Fallen heroes

The Parmer County Veterans Memorial was dedicated on Memorial Day in 1993 in the Farwell City Park.

The memorial honors county men who died during war time.

James R. Fortenberry

James Richard Fortenberry, son of Mr. And Mrs. Paul Fortenberry, was born in Amarillo. His parents moved to Friona where he was raised. He graduated from the Oklahoma Military Academy in 1968 and joined the U.S. Army in September 1969.

He was assigned to the 15th Medical Battalion of the 1st Calvary in Vietnam. He was "crew chief" on a "MEDEVAC" helicopter when he died Sept. 24, 1970.

He was awarded the Distinguished Flying cross, the Air Medal with 7 through 8 Award, the Army Commendation Medal, Good Conduct Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal, Aircraft Crewman Badge (Wings), and Republic of Vietnam Armed Forced Honor Medal.

Farwell's mule barn once delivered gas to area farmers

The two oldest buildings in Farwell have stood proud and defiant for decades becoming more and more common. without attracting much in the way of honors or notice of city residents.

The old Kemp Lumber Yard at the west end of Avenue B, one of the first businesses here, is over a century old, as is the old mule barn of the Texas Company that stands north of Avenue A near 4th Street.

The Texas Co. label, still painted on the south side of the old barn, was established in 1901 and grew rapidly on the wealth of Texas' petroleum reserves that Woody Lovelace, who operated it for a half-century. were first discovered in the "gusher well" at Spindletop.

The nation's growing automobile industry was turning out the thousands of Oil Co. Today, the property is owned by Farwell Fuels.) motor vehicles that suddenly began to fill American roads. That revolution in transportation made the creation of a network of service stations that sold gas, by motorized trucks to make deliveries oils, and diesel a booming enterprise too.

The Texas Co. adopted a distinctive banjo-shaped sign to mark its stations with a bold white star beaming from a red field in honor of the Lone Star state of Texas. One of those historic "banjo signs" remains on Farwell's main street adjacent to the mule barn to this day.

Sometime prior to 1905, the name on the signs was shortened to "Texaco" (although the company's directors did not adopt that as the official name until 1959.)

It was sometime in the earlier days of Farwell, over a century ago, that the young fuel company established a tank depot here from which to distribute its products to area farmers.

Among the earliest wagon masters were the father of Mitz Walling, followed by Bill Massey and Dick Hunter.

Early each morning, the mules would be led out of their stalls and hitched up to a wagon carrying a large tank that was filled with gasoline. The new-fangled farm equipments that used internal combustion engines instead of horses were

The old Texas Fuel Company barn just north of U.S. 70-84 in Farwell is one of the oldest buildings in town.

Also, other cans on the wagon contained lubricants and the newer petroleum products that fueled the stoves and provided heat and lighting for rural homes. The mules then plodded each day down the dirt roads to make deliveries to farmers and their families.

After the end of World War II, the fuel distributorship was purchased by

Progress had moved on by that time and the mule teams had been replaced

Even with the departure of its lop-eared tenants, the old mule barn continued its service for decades more as a storeroom and a garage.

Those days passed in their own turn and the old mule barn was finally allowed to settle into a genteel retirement. Pigeons roost in its hay loft, the sun bakes its tattered shingles, and it watches impassively as the cars and trucks and farm machinery trundle by in a constant stream on the adjacent highway.

Just over a century ago, the Texas Company and its mule barn were the hub of activity in the young town. They combined to provide the fuels without which motorized vehicles and equipment would have been impossible to operate in Parmer and Curry counties.

The old barn has stood in Farwell for over a century now, unnoticed by the

traffic that streams down the highway and indifferent to the passage of years. It must be puzzled how all those years (and its old friendly mules) managed to slip past and fade from memory so quickly.

Because the highway will be closed during the parade, Hereford Street in Texico will be used as a bypass for traffic moving through the area.





County burn ban extended for 30 days

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday drug-detection dog and handler in its own investigaextended the burn ban an additional month due to the ongoing drought and extreme danger of wild-

Requests were considered and rejected to provide a temporary respite from the burn ban in only the southern part of the county, that area which has received the majority of the moisture in the past month, scant though it may be.

This temporary lifting of the ban would have allowed rural residents there to burn the refuse that's piled up in their burn pits or to conduct controlled burns on wheat stubble.

The commissioners debated the benefits of a temporary and limited lifting of the ban in the current conditions of greatly reduced winds. These benefits, however, they decided were outweighed by the says, "and some of them have told me that they can't danger that would result from any flames that even a help noticing that it hasn't rained ever since they controlled burn might spark downwind.

