## Enter State Playoffs

Texico Wolverine girls were to advance to the state Class A basketball playoffs Thursday at 3:30 p.m. MST against Maxwell, a team that Texico Coach Roy King describes as "small in size, but very quick and adept at man-to-man defense tactics."

Should the Wolverines win they would play their next game at 2 p.m. today (Friday). In the event of a loss in the first game they will be eliminated from the tournament.

In order to advance to the state Class A semi-final rounds, Texico rolled past Mountainair, 65-34, last week in Mountainair, thus clinching a playoff berth. The Wolverine girls then went on to best Floyd the next night, 38-37, to win the regional crown.

Thus far, with the upcoming track season looming on the horizon, this year has been a good one at Texico,

sportswise that is. Earlier, the Wolverine varsity football boys fought their way to the finals of the state Class A football playoffs, bowing to defending state champs, the Hagerman Bobcats.

Now with the Green and White girls in contention for a possible state cage crown, Texico boosters and others are beginning to realize that when the Sports Muse smiles on Texico's teams, they can be a force to be reckoned with.

KKQQ FM radio station of Clovis (Channel 99.1) was to follow the Wolverine girls throughout this week's state championship tournament, broadcasting indepth game reports Thursday afternoon during halftime and immediately following the game which was to begin at 3:30 p.m. MST.

Should the Green and White win KKQQ will announce the day and time of the next game.

### PERSONAL

Of late the press has been chastising President Carter for a lack of spunk in defending United States interests. Our old friend W.H. (Hop) Graham in Lovington came to his defense with a few well chosen words directed at President Lopez Portillo of Mexico.

We think that it is too bad that these words of honest wisdom originated with a Southwest publisher and not from the State Department. We agree with Hop and hope by the time you finish his column you will also agree.

Said W.H. Graham: "Carter Rebuked in Mexico," cried the 72-point head in the Albuquerque Journal. "Lopez Portillo Warns Deceit Could Backfire."

Now just a darn minute, Jose.

The things you are saying to Jimmy Carter, you are saying to all of us in the United States. No doubt part of your bravado is for domestic consumption. Every politician likes to enhance his image among the home folks.

But the things you are saying about us hurt. And in this day of the world community, there are other ears listening.

Here in New Mexico we are your closest neighbors. The Hispanic heritage is evident everywhere, in our culture, in our politics, even in the official name of our state. It puts our teeth on edge for you to speak of "sudden deceit" as characterizing our actions.

Let's go over a few things. We might start with the 1938 expropriation of American owned properties by the Mexican government. That sounds more descriptive of "sudden deceit" than declining a deal to buy natural gas at international blackmarket prices.

You desire a trading relationship with the U.S., but no U.S. company can operate within your borders unless it gives up its autonomy. Mexicans can own property in this country, but U.S. citizens can't own property on your side.

At least half a million of your citizens cross the border every year, seeking to come into the United States to find jobs, get married, and have children. In short, emigrate illegally.

We find a few of them and transport them back to your country. Gratis. No charges are filed. They are not imprisoned or abused. When they get into trouble by breaking our criminal laws, we appoint legal counsel in their behalf, all at our expense.

What happens when a citizen of the U.S. gets into trouble in Mexico? He is lucky if he gets out of jail or prison within months, maybe years. Very often he is cut off from all outside aid. Very often he loses his personal property to local law officials.

In the United States, bribing an officer of the law is a crime and it makes news when it is discovered. In Mexico, the patron system is a way of life.

We have personal knowledge of and can furnish case histories to illustrate our point that the most affluent of our citizens are not treated as well by your government as the least affluent of your citizens are treated by ours.


President Carter is bilingual. His second language is Spanish. He speaks it fluently. He has a genuine and abiding interest in Mexico. The first foreign ambassador he officially received after taking office was from Mexico.

Have you forgotten these things? Can you, in sincerity, overlook them?

President Lopez Portillo, it bothers us that you would make such unseemly remarks toward us. They are not justified.

Personally, we have long advocated better and broader relations between the United States and Mexico. You have

## Farwell School Board Rehires All Personnel

Gilbert Kaltwasser and Ted Magness, who will soon retire from the Farwell School Board, were honored Monday night during the organization's regular monthly meeting. Each of the men was presented a certificate of appreciation along with a gift certificate to a Clovis restaurant from the Classroom Teacher's Organization. Making the presentations on behalf of the CTO was Lynn Burton, the school's band director.

Kaltwasser, who was president of the board, has served 12 years as a board member while Magness is completing his sixth year on the board.

