Texico moves ahead on property clean-up

The Texico City Council checked the local ordinances on trash and rubbish removal on Nov. 22 in preparation for cleaning up the Raul Esparza property on Lamar Street.

Texico will either have to pay an outside contractor to clean up the property, or have city workers clean it up and keep track of costs.

Esparza will be allowed to continue living in the house during the cleanup process.

Once the cleanup is complete, the city will take out a lien on the property for the full amount of cleanup, including dump fees. The costs are expected to be around\$10.000.

When Mike graduated from MMI in 2009, he came home to open his new shop. Originally, he looked at locations in Clovis, but decided that his supporters and friends were in Farwell, so he began looking for property here.

He found a great location next to Lowe's Supermarket and began making plans. After some "major cleanup sessions," he opened Big Mike's Bikes in January 2010.

He said some of his friends thought it was crazy to open in the middle of a bad recession and in the middle of winter but Mike felt it would work out well. He said they had a chance to "work out the bugs" and get ready before the major riding season started.

Mike was right. Over the winter they worked on cars, four wheelers for farm- its ers, dirt bikes – pretty much anything. By spring, they had to discontinue the automobile work because they had so much bike business built up. Since then, they have never looked back.

Mike said he really likes the biker lifestyle -- "most of those guys are just teddy bears with big hearts." He really enjoys talking with bikers from all over who stop in the shop.

One time there was a tour group from Eastern Europe that stopped during their tour of the U.S. While they were here, he walked next door to Lowe's to get a soda and a group of local Girl Scouts were outside selling cookies. He motioned for the girls to grab as many cookies as they could carry and follow him. Mike said the biker's "just melted" and the girls sold all the cookies they brought with them.

Mike insists that he has never met a biker he didn't like and really enjoys going on benefit runs with them. Mike and his crew participate in fund-raising runs every year for Toys for Tots, cancer patients, Thanksgiving meals, tornado victims - whenever there is a good cause. Mike has led a large contingent of bikes in the Border Town Days parade the past two years.

Recently, the Farwell band even received help from bikers. Big Mike's held an annual anniversary celebration and invited bikers from all over to come eat, listen to music and participate in bike games such as figure eight races and obstacle courses.

Last year, they fed over 200 people. When Mike found out that the Farwell Band was short on money, he simply passed the hat among his biker buddies and raised \$600 for the band. He said "sometimes they look scary, but you can't find a better group of people than bikers."

Mike had to initially convince his mom, Dalia, of this, though. Mom was not Commissioner (Friona too thrilled by the look of some of his biker friends. One time he took her to a biker party and she was really nervous before going in. Mike said, "she wasn't sure if it was safe."

However, her mind was quickly changed when big biker guys started giving her hugs and calling her "Mom" all day. Now, Mike said his mom fully supports his career choice and really likes the bikers - she even cooks for them on Sundays.

When asked what his kid's friends thought about the bikes and his look of tattoos and earrings, Mike said, "the kids are so funny -they love it. They ask me all kinds of questions and want to ride on the bike."



E. Persons desiring to register to vote at the regular municipal election must register with the County Clerk of Curry County not later than Tuesday, February 7, 2012 at 5:00 p.m., the date on which the County Clerk will close registration books

Request for Applicants and Notice of Public Hearing Since the official 2010 Census for Parmer County exceeds 10,200, the district judge having jurisdiction in the county is required by law to appoint a county auditor.

To be qualified for appointment as county auditor a person must be:

1. a competent accountant with at least two years experience in auditing and accounting.

2. thoroughly competent in public business details; and

3. a person of unquestionably good moral character and intelligence.

(There is no requirement that a county auditor be a licensed accountant or a certified public accountant).

The term of office of a county auditor is two years. The Local Government Code prohibits any personal interest in a contract with the county by a county auditor. The Texas Constitution requires a county officer to reside in the county.







Mustangs fall in Area title battle




Andrew Marrufo holds onto the ball as he dives across the goal line to tie the score at 14-14.

Mustangs of the Week: Coach Guevara, for the first time ever, said this honor goes to the entire team.

A great comeback season for the Bovina Mustangs football team came to a close last Friday in a 28-14 loss to the Springlake-Earth Wolverines in the state Regional clash at Amarillo.

The Mustangs had opened the season with a 1-7 record, then came roaring back to win four in a row including a pair of state playoff victories.

This was the second consecutive year that a Hector Guevara-coached team made it to the third round of the state playoffs, a historic first.

S-E had defeated the Mustangs during district play in October, 42-20.

S-E boasts a speedy back named Nathan Garcia. He rushed for 224 yards to lead his team. This came behind a line that included seven players with listed weights between 220 and 335 lbs.

Both teams relied on their strong running offenses, and both had success.

The Wolverines started the game at its 40. Good tackles were made by Jose Lara, Marco Terrones, Abel Martinez and Edwin Carrillo. On 4th and 4 at the Bovina 18, an S-E run was stopped short.

Bovina went 3 and out and punted to the S-E 30. On a broken play, the S-E QB ran for 19. Martinez had another good tackle. Then S-E scored on a 48-yard pitch play at 2:59. The kick made it 7-0.

Jose Lara had a good kick return to the Bovina 32. Runs by Terrones and Andrew Marrufo gained a first down. Then Marrufo ran for 7 and another first down as the first quarter ended.

Terrones gained 14 to the S-E 19. Joseph Casas' only pass of the game came from the 9 yard line as Marrufo gathered it in for a TD at 11:02. The Jorge Luna kick made it 14-all.

S-E started near midfield. Gomez ran for 28. Lara and Martinez had good tackles. S-E scored on an 18yard pass into the back of the end zone at 9:05. The kick made it 14-7.

Darien Walker took the kickoff and had a big return to the Bovina 35. Terrones ran around end for 24. The drive culminated in a 38-yard TD run by Lara at 7:49. The Luna kick again tied the game, this time at 14-all.

S-E started at its 30. Vela, Aaron Castaneda and Casas had good tackles. Juan Garcia had a WB sack, forcing a punt to the Bovina 14. The Mustangs moved the ball well, getting to their 44 as time ran out in the first half.

Walker opened the 3rd quarter with another excellent kick return, this time to the Bovina 33. Lara ran around end for 16, then he and Terrones had 5-yard carries.

The Mustangs went for it at 4th and 1 at the S-E 32, and Lara gained the first down. But on 4th and 3, S-E held.

Lara had a TD-saving tackle at midfield. S-E scored on a 43-yard run at 4:39. The kick made it 21-14.

Bovina went 3 and out and punted to the S-E 38. S-E moved quickly, with a 35-yard run followed by a 22yard TD run with 10 seconds left in the 3rd quarter. The kick made it 28-14.

Bovina started at its 20 and moved the ball well, behind runs by Casas, Lara and Terrones. Bovina went for it on 34th and 3 at midfield, with Casas keeping for 20. Lara had a 12-yard run, but on 4th and 10 deep in S-E territory, a Bovina pass failed.

Lara and Martinez had good tackles, forcing a punt to the Bovina 11 with 35 seconds left.

Individual stats showed Lara rushed for 94 yards, Terrones 80, Marrufo 47 and Casas 33. Bovina attempted 3 passes, connecting on 2 of them.