In other business, the commissioners:


Robert Murrell Smith died July 18, 2011, at his home in Lake Elsinore, Calif.



Border Farwell city council responds to questions

The Farwell City Council on July 19 responded to a variety of questions from concerned residents.

Rose Longley inquired about the status of certification for the city's water manager and was told two city employees are currently engaged in the training process mandated to receive that certification.

"It's going to take a while," explained mayor Jimmie Mace. "We've had no applicants for the job who already possessed that certification and we want to get at least two qualified like that so we can have a primary and a back-up all the time in the

Janice Clement noted that the previous water manager, Joe Servin, had resigned but still continues to draw a salary from the city even though he has already been in his new job as a truck driver for another employer.

"The city of Farwell is still operating under the certification he holds," Mace said. "He is not in a 9-to-5 job but he continues to provide the city his skills and advice and qualifications so he is still working for us."

Ken McDaniel complained that the 50 mile per hour speed limit coming into town on U.S. Highway 70-84 from Lariat is excessive, saying that two accidents have occurred in the last year, particularly when the blacktop is wet.

He requested that the city reduce the speed limit and correct the deficiencies in the water run-off measures for the road surface in that area.

"Fixing drainage and setting speed limits on that road belong to the state, not this city," explained Mace. "We have asked before for a reduction on the speed of vehicles going through our town and the state said no."

"It would suit this council fine if the speed on 70-84 was 35 miles per hour from a mile east of the city all the way to the railroad tracks," he added.

Ms. Clement and Mr. McDaniel contended that a petition by Farwell's citizens and an intensified insistence by the city council could force the state to agree to the city's request.

In agenda items, the council:

-- Learned that the city's contribution to the Texas Municipal Retire-ment System would be reduced from 16.24 percent to the lower rate of 16.03 percent.

-- Discussed the 4.3 percent increase in rates by Republic (formerly Duncan) Disposal. The issue was tabled to facilitate analysis of the existing contract, to obtain more information from the contractor, and to research alternatives.

-- Rejected the Energy Resolution of Southwest Wednesday and Friday; Public Service / XCEL.

-- Received a report on the work completions of municipal employees to include the sewer repairs on the southernmost blocks of 3rd and 4th streets, the water hook-up to the Farwell schools athletic field, the ongoing repairs of pot-holes, and the continuous routine requirements.

A brick with the name of an individual or family can be purchased at the PCHC booth as well, everlastingly etching those names into the pantheon of the county's history.


There are two categories 7 and under, and 8-12 years of age.

French and Nellie Crook of Bovina, attended Bovina Schools. He was killed in action on June 15, 1952, during the Korean War. He was 24 years old.

He was drafted into the U.S. Army and entered with a group of young men from the Alpine, Texas, area. He wrote home expressing anxiety about the huge man sleeping in the bunk over him. It was later found that this man was Dan Blocker who later was a star of the TV show "Bonanza".

Crook was assigned to Company I of the 45th Infantry Division. His company was shipped out to Hokkaido, Japan, and eventually on to Korea.

He had attained the rank of Sergeant First Class and was killed when his bunker sustained a direct hit. His location was overtaken by the North Koreans and it was some time before they were forced out and the casualties were discovered.

Crook's name also appears on a memorial erected in the city of El Paso, Texas. It was dedicated to the soldier killed in the Korean War from the El Paso

He was buried in April 1954 in Bovina Cemetery, next to his brother, Richard, who was killed in 1948 in a truck accident between Portales and Roswell,

Ples L. New

Mr. and Mrs. E. R. New, formerly of Friona, were informed in July 1944 that their son, Ples LeGrande New, met his death in France on July 8th. New was connected with the local Farmer's Elevator before entering service.

In March 1942, he entered service and was assigned to Camp Barkeley, Texas for training with the 90th Division, 358th Infantry, following which he E. Taylor, son of Mr. And Mrs. E. E. Taylor of Friona, Maxwell M. Caldwell of San Antonio, had spent went to California in 1943 for desert training.

Just two years after his entry into the Army, he sailed with the 90th for England, and was there one month before joining in the invasion of France on June 6th. A short six weeks later Sqt. New met his death by enemy action. He was 37 years old.

Rex McElroy

In March 1942, Parmer County's casualty list was started when Mr. And Mrs. F. W. McElroy, formerly of Farwell, received word that their son, Rex, was believed lost along with other members of the crew on the submarine "Shark".

The War Department's communiqué revealed that the Shark was more than 30 days overdue, and was presumed lost in the Far East.


