Border Town Days is a huge success

Despite the high ridge that has placed much of the Texas Panhandle in the "too hot" category much of the time recently, the weather favored Border Town Days by cooling down a bit.

With a light breeze, it turned out to be a great day for the large crowd that attended the 46th annual BTD celebration in Texico-Farwell on July 28.

It was a day that saw a record set in the number of entries in the Decorated Bicycle Contest -- more than 40! That is more than twice the norm.

And the number of kiddie rides was way up there, spearheaded by Fritz Friemel's carnival rides, Joe's Boot Shop's mechanical bull and Sid Morris' pony rides.

As usual, the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club's barbecue was a main attraction, with more than 800 brisket plates sold.

From the 1972 Tribune:

In January 1932, when Mrs. Bertha Kaltwasser came to the Oklahoma Lane community with her husband John, there weren't too many families around.

She mentions the Kepleys, McGuires, C.C. Christians, Albert Ramms and Kubes.

She and her husband John, who passed away in 1959, were both the children of German immigrants. When Mrs. Kaltwasser was about 13 years old, her family moved from Fayette County, Texas, to Vernon. She met her husband through his brother-in-law's wife.

The couple was married in 1916. The family moved here so that John could farm land owned by Mrs. Kaltwasser's father.

Mrs. Kaltwasser said her parents only spoke German when they first came here but soon picked up words that helped them converse with non-Germans. She spoke German at home and taught her stepson, A.O., now an Indiana resident, and her two sons, Gilbert, who lives next door to her at Oklahoma Lane, and Walter, a Farwell resident. A daughter passed away in 1969.

Her husband farmed all his life, so Mrs. Kaltwasser has many recollections of the hard work involved in the process when they came here.

"It takes more equipment to farm now," she said. "We used to use a horse and plow. I've still got the harness with which we used to hook the horse to the plow."

"When the equipment changed, our boys had to learn how to use it. My husband found it hard to adapt. When the war broke out, all the boys went into the service. We had to rent the place out until they got back because my husband couldn't farm it alone."

Mrs. Kaltwasser said Walter was one of the first to put up an irrigation well on land in this area, around 1946.

When the children were younger, they attended Oklahoma Lane School. When the boys came home after school, they had to work on the farm.

"We grew cotton, grain and millet," she said. "We hauled with wagons. We would cut the heads from the maize, pile it on wagons and wait for the thresher. I remember well that we got 30 cents a hundred for grain."

The family also had cattle and chickens on the farm, plus a garden.

Mrs. Kaltwasser said she cooked big meals for her family but they had to eat what she cooked. She said pecan pie was a favorite with Walter, and Gilbert was particularly fond of lemon pie.

Until she moved to her present home in 1960, this early pioneer used a large kettle to heat water for washing. She had an old wringer-type washer through which she ran the clothes to clean them.

The kettle is heated by a furnace in which wood is burned. "I always kept dry wood in the house," she said. The oil stove was eventually replaced by a butane stove.

Mrs. Kaltwasser said her boys didn't have much time to get into mischief. "They had horses to tend, cows to milk, eggs to gather, hogs to slop and other chores."

She also kept the boys busy with washing, ironing and housekeeping. In those days, homemaking was a full-time job, she concluded.

