Comments urged for Water District proposals

Here is a report from Jimmy Wedel concerning the new proposed water irrigation regulations promulgated by the High Plains Underground Water District No. 1:

The new proposed rules seem somewhat reasonable, but I would urge you to comment on three items:

1. Alternative reporting should be allowed for low volume users -- those in areas that couldn't reasonably be expected to exceed maximum usage. etc.

2. Pooling of contiguous property, as long as there is one common owner (in the case of many farmers who have more than one corporation, etc, and routinely share water across property lines).

3. A waiver of penalties in a year when the drought is extremely excessive -- like this one!



It is hosted by the Border Town Days Committee Fireworks penalties addressed

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday amended the county's Emergency Management Plan by adding a section on fireworks in response to the ongoing drought and the prohibition of fireworks that it has made necessary.

The penalty for a violation of this prohibition is now a Class C misdemeanor instead of a Class B misdemeanor.

"The maximum penalty for a Class B violation is a fine of \$1,500 and up to 180 days in jail and we thought that was entirely too much to throw at some teenager with a sparkler or firecrackers," county judge Trey Ellis said.

"The maximum for a Class C does not include any jail time," Ellis explained, "but the maximum fine of \$500 still provides a severe punishment. Nobody should want to risk that much money just for the few seconds that any of these fireworks last."

Parmer County has posted signs on the highways, U.S. 70-84 and U.S. 60, cautioning anyone who has purchased fireworks that are legal in Curry County that they remain prohibited for use on the Texas side of the border.