E M 2-C McElroy was a Navy man of some years, having served one 4-year hitch on the "Texas" and "Nevada", and then entering the submarine branch, where he had three years of training at a sub base before war was declared.

He would have been 28 years of age in July 1942.

H. Macyl Roberts

Entering service on March 15, 1942, Herman Macyl Roberts served overseas from July that same year to

Island in the Samoa group, where he was stationed for 16 months. From there, Roberts went to the Hawaiian Islands, serving from October 1943 to 1, Friona, Texas. January 1944. His last letter came from Hawaii. His movements are then unknown until Feb. 17, 1944, when he took part in the Battle of Engibi Island.

Nathaniel E. Taylor

when he was swimming in the San Marcos River Christmas in the home of J.R.'s parents near Farwell. near San Marcos, Texas. The accident occurred on April 28, 1944.

Taylor entered the Army at Fort Sill on May 28, 1943, and shortly thereafter was sent to Sheppard Field, and later to Kelley Field. On Nov. 1, he was of the crash and the bodies until the following fall. moved to San Marcos, were he entered the Air Corps navigation school.

Loyd Reiser

An unexpected tragedy of war took the life of Sgt. Loyd Reiser, son of Mr. And Mrs. Edward J. Reiser, on May 14, 1944.

Flying in formation with other C-47 transport planes, over Italy, Reiser was killed when his plane collided with two others in the formation. Thirteen young Americans went to their deaths in the crash.

Reiser was engaged in farming north of Bovina for some time, and had attended the Bovina, Rhea, and Friona Schools. He volunteered for the Air Force on Dec. 28, 1941.

Burial was in the Mt. Sopranio Military Cemetery, not far from Rome, Italy.

William J. Palmer

Pvt. William J. Palmer lost his life in an accident,

Oran Brown

A resident of Lariat, he died in the Philippine Islands during World War II.

Claude I. Gober

Lt. Claude Isom Gober, son of Mr. And Mrs. J.I. Gober of Farwell, was born on Aug. 3, 1920, near Frederick, Okla., and died in the crash of a B-17 plane near Wargrave, England on Nov. 13, 1943.

Affectionately known as "Buzz", the young man grew up in the Oklahoma Lane community, joining the AAF in August,1944. He trained as a bombardier on a B-17 at Ellington Field, Houston, and Big







Spring, receiving his commission in April 1943, leaving the States in September of that year.

His death was one of unaccountables of war. According to a letter from Sampson Sharff, who ordinarily served as co-pilot in the crew with Gober, the B-17 started out on an operational mission, and while over Britain went into a spin that carried most of the crew to death.

Gober, as bombardier, could have released the plane's bombs and possibly saved some lives, but the bombs would have struck a small English town, and the ship went down with its load of explosives.

Kenneth W. Bainum

Kenneth Wade Bainum, was born March 25, 1930. He died in an Air Force plane crash on Aug. 18, 1964, during the Vietnam War.

He was the son of Charles and Tina Bainum. He is buried in the Friona Cemetery.

Ira B. Benger

Capt. Ira B. Benger, of Friona, was killed in an accident which occurred at Biggs Field, El Paso.

He graduated from Friona High in 1937 and attended Texas Tech until he joined the Air Force in 1940. He was stationed at Santa Maria, Calif., for primary raining, and at Mofett Field, Calif. For basics. He graduated from the Stockton, Calif. Base in May,

1941, with honors, receiving his second lieutenant commission. He returned to Moffett Field as instructor and later transferred, with the school, to La Madison Wis., Jackson, Fla., Harlingen, Texas, and Moore Field as flight commander.

He volunteered into the B-17 school at Siebling, Fla., qualifying as pilot for all types of planes and upon completion of his work there, was stationed at Tucson, Pueblo, Colo., to instruct in the new school for B-24 pilots, and became a first pilot.

Everett L. Gee

PFC Everett Louis Gee, of the U.S. Marines, gave his life in action against the Japanese on the island of Peliliu, in the Palau group, on Sept. 28, 1944. He was 20 years of age at the time of his death.

Gee, son of Mrs. F.R. Barber of Bovina, and husband of Julia Hardage Gee, entered the service at San Diego, and was sent overseas for duty on April Fifth Army groups which hit the Anzio Beach in the 18, 1944.

Virgil H. Weis

PFC Virgil Harry Weis, son of Mrs. Carl Bender of Friona, is buried in an American military cemetery on Tacoblan, in the Philippines.

He died in an American hospital near Palo on Leyte in the Philippines, on April 2, 1945. The cause of his death was not determined.

