## Cotton battles drought

It's bad enough that Texas has been in a historic drought, but the worse may be yet to come for our local cotton growers unless Mother Nature steps up.

Parmer County Cotton Growers Manager Craig Rohrbach said the next cotton growing season could be worse if there's a lack of moisture again.

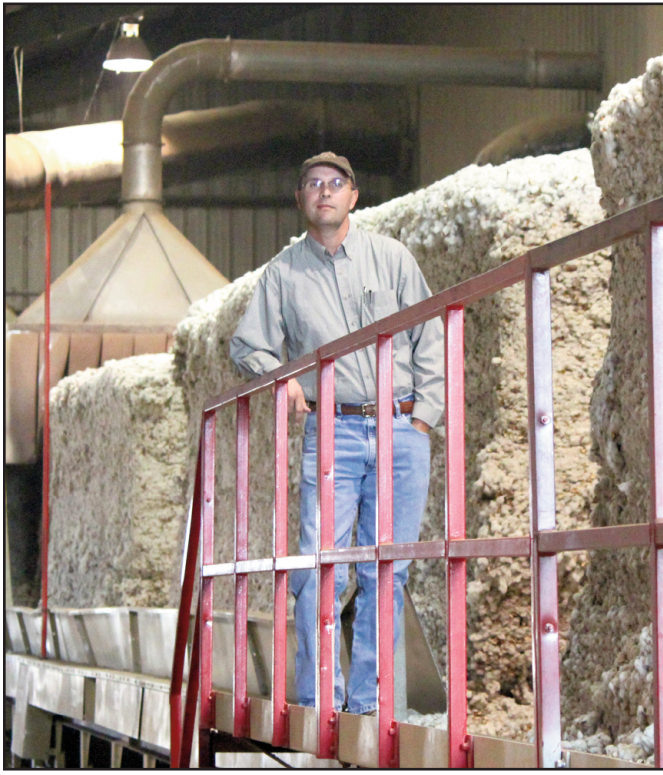
With the extended drought, farmers have been forced to pump large amounts of water from their wells to salvage at least part of their crop this year.

Looking at 2012, without major rainfall in the winter and spring, the ground will have a depleted moisture content. Cotton plants draw on stockpiled water during hot summer months, so a good soil profile is essential -- irrigation alone can't keep up with the plant's demand.

"The drought has had a huge effect on our crop this year and will continue to be a grave concern into next year," says Rohrbach. "Every farmer in the area has had to make some hard choices and the drought will definitely shape their choices for next year as well."

Early in the season, farmers were forced to choose which parts of their crop to salvage. By diverting water from some fields, they were able to save others and

make a crop to harvest. The average yield is down from 2 1/2 bales per acre last year to 1 or 1 1/2 bales this year.

Now it's time to look ahead.

Rohrbach predicts another large planting season for cotton, despite the drought.

"Cotton handles the stress better than other crops in our area," he said. "Cotton likes as much water as it can get, but it can survive by holding on and waiting for the rain."

According to Rohrbach, there are several factors that keep cotton as a good option for local growers: new varieties are available

that mature faster with better quality, the price for cotton is still historically high, other crops require even more water than cotton, and cotton is still in demand worldwide.

Last year, about 40 growers for PCCG committed to grow around 14,000 acres of cotton.

This year's growing season began with almost 26,000 acres committed, but only around 20,000 will actually be harvested. From those acres, Rohrbach predicts he will gin about 30,000 bales rather than the 60,000 originally expected.

The drought also caus-

## Tuesday is Election Day in Texas

Tuesday, Nov. 8 is Election Day in Texas. All that is on the ballot are the constitutional amendments plus a bond issue for the Friona School District.

The following polls will be open in Parmer County from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.: Calvary Baptist Church, Friona; Bovina EMS building; Farwell Community Center; and Lazbuddie Methodist Church.

Here's a summation of the amendments, on which you either vote for or against:

No. 1 - Allows the legislature to provide exemptions from ad valorem taxes on homes for surviving spouses of 100 percent or totally disabled veterans.

No. 2 - Allows the Texas Water Development Board to issue bonds up to \$6 billion.

No. 3 - Allows the state to issue bonds to finance educational loans to students.

No. 4 - Allows the Legislature to let counties to issue bonds to redevelop blighted areas, to be paid for in tax increases.

No. 5 - Allows the Legislature to let cities or counties have agreements with other cities or counties without imposing a tax or having a sinking fund.

No. 6 - Clarifies how permanent school funds are used.

No. 7 - Deals with El Paso County issuing bonds.

