Farwell Band Receives First Division Rating

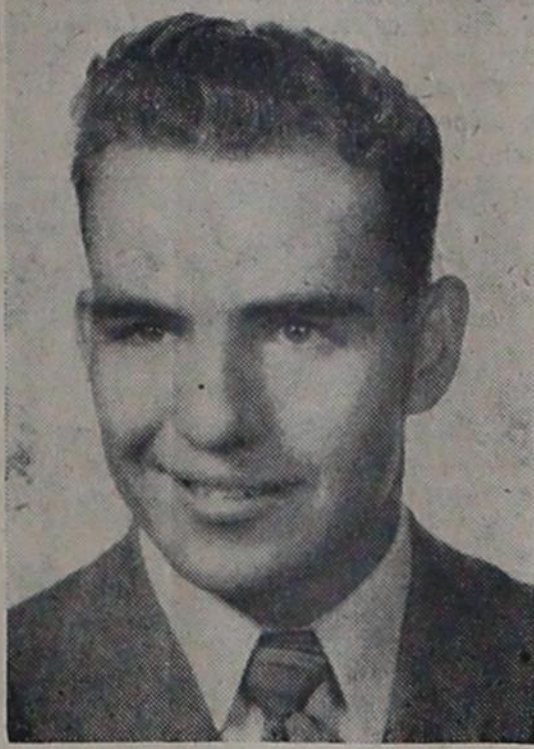

Sewer Clogs Caused By Carelessness

City officials complained today that repeated clogs in the city's sewer system was being caused by carelessness on the part of users, and cautioned against this practice.

The latest clogged up main was caused by dumping paper towels through commodes, which rendered the system out of commission for some dozen families in south Farwell.

"We have a good sewer system, but it is not designed for that kind of refuse," one official commented, and urged that only toilet paper be used. "It cost the city a lot of money to unclog a main," he added further.

Making Progress On Cotton Gin at Hub

Progress was noted last Saturday on the new cotton gin being erected one mile south of Hub in this county by the Mills & Fleming Gin Company of Burkburnett.

G. W. Fleming has been on the grounds overseeing the construction work. The new office quarters were being completed last Saturday, and the foundations have been run for the gin structure and the scales. None of the ginning machinery had been placed on the grounds at that time.

The office quarters will be 34x20 feet, equipped with inside toilets and ample storage space. A large platform scale 50 feet in length will be installed to handle large semi-trailer trucks.

The new gin is located a mile south of Hub on the REA lines, where electrical services will be available. The Southwestern Public Service Company will run a high-tension line from Hub to operate the gin machinery. Butane gas will be used to heat the office, and hot and cold water showers are being provided for the workmen in the gin building.

The new gin will be a four-stand, 90-saw Continental, equipped with the latest improvements for handling "pulled" cotton.

Juvenile Held Here On Burglary Charge

A 16-year-old juvenile, who gave his home address at Belleville, Kans. was in the county jail early this week awaiting arraignment on a charge of burglary.

The lad is charged with entering the J. M. McAdams shoe shop on the night of April 13 and taking two pairs of boots, some belts and a riding quilt. He was picked up by Clovis police and turned over to Parmer County officials. Local officers said he was wearing one pair of boots when apprehended.

Commissioners Vote To Buy New Grader

In session here Monday, the Parmer County Commissioners court voted to advertise for bids on a new motor grader for Precinct No. 3.

Other business attended during the session was approval of the current bills, approval of \$10 fee to Karl Lovelady, Muleshoe attorney, for district court; allowed \$30 on the purchase of eyeglasses for Billy and Howard Dunnam.

The session was continued until Friday of this week to complete unfinished business, it was learned.

Late Freeze Claims Much Parmer Wheat

Much of Parmer County's most promising wheat has been frozen to such an extent that it will not bear grain, in the opinion of Jud Briscoe, adjuster for Craven-Dargan Insurance Co. of Houston, who was here the first of the week inspecting wheat fields in this county.

Briscoe said that most of the damage was confined to early-planted fields that had not been grazed off during the winter months. He said that the wheat stalks had reached the jointed stage when the freeze hit this region on April 11-12. Readings of 18-20 degrees were recorded during that period.

He said that in most cases the best looking fields of the county would bear little or no grain. After examining several promising fields, he said it was discovered that the main stem was white and discolored. "Such stems will certainly fall down and the heads are already dead," he commented.

Briscoe also gave it as his opinion that the fields that had not advanced to the jointing stage at the time of the hard freezes still stood a chance to make grain. Fields that were planted early and have been grazed during the winter stand a good chance for yields, he opined.

