The 1953 farm-to-market road program for Parmer County has been released by the Commissioners Court. It met Saturday in a special session to forward a resolution to the State Highway Commission requesting that certain paved roads be constructed in Parmer County.

First on the 1953 agenda is a proposed road from the "crossroads" (about 10 miles north of Bovina) east to Friona approximately 10 miles. This project will also include a loop through the City of Friona "if such funds are available." This loop would likely run west from Main to a point on Highway 60.

The second project is a suggested farm-to-market road from the intersection of the Friona-Muleshoe and the leg west to Farwell, the location commonly known as the "twin houses." The road is proposed eastward to the Castro County line, including a jog north to the Lazbuddy School, The proposed road would extend approximately 10 miles.

Third, a paved route north from the "crossroads" north of Bovina to the Deaf Smith County line, over such a route as the Engineering department of the Highway Commission deems advisable this road would extend about eight miles

The last project would connect Highway 84 at Lariat to the road south of Lariat which Bailey County proposes to build.

Mrs. Jim Moore announced this week that Jim's Cafe in Texico has been leased to Lee Finley of Ft. Sumner and the new management will take effect January 1.