No. 8 - Allows the appraisal for ad valorem tax purposes of open-space land devoted to water stewardship on the basis of its productive capacity.

No. 9 - Allows the governor to grant someone a pardon who completes a term of deferred adjudication community supervision.

No. 10 - Changes the length of the unexpired term that causes the resignation of certain elected county or district office holders if they seek another office.

Donated coats can be dropped off at the high

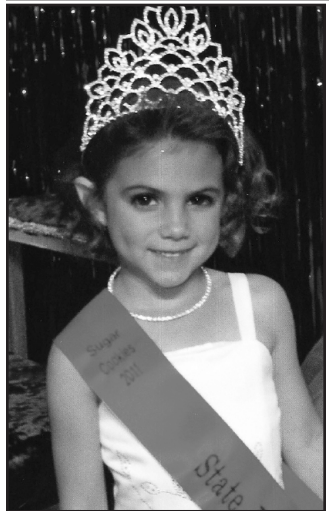
school outside the counselor's (Hayley Christian) office anytime through Nov. 18.

Ms. Bara was partially ejected and was pronounced dead at the scene; she was not wearing her safety belt, said police.

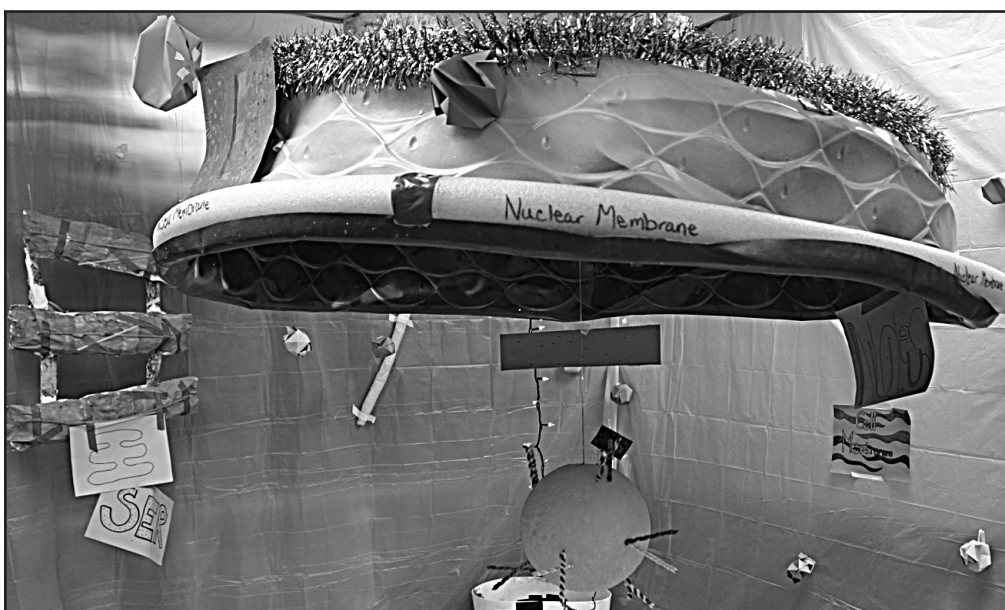
## Farwell duo qualify for State

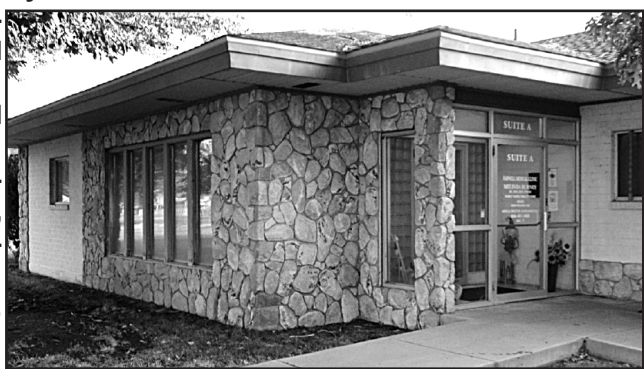

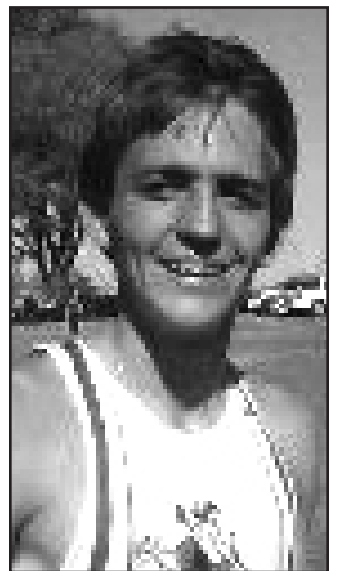

# 100 Years

Farwell Texico Lazbuddie Bovina

Of the State Line Tribune

From 1986:

Nora Kaemper and her family moved here from Illinois in 1914. Her father, Henry, had visited New Mexico and found it to be the Land of Enchantment.