Regular Business Planned For Legion

American Legion members discussed the zone meeting to be held in Farwell May 13, at their regular session Monday night. The zone commander is to bring a film of the 1951 convention to show as a program feature.

Members also discussed Boys' State, to which they sponsor delegates each year.

Businessmen to Meet

A meeting of the businessmen of Texico-Farwell has been called for this (Thursday) evening at the Legion Hall to consider the future of the weekly trades day event.

Otis Huggins, secretary-treasurer, said today that only 12 local firms were supporting the trades day and unless more merchants could be enlisted, the weekly event would have to be discontinued.

1500 Acres Castor Beans For Parmer

At least 1500 acres of castor beans will be planted in Parmer County this year, Joe Camp, PMA secretary announced here today, after tabulating alleged acres on file in his office.

Spencer Hough of south of Friona, will plant the biggest acreage with 200 acres pledged to the new crop in this county. Other growers, considering the castor beans purely an experimental crop, will restrict their planting to 15 to 20 acres.

Camp said all the beans contracted through his office would be planted on irrigated acreage. He added he had heard of other plantings to be made on dryland farms. The castor beans are being planted in this county to assist in the defense program, Camp said.

Discussing the yield in Deaf Smith county last year, one of the first high plains counties to experiment with the new crop, Camp said the growers of that county were well satisfied with the returns. He said that late plantings and early frost evidently figured in only nominal yields last year.

The PMA will furnish combines and hullers on a rental basis for gathering the crop this fall, and a price of 10 cents per pound is guaranteed for the beans. Last year's prices ran from 11 to 12 cents in Deaf Smith county, Camp said.

About 6000 pounds of seed are on hand at the office of the PMA here in Farwell, and Camp said his office was ready to accept more contracts and furnish the seed for additional plantings.

At a planting demonstration held Wednesday afternoon on the Bill St. Clair farm near Muleshoe, approximately 35 or 40 farmers were on hand. A speaker from the extension service in College Station discussed planting of castor beans, and John Martin, with the PMA castor bean program, explained the program.

Two implement dealers had tractors and planters at the meeting, showed planter plates and demonstrated the use of the equipment.

Rhea Community Has Meeting

A community meeting of the Rhea Farm Bureau held jointly with persons interested in the neighborhood progress contest, was on the agenda at Rhea Friday night.

Allen Romich of Friona showed two films, an educational one on soil conservation; and an entertaining show on the zoo. Mr. Dodson, representative of the Baker castor oil company of Hereford, then discussed castor bean production for 1952. Joe Jones, county agent, worked with the attendants on the progress on the neighborhood progress program.

Projects were outlined for this year for the contest, which is sponsored by Farmer's Stockman of Oklahoma.

Projects which were discussed include: putting up road markers and painting names on all mail boxes; windbreaks, shrubs and trees planted where needed around Rhea homes; and to promote contour farming on land where it is needed.

Also Rhea citizens plan to initiate a safety program, to be climaxed by a Farm Safety day next year, when 4-H boys will inspect each farm for dangerous spots and make a report. Soil analysis to determine fertilizer needs of the land will be encouraged. Jones points out that this service is offered by the extension program. A community-wide fly control program in the summer months will also be encouraged.

A man and his 3-year-old daughter were injured about mid-afternoon Tuesday when a pick-up in which they were traveling turned completely over three miles west of here on the Clovis highway.

The injured are Rev. Roy L. Boatright and daughter, Linde Marlene. Rev. Boatright suffered a heavy gash on the head and the little girl sustained two breaks in her right arm. Mrs. Boatright, who was in the pickup, escaped injury. The pickup left the highway and righted itself after turning completely over.

Attached to the rear of the pickup was a large house-trailer, which escaped undamaged when the trailer hitch broke loose. The only damage to the house-trailer and contents was a few broken dishes.

Rev. and Mrs. Boatright and the little daughter were enroute from Los Angeles to Ohio, where he was scheduled to conduct a revival meeting. They are friends of the Ben Smart home here in Farwell, where they will be detained for some time.

The Boatrights formerly lived in Amarillo, where he was pastor of the Four Square Gospel Church. They now reside at Prescott, Ariz. They have just returned home from Brazil, where he conducted a two-week revival meeting.

Texico Case Goes to Attorney General

After ruling that the Texico municipal election, held on April 1st, was invalid so far as it concerned the councilmen, District Judge E. T. Hensley Jr., has referred the case to the attorney general for an opinion.

The court found that illegal ballots had been cast in the recent election because some voters participated who were not legally registered.

