Red Lonsdale

Texico teacher is one of a kind

Any student who has ever been in Ridley "Red" Lonsdale's class at Texico Elementary School knows a few things:

- 1. He despises the Dallas Cowboys.
- 2. He is a big Oklahoma University fan.
- 3. His class is different than all the others.

Without a doubt, Red is a unique 3rd grade teacher. Ask anyone who knows

Students who have been in his class will elaborate at length about all of the fun things that happened during the year. Anything from making "gak" (think slime) on the first day of school to sewing turkeys for Thanksgiving to playing

Red likes to get kids involved. He tells the kids on the first day of school about his love of football and his preferences for teams.

He dislikes the Dallas Cowboys because he believes the 'boys got "preferential treatment from officials during big games". So, when the first unsuspecting student happens to wear a Cowboy's jersey - he or she ends up with a big duct tape "X" across their shirt for the rest of the day.

Of course, everyone in class thinks this is hilarious and they can't wait for the next time someone forgets.

Every morning he throws footballs to the kids as he talks or asks them ques-

tions. He says this practice "gets them awake and moving." He does many things to keep the kids engaged during their lessons, like having them stand on their chair to answer questions, do dance moves, and even

sing their answers. Anything to motivate them. His theory about this type of teaching is simple - he just "looks for ways to make things fun. The best learning takes place with a fun emotion".

He learned this from his wife, Gayla, a diagnostician in Clovis. She told him that all learning comes from emotion and a positive emotion is the best motiva-

However, this positive attitude did not always relate to teaching. Before Mr. Lonsdale earned his teaching degree from ENMU, he attended another school -

In 1977, he graduated from Barber College in Lubbock. Many people around the Farwell area still remember him from his days cutting hair. He originally began working at a barber shop on Avenue A in Farwell for an elderly barber named Sterling Billington, one of our area's pioneers.

When Billington died, Red took over the barber shop and cut hair for about 18 years before arthritis caused him to give up that occupation. After his last year there, he was named Border Town Days Honorary Parade Marshal.

When kids would hang out at the barber shop, he often would pay them a little to sweep up in the evening. While they worked, he would hide some change (enough for a soda) behind the Coke machine. He would challenge them to think of a way to get the money out with only a yardstick and some bubblegum.

He began teaching at Texico in 1999 when he was hired as a junior high special education aide. The next year he was offered a 4th grade classroom where he taught for 3 years before moving to his current job. Over the years he has completed his master's degree in education and level 3 dossier.

Another aspect of the multi-talented man is his woodworking ability.

As a hobby, he took up working with the skill saw to create different projects.

He eventually took a woodworking class with Gayla and created a gun cabinet for their house.

As his skill progressed, he decided to use it in his classroom. About three years ago, he started making wood cut-out names for all the students who reached their Accelerated Reading goals (200 points) for the year in his class.

These names have become coveted prizes. Every kid wants his name made by Mr. Lonsdale because they are so well done. He personalizes each project with arrows, sports themes, crosses, or things the child likes. For anyone who reaches 300 AR points, he creates an elaborate wood 3-D puzzle in a shape like a motorcycle, a car or other pattern.

Talk about motivating a student to read - these wood projects certainly do the trick!

Red hopes to continue teaching until his retirement age in about 10 years. He loves working with the kids and the supportive administration at Texico. He hopes that his health problems won't get in the way and feels that he was "blessed with a personality to enjoy his job".

Texico Supt. R.L. Richards, agrees that Red is "one of the finest educators I know ... he does Texico proud."

One of the things kids appreciate most is when Red and Gayla come to their little league, volleyball, football or basketball games.

By taking an interest in the kids outside of the classroom, Red knows they will work harder for him inside the classroom. For Red, it is all about the kids and getting involved.

Working at a family newspaper...

From the 1986 Tribune:

During the Depression of the 1930s, State Line Tribune publisher "Hop" Graham hired his daughter, "Abie," to help run the family newspaper.

Abie was familiar with the back shop and was given the job of running the new linotype machine. Faced with a 90-key machine was a formidable task.

