## Red Lonsdale Texico teacher <br> is one of a kind

Any student who has ever been in Ridley "Red" Lonsdale's class at Texico Elementary School knows a few things:

1. He despises the Dallas Cowboys.
2. He is a big Oklahoma University fan.
3. His class is different than all the others.

Without a doubt, Red is a unique 3rd grade teacher. Ask anyone who knows him.
Students who have been in his class will elaborate at length about all of the fun things that happened during the year. Anything from making "gak" (think slime) on the first day of school to sewing turkeys for Thanksgiving to playing football.
Red likes to get kids involved. He tells the kids on the first day of school about his love of football and his preferences for teams.
He dislikes the Dallas Cowboys because he believes the 'boys got "preferen tial treatment from officials during big games". So, when the first unsuspecting student happens to wear a Cowboy's jersey - he or she ends up with a big duct ape " $X$ " across their shirt for the rest of the day

His theory about this type of teaching is simple - he just "looks for ways to make things fun. The best learning takes place with a fun emotion"
He learned this from his wife, Gayla, a diagnostician in Clovis. She told him that all learning comes from emotion and a positive emotion is the best motivator.
However, this positive attitude did not always relate to teaching. Before Mr. Lonsdale earned his teaching degree from ENMU, he attended another school barber college.
In 1977, he graduated from Barber College in Lubbock. Many people around the Farwell area still remember him from his days cutting hair. He originally began working at a barber shop on Avenue $A$ in Farwell for an elderly barber named Sterling Billington, one of our area's pioneers
When Billington died, Red took over the barber shop and cut hair for about 8 years before arthritis caused him to give up that occupation. After his last ear there, he was named Border Town Days Honorary Parade Marshal
e to sweep up in the evening While they worked, he would hide some change (enough for a soda) behind the Coke machine. He would challenge them to think of a way to get the money out with only a yardstick and some bubblegum. He began teaching at Texico in 1999 when he was hired as a junior high special education aide. The next year he was offered a 4th grade classroom where he taught for 3 years before moving to his current job. Over the years he has completed his master's degree in education and level 3 dossier
Another aspect of the multi-talented man is his woodworking ability.
As a hobby, he took up working with the skill saw to create different projects.

As his skill progressed, he decided to use it in his lassroom. About three years ago, he started making wood cut-out names for all the students who eached their Accelerated Reading goals (200 points) for the year in his class

These names have become coveted prizes. Every kid wants his name made by Mr. Lonsdale because they are so well done. He personalizes each project with arrows, sports themes, crosses, or things the child likes. For anyone who reaches 300 AR points, he creates an elaborate wood 3-D puzzle in a shape like a motorcycle, a car or other pattern. Talk about motivating a student to read - these oood projects certainly do the trick!
Red hopes to continue teaching until his retirement age in about 10 years. He loves working with He hopes that his health problems won't get in the way and feels that he was "blessed with a personality to enjoy his job".