Weis spent more than four years in the service, having been inducted on March 2, 1941.

William J. Skulley

No information is available about PFC William J. Skulley except for the fat that he was killed in action during World War II.

Roy E. Hughes

Staff Sgt. Roy E. Hughes met his death Feb. 12, 1944, while flying his 15th mission as a top turret gunner, with the 15th Air Force.

The plane was shot down near the German-Austrian border and only one crew member, the waist gunner, escaped with his life, only to be taken prisoner.

Hughes was awarded the Air Medal with tow Oak Leaf clusters and the Purple Heart, presented posthumously to his parents, Mr. And Mrs. B.A. Hughes, of Friona.

A 1939 graduate of Friona high school, he was employed at Reeves Chevrolet when he entered service on Aug. 7, 1942.

Training was taken at St. Petersburg, Fla., Langley Field, Va. Hughes was assigned to the antisubmarine patrol with a bomber crew, based at Jacksonville, Fla., and later at Cuba before going to Italy with a B-24 crew in September, 1943.

S. Dence Justice

Sgt. Stephen Dence Justice, son of Mr. And Mrs. Sam J. Justice of Farwell, was killed in action in the Battle of the Bulge, on Dec. 23, 1944. Justice entered service on Jan. 7, 1941, volunteering at Clovis.

At Fort Bliss, he asked to be transferred to the paratroops, and was sent to Fort Benning, Ga., for his training. His first overseas assignment was in Africa in February 1943, after which he was in the Invasion of Italy, and moved into Southern France in

September 1944.

Justice belonged to the 509th Parachute Infantry Battallion which was cited for outstanding service by Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark.

Mrs. Justice received word that her son was buried in an American military cemetery an Henri-Chappelle, in Belgium.

John Tetum Wilkerson

He lived in Parmer County when he joined the U.S. Army. He was a member of the 36th Infantry Division when he died near Salerno, Italy in 1944.





Water board rules finalized

The High Plains Underground Water District No. 1 board unanimously approved on July 19 amendments to implement their management goal to have 40 percent of the saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer in 2010 available for use in 2060.

This includes the district's first-ever production limits which will be phased in starting with a limit of 1.75 acre-feet, or 21 inches, per acre of water rights in 2010; and ending with 1.25 acrefeet, or 15 inches, in 2016.

Another change is the requirement for meters on new wells starting Jan. 1.

Existing wells will need meters by 2016 but will have to measure usage through an alternative method until then.

Plains The usage must be meters and alternative water reported to the district methods will be available on the district's website proved A list of approved on Sept. 1.



was a graduate of Oklahoma Lane School. He was drafted into the Army on March 18, 1941.

After training at Ft. Bliss, he was sent to the Philippines Aug. 20, 1941. He fought on Bataan and received the Distinguished Unit Citation with Oak Leaf Clusters. He survived the Bataan Death march, but died from illness in the Philippines Aug. 23, 1943.

Owen Drake

Pvt. Owen Drake, formerly of Friona, met his death in the invasion of Normandy, near St. Lo, France on July 30, 1944. He was the son of Mr. And Mrs. A.O. Drake.

Entering service in November 1943, Drake was assigned to the 115th Infantry of the 29th Division. He landed in England on July 12, 1944 and hit France on July 18, to meet his death only two weeks later. His remains were buried at a military cemetery at Le Chene, Guerin, France.

In his column of July, 1944, the late beloved Ernie Pyle spoke of "the breakout from our beachhead", in which Drake's outfit participated. Pyle writes "at least paste it (July 25) in your mind. For I have a hunch that July 25 of this year 1944 which will be one of the great historic pinnacles of this war."

At the top of the May 21, 1919, issue was an ad for the Plains Buying and Selling Association of Texico-

The new store carried a full line of staple groceries, feed, coal, gas and oil. And it said it paid the highest market price for butter and eggs.

Apparently, the News wasn't doing that well financially as its top page 1 story was headlined "Notice to Those Who Should Advertise."

The previous week the advertising space in the News was less than 19 percent. Weekly papers should average more than 50 percent.

The article pointed out the main businesses in the Twin Cities: 2 banks, 2 drug stores, 2 pressing and cleaning establishments, 2 butcher shops, 2 lumber yards, 2 manufacturing industries, 1 commission company, 2 brokerage companies, 1 tin shop, 2 milliners, 1 produce house, 3 doctors, 1 theater, 1

- -- The commissioners court met. "The road case seems to be about the only matter of interest. There was some talk of compromise but it all went up in -- Visitors to the area included Mrs. Stephen smoke."


