



# Gerri Bowers has recipe published in cookbook

Gerri Bowers of Farwell now has added the title of "Expert Chef" along to her everyday title of Deputy County Clerk.

Gerri has served as Farwell's Deputy County Clerk for 14 years but recently helped draw some extra attention to Farwell. One of her own family recipes was published in the January edition of Gooseberry Patch "Weeknight Dinners" cookbook.

Gerri submitted her traditional family recipe for Chile Relleno Casserole around three years ago. She and co-worker Stacy Lamb were looking at the Gooseberry Patch website and noticed a request by the book for new recipes.

Since Gerri had recently made the Chile Relleno Casserole for an office function, the recipe was still saved on her computer. With encouragement from Stacy, Gerri emailed her recipe to the famous cookbook.

Then, last June, the Gooseberry Patch company sent Gerri a letter congratulating her for her winning recipe. The company informed her that her recipe would appear in their January release of "Weeknight Dinners."

Gerri does not know where the recipe came from originally, but first her aunt, and then her

mother, began making the casserole for their families in the 1970's. It was just natural for her to continue the tradition and prepare this recipe at home.

Gerri comments, "I love to cook Mexican food and this recipe is one of my favorites since I was a little girl."

Both Stacy and Parmer County Clerk Colleen Stover attest to Gerri's excellent cooking abilities.

"She is a great cook," says Stacy. "We got to try the Chile Relleno at a recent luncheon and it was wonderful."

Stacy also brags on Gerri's butter pecan fudge and cheese balls, which are also old family favorites. Gerri enjoys original family recipes and tends to stick with them for her own cooking style.

Gerri is excited to see her recipe printed in the nationally-published cookbook. "It is so neat to see my recipe and 'Farwell, Tx' printed in the book. Maybe people will look up where Farwell is located."

Although she received no compensation or royalties from the published

## Chamber approves banquet changes

The Farwell Chamber of Commerce on Jan. 29 approved some big changes for the annual Chamber banquet for this year.

Historically, the banquet to honor local folks for their support of the city has been held on a Saturday night and has featured steaks cooked before the event.

This April, the event will be held on a Thursday night, with the exact date still to be set.

The move was prompted by parents who said they couldn't make the event because of weekend activities. Several also said weekends were harder to find sitters for.

On the other hand, supporters who wanted the event held on Saturday pointed out that it would be more difficult for family from out of town to make a Thursday event.

Chamber President Rob Pomper supported the change to Thursdays, pointing out that recent turnout for the event has been dwindling and the Chamber needs to change to ensure as many local folks can make it as possible.

He said that it was disrespectful to give out the awards if the only ones who could show up were the award winners.

The second big change was in the food provided.

Over the years, many folks had asked for a different selection of food offered. The Chamber will look into possibly having the event catered by Desperado's, Leal's, or a similar caterer.

The Chamber is looking into possibly providing chicken fried steak, Mexican food, or a chicken and fish dinner.

This year's entertainment will be Olivia and Gabbie Schilling, Farwell High students who recently released an album.

The Chamber is also looking into the idea of door prizes to help boost attendance.

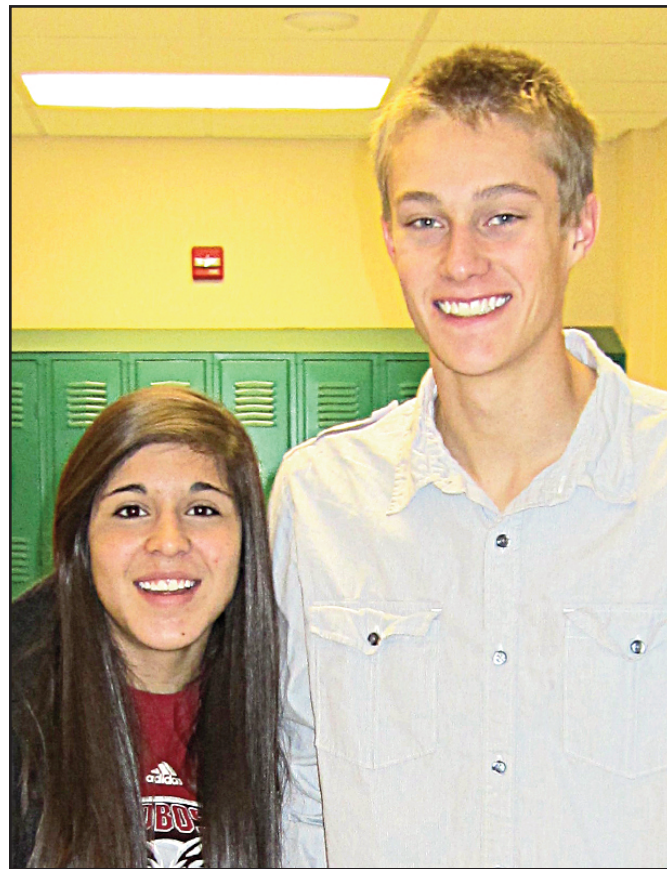
In other news, new city brochures have been made for Farwell. They are available at City Hall.

