Trial Begins For Ex-Texico Clerk

Clara Wiehl, former Texico City Clerk and treasurer, went on trial Monday in 9th District Court in Clovis for alleged acts of embezzlement, failure to deposit public money and tampering with public records. Judge Reuben Nieves is presiding.

Michael Kaufman, assistant attorney general for the state of New Mexico, opened the state's case Monday; but, after being called away by illness in the family, Bill Bonem, district attorney for Curry County, took over the following day. Court did not resume on Tuesday until 1 p.m. to give Bonem time to study material prepared by Kaufman.

Mrs. Wiehl is represented by Dan Bizzard.

A jury of seven men and five women were selected Monday and both the prosecution and defense attorneys made their

opening remarks later that day.

Mrs. Wiehl held the post of city clerk and treasurer at Texico for 15 years, resigning in March of last year. She was indicted last December by a Curry County Grand Jury on 16 counts of embezzlement, 16 counts of failure to deposit public money and six counts of tampering with public records.

The charges concern alleged violations for a period of October 1977 to December 1977. About \$27,500 in city money is allegedly involved.

Kaufman, in his opening statement Monday, spoke of the operations of the City of Texico and of how a large portion of the income from utilities (water, sewage and garbage services) were utilized to finance other town services.

Amid colorful circus decorations, provided by Theta Rho Chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority, good food, and a thoughtful, slightly philosophical address delivered by Max Sherman, president of West Texas State University, Mrs. Don (Maxine) Williams and W.M. Roberts were recognized as the 1979 woman and man of the year.

The festivities were enjoyed Friday night during the annual Farwell Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet at Farwell School cafeteria. One-hundred-and-eight people were served.

Mrs. Williams, a native of Farwell, has been involved with community activities for years. One of her more recent projects was the Farwell Convalescent Center and Auxiliary. She is also a charter member of Theta Rho ESA and has been involved with its

philanthropic activities for more than 25 years.

Roberts, who is serving his second stint as superintendent of Farwell Schools, has been an educator since 1927. He has spent 30 years as a superintendent. In 1975 he retired from the teaching profession but returned later to take the helm of the local school system.

Chamber directors for 1979 were introduced, including Lee Hutchins, Joe Hughes, Don Williams, Jerry Monk, Otis McMillan, Fred Chandler, Johnny Atkinson, Johnny Curtis, Ricky Stewart, R.W. Anderson, I.W. Quickel and W.M. Roberts.

Roberts, who was master of ceremonies, touched on many areas in giving the progress report, citing the last Border Town Day celebration as one of the best ever in recent years. During the past year new tennis courts have been built at Farwell Schools.

The Chamber recently secured brochures, boosting the City of Farwell, Roberts said, adding that plans are in the works that if followed would bring Amtrak from Atlanta, Ga., to the West Coast through Texas and Clovis.

The congregation of the New Light Baptist Church is building a new church and an addition to the local First Baptist Church is in the "planning stages," Roberts said.

Several new homes have been constructed in recent months and the emergency service of the volunteer fire department has greatly improved since seven firemen completed requirements for emergency medical technician certification.

This summer the city plans to re-surface approximately 20 blocks of city streets, and recently the highway department completed some repair work on Ninth Street.

In recent weeks Farwell School students have been faring well in both literary and sports events, Roberts said.

Noting other progress, he said that Hughes Auto Parts has expanded its business and moved to a new location during the past year. He also noted that Mr. and Mrs. Miller

Cunningham are the new owners of Venture Foods, formerly Pay 'N Save.

Farwell has several new businesses; including Irrigation Supply, Glover, Inc., Unique Antiques, Howard Shoe Repair Service, T&A Welding and a trucking company which is to locate here in the near future.

Several existing businesses have also undergone some changes, including new owners for the Farwell Gin Company and new officers for the Lariat Gin. Joe Myers used car business has moved to a new location, Farwell Hardware has purchased additional property, Kelly Green Seeds has expanded and Interstate Fertilizer has moved and added improvements.

In his broadly philosophical address, Sherman touched upon several points. He quoted a Chinese proverb, "I hear, I forget, I see, I remember" to point out that the world belongs to the doers. "Aiming

"The students on college campuses represent our best," he continued. "The American dream is best symbolized by the dream of the president. Truman was right when he said the man who holds office is the servant of the people," Sherman said.

February 9-21 of 1978. She explained that the stubs and cash sheet found in the trash corresponded, but that the amount had not been credited to the city's deposit.