The races for mayor, clerk and police magistrate were not affected in the ruling for the reason that there were not enough illegal votes to change the result.

The Texico town council will hold its regular meeting next Monday night and it was thought an opinion from the attorney general might be forthcoming by that time.

BREAK-IN AT GULF

The Gulf service station in Farwell was broken into Sunday night. O. C. Pulliam, owner and operator of the station, reports a loss of \$15 to \$25 in merchandise of candy, cigarettes, soda pop and pennies left in the cash drawer.

Entrance was gained by breaking a rear window. No arrest has been made, Sheriff Chas. Lovelace said early Wednesday morning.

New Bovina Quarters Occupied Past Week

Bovina's newly completed city hall and fire station were moved into by officials over the past week-end. City Clerk Homer Martin set up offices and the fire truck was housed in the new building.

The officials now are planning to equip their new quarters with new furnishings.

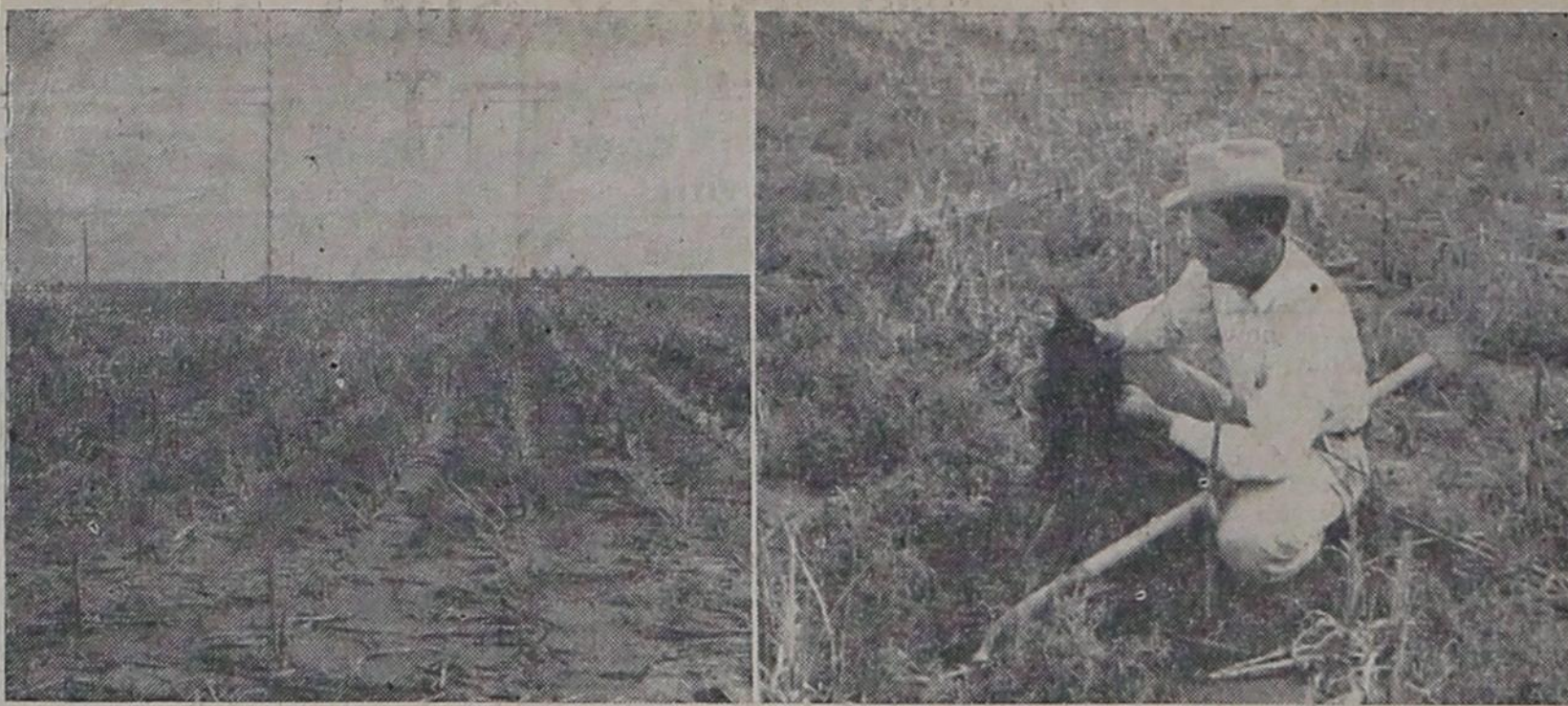

In the top right picture, Joe Jones, county agent, inspects the roots of the legumes. The bottom picture shows equipment used in seeding the vetch last fall.