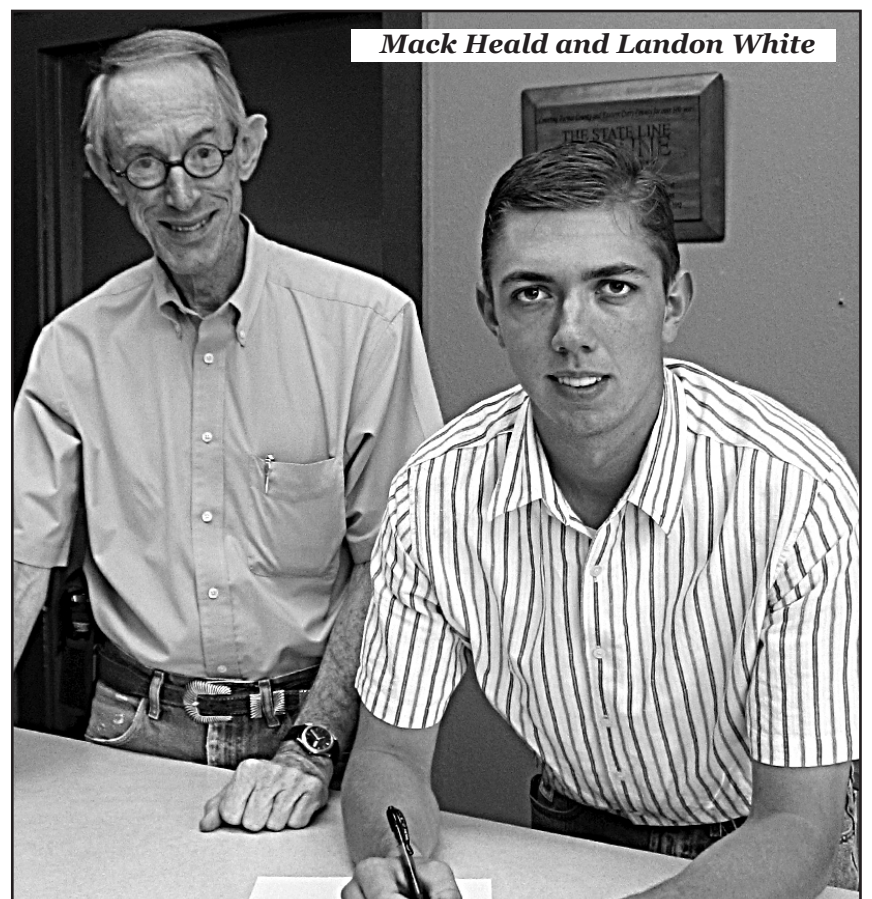
Should there be special circumstances whereby individuals have heavy objects they are unable to move themselves to the curb, inquires for help should be made by August 2 via (575) 482-3632.

Texico finalizes city budget

The Texico City Council on July 24 approved the finalized budget for the year.

City Clerk Carolyn Johnson said the biggest change was in the Public Works budget. Last year they spent \$40,000 more than they had expected, mostly due to issues with water well problems. Even now, the well at KKR park is not working and Brown well is pumping air.

Johnson said income from gross receipt taxes brought in more money than expected, and should continue to increase with the work being done at the sewer plant this year.

The city is also planning on a 2 percent pay raises for city employees.

In other news, the council:

- Discussed the city mowing ditches. Property owners are required to keep ditches on their property mowed, but the city has cleared ditches on the right-of-way for years.

Clearing ditches takes city workers several hours to do, and it fixes drainage issues around the town.

Councilman Doug Scioli said the property owner is responsible, and should be keeping up with it, but some owners don't have a mower that can do the job.

The issue was tabled.

Here are some thoughts about the Colorado forest fires and drought from Farwell High grad Johnny Franse, who now lives in Crawford, Colo.

A trio of turkey vultures ascended from below, riding a hot thermal, each one with eyes set deep in a blood-red head.

I stood on the edge of Smith Fork Canyon on Colorado's west slope. The hayfields below were dry and browned out, scalped short after the first cutting. There will be no second cutting in this driest of years, 2012.

The river in the canyon's bottom was just a trickle on white hot cobblestone.

The June sky was smudged like a bad thumbprint from fires burning in Colorado and New Mexico.

The West Elk Range was reduced to a brooding line of hulking shadows on the horizon. The sage at the canyon's edge was emitting a strong, sweet odor as if succumbing to the sun and heat.

It was hard to imagine the transformation from the aspen-clad mountains only five miles distant to this arid hell on earth.

Such is the nature of this high desert chaparral country where mule deer are as common as jackrabbits in Texas.

Miles said one of the surveyors even commented to him that she was "impressed with your facility." He is excited about the progress of FCRC and thrilled to be through his first survey process in the state of Texas.

Currently, FCRC employs about 83 local people and cares for almost 60 residents. Their new short-term care wing has been well-received and popular.

Miles stated that 100 percent of their short-term patients have been able to return to their normal living situations after their stay at the Center. He believes there are many success stories and is proud that Farwell is able to offer the only private room Medicare facility between Albuquerque and Amarillo.

Miles is working on new programs for the Center. He wants to plan inter-generational activities that encourage young people to get involved with the seniors in their community. He would like to begin an "Adopt a Grandparent" program with local 3rd and 4th graders and pair them up with a local resident for companionship and fun activities.

Miles believes the seniors would enjoy the kids and offer them first-hand exposure to history.