Sometimes Hammit would come to work at 8 a.m. Texas time -- before Mrs. Wiehl opened the office -- and answer the phone and receive payments for utilities, related Mrs. Christian.

Under continued cross examination, Mrs. Christian said that during the time Mrs. Wiehl was employed, Mrs. Wiehl, Hammit and Maurine Baker -- once a part-time and full-time city employee -- each had keys to the cash box and the city hall building.

Mrs. Christian said Hammit taught her the office procedures after Mrs. Wiehl quit, but that he did not know how to operate the posting machine. A

representative of the National Cash Register Company had to show them how to operate the machine, she said.

Lloyd Jefferies, a field engineer for NCR provided expert testimony concerning the operation of the 299 posting machine which Texico installed approximately two years ago. Prior to that, the city utilized a Burroughs machine, also a product of NCR.

Jefferies said the new machine was more versatile, stored information electronically and had been programmed by a NCR programmer in El Paso. He added that the machine had been serviced from three to five times during the past two years.

"The machine is incapable of making wrong additions and it cannot enter figures in the (Continued on Page 3)

Chamber Honorees Serve School, Church, Community

Maxine Williams and W.M. Roberts, were named the 1979 woman and man of the year Friday night during the annual Farwell Chamber of Commerce Banquet.

The 1979 woman of the year is a native of Farwell, having lived here most of her life. While attending Farwell Schools she early demonstrated the kind of outstanding citizen she would become by her enthusiasm and participation in all school activities.

Mrs. Williams was voted football sweetheart, most beautiful and she was active in basketball as well as any other activities available at the time.

As a member of the pep club she beat a drum and often marched onto the football field with the group to form a giant "F." Her interest in the local school did not wane after graduation as she has actively supported all school activities throughout her adulthood. She attended West Texas

State College after graduating from high school. She and her future in-laws traveled to Alaska in 1951 where Maxine married her high school sweetheart, Don Williams. After completing his tour of service in the army the Williamses returned to Farwell where Maxine began a busy career as homemaker and community builder. She furnishes time, leadership, money, good judgment and faith in the future to worthy community projects. The Williamses have a daughter, Deanna, who attends Texas Tech, and one son, Clay, who is in high school.

Mrs. Williams is a charter member of Theta Rho Chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority, an international philanthropic organization. For 28 years she has helped deliver gifts to shut-ins in the community, helped with Mother's Day Teas and aided March of Dimes and Cystic Fibrosis drives. She serves as chairman

of the community to aid Girlstown. She has held all ESA offices and twice during her 28 years of service she has served as president.

Mrs. Williams is a member of First Baptist Church, Farwell, and has taught Sunday School and been active in the lay witness program. She was a member of the building committee to remodel the sanctuary. For several years she has sponsored a Korean child through the Christian Children's Fund.

As a member of the Farwell Hospital District Board Maxine has given many hours of service toward the building and furnishing of the Convalescent Center and still more hours seeking to recruit doctors and dentists for the community. She is also a charter member of the Convalescent Center Auxiliary which she helped to organize and in which she continues to work regularly.

In 1977 West Texas State

University honored her with an award for distinguished service to her community.

Farwell School Superintendent W.M. Roberts, the 1979 man of the year, is known for his unfailing good humor as well as his willingness to help out, regardless of what the circumstances are.

During his 50 plus years as an educator this quality of putting profession and community above personal desires has been recognized and appreciated by many people, old and young.

The 1979 honoree began his career in 1927-28 in Jones County, Texas. He was affiliated with seven school districts before coming to Farwell in 1949. He was absent for four years but later returned to his many friends here.

He retired from the teaching profession in 1975, but as he was not used to being inactive, he immediately plunged into the business world as the owner of an insurance agency. Later when the Farwell Independent School District needed an experienced hand at the helm he returned to the harness of school superintendent.

Roberts has taught in the classroom, coached athletics, worked as a principal and has spent 30 years as a superintendent. Professionally he is a member of the National Education Association, Parmer County Teachers Association and the Panhandle School Leaders Association.

He is a charter member of the First Baptist Church in Farwell. He is also a charter member of the Texico-Farwell Lions Club. He has held many offices in Lions and has served as club secretary since 1977.

He has been a member of the Chamber of Commerce for many years and will again serve as president of the organization.

