Cotton battles drought


It's bad enough that Texas has been in a historic drought, but the worse may be yet to come for our local cotton growers unless Mother Nature steps up.

Parmer County Cotton Growers Manager Craig Rohrbach said the next cotton growing season could be worse if there's a lack of moisture again.

With the extended drought, farmers have been forced to pump large amounts of water from their wells to salvage at least part of their crop this year.

Looking at 2012, without major rainfall in the winter and spring, the ground will have a depleted moisture content. Cotton plants draw on stockpiled water during hot summer months, so a good soil profile is essential -- irrigation alone can't keep up with the plant's demand.

"The drought has had a huge effect on our crop this year and will continue to be a grave concern

Tuesday, Nov. 8 is Election Day in Texas.

All that is on the ballot are the constitutional amendments plus a bond issue for the Friona School District.

The following polls will be open in Parmer County from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.:

Calvary Baptist Church, Friona; Bovina EMS building; Farwell Community Center; and Lazbuddie Methodist Church.

Here's a summation of the amendments, on which you either vote for or against:

No. 1 - Allows the legislature to provide exemptions from ad valorem taxes on homes for surviving spouses of 100 percent or totally disabled veterans.

No. 2 - Allows the Texas Water Development Board to issue bonds up to \$6 billion.

No. 3 - Allows the state to issue bonds to finance educational loans to students

No. 4 - Allows the Legislature to let counties to issue bonds to redevelop blighted areas, to be paid for in tax increases.

No. 5 - Allows the Legislature to let cities or counties have agreements with other cities or counties without imposing a tax or having a sinking fund.

No. 6 - Clarifies how permanent school funs are used.

No. 7 - Deals with El Paso County issuing bonds.

No. 8 - Allows the appraisal for ad valorem tax purposes of open-space land devoted to water stewardship on the basis of its productive capacity.

No. 9 - Allows the governor to grant someone a pardon who completes a term of deferred adjudication community supervision.

No. 10 - Changes the length of the unexpired term that causes the resignation of certain elected county or district office holders if they seek another office.



State Police said Ernestina Ann Bara, 29, was driving a 1999 Ford WUV northbound on FM 1731.



Nora said they didn't know how the wind blew here and having an orchard was out of the question. They rented a house in Clovis, then moved to Pleasant Hill where they lived in a half dugout. Beef was hung from the windmill and the weather stayed cold enough to keep the meat frozen. For lights, they used kerosene. They cooked on a coal stove and washed clothes on a scrub board. They walked 2 1/2 miles to school. Once it snowed so much and with high drifts, the horse walked on top of the drifts.

es other problems. For example, because less cotton will be ginned this year, the gin will have less cottonseed available for area dairies and feedlots.

Dairies are already faced with a decline in feed sources for their cattle and now will be scrambling to secure what cottonseed is available. There will also be less burrs (or the cotton "trash") that is ground up to add filler to cow rations. The price of burrs has jumped to a historical high with the lack of supply. Some dairies have been forced to bale stalks and even CRP grass to find something for their cows.

Since PCCG also sells cottonseed for planting, Rohrbach knows the farmer's decisions on what to plant next year will impact his gin as well.





"Those farmers who stuck with their cotton this year will probably still make money, although their yields are down. For next year, with good pre-planning, cotton still makes sense in our area. Rain would sure help, though."






Taylor Crooks




the State Championship Teams in 2003 and 2004. He attended Central New Mexico Community







On 4th down, Texico surprised Clayton when punter Harrison took the snap around the left side down to Clayton's 15.


Carries by Rivera and Harrison set up a Johnson TD run. Johnson ran for two extra points and Texico led 8-0 at 7:58.



As you know, back in the 1990s, the Parmer County veterans memorial was built in Farwell.

This was done to remember all members of our armed forces from Parmer County who died during wartime. Those was the only criteria.

It has come to our attention that one veteran's named was inadvertently omitted: Paul Nittler, of Bovina, who died during World War II.

Mr. Nittler was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Nittler. He was killed in action in rance and was buried at a U.S. military cemetery there.
