

PCCG holds annual meeting

Growers held its annual meeting Aug. 26 at the BBQ Shop in Farwell.



studies by TCGA and other agencies, it was determined that farming actually creates only 10% of the amount originally claimed. They are currently working to insure farmers are not hampered by such government regulations.

TCGA also works closely with energy companies to obtain the best rates and services for farming interests. And focuses on trucking regulations to make it easier for module trucks to travel across state lines to pick up cotton.

Shawn Wade, Director of Policy Analysis for Plains Cotton Growers, commented on the still unresolved Farm Bill and Lesser Prairie Chicken issue.

The farm bill expires in September and they are working on an extension. So far, more than half the issues in the bill are resolved.

Wade also said PCG has been working with **Environmental** the Defense Fund to come up with policy for the endangered species affected through farming practices. More than 200 species are currently on the list from the Fish and Wildlife Department for candidate species. They have plans to evaluate all the species as time allows and it is possible that others will affect farmers in our area.

Wade said that part of the wildlife issue has been with oil and gas companies that want to continue operations in our area.

PCG and cooperating agencies are looking for voluntary programs to satisfy the habitat requirements from the Wildlife Fish and Department. One possibility is the Habitat **Exchange** Program. Farmers can volunteer their land to enhance species habitat and receive credits from Fish and Wildlife. The oil and

A couple more players have joined the Steers and varsity coach Taylor Read said the JV will play against Hale Center next



Notice of Tax Revenue Increase

The City of Farwell conducted public hearings on August 30, 2013 and September 3, 2013 on a proposal to increase the total tax revenues of the City of Farwell from properties on the tax roll in the preceding year by 5.995106 percent.

The total tax revenue raised last year at last year's tax rate of 0.519800 for each \$100 of taxable value was \$227,704.74.

The total tax revenue proposed to be raised this year at the proposed tax rate of 0.519800 for each \$100 of taxable value, excluding tax revenue to be raised from new property added to the tax roll this year, is \$241,178.52.

Nichols, Barrett, Clawson re-elected to Bailey County **Electric Co-op board**

Bailey County Electric Cooperative held its 74th annual meeting on Aug. 27 in Muleshoe.

Administrative Assistant Rickie Warren said next year's annual meeting will be something special to honor its 75th year. The cooperative has been working on putting together an afternoon and evening event that will be a family friendly event aimed at thanking the community and members for supporting BCEC.

Districts 4, 5, and 7 held their elections and incumbents Jerry Nichols, Ronnie Barrett and Larry Clawson were re-elected.

Co-op President David Marricle said the dry temperatures from last year led to an all-time peak load, mostly from irrigation wells. Irrigation sales accounted for over 81% of the total usage for the co-

In the last year they have installed about 19 miles of new distribution line to connect over 200 new services.

The value of the electric plant has risen to \$45 million after approximately \$3.4 million has been added

in upgrades. The co-op retired over \$550,000 in capital credits

again last year and the Balley County Electric contin-

ues to be financially sound and stable. Other major system upgrades included distribution line upgrades in the Oasis, Sprinklake and

Progress areas. They also have made improvements to the inter-

changes just south of Muleshoe and in Earth. This helps the co-op manage system outages bet-

ter and restore service more quickly.

They also upgraded the transmission system and substations.

Marricle said the cell phone messaging system continues to be a valuable tool to notify farmers and other folks of events that could affect operations.

The harvest season is off to a rapid start as silage choppers are rolling in area corn. Conditions are very good and harvest has not been impeded by weather making harvest.

The irrigation termination decision making process in corn continues. Assuming an adequate crop condition, we normally say that once the starch line has reached 50%, irrigation can be terminated with no detrimental affect. The key to this crop stage irrigation termination point is it assumes a full pro- animals. file of moisture from which the plant will pull moisture to finish filling grain.

If the soil profile is not near capacity at 50% starch line, additional moisture will be required to finish the crop. With sprinkler and drip irrigation systems, we have the capability to tailor late irrigation applications to specific crop needs.

Early irrigation termination can significantly reduce corn yield.


But a Demon defender made a spectacular play on a Wolverine pass in the end zone to stop the drive and end the game.