## Working at a family newspaper...

From the 1986 Tribune
During the Depression of the 1930s, State Line Tribune publisher "Hop" Graham hired his daughter "Abie," to help run the family newspaper
Abie was familiar with the back shop and was Faced with a 90 -key machine was a formidable task.
Abie and her dad put in lots of long hours during
he first few months as she struggled not only to get the type set, but correct as well. There were plenty of errors but within three months she was able to set the type as good as any area operator.
The linotype itself was a wonderful, weird Rube Goldberg-looking machine and was a breath of life for newspapers.
With its steel fingers, it picked up a specialized size of type of loose matrixes, and ingested them into its maw following a series of complicated procedures, then injected a slug of lead with the printing aces on top.
This is what actually made the readable print in the newspaper. The machine didn't stop there. It had came down, picked up the loose mats, lifted them to he distributor bar and collected them so they fell the distributor bar and collected them so they fell uts on the individual mats.
We had an old Mod
geared to run around two lines a minute which was any other linotype machine in the area. There was always another line waiting while she worked.
The machine had its way of retaliating, though. If things done by the operator were not exactly right, it could spit out hot lead at the operator. Abie recalled the day that happened and a splash hit her on the op of her head, slamming her chair back and it crashed over while she was frantically pawing at her hair trying to dislodge the metal. A friend came up behind her and dowsed her hair with a cup of water. Ithought I was bleeding to death at first, Abie said. was funny later but not then, she added.
The only change made to the linotype while Abie cast into 18 -inch long forms with a hooked netal which eliminated hand scooping into the heated pot of the machine.
The crane which held the "pigs" was programmed o feed just what was necessary into the metal pot to keep the hot metal at the right level. And as Abie said, it sure beat hopping up and down, scooping more metal in as needed and eliminated forgetting he pot was so low that you had to pile in a bunch of metal and waited until it melted down.
Unfortunately, like the dinosaur, the linotype became obsolete with the advance of high tech. They are all gone from modern newspaper offices. Hop paid Abie $\$ 10$ a day for her three days work. Abie said room and board were thrown in and she felt she was roling in money. Occasionally, Hop farmed his daughter out to the Clovis News-Journal and was not smart heough to know that the mal nd was consider her an invader. operators considered her an invader
end Abie went off to the Lexas, two months.
From her dad and the late Paul Crume, Abie developed a knack for writing. When Paul went to college, she took over his writing duties, including the sideine, play-by-play bit on football games.
"Paul had such a marvelous vocabulary that I earned to write many run of the mill stories with a change of style," she said, adding that Paul's consistent use of the different words challenged her to learn.
As times improved, James Oliver "Plnky" Martin oined the Tribune as a printer's devil and sometimes writer, learning later the linotype.
Hop also started two of the Jones brothers in the usiness. ventually becoming operators and staying in that

The one thing Hop was never able to teach his young charges was to sell ads. As Paulie put it, his idea of selling was to ask a local merchant, "You ally didn't.
So Hop continued to be the main provider of income for the paper. Hop was really an amazing man, Abie recalled. He had only an 8th grade education but could write easily. He would occasionally turn to Abie to help fill in some words because he wasn't sure of the spelling.
One of the shop jokes the two of them shared was over the copy of a handbill that had been turned in for the paper. I puzzled over this one item (it was Abie said. We both studied "inles belt item" for 30 minutes before it dawned "Inles" turned out to be "endless." The word stayed in shop talk for a num ber of years.

The Tribune had its once in a lifetime place in the sun when the Hassell murder trial was held in Farwell. But mainly what Abie remembers is that an Extra was issued -- the only one in the history of the paper, and she got to peddle papers up and down the residential streets, amassing what was a special income of $\$ 2$.
All the youngsters learned to do makeup of the paper, operate the big press, along with less technical jobs. One thing they did wasn't that smart because when Hop left word for the back end of the building to be cleaned, the permanent files of the Tribune went into the bonfire with the assorted trash. This happened in 1939
along too late to get pushed around by Abily cam along too late to get pushed around by Abie and he usually called "Sonny," turned out to be managing editor after his father died and continued in that capacity until the paper was sold to John and Joann capac
Getz.
When Hop first bought the paper, which he renamed the State Line Tribune, it had been housed in the old Hayne's Grocery building on 2nd Street But problems arose. Hop was preparing to instal both a linotype and a heavy press and the floor of the Hayne's building could not take the load.
Capital Freehold had a building with hardwood
floors which would bear the weight of the new

Wer driven by hand-feeding one sheet at a time. Mrs. Hop and Sammy joined the crew on paper day to help with necessary folding and addressing the papers. Like most country papers, the Tribune did not carry many local pictures during its early days. Before new techniques and Polaroid cameras, paper whers it was turned into a cut, which could be printed.
On the other hand, the Tribune boasted the fasted of the old hand-spiking printers in the business. Hand-spiking was simply picking up each individual letter to spell out a line of type, then locking it into place for the printing process. With husband Kater Crume off to war, Abie put in er three days at the Tribune, then hopped a bus and spent the rest of the week at a machine for the Amarillo Globe-News.