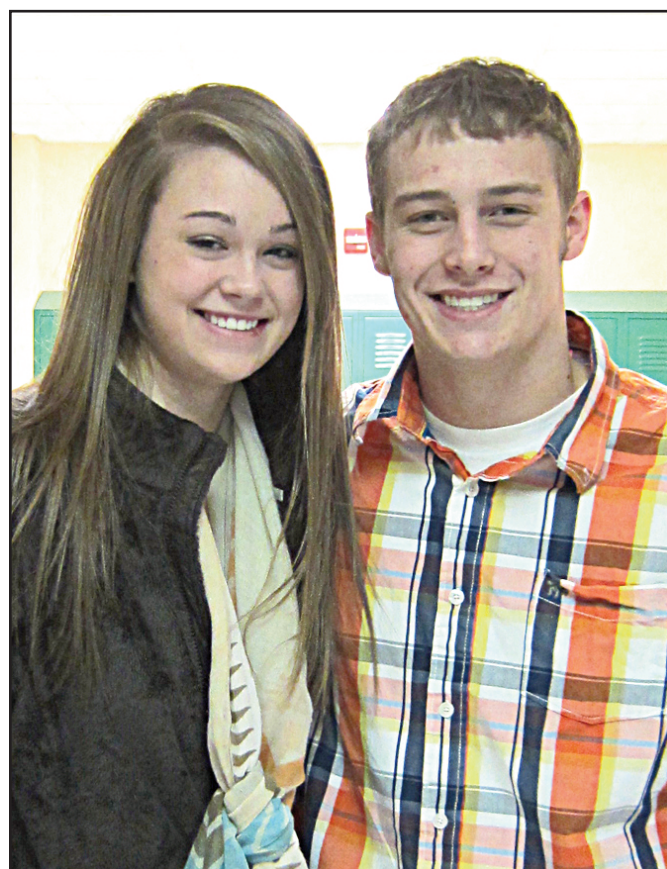
Persons can file by calling board secretary Margie Watkins.

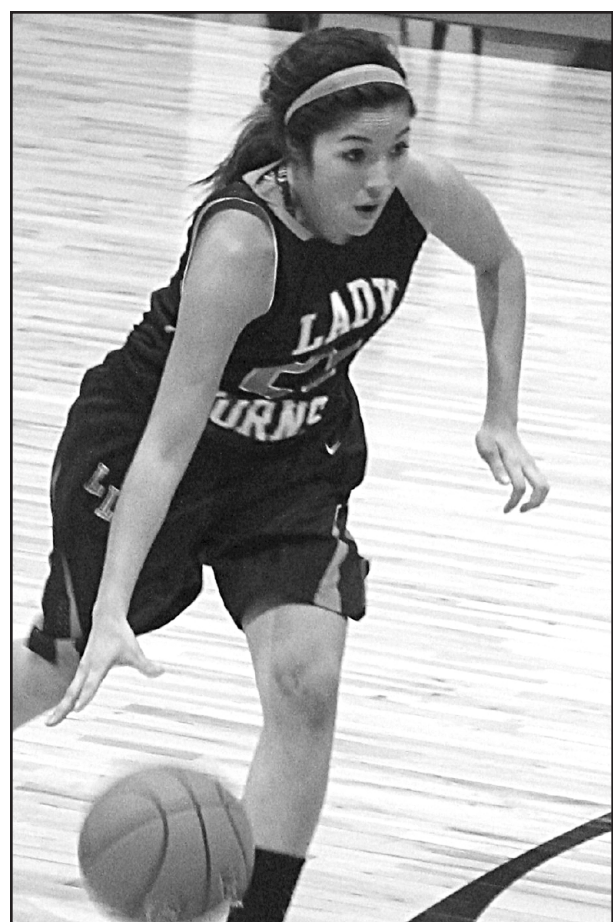

# Texico students present Science Spectrum exhibits

Texico 4th and 5th graders recently presented their Science Spectrum exhibits.

These science-based research projects reflect on themes such as biomes, plants or animals. Each student was responsible for researching their topic using the computer, answering specific questions about their topic and writing their findings in a final report. The students then created a project board that was displayed at Texico for all the students and parents to learn about their topic.

