Dale Arnold and his 'cool, crazy science class'

Some teachers use extra credit as an incentive for their students. Dale Arnold, a Farwell Junior High science teacher, uses fish and birds and snakes in his classroom.

"In our classroom, cleaning cages is a motivator. The kids love to do anything with the animals," he said.

These animals include a beautiful quaker parrot named Bella, several geckos, a tarantula, finches, King, Milk, and Hog Nose snakes as well as an 8-ft. boa constrictor.

However, their special project this year has been a salt water fish tank.

Complete with Dory and Nemo look-alikes, the tank is a wonderful addition. "The kids began by researching the types of fish for the tank and we keep adding things as we go," said Arnold. "It has been a great learning experience.

The kids got excited about it and then it was just contagious." Arnold believes the kids have learned much more by actively participating in the tank than just reading about it in a textbook.

"Kids have really learned about the environment in a salt water tank. They have tested for nitrogen levels, nitrates, PH levels and salinity. They had to research what types of things live in this environment and make good choices for our tank."

Arnold hopes that these hands-on projects will get kids excited about science.

"In our class, we really don't use textbooks much," he noted. "We search online for our projects and use hands-on lab projects as much as possible. We also use a great animation computer program that allows the kids to advance at their own pace."

Arnold said he sets the bar high for his students because "there is no growth without adversity." He wants them to be exposed to science, challenged and really master the concepts.

Although this is his first year at Farwell, Arnold is no stranger to education. He taught four years in Portales, then nine more at Muleshoe. He is proud of the fact that he helped improve the science curriculum in his former positions.

So far, he really likes Farwell. Since funding is always an issue for any educa-

tor, he is especially grateful for the support of his science curriculum. Arnold comes from a teaching family. His parents recently retired with a combined 70 years of teaching experience. His wife is also a 4th grade Farwell teacher. All these educational influences helped shape his philosophy of teaching.

Basically, Arnold wants to be there for the kids. He wants them to feel com-

fortable in his classroom and grow as individuals. "A huge part of teaching is relating to the students." Thus, he feels like the best way to reach kids is through hands-on work. He wants them to "do" sci-

Often, Arnold opens his class with a magic trick. He never tells the kids the solution to the trick; he prefers to keep them guessing.

"If you can get a kid's attention. they will be more likely to concentrate and work hard," said Arnold, "If I can offer a student a little something different in my 'cool, crazy science class,' maybe I can keep them in school and help them

For his science students "a little something different" often means holding a snake if they finish their assignment or playing with a gecko at their desk. Animals are evidently a good motivator.

He said students love to come in early and stay after school to help with cleaning, feeding and caring for the pets.

Looking ahead to next year. Arnold has several new projects in mind.

"I would like to do a rocket launch with the 6th graders - let them build their own and then launch them. I want to let the 7th graders to build remote control cars and run them. For the 8th graders, I want to offer a robotics project. I have been in contact with several other robotics teachers and it really sounds interesting."

Of course, these plans are subject to funding concerns, but Arnold enjoys offering new choices to kids through projects like these.

"Any small thing you can offer a child can lead to great changes in their attitude and lives," he said.



Farwell High grad serves in Afghanistan as flight engineer

Farwell High graduate Rogelio "Roger" Martinez was recently featured in an Air Force Print News article written by Tech Sqt. Beth Del Vecchio.

Martinez, an Air Force Master Sergeant, is a flight engineer stationed with the 76th Expeditionary Rescue Squadron stationed at Camp Bastion in Afghanistan.

His mother, Cristina, and brother, Jimmy, live in Farwell.

As part of an aircrew, Roger is involved in the vital role of medical evacuation missions.

Some of his responsibilities include:

Performing aircraft preflight, in-flight and postflight inspections, maintaining aircraft checklists during flight, monitoring engine instruments and aircraft systems by operating, computing and applying aircraft weight, balance and performance data.

Also, determining engine fuel consumption using airspeed, atmospheric data, charts, computers or electronic calculators, reporting abnormal conditions to the pilot, and recommending corrective actions.