Except for a called meeting sometime this month, the two members who are not running for re-election have served at their last board session. Their replacements will be named in the trustee election coming up April 7.

In other business the Board voted to renew the contracts of all teachers, coaches and aides. They also accepted a bid from Southern Bus Sales for two school buses in the amount of 1,580.00 for a 1971 IHC 54 passenger bus and \$2,380.00 for a 1972 Ford 54 passenger bus.

The Board also approved the

report of the Textbook Selection Committee on new textbooks adopted for the 1979-80 school year.

Mrs. Billie Blain was named to act as presiding judge of the upcoming trustee election, replacing Albert Smith who was ineligible to serve because his son, Eddie Smith, is a candidate for one of three vacancies.

After much discussion concerning a school tax re-appraisal the Board instructed James Craig, administrative assistant, to gather as much information as possible in regard to this matter and that the Board meet in a called session (no date set yet) before rendering its decision.

The Board accepted the resignation of Paula Drake, speech therapy teacher, effective May 25, 1979.

A motion to remove the juke box from the school cafeteria was defeated by a four to three vote.

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## Two Men Arrested For Home Burglary

Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace reports that two New Mexico men were apprehended after they had entered the Myron Hillock residence in Farwell last Wednesday afternoon making off with the cash contents of Mrs. Hillock's handbag. The intruders apparently entered the front door of the residence as Mrs. Hillock returned inside her home they ran out the back entrance. They were caught a short distance from the scene.

Involved in the incident and bound over for grand jury action were Eddie Jarmillo, 23, of Clovis who was turned over to the Clovis Parole Board and is being returned to the New Mexico State Penitentiary. Randy Wallis, 20, of Cannon Air Force Base was released to military authorities at Cannon.

The sheriff reports that about 60 gallons of gasoline was taken from an overhead tank belonging to the Highway Patrol. The tank is located at Texaco, Inc., in Farwell. A lock was sawed off the tank to gain access to the gasoline, the sheriff said.

Several REA meters on the highway south of Bovina were vandalized, having been shot with a 22 rifle.

In a Saturday night or Sunday night incident, someone apparently entered the office of the superintendent at Farwell Schools, taking a \$30 pocket calculator and about \$5 in change. Sheriff Lovelace says there was no sign of forced entry and it is believed that the culprit either had a key, found a door left unlocked, picked the lock or else hid in the building while it was open.

In other investigations, R.L. Douglas, who lives southwest of Bovina, reports that a door was stolen off an old pickup parked near his residence.

David Dean Wines, 37, of Bovina, was fined \$100 plus court costs and given six months probation for driving while intoxicated.

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

The high school symphonic band will perform "La Mascarada" (Paso Doble), "Simple Gifts," "Suite For Band," and "Daybreak."


Featured selections of the junior high band will include "A Hard Day's Night," "Lyric March," "Allegro-Adagio




"Even though the 8th graders failed to score, they did show signs of promise. They competed well and it will only be a matter of time before they get it together," Phillips said.

WITH THE BIBLE

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### "WHAT GRACE IS"

Never let the devil deceive you into supposing that God planned sin as "a gracious means to a glorious end," for then salvation from sin would be simple justice, not grace. No, you can't charge God with your sin.

It is to the guilty, the undeserving, far and wide, that God offers "the forgiveness of sins according to the riches of His grace" (Eph. 1:7).

There are two significant phrases in Eph. 2 which shed clear light upon the character, the nature, of grace. They are found in Verses 2 and 3, which speak of the unsaved as "children of disobedience" and "children of wrath."

Meditate for a moment on these phrases: "children of disobedience" and "children of wrath."

It is against this dark, black background of *deserved* wrath, that we read further:

"BUT GOD, who is RICH IN MERCY, for His GREAT LOVE wherewith He loved us,

"Even when we were dead in

sins, hath quickened us together with Christ (BY GRACE YE ARE SAVED)

"And hath raised us up together and made us sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus:

"That in the ages to come He might show THE EXCEEDING RICHES OF HIS GRACE IN HIS KINDNESS TOWARD US THROUGH CHRIST JESUS" (Eph. 2:4-7).

Somehow it takes a load off one's heart and mind to come to the end of his rope, as it were, and admit that he is a sinner, deserving of God's wrath. How sweet, to the ears of such, is the wonderful message of redemption by grace, through the finished work of Christ at Calvary? We were all the "children of disobedience" and therefore "by nature the children of wrath" - "BUT GOD!" When hope seemed gone, HE intervened and now offers salvation to all by grace, through faith. "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31).

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
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
