## Texico may increase

## rates for city utilities

The Texico City Council on Aug. 23 agreed on plans to increase rates on city utilities.
A public hearing on the proposals will be held on Sept. 13. See ad elsewhere today's Tribune for details.
The water rate will increase by 5 cents for every 1,000 gallons used over 4,000 allons.
Sewer rates will be increased by $\$ 1$ to $\$ 14.70$ for residential and $\$ 17.47$ for ommercial.
The garbage collection rates in the city will go up by $\$ 1$. It will cost $\$ 19.50$ for esidential. Outside the city it goes up to $\$ 24.53$ for residences. Commercial properties also increased by a dollar, depending on how often it is picked up. The council also will start charging for landfill usage. City residents will now pay $\$ 10$ per car load, and $\$ 20$ per trailer load to use the roll-off site.
The site will be locked and a city worker will need to open it up.
In other news, the council:

- Discussed the route the water lines would take for the new wells south of own. The city was working on securing easements to make the route more direct.

Olivet cemetery had its first burial in 1907
assed on some interesting facts about the Olivet emetery south of Farwel:

The 10 -acre cemetery has about 91 graves. The first burial was Essie Hootenpyle in 1907 and the last
orded in 1988 was Connell Dycus.
The grave of John Armstrong in 1908 is a very ignificant part of early history as he was the managhot by cattle thieves in Bovina while loading cattle to be shipped by rail.
-- Other historical graves are of a family including mother and her eight children who were murdered in 1926 by their step-father and who also was their uncle.
The mass murderer was George Hassell who was convicted of these crimes and sentenced to die in the electric chair. He had also been convicted with he murder of a previous wife and three children in California.
-- There are stones that indicate one Civil War veteran and veterans of World War I and II.

From 1939: same spir- in the hardwood floo declared "they shall not pass, on the battlefields France in 1918, the high school students of Oklahoma Lane with all dds apparently against hem stood their ground Monday noon and fough ossful finish a well advanced fire that threat ened to destroy their pride and jot the high school auditorium.
When the fire was out the boys found themselves minus all their clothing but disregarded their personal losses with a beaming smile hat wrote across their countenance.
"We saved our new auditorium, so what matrs?"
The fire struck at the noon hour whie the mall chiassrooms con nected with the auditorimere idle from stud ies. Members of the boys basketball team, dressed n their gym suits, were practicing basketball on the indoor court.
Suddenly, without previous warning, janitor Tucker interrupted the practice game with cries of "fire." The boys quicky organized a bucket brigade as the waterfilled buckets were filled from hydrants in the yard. They were passed human chain of active thletes who played the water on the lapping flames that had originatd in the boys dressing room upstairs, in a small room that contained all their clothing.
Time and again, the leaping flames and intense smoke fought the boys back but not for long. The fight was continued while the lady teachers and girls

"closer to 50 percent off production," says Williams. closer to 50 percent off production," says Williams.
David McDermid, a dairy owner in Texico, has also felt the effects of the drought.
His dairy produces its own silage for the cows and his yields this year were off about 50 percent. Generally his land produces around $28-29$ tons of silage per acre. Due to the drought, this year the yields were only about 10-12 tons.
With production numbers so low, McDermid says dairies will "lose a ton of money" by having to find alternative feed sources for their cows.
Many local dairies and ranchers are experiencing similar but slightly different problems this year. The amount of silage produced is so low that there is a re being forced to sell their cattle when they can't are being forced to sell their Dairies are in slighly a diff
Dairies are in slightly a different position. They do find food from other places when they have a bad crop. This means they are definitely feeling the effects of the drought financially just like farmers and ranchers.
Williams predicts that this drought will have longerm effects on the area. "Even if rain comes right now, it will take a long time to get the soil profile back normal" he says.
Many farmers are now adjusting their future plans in accordance with the drought conditions. "Next year's planting of corn will be conservative and cres of corn will diminish in this area," predicts Villiams.
He also foresees a shift to sorghum silage and hay grazers for cattle food sources. Many farmers will be orced to plant alternative crops that may not pay as uch as corn but will require less water. with the drought. Even if rain comes soon, busiated es will continue to feel the pinch of the drought of 2011. In reality, every local citizen and our local economy will also feel the pinch.

Hopefully this year is what one old farmer described as a "once in a hundred years" occurrence.

## New Homestead Exemption Application Rules

## Become Effective on Sept. 1, 2011

Beginning this month, individuals seeking to apply for a homestead exemption in Texas will need to comply with a new application process.
The recent session of the Texas Legislature imposed rigorous new standards of mandatory disclosure for those property owners who apply for any one of several kinds of homestead exemptions starting Sept. 1.
property tax purposes, homestead exemption for property tax purposes, applicants must now pro-
vide a copy of their Texas driver's license or Texas state-issued identification card and a copy of their vehicle registration receipt with their application for a homestead exemption.
Moreover, the addresses shown on each of the documents must be the game as the address for which the homestead is sought.
Those who do not own a vehicle will be required to submit a notarized affidavit certifying that fact and provide a copy of a current bill received from a
utility company. The address on the utility bill must utility company. The address on the utility bill must
be the same as the address on the application for a be the same as the ad
homestead exemption.
The Legislature has closed loopholes in disclosure that allowed some citizens to obtain homestead exemptions on more than one property.  from Jim Swafford, CEO of Scandia Wind Southwest:During this season of drought and diminished crops, area farmers have asked me when we are oing to get those wind turbines. There is some
Area transmission lizon
Area transmission lines have been approved to begin construction in the Panhandle. These lines, transport power to the large populated areas in southern Texas.

It is estimated that these lines will be energized in late 2013.
Wind developers will soon be notified as to their interconnection status to connect to these new lines. Mariah wind project applied for 1,200 megawatts.
Scandia Wind Southwest put up $\$ 1$ million collateral (non-refundable) to assure the Public Utility Commission that our site would be here two years from now and have the capacity needed to support eir construction buildout.
The Mariah Project is well into its third year of development. We have under contract lease agreeand Dallam counties consisting of over 500 landowners.
We continue to gather wind data, monitor wildlife and environmental studies. We have completed most permitting requirements for the local, county, state and federal agencies. One important permit we have been approved for is from the Federal Aviation Administration.
We still have a lot of work yet to be done and costs associated with it. Scandia Wind Southwest continues to look for investors for needed funds to offset future development cost.
Our office in Bovina is open Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. Everyone is welcome to come by and visit for further Mariah Project updates.