"I worry about the operability of aviation systems, so the pilots can concentrate on flying," said Roger. "The aircraft weight is always changing; field elevations, runaway conditions and weather changes. I have to make calculations based on these conditions to determine the aircraft's flight performance."

Roger sits behind, but right between the pilots on the flight deck. He acts as an objective eye and adds an extra safety element to the flight.

"The flight engineer is our systems expert," said Lt. Col. Peter Dominicis, 76th ERS commander. "He knows more about the aircraft than most pilots ever

Dominicis continued:

"Pilots learn that if something starts to go wrong, they need to sort of de-automate, step back from technology and fly the plane. Having an engineer allows us to do that -- to fly the airplane.'

Roger said flying MEDEVAC missions in Afghanistan is a bit different then the personnel recovery-focused missions he flies at Moody Air Force Base in Georgia.

You know, picking up a patient and knowing they are in really bad shape keeps you alert and raises the stakes a bit," he said. "Once you get on the ground, it's a great feeling that we completed the mission and the patient is going to be all right."



Live Cattle prices dropped down into Friday's close for the second week in a row. The market was almost an xact repeat of last week price action with prices making lows of the week on Monday, highs on Wednesday and selling off again into Friday. Cash traded between \$123-124 which was inline with the February contract. Most short term trends are now pointing lower, but prices will need to see some follow through selling continue into next week to confirm a trend change.

Feeder prices also moved down into Friday's close, but seemed to hold their two week support level. Most of the movement next week will hinge directly on the Live Cattle price. The industry on the whole has some fairly large imbalances at this time which keep traders on the sidelines until there is some evidence of a strong move in one direction or the other. Prices continue to trade inside a two week sideways range.

Soybean prices took a hit into Friday's close before moving back off their lows into the close. This market was able to make it back to retest their highs made in early January, but failed to breakout above these levels and is now making an attempt to turn down. Short term rends were on the verge of turning down on Friday, but will need to see more pressure into next week to confirm

Corn prices also turned down into Friday's close, but did not move below short term support levels at the 66.27 level basis the March contract. Technically, there are some internal indicators which did turn down on Friday, but will need to take out support in order to confirm a shift in the short term price direction. A move below support could lead to another test of the \$6.00 evel over the near term.

Wheat prices began to turn down on Thursday and prices really got hammered into Friday's close. Friday just wasn't a very good day for the Ag Commodity sectors? In any case, short term trends are down and this comes after wheat prices were able to retest their January highs and failed. The market was able to hold their 50% retracement level on Friday which could lead to a bounce, but major long term support is still further down around the \$5.90 level basis the March KC con-

Cotton prices also took their long term support levels out on Friday once prices crossed the \$93.00 level basis the March contract. This not only turned short term trends down but also their long term trends. Cotton prices have moved sharply higher since turning their long term trends up last December. Now that prices are projecting lower, it is possible that the market will once again test their old \$83.00 low?

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
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Farwell students study habitats

Mitchell stresses need for EMS workers

EMS Director Larry Mitchell reported to the Bovina City Council on Feb. 9 that there is a dire need for certified EMS volunteers in order for the service to continue to operate within the parameters set by state regulations.

The ambulance service currently operates with 10 staffers, including 2 paramedics and some new personnel. The staff is spread thin for the amount of calls received on average.

The service is in violation if they are unable to respond to calls.

Mitchell asked the council to consider pay for certified volunteers as an incentive to bring more people on board.

Discussion included possible revenue means for such a program, including a direct charge per response or perhaps a county sales tax that would allow generated funds to be dispersed to all precincts in an effort to support the EMS services.

Current revenue goes toward operation, training, maintenance, and equipment upgrades and is generated by each by entity on a per response basis.

No action was taken by the council.

In other business, the council:

-- Discussed sealcoating streets.

It was said there are between 16 and 24 blocks to be addressed, beginning with the pavement in the worst condition.

Forty thousand dollars have been set aside for the project. Dwight Brandt Engineering will oversee it.


