## Bovina water rate hiked

The Bovina City Council on Oct. 9 approved an ordinance that establishes a master fee schedule for services provided by the city. The fee schedule will be kept on file at City Hall and becomes effective in 60 days.
This includes a new water rate. There will be a $\$ .02$ increase per 1,000 gallons of water after the base rate. The base rate is $\$ 17$ for up to 4,000 gallons of water used. Anything over this amount will be addressed in the fee schedule.

The Council commented that this increase was not designed only to provide more revenue for the city, but to allow the city to be eligible for grant money.
