1836: FRIDAY, JANUARY 1 General Stephen F. Austin arrived
in New Orleans this morning on the schooner "William Robbins," after a five-day voyage from Brazoria, a
port on the Brazos River of Texas port on the Brazos River of Texas
He heads a delegation of three commissioners appointed by the Provisional Government of Texas to obtain loans for their government.
The other two The other two are Dr. Branch T
Archer and William H. Wharton. The Provisional Government wa set up last November by a Consulation consisting of delegates elected
from the municipatities from the municipatities of Texas.
Although it is a Mexican territory, Texas is unlike any other portion of that country. It has been settled mostly by Americans, attracted there by "empresarios," who were
granted free land by the Mexican granted free land by the Mexica
goverument to bring in settlers General Austin is without doubt the foremost of these "empresarios." Anglo-American settlers now outnumber native Mexicans in Texas have ventured to cross the arid wasteland between the Rio Grande
and and the Nueces Rivers. They call it "El Desierto Muerto," the dead the Nueces River, is good land and good climate. By offering this land to Americans, the Mexican govern
ment has sought to create a buffer ment has sought to create a buffer
zone between the warlike Indian zone between the warlike India
tribes to the north and the rest of Mexico.
The settlement program was be-
gun some 15 years ago and has be gun some 15 years ago, and has been
enormously successful-indeed, too enormously successful--indeed, to
successful for the Mexican government, which now is unable to control the immigrants. It is estimated that
there are now more than there are now more than 28,000
Anglo-Americans in Anglo-Americans in the region,
while there are only some $3 ; 600$ native Mexicans. It is thought that there are about 15,000 Indians there and perhaps 5,000 Negroes, counting both slave and free. Texas is not a separate Mexican state, but is
attached to Coahuila in a unit called the State of Coahuila and Texas, now with its capital in Monclova Coahuila. Formerly the capital wa in Saltilio, and both places are fa-
too remote for the settlers north of the Nueces River. This has resulted in such dissatisfaction. Texian relations with the Mexican government have become increas-
ingly strained since 1830, when empresario grants were discontinued and immigration into Texa
prohibited This prohibited. This was later rescind ed, but the situation has been actions of the Mexican dictator
Santa Anne
 1833. Last summer he suspended the
Constitution of 1824 which provided some autonomy and legal protection to the Mexican states, including
Texas. There is considerable miliTexas. There is considerable mili-
tary opposition to Santa Anna throughout Mexico. The Mexican government has been in turmoil since it gained independence from
Spain in 1821, and Mexican presiSpain in 1821, and Mexican presi-
dents since then usually obtain their ents since then usually obtain their
office by force. Many Texians have wished to stay
with Mexico, since their land titles with Mexico, since their land titles
are Mexican, and they have taxare Mexican, and they have tax-
exempt status. However, they deexempt status. However, they de1824, and also that Texas become a state of its own, separate from
Coahuila. A growing number Coahuila. A growing number are
coming to believe coming to believe that complete
separation from Mexico is the only course, with the expectation that Texas will then be immediately annexed by the United States. As
late as last November, the Consullate as last November, the Consul-
tation which met in San Felipe de Austin voted two for one for adAustin voted two for one for ad-
herence to Mexico, but now most favor independence. General Austin has only recently years ago he went to Mexico City to years ago he went to Mexico City to
petition for a separate State of Texas, but was denied, although other concessions were made. On
his way home he was arrested by order of President Santa Anna,
charged with inciting insurrection charged with inciting insurrection.
He was held in rison He was held in prison without trial for more than a year, the first three months in solitary confinement.
Upon his release, his health impaired, he was eventually permitted to return to Texas. He arrived last
September, after an asence of September, after an absence of two years and four months. He has now
joined the movement for independence, stating that "war is our only ence, statin
resource."
That war
That war is already under way. Last October Austin was elected commander-in-chief of a Texian
army of some 500 volunteers, and army of some have been a number of encounters, in all of which the Texians have been victorious. The most important was the capture of the
Mexican stronghold at San Antonio Mexican stronghold at San Antonio
de Bexar a month ago. General Austin, who does not consider himself to be a military man, resigned his command to become commis-
sioner. He has since been succeeded
by by General Sam Houston, appointed
Major General of the Major General of the Army of Texas by the Consultation at San Felipe.

been met here with great enthus iasm. A land buyer bound for Texas,
ine who is currently presiding in the same hotel as General Austin, reports: "This house is much
thronged, many persons are crowding to the bar room to see the

Texas. Indeed, we can scarcely hear of anything else." There can be no doubt that the people of the
United States give their wholehearted support to Texas independence. Volunteers are streaming into
Texas, including our own New Texas, including our own New

Farm Bill is 'income neutral'

Barring unforeseen developments
the effect of the newly-passed farm bill in 1986 should be "income neutral" for most cotton producers,
says Donald Johnson, Executive says Donald Johnson, Executive
Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock. The bill, to be signed into law
Dec. 23, reduced the cotton loan rate Dec. 23 , reduced the cotton loan rate
from 57.3 cents to 55 cents, Johnso points out, "but it continues the current 81 -cent per-pound target price. So what most producers lose in loan or market value of their
crops will be offset by a higher deficiency payment rate.' However, he says, the bill retains the current $\$ 50,000$ limit on deficiency payment without a higher per-
pound rate is going to come up with pound rate is going to come up with
a loss of total combined income from the loan and deficiency pay ment."
After 1986 the loan is to be set After 1986 the loan is to be set each