Roberts is known as the "Voice of The Steers" as he

announces football games, Twin Cities Relays and the annual Farwell Livestock Show.

He was born in Jones County, Texas, and attended Harmony School until his

senior year. He graduated from Anson High School. He married his wife Leatha Jo in Quannah. They have two sons, James K., deceased, and Charles R. of Ft. Stockton, and two grandchildren.

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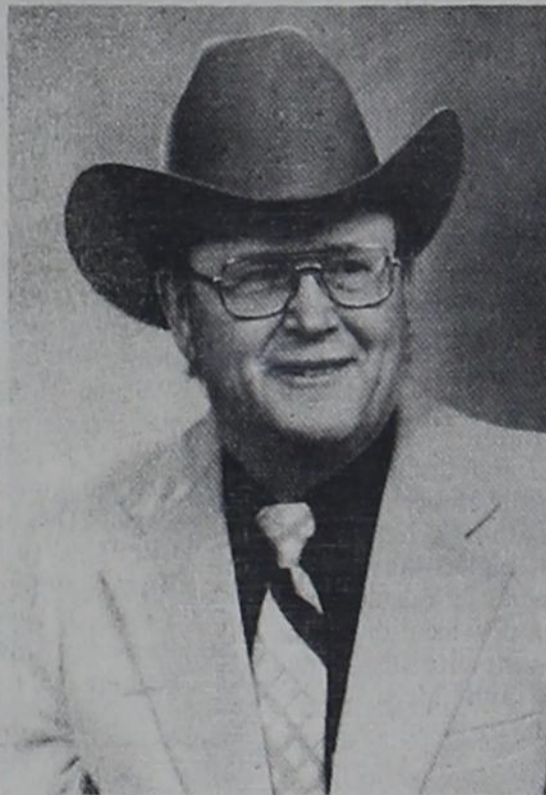
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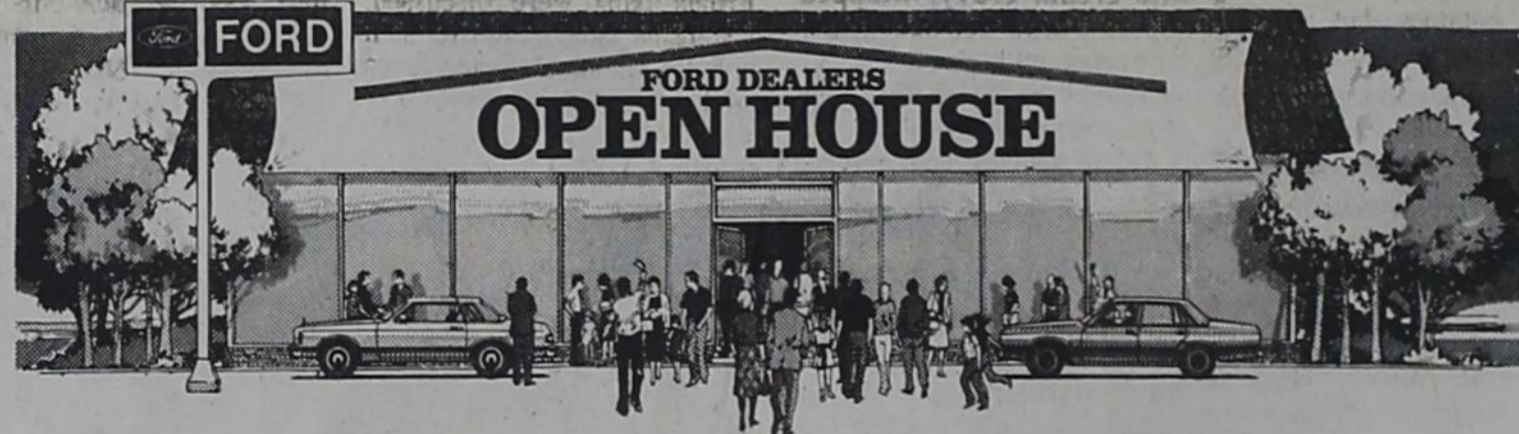

wrong column. Rather than do that it will stop working all together," he said.

Jefferies affirmed that he taught Mrs. Wiehl how to operate the 299 model and that he was later called back to Texico to teach Mrs. Christian how to use it after Mrs. Wiehl had quit.