He also encourages local high school juniors and seniors to contact the Center about community service projects and volunteer opportunities.

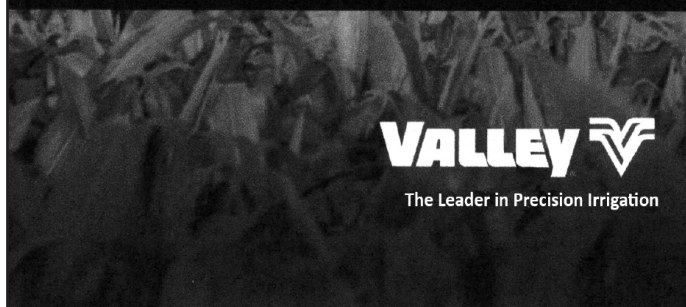

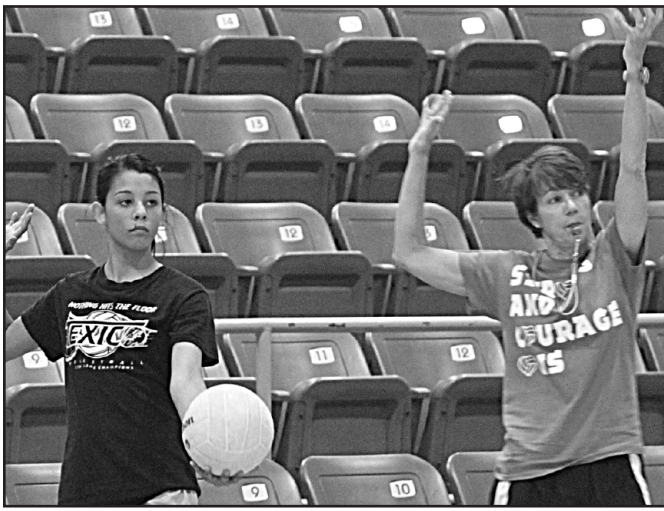

through 12 need to be present for every one of these practices. The more we learn in the summer, the less we will need to rehearse at night after school starts. This is why we need everyone to make it for all these practices.

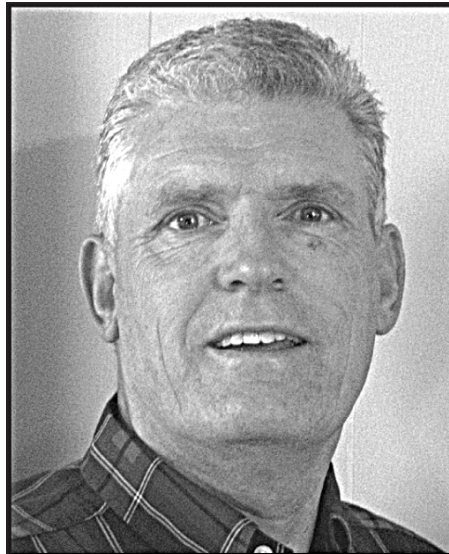

Live Cattle -Cash trade was once again lower with cash trading at \$113 last week. This week there has been little talk about what may change, but futures prices continue to indicate that there may be some strength around the corner? Overall, the market has been trading sideways since bottoming last April and the market has been unable to breakout to new highs or breakdown into new lows. This has most traders guessing at the next direction and possible the fact that prices may continue to drift sideways into the end of the year? With the significant premium carried in the back months, cash could actually drift higher while the prices in the back months hold steady? With the December, February and April contracts now carrying anywhere from a \$10-20 premium to cash trade, something has to give.

Feeder Cattle - Feeder prices seem to have gained some stability over the last few days. The drop-off their highs was one of the hardest hits this market has seen in years. With corn prices also slowing their advance some of the pressure has been temporarily lifted off the feeders. These two markets have moved in opposite directions, but in tandem with each other even down to the intraday charts. If corn prices begin to move higher during the day, feeders do the opposite.

Soybean prices dropped over \$1.50 in just the first three days of this week. The market is trying to recover at this time and is expected to trade all the way back up to retest last weeks highs. Whether or not the market will breakout to new high ground or fail is yet to be seen? Soybeans only dropped about three days off their high which was expected to take place at some point. solid news?