Abie and her dad put in lots of long hours during the first few months as she struggled not only to get the type set, but correct as well. There were plenty of errors but within three months she was able to set the type as good as any area operator.

The linotype itself was a wonderful, weird Rube Goldberg-looking machine and was a breath of life for newspapers.

With its steel fingers, it picked up a specialized size of type of loose matrixes, and ingested them into its maw following a series of complicated procedures, then injected a slug of lead with the printing faces on top.

This is what actually made the readable print in the newspaper. The machine didn't stop there. It had another trick up its sleeve. When an elongated arm came down, picked up the loose mats, lifted them to the distributor bar and collected them so they fell into the proper slots in the magazine according to cuts on the individual mats.

We had an old Model 5, Abie recalls, which was geared to run around two lines a minute faster than any other linotype machine in the area. There was always another line waiting while she worked.

The machine had its way of retaliating, though. If things done by the operator were not exactly right, it could spit out hot lead at the operator. Abie recalled the day that happened and a splash hit her on the top of her head, slamming her chair back and it crashed over while she was frantically pawing at her hair trying to dislodge the metal. A friend came up behind her and dowsed her hair with a cup of water.

I thought I was bleeding to death at first, Abie said. It was funny later but not then, she added.

The only change made to the linotype while Abie operated it was the coming of "pigs." This was metal cast into 18-inch long forms with a hooked neck, which eliminated hand scooping into the heated pot of the machine.

The crane which held the "pigs" was programmed to feed just what was necessary into the metal pot to keep the hot metal at the right level. And as Abie said, it sure beat hopping up and down, scooping more metal in as needed and eliminated forgetting the pot was so low that you had to pile in a bunch of metal and waited until it melted down.

Unfortunately, like the dinosaur, the linotype became obsolete with the advance of high tech. They are all gone from modern newspaper offices.

Hop paid Abie \$10 a day for her three days work. Abie said room and board were thrown in and she felt she was rolling in money. Occasionally, Hop farmed his daughter out to the Clovis News-Journal and other papers in the area where she did the job and was not smart enough to know that the male operators considered her an invader.

Hop even got her a job on the Longview, Texas, paper and Abie went off to the oil boom country for two months.

From her dad and the late Paul Crume, Abie developed a knack for writing. When Paul went to college, she took over his writing duties, including the sideline, play-by-play bit on football games.

"Paul had such a marvelous vocabulary that I learned to write many run of the mill stories with a change of style," she said, adding that Paul's consistent use of the different words challenged her to

As times improved, James Oliver "Plnky" Martin joined the Tribune as a printer's devil and sometimes writer, learning later the linotype.

Hop also started two of the Jones brothers in the business. Paulie came first and Rusty followed later, eventually becoming operators and staying in that

Reasonable Notice of Open Meeting Law

The Texico City Council met in a regular session on September 27, 2011, and decided that reasonable notice to the public as required in Open Meetings Act (NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1 to 4) would be as follows:

Unless the business before the City Council dictates otherwise, the City Council conducts open meetings to take formal action on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at 6:30 p.m. However, when that Tuesday is a City holiday, that meeting will be held on the next business day.

The City Clerk and staff were authorized and directed to publish an annual schedule of regular meetings as legal advertisement in the State Line Tribune.

Emergency meetings will be called only under circumstances, which demand immediate action to protect the health, safety and property of citizens or to protect the public body from substantial financial loss. The City of Texico Council will avoid emergency meetings whenever possible. Emergency meetings may be called by the Mayor or a majority of the members upon four (4) hours notice, unless threat of personal injury or property damage requires less notice. The notice for all emergency meetings shall include an agenda for the meeting or information on how the public may obtain a copy of the

The Mayor or majority of the council members upon three (3) days notice may call special meetings. The notices shall include an agenda for the meeting or information on how members of the public may obtain a copy of the agenda. The agenda shall be available to the public at least twenty-four hours before any special meeting.

All other meetings which may be called for informational purposes at which no action is taken shall be held only after written notice is issued to the State Line Tribune no later than 12:00 noon of the day of such meeting, of four (4) hours before such meeting, whichever is greater.