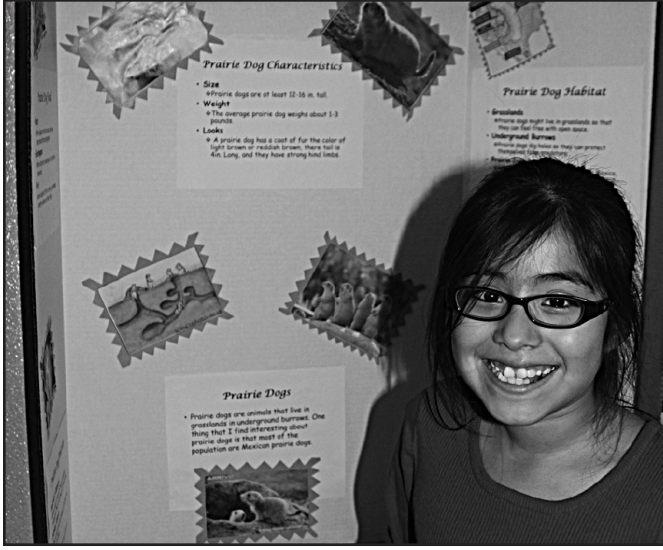

ing. Our 5th graders put all of their research into a Power Point presentation and learned a lot about not only their topic, but also the computer processes."



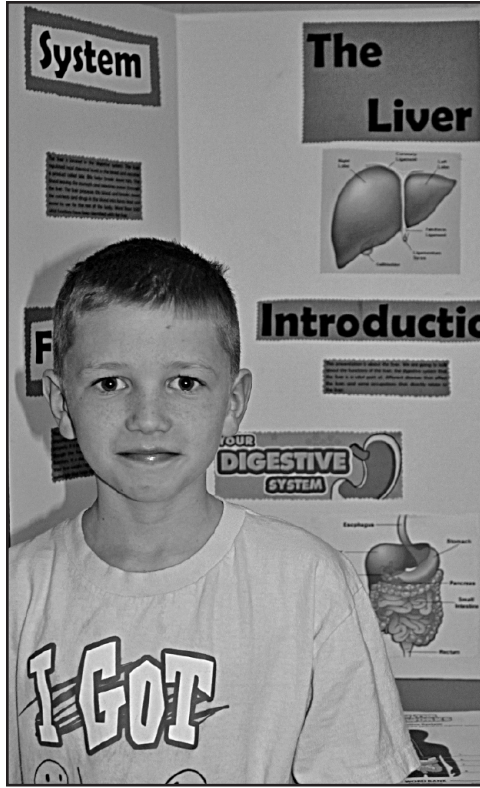

### Chilie Relleno Casserole

#### Ingredients:

- 1 lb. Jack Cheese
- 1 lb. Cheddar Cheese
- 2 - 8 ounce cans of whole Ortega Chilies
- 4 eggs, separated
- 1 Tablespoon flour
- 2/3 cups evaporated milk
- Salt & pepper

Grate cheeses and layer in a 9 X 13 casserole dish. Place Ortega chilies on top of cheeses. In another bowl, beat egg yolks and gradually add flour and evaporated milk to yolks. In a separate bowl, beat egg whites until fairly fluffy and then mix into the yolk mixture. Salt and pepper to taste. Layer egg mixtures over the chilies and cheese. Bake uncovered at 325 degrees for 50 minutes.

## Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

In last week's Tribune, Mike Pomper stated in his column that prisoners were receiving free health care.

I am currently teaching at the T.L. Roach prison unit in Childress and have been for the past 2 1/2 years. I can assure you that the prison system in Texas is not coddling the offenders (inmates). I have been very pleased with the frugality of this unit while spending taxpayer money.

Just one example is the use of deer meat for meals. Many hunters enjoy killin deer, but not eating them. The prison system encourages donations of deer meat.

Farmers often donate truckloads of vegetables that they can't or don't want to sell, for meals at our prison unit.

Additionally, we are a "farm" unit complete with "hoe squads" that work the vegetable fields, raising food for the offenders' tables.

The other units have various specialties that they produce. Some manufacture chairs, tables, desks, soap, uniforms, and raise chickens, hogs, beef and many more items that they supply to units within the prison system.

With regard to health care, Jan. 1 offenders must pay \$100 on the first visit to the infirmary. Subsequent visits are free.

Since many offenders' families are not there for them for various reasons (won't send them any money), many can't afford the initial fee. Therefore, they can't or won't go to the infirmary.

I recently had a student in my class who had no knee. His leg bones ground on each other when he walked. Consequently, he limped terribly. This prison system will not treat him because the injury did not occur while incarcerated. He is going to be in prison for a very long time, painfully getting from point A to point B.

We all applaus the Arizona sheriff who runs a no-frills prison system. I think that we should also appreciate the Texas Department of Criminal Justice for running a tight ship.

## New standards proposed for school lunch menus

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has proposed new standards for school lunch menus.

The idea is to give students healthier food choices. It would ban the sale of almost all candy, high-calorie sports drinks and greasy foods on campus.

The USDA proposes to set fat, calorie, sugar and sodium limits on almost all foods sold in schools.