Cotton prices have remained inside a tight sideways range since late May and at this point there really hasn't been anything to push this market in one direction or the other. Technically, resistance levels remain around the \$75.50 level and support around the \$64.50 level basis the December contract. Until prices can take out one of these levels, prices may stay parked for several more weeks. With Europe struggling with their economy and other hot spots across the world, China has shown little interest in U.S. cotton and prices continue to float around these levels.

Corn prices took a quick little two day drop off Monday's high made at the \$8.00 level and traded down into the mid \$7.40's before popping back up. Technically it looks like now there could be a sideways trade setting up. Although it's still a little early to make this judgment, if prices stall out for very long around the \$8.00 level basis the December, the market could hold inside this range until either the weather changes or crop tours begin? A two day break and rally back to the old high really isn't long enough to call this a sideways range, but take into account the closes over the last eight days and it begins to look more like a sideways trend for the time being.

Wheat prices also saw a major push down alongside the rest of the grains. Wheat dropped about 80 cents over the last few days and is now moving back higher along with the rest of the grain complex. This break seen over the last few days may have been enough to slow the advance for a minute? This rubber band was stretched to the point that a sharp reaction may have been good for the market at this point in time? Now the focus is beginning to shift on just how much damage was done and where.

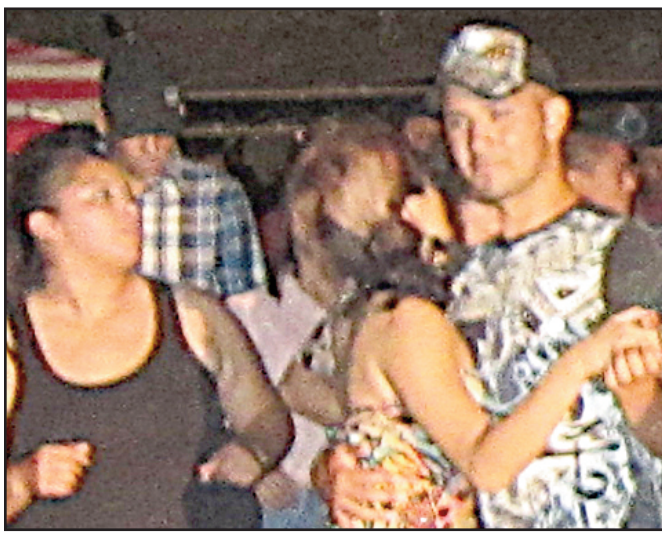
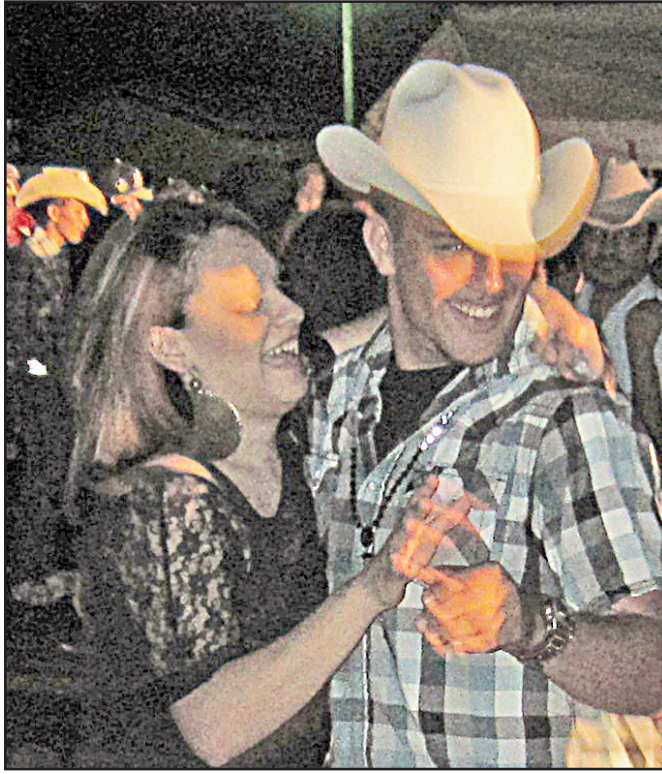

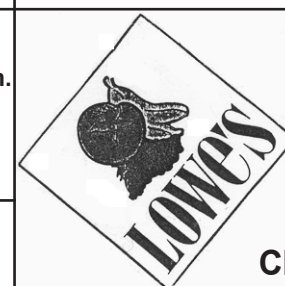