In response to a hypothetical question, Jefferies said it would be possible for someone using a 299 machine to take money from the cash box and not be detected. The amount of money taken would have to be posted on the appropriate ledger cards, the yellow sheet inserted and processed and the machine cleared so that additional posting could be processed. Then the appropriate stubs and yellow backing sheet - or cash sheet - could be disposed of, he explained. That way the people paying their bills would receive proper credit, but the amount of money would not be credited to the city's accounts.

Under cross examination Jefferies said the 299 machine was not capable of being "locked" and that anyone could be taught to operate it.

Since Hammit is recovering from back surgery and is under a doctor's order not to drive or ride in a vehicle he was unable to appear in court this week. However, his deposition taken Saturday was read into the court records

Tuesday afternoon. Keith Hewett, court reporter, read Hammit's responses to questions.

Hammit said he has lived in Texico since 1955 and has been an employee of the city for the past seven years. Besides taking care of water wells and reading meters, Hammit explained that he sometimes helped out with office duties early in the mornings and when Mrs. Wiehl was either sick or on vacation.

"Usually the first day or two of the month I would come into the office at 8 a.m. Texas time to accomodate people who like to pay their bills before the office opens. Sometimes I would use the time to call people and tell them that they would be disconnected for non-payment of bills, but that was only about one day a month," he said.

Even though he operated the old Burroughs machine "just to see if he could do it," Hammit emphasized that he did not know how to operate the new NCR machine. However, he did see Mrs. Wiehl make ledger entries, he said.

Hammit also said that he sometimes took the city's deposits to the bank after Mrs. Wiehl filled out the appropriate statements.

When asked to explain how he discovered the stubs and cash sheet in question, Hammit related the following sequence of events:

"I worked for Clara on February 10 (a Friday) last year. Every day a new envelope is started for money and checks received from the accounts. I remember taking in two receipts that day. When Clara returned the following Monday she said she could not find the envelope for February 10. We looked but couldn't find it.

"The following Friday I again worked for Clara and because I was still bothered about the missing envelope I began to search for it again and that is when I found the cash sheet and the stubs in the trash can. I didn't say anything right then because Clara was my friend. I put the material in a desk drawer and kept it about a week before saying anything to anyone.

"The next Friday Maurine worked for Clara as I was metering and that is when I told her about the cash sheet and stubs. She advised me to tell the mayor or the trustees and that is what I did. I turned the material over to Mayor Turnbough."

Under cross examination Hammit denied that he knew how to operate the posting machine.

When Mrs. Baker testified a few minutes later she affirmed what Hammit had said when he told her about the stubs and cash sheet.

"I told him to tell the mayor the trustees and as far as I know that is what he did," she said.

Mrs. Baker first started working for the City of Texico part time in 1974. For parts of 1975 and 1976 she became a full-time employee but her duties did not change much then, she said. For the rest of 1976 until October of 1977, when she was terminated due to lack of funds, Mrs. Baker worked only one week each month during billing.

After she was terminated Mrs. Baker said that occasionally (one or two days each month) Mrs. Wiehl would pay her to work for her.

Mayor Manford Turnbough testified at the close of Tuesday's session. He has lived in Texico for 14 years, 11 of which have been in public service, first as trustee for four years and as mayor for the past seven years.

He testified that the city's

financial troubles began in 1977.

"Payrolls became hard to make, we had to terminate Maurine and we asked the Curry County Commissioners to help pay our city marshal." Turnbough was asked about the statements he had made during the December grand jury investigation.

"I was mistaken when I said Clara was the only person to have a key to the cash box," he explained. "I realized it that same day, but I wasn't recalled to the grand jury."

Turnbough explained that he told the grand jury that Clara usually handled all receipts except when she was on vacation or sick. I wasn't familiar with the office procedure and I really didn't know that Hammit sometimes came in early in the morning to help out.

"I also erred when I told the grand jury that Hammit gave me the material in question on March 10. That was the day Clara resigned. Hammit gave me the stubs and cash sheet the latter part of February of last year but I do not remember the exact date," Turnbough said.

"I showed the material to the trustees and we decided to turn it over to Ribble Holloman, the auditor." The mayor also said that to the best of his knowledge that Hammit did not know how to operate the posting machine.

The proceedings adjourned Tuesday at 6:30 p.m. MST and resumed the following morning at 8:30 a.m. MST at which time the auditors were called to testify.