Early last August, Buddy Jones, local farmer, seeded hairy vetch, a soil-building plant, between grain sorghum rows, as a soil building crop. Checking up on the crop last week, County Agent Joe Jones, found the plants to be thriving.

The crop was seeded before the last watering of the grain sorghum last year, to add nitrogen, as well as organic matter to the soil—the two materials most lacking in the land in this area. The practice is one of the newer ones in the county which shows up this spring, after seeding last fall. As for actual results, however, Jones says, the consequences can better be seen when the practice is tried by more people on a more extensive scale.

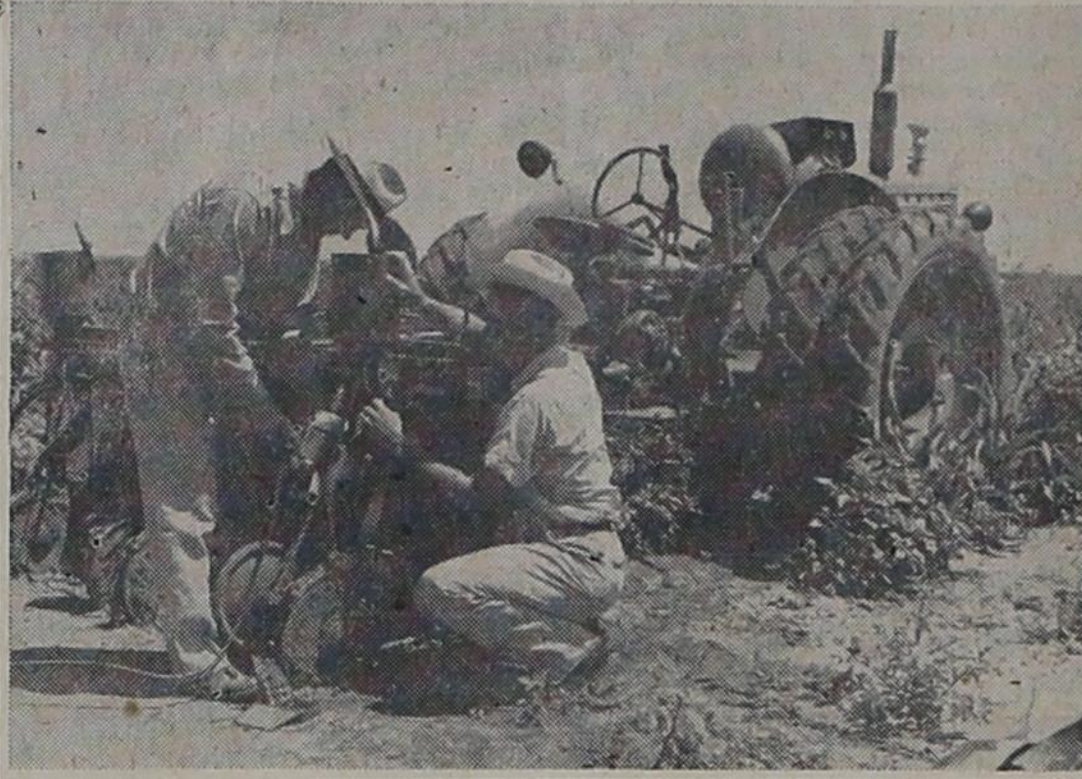
When seeding the legume last fall, Jones used the new drill manufactured by Hancock Co. in Lubbock for that purpose. The drill is owned by Parmer County Soil Conservation district. The district owns three such drills, that now are equipped with fertilizer attachments, so the legumes can be fertilized as they are seeded.

The drill seeds two rows ten inches apart between each grain sorghum row, says Jones. Also the equipment would work well in cotton because of fenders which keep the machine from knocking the boll over the stalks. In fact, legumes can be seeded in any crop that the tractor won't break over, for the drill is built for row crop 40 inches high.

Vetch isn't the only legume adaptable for this area, the county agent adds. Austrian winter peas and sweet clovers have been named as other legumes for this type soil.

According to County Agent Jones, an increase in the acreage of fall planted legumes is needed if farmers are to maintain high production per acre of cotton and other crops. One of the most important effects is the influence on improving soil structure or condition. The soil structure should be granular or crumbly as to allow for deep root and water penetration and air circulation within the soil. In some soils, the particles "run together" to such an extent that little or no water can get to them.

The legume also places organic matter in the soil, another important factor in good soil, Jones concludes. Jones is now turning under the vetch, and will water and seed grain sorghum, which will be observed with interest, Agent Jones says, to see what increase in yield will be. If
