Car horns used as an insult

school in the Philippines as part of a Rotary exchange program, will be

Well,
Well, I'm starting on my fourth
week here in the Philippines and week here in the Philippines, and
I'm enjoying it very much! Right 'm enjoying it very much! Right
now, it is July 18 here while it is July 17 th there, and the e ime is $7: 15$ p.m.
here in the Philippines while there it here in the Philippines while there it is $5: 15 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$.
First of all, First of all, I'll tell you about my
school. It is very different because they skip grades 7 and 8 , and when the students enter college they should be at the age of 16 . They
finish college at the age of 20 and already have a career.
Another difference is the way the school system is set up. For example, the grades $1-6,9-12$, and
college are all in the same area and under the same name
I am enrolled in a priv
school so as part of the rules, we have to wear uniforms and say a prayer before and after each class
period period.
Lunch
Lunchtime is also different be-
cause we eat in what is called a canteen where there are a large variety of snacks, foods, and drinks. The Filipino people eat a total of
five times a day. Breakfast, of course, consists of rice and two different types of meat. Then around $10-11$ a.m. there is a mid-
morning snack. Then lunch is morning snack. Then lunch is
served, and again there is rice, and a variety of meats or fish.
Around $5-6$ p.m. there is a midafternoon snack, which to us would
be considered dinner, because a snack to the Filipinos is going to the Pizza Hut, Arby's, McDonald's, or Wendy's. Then dinner is served around $7-8$ p.m.
Another thing Another thing that is done com-
pletely different is the driving. You

might say that the first person who can squeeze into a vacant parking
spot wins! They don't follow the spot wins! They don't follow the
lanes like we do; u-turns are made whereever possible; and traffic
lights are very rare! lights are very rare! mixed in with the traffic going in the opposite direction. The Filipinos have what is called a Jeepney, which is an American jeep trans decorated to the driver's taste The drivers are definitely what you would refer to as "Reckless
drivers." I was in total drivers." I was in total cultural
shock the first time I rode in Jeep shock the first time I rode in a Jeep.

1843: SUNDAY, AUGUST 6. The expedition under command of Colonel Jacob Snively today reached Bird's Fort on the Trinity River
and disbanded. Their project has ended in failure.
The expedition set out last April 25 with about 175 men, authorized b the Texas War Department to inter-
cept a rich Mexican caravan except a rich Mexican caravan ex-
pected to cross Texas territory on its return from a buying trip in the United States.
The caravan was never encountCred, and by June 28 Captain to return home. Two days later some 200 United States dragoon, escorting the caravan in U.S. terri-
tory, crossed the Arkansas River to tory, crossed the Arkansas River to
Snively's camp, and forced the Texians to give up their arms. The Texas government is protesting this invasion of its territory. The next
day the dragoons offered to conduct the disarmed men to Independence Missouri, and 50 accepted. Those remaining decided to con once it crossed into Texas territory, They still had their arms - those taken by the dragoons were capsent scouts to escopetas. Snively Chandler, and he and his men agreed to return, at least for a while.
On July 4 Indians stampeded their - Torses, and in a running battle, on wounded. Some 10 or 15 Indians were killed. On July 8 their scouts brought news that the caravan was in Texas territory. By this time Chandler's men were again dis-
couraged, and they refused to pursue it. Snively thereupon resigned his command in favor of Captain Charles A. Wafield, who had recently joined the expedition with
several men after a venture of his own against New Mexico had

porter of the Navy. porter of the Navy.

Republic, on May 20 , after almost a year of constant demand for it by
Moore and his supporters. President Houston had dismissed Moore from office and in effect had la-
belled him a pirate in a proclamation issued May 6, 1843. Upon his return to Galveston on July 14, 18 ,
tion Moore insisted that his dismissal was illegal, since an act of Congress
approved February 4, 1841, provides approved February 4, 1841 , provides
that an officer can be deprived of his commission only by court-martial. However, President Houston and
Secretary of War and Marine Secretary of War and Marine
George W. Hill refused to order a court-martial.
On September 27, 1843, Moore On September 27, 1843, Moore
published a defense of his conduct of published a defense of his conduct of
the Navy in a 201-page booklet the Navy in a 201-page booklet
entitled "To the People of Texas-An entitled "To the People of Texas-An
Appeal: In Vindication of His ConAuct of the Navy." On the following duct of the Navy, On the following
January 11 he formally petitioned
Congress to order Congress to order a court-martial, and after investigation, it complied.

## CRP signup under way

A third signup period for the
federal Conservation Reserve Pro-
gram (CRP) begins Monday (Aug.
4), and there are two major reasons for area farmers to give the program serious consideration, advises an economist with the Texas Agri-
cultural Extension Service.
The signup period, which ends Aug. 15 , is for the 1987 CRP, said Dr. Jackie Smith, the economist. Interested farmers should go to their
county office of the Agricultural county office of the Agricultural
Stabilization and Conservation Service, he' said.
vice, he said.
"I think this program should be
considered more seriusly considered more seriously than be-
fore," Smith said. He cited two principal reasons: -Uncertainties surrounding the
federal cotton promer federal cotton program and other annual price support programs, and
-Requirements for conservation -Requirements for conservation
cross-compliance, which make the CRP a more attractive alternative. Smith said the cross-compliance provisions require producers who
have been farming highly erodible land to begin implementing a conservation plan by 1990 .
"In this area, it could signif-
icantly increase the cost of com-
pliance in the cotton program, in
pliance in the cotton program, in
some cases, bring an end to program participation altogether," the Extension specialist warned. As farmers consider the possible
costs of the conservation plans they must have in effect by plans, CRP may be more attractive, Smith suggested. Under the CRP, he explained,
landowners can offer highly erodlandowners can offer highly erod-
ible croplands on a bid basis. If the bid is apceeped, the owner gets an annual rental payment, equal to his bid, for 10 years. In return, the
farmers has to establish and maintain an acceptable cover on the land tain an acceptable cover on the land