He took back soil to Illinois to show how rich it was. They sold their home and land and chartered a railroad car, loaded furniture, fruit trees, grapevines and flowers.

Nora said they didn't know how the wind blew here and having an orchard was out of the question. They rented a house in Clovis, then moved to Pleasant Hill where they lived in a half dugout. Beef was hung from the windmill and the weather stayed cold enough to keep the meat frozen. For lights, they used kerosene. They cooked on a coal stove and washed clothes on a scrub board.

They walked 2 1/2 miles to school. Once it snowed so much and with high drifts, the horse walked on top of the drifts.

About a mile north of Pleasant Hill was a lake that Nora ice skated on. The lake is now gone.

In 1917, she met Roy D. Day and they married in 1919. He had been a state evangelist for two years. After they wed, they went to DeLeon, Texas, then to Hope, N.M. At Pleasant Hill, they held a revival and had 30 conversions -- I was No. 30.

The Lord blessed us with 5 children.

The times were hard during the Depression. I remember buying pork chops at 25 cents a lb.

es other problems. For example, because less cotton will be ginned this year, the gin will have less cottonseed available for area dairies and feedlots.

Dairies are already faced with a decline in feed sources for their cattle and now will be scrambling to secure what cottonseed is available. There will also be less burrs (or the cotton "trash") that is ground up to add filler to cow rations. The price of burrs has jumped to a historical high with the lack of supply. Some dairies have been forced to bale stalks and even CRP grass to find something for their cows.

Since PCCG also sells cottonseed for planting, Rohrbach knows the farmer's decisions on what to plant next year will impact his gin as well.

"Farmers may go to different rotations of crops, not planting cotton on the same fields two years in a row. They will also not stretch their water next year. Learning from this year that rain just cannot be guaranteed, they will be more cautious in their planting next year," he predicts.

"Those farmers who stuck with their cotton this year will probably still make money, although their yields are down. For next year, with good pre-planning, cotton still makes sense in our area. Rain would sure help, though."

# Border Banter

Periodically, as part of my 50th anniversary as a newspaperman, I relate some fun stories of back in the day

Today, it's about journalistic ethics, or lack thereof.

Once, I attended a seminar in Indianapolis put on by IRE -- Investigative Reporters and Editors.

I felt it was poorly done because the speakers they had came from some of the largest newspapers in the nation, like Boston and Chicago.

But the vast majority of folks attending the seminar came from small city newspapers.

At that time, if you had a job with a Boston paper, for example, you had plenty of time to work on an investigation because that could be your sole assignment.

But when you work for small city papers, you had lots of irons in the fire and didn't have the time to devote solely for one project.

That seminar was put on by a college in Missouri that emphasized journalistic reporting. So after the seminar ended, I wrote a letter to them saying the seminar had been done very poorly because the attendees could not relate to the speakers, and I offered suggestions for improvement.

Much to my surprise, they printed my letter in their next quarterly journalistic review.

But they didn't print

the whole letter I had written. They cut out the criticism parts and just left in the ideas for betterment.

I had to laugh.

Here's a group devoted to investigative reporting and they can't take criticism themselves.

Nor did they ask my approval for printing my letter in a national publication.

So much for journalistic ethics.

\*\*\*

Concerning ethics, my favorite story was when I was assigned to cover the annual big parade in Michigan City, Ind.

At the start of the parade, I walked its length and roughly counted the number of people along its route.

I counted about 2,000 people on my side, so when I wrote the story I estimated about 4,000 folks watched the parade.

When the story came out, the lead said: "More than 100,000 turned out to watch the big parade..."

So much for journalistic ethics.

\*\*\*

A couple of years later, our town was hit by a riot.

I was the only reporter to watch the whole riot, from start to finish, although reporters showed up from the big papers, such as Chicago.

Thus, I had the only true first-hand account of the shooting, trashing, beating up folks, etc. In fact, a bullet whizzed by my left ear, but that's another story.

Anyway, the next morning I wrote the full story -- which was thrown into the trash can by the editor.

It was too realistic.

Instead, the main story in our paper was about the mayor criticizing the rioters.

So much for journalistic ethics.

\*\*\*

Now back to the present...

This is my annual reminder to shop locally.

I cannot stress enough the importance of this yearly note, especially in the tough time our area is facing.

