It has been said that the ancient Chinese paid their doctors as long as they were well and ceased paying when they got sick. We do not know about the truth of this story but the psychology behind the idea appears to be sound.

It's possible that some such plan will have to be worked out in this country if the escalation in doctor and hospital costs continues. We realize that some of the Washington moguls of thought are coming up with various proposals. One proposal we think is a real lemon is the administration's plan to put a cap on hospital charges by law. As with most of the Washington proposals, those in political power will not suffer the consequences; it will be the faceless mass of the people who will eventually

While we are not intimately acquainted with hospital administration we have long observed that most hospitals are only keeping a jump ahead of bankruptcy as it is now. If their flow of money is inhibited by legislation then their only cost reduction plans can come in the areas of lesser pay for their employees or to stop the purchase of advanced life-saving equip-

We are not thrilled with the thought of our nurse, or lab son working to save our life being underpaid. In the field of health the same truism will hold: "you get what you pay his hand on our life valve. We suspect most people feel the

If the hospitals are forced into a moratorium on the purchase of new gadgets then it will be comparable to a patient, today, going into a hospital that is equipped by 1970 technical standards. We wouldn't like it, you wouldn't like it.

It was a rather bleak day though for the Farwell Steers and Steerettes with the varsity boys earning 14 points to tie Littlefield for seventh place, and the varsity girls also finishing in seventh place with 36 points.

During the day's actions, two meet records were broken. J. McIntire of New Deal broke the old shot put record with his toss of 56' 81/2". He had set the existing record of 54' 11" in last year's meet.

C. Nichols of Friona broke the pole vault record with his jump of 12' 7". The previous record set in 1976 by Woods of Springlake-Earth was 12' 3".

En route to a seventh place ranking, the Steers managed to pick up one second place and one fifth and one sixth.

Max Lonsdale garnered second in the 100-yard dash with a time of 10.5. The sprint relay team of Juan Diaz, Mark Owen, Waverly Coates and Lonsdale took sixth with a time of 47.6, and the mile relay team of Diaz, Isidro Garcia, Lonsdale and Blake Buchenau also finished fifth with a time of 3:50.

For the Steerettes, Lorie Turner brought home the team's only first place medal. She won the 80-yard low hurdles with a time of 12.4. Vicki Vinton finished fourth in the 220-yard dash with a time of 28.6.

The 440-relay team of Turner, Vinton, Yolanda Martin and Gina Eubank took third with a time of 53.6. Those same girls, running as the 880-relay, came in fifth with a ime of 1:58.9.

Sharmy Christian ran the 80-yard low hurdles in 13.1 to claim fourth place. Gina Eubank finished the 100-yard dash in 12.7 seconds to take fifth place.

In commenting on the Steers, Coach Royce Baker said, "I am pleased with our overall running. The young kids also did well. We were handicapped last week. Due to illness and injuries we had only two good workouts instead of the usual four before the relays."

The coach said that the relay teams ran their best times during the meet. "The mile relay team cut .4 second off their time, and the sprint relay team shaved off .6 second. 

Dr. Lawrence E. Morehouse wrote an excellent book on physical fitness called, "Total Fitness." 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



Farwell Volunteer Fire Department reported one ambulance call and three fire calls during the past week. All of the calls were reported Tues-



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
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"Now to him that worketh is the reward not reckoned of grace, but of debt.

But He can, on the basis of the

penalty paid at Calvary, bestow salvation as a free gift. This is why we "The wages of sin is death; but THE GIFT OF GOD is eternal life

through Jesus Christ our Lord" (Rom. 6:23) "It is THE GIFT OF GOD, not of works, lest any man should boast"

(Eph. 2:8,9) God owed Abraham nothing, but seeing His faith He said: "This man believes Me; I will account his faith for righteousness" (Gen. 15:6). And this He still does for those who trust Him, only He has now revealed the basis for this action: Christ's payment for sins at Calvary. This is why, in Romans 4:5, He forbids works for salvation and declares that the believer's faith is "counted for right

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




