### Huggins served two fire depts.

From 1964:

After 20 years of service in the fire departments of the Twin Cities, Otis Huggins is retiring.

Huggins joined the Texico-Farwell Fire Dept. in 1944 and was elected secretary under Chief A.C. Green in 1945. He served in that capacity until 1956 when Farwell organized a department, a first for the Texas twin city.

Huggins was appointed chief of the Farwell department by the city commission and has served in that capacity since that time. He is a holder of a lifetime membership in the New Mexico State Firemen's Association.

He has maintained his membership in the Texico department as well as the Farwell group.

Recalling some exciting times with the fire departments, Huggins cites the Cory Penn Station fire in 1959 as probably the most dangerous fire in the past 20 years.

A workman was pumping gas into the storage tank at the station when a fuel overflow and a spark combined to engulf the area in flames.

It was Thanksgiving and many motorists were on the main travel road going by the station located in the heart of the Twin Cities. A passerby drove the truck from the area but the lines were still attached to the tank. The lines were pulled off and spewed gas into the flames.

Firemen were worried about the explosion of the tank because of the open valve. As Mitz Walling and Stanton Thigpen held the fire hoses and spewed a blank of mist directly at the flames, Huggins moved to shut off the valve and the fire was extinguished a short time later.

"We were scared of a flashback but I trusted Mitz and Stan and knew what to expect from them," said Huggins after the excitement had subsided.

With a milling crowd and electrical hot wires near the scene, firemen were thankful no spectators were injured.







Live Cattle prices took a hard hit on Monday with the oulk of the break taking place near the close of the day Cash trade was strong last week, but about \$1 lower than the \$125 from the week before. Overall, prices remain inside a large sideways trading range, but for now, the market landed on the \$120 support level basis the February contract which has held the market for the last

Feeder prices also broke alongside the Live Cattle on Monday for no apparent reason. Prices traded back down into the \$144.50 support area and held basis the January contract. Prices have more support around the \$143.25 which have held price declines since late in September. A break below these long term support levels would project a sharply lower leg just ahead and possibly indicate a long term top in place.

Soybean prices broke their long term support levels back in September and have yet to turn charts back higher. The market was able to rally over the few days, but sold off late Monday along with several other markets. Short term trends were able to turn down and a retest of the lows made around the \$11.00 level may be in order basis the January contract.

**Corn prices** have also remained under pressure since breaking below their 6 week sideways trading range Prices made a short term attempt to move up, but short term trends have already turned back down. The market tested long term support around the \$5.90 level basis the March contract and held on Monday. A break below this level could send the market back to test the \$5.44 low of the year?

Wheat prices have also continued to decline along with the rest of the grain complex. There may be some support around \$6.50 low made just a couple of weeks ago, but many markets look like the next solid level of support will come in around the July low made in 2010. This level is roughly a \$1.00 away from current levels which would place the March KC contract down around the \$5.70 area?

Cotton prices continue to trade in a sideways fashion and have been for the last couple of weeks. The market moved down and traded below some long term support around the \$91.25 level basis the March contract before moving back up. Prices are now resting on support while waiting for some news to move prices. Overall, a lower U.S. Dollar would be supportive?





I understand that alcoholism pervades all levels of society. But to know that a segment of our nation's "leaders" stays drunk much of the time (out of public view) dismays me.



### William Halbert "Hop" Graham

William Halbert "Hop" Graham, 81, community leader and former owner and publisher of the Lovington (N.M.) Leader, died Dec. 20 at Covenant Hospital in Lubbock after

He was a second-generation publisher and a pioneer in the newspaper industry in the 1950s and was the first to use web-fed offset printing in the Texas Panhandle and New Mexico. In the late 1950s, he was the principal person behind Texas newspapers the Stratford Star, the Bovina Blade, the State Line Tribune and the Mach Meter, the base paper out at Cannon Air Force Base in Clovis.

Graham heard of the development in the Dallas area of a web-fed press and decided the new technology of offset printing was the hope of the future for small papers that had a hard time finding good help. He bought the second offset press manufactured and put it in Friona in 1958.

He became the first person between Dallas and Denver to use the new method. He moved the printing press to Lovington, with his family in 1965 to run the Lovington Leader. The new press made the Leader the most modern newspaper in New Mexico at the time. The technology caught on, soon all newspapers converted to offset printing.

Graham, a Lovington Citizen of the Year recipient, was widely known for his community service work and used the newspaper and his energy to help raise funds for community causes. He was instrumental in helping raise funds for the Good Samaritan Center before it was built and also helped raise funds for the reopening of Nor-Lea

He started the Lovington Community Christmas Card in the 1960s to raise funds for the community Christmas decorations. The Community Christmas Card fund continues

He more recently was a charter member of the Lea County Athletic Hall of Fame board and single-handedly raised \$45,000 the Hall of Fame's first year to help get it

Texas journalism professionals named Graham to the Panhandle Press Association Hall of Fame in 2002 for his pioneering efforts in the industry.

Funeral services were Dec. 23 at First United Methodist Church in Lovington with Rev. Jaron Graham, grandson and pastor of First Church of the Nazarene and Rev. Virgil Ichtertz, pastor of First United Methodist Church, officiating. Services are under the direction of Stevens Funeral Home.

Graham was born Aug. 29, 1930, in Farwell to William Halbert and Araminta Black Graham. He was raised in Farwell and attended Southern Methodist University and transferred to Eastern New Mexico University when his father became ill. He graduated from ENMU with a degree in journalism and ran the family newspaper in Farwell until

He married Bessie LaJeanne Dudley on June 10, 1952. She preceded him in death on July 21, 2007. He is also preceded in death by son Ron, who was killed in an ultralight plane crash in 1985, and two sisters, Allie Blanche Crume and Sammie Graham.

He is survived by 4 sons, Hal and wife Sandy of Stephenville, Texas; John and wife Jeanine of Lovington; Andy, of Los Angeles, and Steve and wife Carolyn of Los Angeles; a daughter-in-law, Gina Fort of Lovington; 4 grandsons, Jaron and wife Elizabeth, and Tyler and wife Amanda, all of Lovington; Dustin, of Socorro, N.M., and Jack, of Los Angeles; 3 granddaughters, Courtney Graham, of Lovington; Kate Graham, of Los Angeles, and LaShawn Byrd and husband Brian, of Roswell; and 2 great-grand-