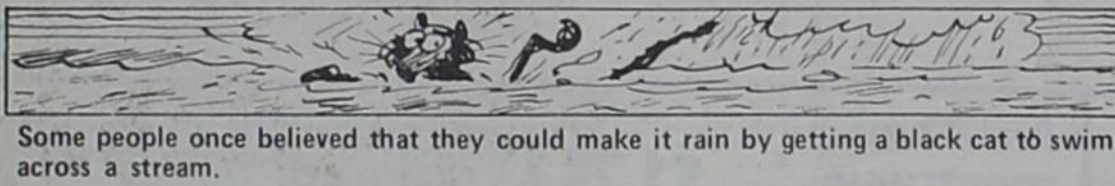

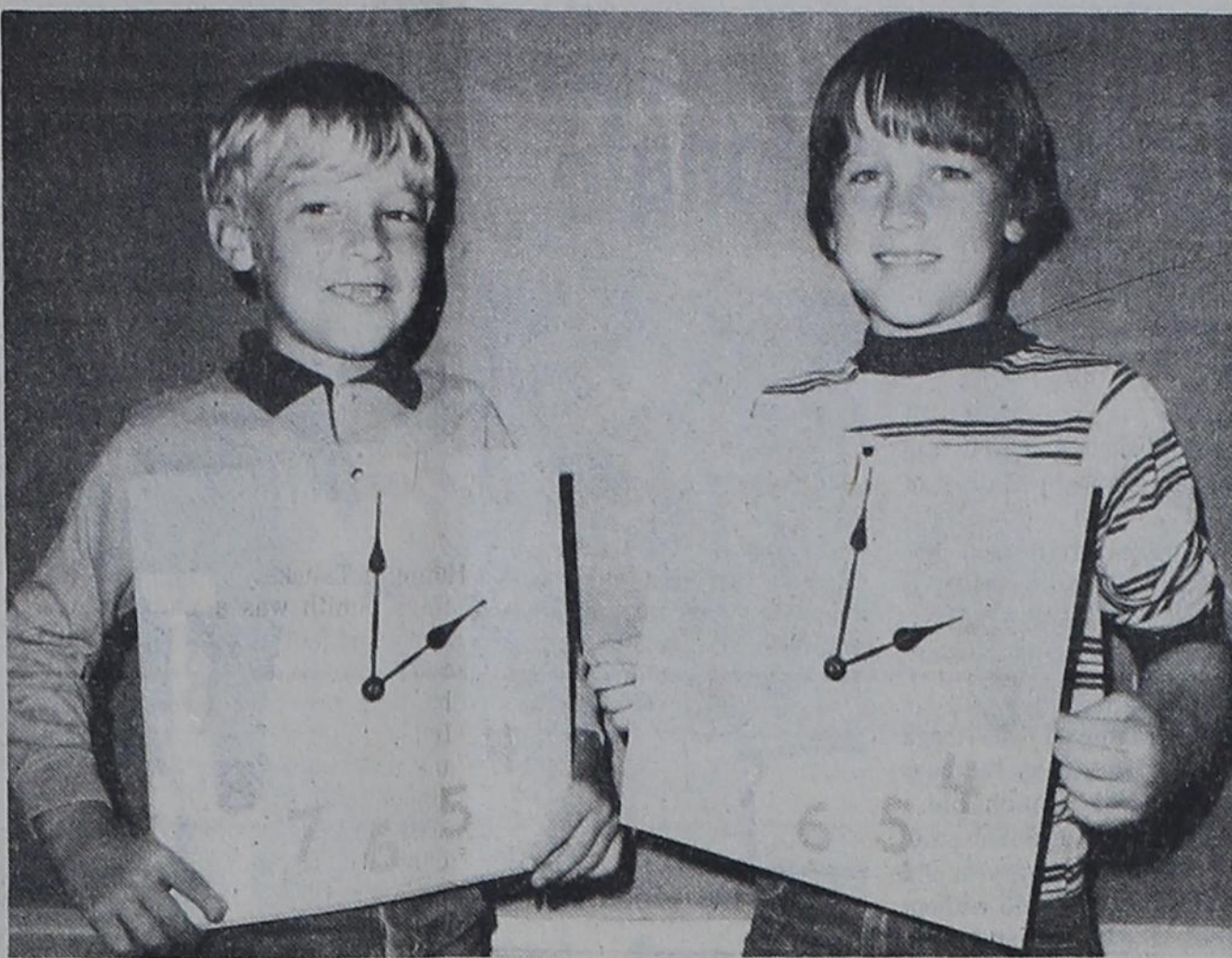

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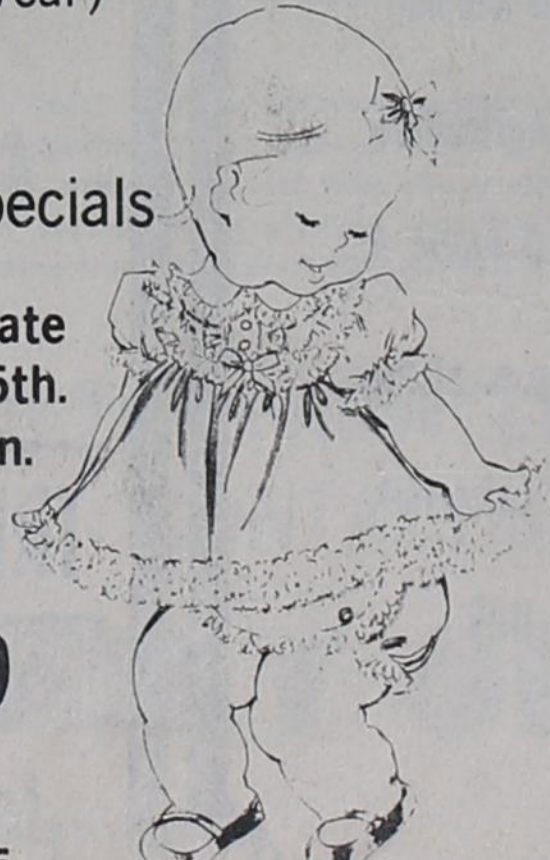
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Track - -

in the first round 2-6, 1-6, to the eventual third place winners, Memphis.