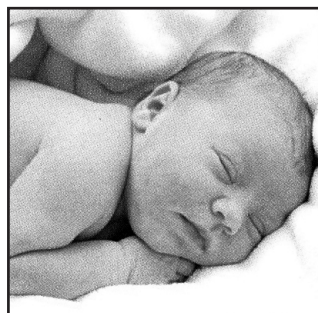

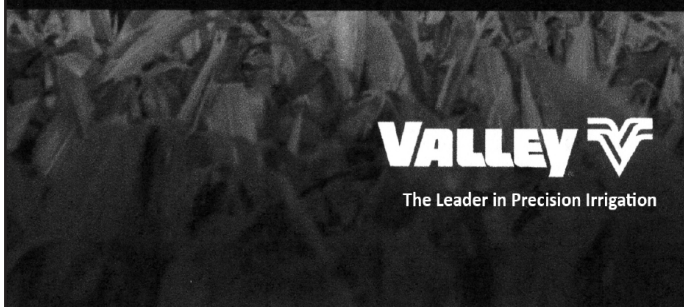

Taylor Brian Crooks was born Nov. 20, 1987, in Albuquerque, and passed away in Denver the week of Oct. 23, 2011.

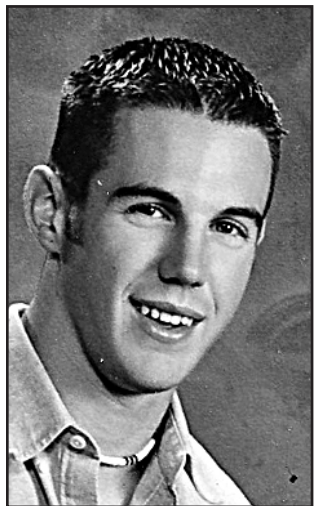
His remains will be cremated and a private family service will be held at a later date. He was preceded in death by his mother, Tonye Harrington Crooks.

Coach J.K. Hester said the 'Horns moved the ball well but squandered scoring opportunities and didn't execute well in the red zone.

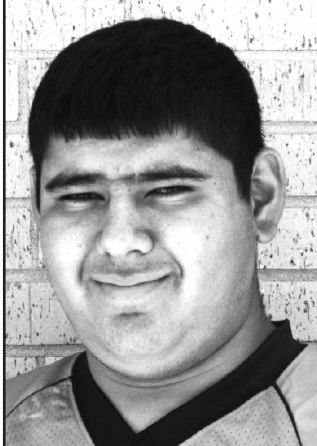
Offensively, Albert Solano had a run more than 20 yards plus a strong kickoff return. Alex Lopez caught 8 passes for 63 yards.

## Mustangs move closer to state playoff berth

The Bovina Mustangs will be in the state playoffs if they beat Nazareth on Friday.

Since Nazareth is winless on the season, the Mustangs will be a heavy favorite to do just that.

The Mustangs stayed in the hunt for a state playoff berth with a 40-7 trouncing of Sudan there last Friday.

Sudan finished its regular season 7-3 overall and 2-2 in District

The Mustangs are 1-2 in District. If Bovina beats Nazareth, the last regular season game, that will put the Mustangs at 2-2 in District -- tied with Sudan. Because Bovina beat Sudan, and this also involved a mathematical equation, the Mustangs would win the playoff spot.

In the first quarter, Bovina took the lead on a 69-yard TD run by Casas, followed by a Jorge Luna kick.

In the 3rd quarter, Bovina added to its lead with a 15-yard Lara TD run, followed by a Luna Kick.

The Mustangs added two TDs in the final quarter to close out the scoring -- a 1-yard plunge by Marrufo (kick failed) and a 5-yard run by Casas (pass failed).

Coach Hector Guevara was happy for his team. "We kept working hard and eventually that can turn into success. We stayed positive."

Team stats were:

First downs - Bovina 13, Sudan 3; rushing yards - Bovina 389, Sudan 38; passing yards - Bovina 0, Sudan 44; and penalties - Bovina 11 for 95 yards, Sudan 8 for 59.

As you know, back in the 1990s, the Parmer County veterans memorial was built in Farwell.

This was done to remember all members of our armed forces from Parmer County who died during wartime. Those was the only criteria.

It has come to our attention that one veteran's name was inadvertently omitted: Paul Nittler, who died during World War II.

Mr. Nittler was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Nittler. He was killed in action in France and was buried at a U.S. military cemetery there. This information came from the March 8, 1945, issue of the State Line Tribune.

The Tribune plans to ask the Farwell Chamber of Commerce to have Mr. Nittler's name added to the memorial.