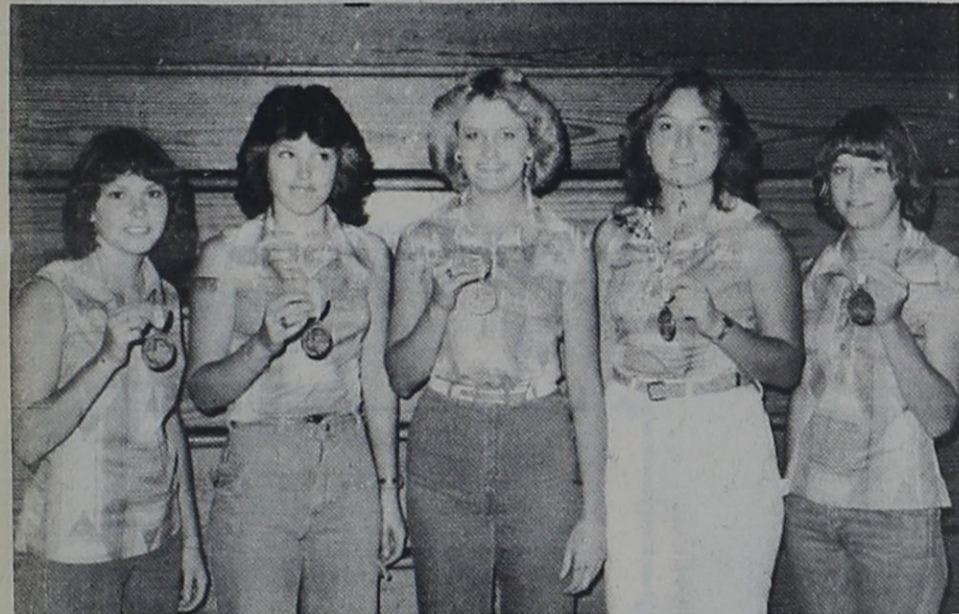

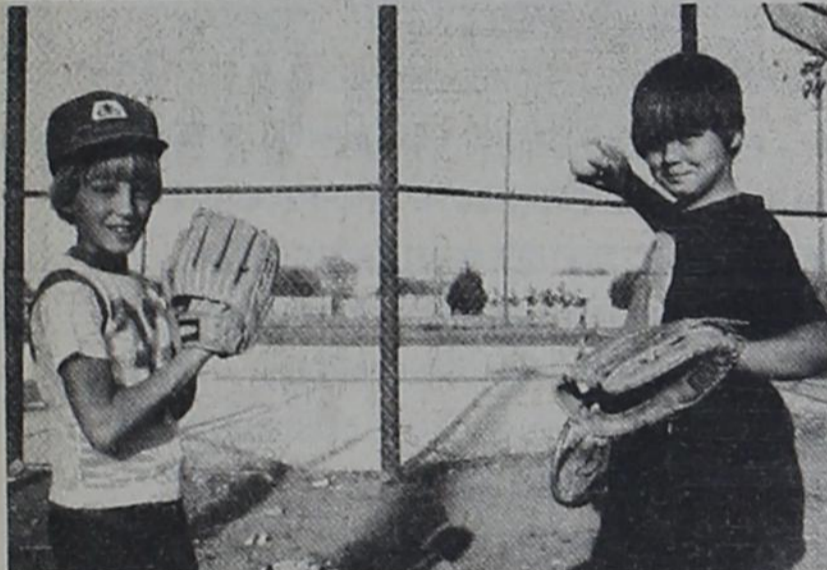

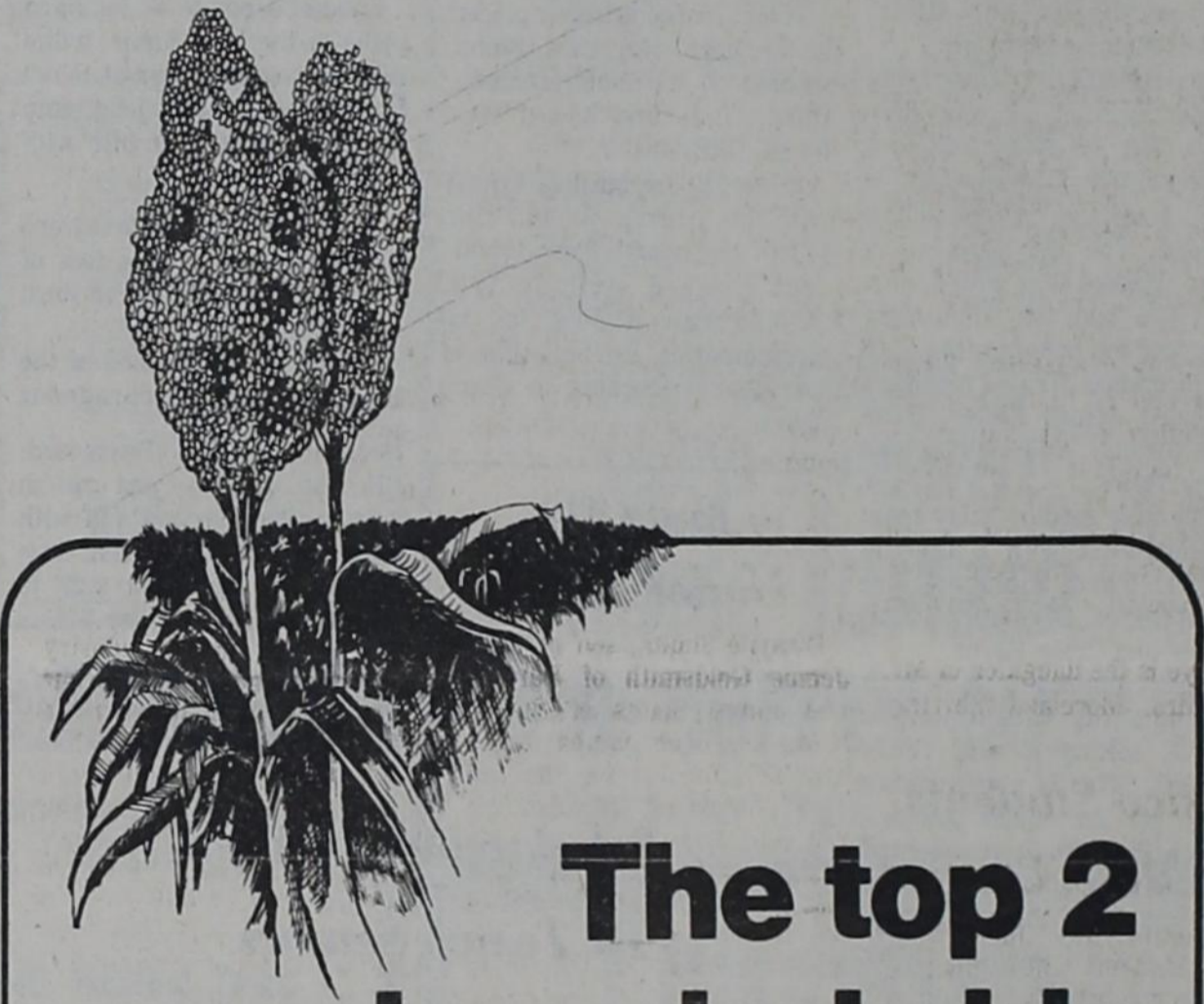
GOLF Facts & Fancies

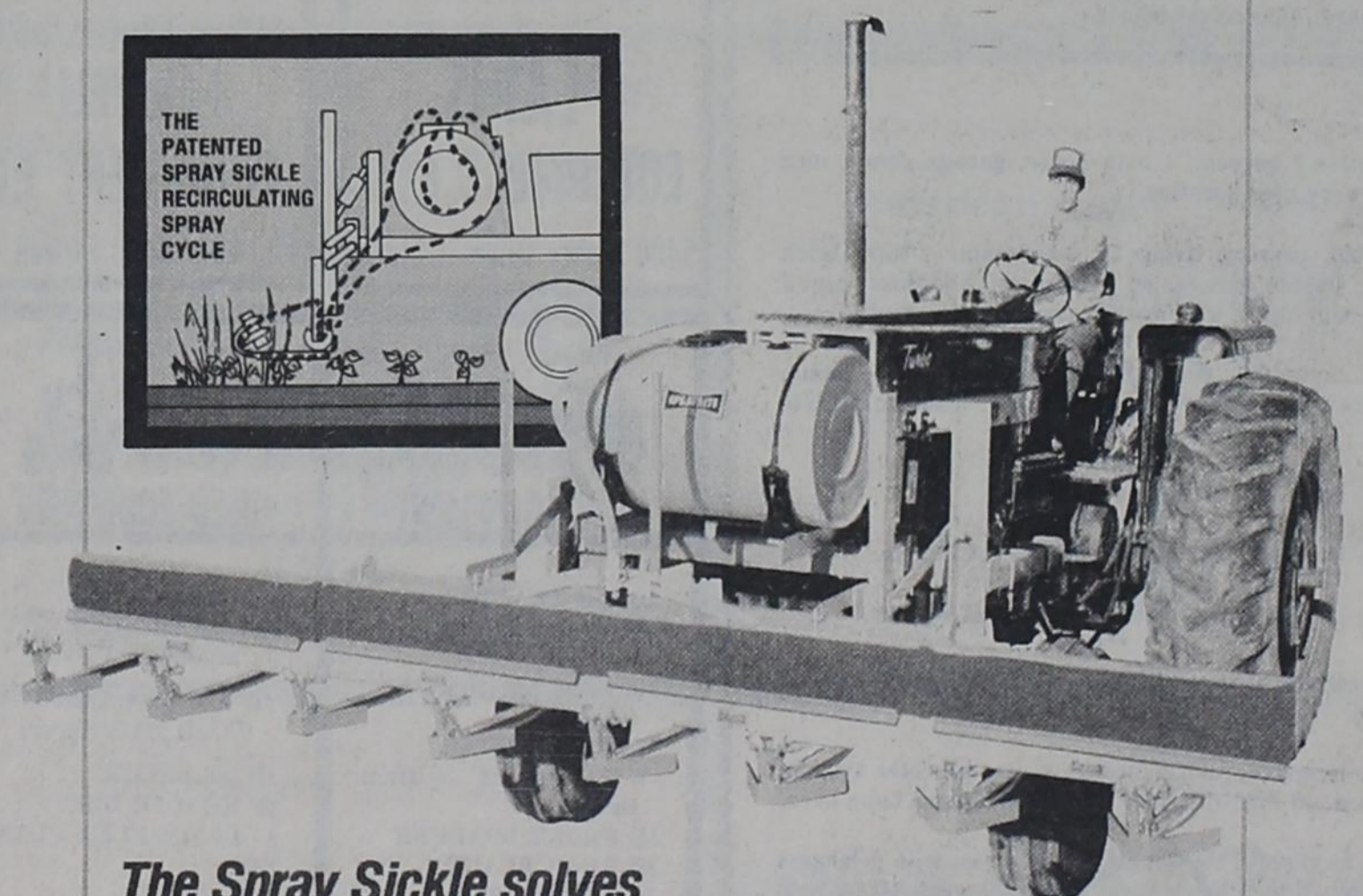

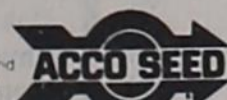

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