Food sold outside the lunchroom is not regulated. Here is the gist of the proposal, which still must be approved:

What's out -- candy, snack cakes, most cookies, pretzels, pizza, most ice cream and juice drinks that are not 100 percent juice.

What's okay -- baked potato chips, granola and cereal bars, dried fruits, yogurt, diet soda, flavored water, unsweetened or diet ice tea.

I have really enjoyed the articles on nullification that Will Anderson has done such a fine job on.

Nullification is an issue dear to my heart -- not just nullification on a state by state basis, but down to the individual nullifying "laws" that he or she knows are wrong (which is most of them).

There is a 1,000-year-old right and duty of jurors to refuse to convict people who are charged under "laws" that the juror believes are overreaching their authority, no matter what the judge may instruct them to do.

Judges used to inform people of this duty -- now they generally hide it. Look up "jury nullification" or check out fija.org for more information.

I am not as optimistic about the chances of a state government doing the right thing, so I don't hold out much hope for Texas or New Mexico nullifying unconstitutional

anti-gun "laws."

After all, they have been enthusiastically enforcing these anti-constitutional edicts for the federal government since 1934. Plus, they have dreamed up plenty of their own -- such as the Texas prohibition on "open carry" that even the feds haven't yet managed to impose.

The Bill of Rights says the "right of the people to keep and bear arms" (that means to own and to carry guns, swords, and Bowie knives) "shall not be infringed."

That means every single anti-gun "law" that has been enforced since 1934, and especially since 1968, is unconstitutional, illegal, and null and void.

It means that anyone

enforcing even the most "reasonable" anti-gun "law" is a criminal. It means there is no authority to issue permits, do background checks, or to ever arrest anyone on "weapons charges".

Don't try to excuse anti-liberty positions by quoting the part about a "well-regulated militia," either. It doesn't mean what the "gun control" advocates want it to mean; "well-regulated" means "fine-tuned" and well-practiced, and the militia is everyone capable of handling a weapon in defense of self, territory, life, and liberty. That is YOU.

The power of nullification lies in each of us. It's time we start using it again.

## Higher county taxes may come

Parmer County Judge Trey Ellis had one addition to make to the story that ran in last week's Tribune about the tax abatements for Mariah Northwest in the Friona area.

Noting that the abatements for the wind energy project won't go into effect until 2015, he said there is a strong possibility that county taxes will increase next year due to lower assessed valuation because of lower crop yields.

So, although the wind energy project will provide extra county funds down the road, higher taxes may be needed sooner.

**Just Passing Through**  
WILL ANDERSON

The 2nd Amendment to the U.S. Constitution says:

*A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.*

The national nightmare continues -- maniacs taking firearms into "gun-free zones" and shooting indiscriminately, killing as many innocent men, women, and children as they can before they can be tackled by civilian heroes, shot by police, or saving the last bullet to kill themselves.

In the coming months, journalists and politicians will be trumpeting what they call their "common sense solution" to the problem, trying to shout down anyone who disagrees.

Every American needs to watch this confrontation closely because it is another threat to their Constitutional rights.

There are three elements that possess firearms in America -- all levels of the government's police forces, the law-abiding citizens, and the criminals.

Any plan that involves taking guns away from the law-abiding citizens has absolutely no hint of "common sense" to it, whatever they may say.

If the law-abiding citizens in America were assembled in one place, they would constitute the largest army in the world, possessing over 270-million legally-held firearms, with almost half of the homes in our Republic having a firearm of some type for self-defense.

Every year, something between 2 million and 2.5 million crimes in America are prevented by law-abiding citizen with a firearm.

Imagine how many lives would have been saved if the "gun-free" zones instead had law-abiding citizens with firearms.

If one way or another, Washington D.C., confiscated 100 percent of legally-held weapons, we have to consider the result: firearms will be possessed only by the government and the criminals.

In what bizarre world could that ever be considered "common sense?"

In the 1990s, Britain and Australia completely disarmed their citizens because they had required every weapon to be registered for decades before and they knew just which homes to visit (or, in many instances, to raid) in order to seize those instruments of self-defense.

Immediately, the crime rate in both nations TRIPLED, including crimes committed with firearms. It is ridiculous to think that criminals would have ever registered their illegally held weapons, and suddenly, thanks to the national government, criminals knew that none of the victims of their crimes had any chance of defending themselves.

Those higher rates of crime have remained, with one of the fastest-growing crimes being home-invasion -- entering a residence when they know the family will be home in order to steal, rape, kidnap, murder, and other outrages.


In contrast, home-invasion has been rare in America and the criminals who do break into residences take every caution to do so when they think no member of the family is home.

The criminal knows there is a good chance that the man, woman, or child they encounter in that home may possess a firearm for self-defense -- and know how to use it.

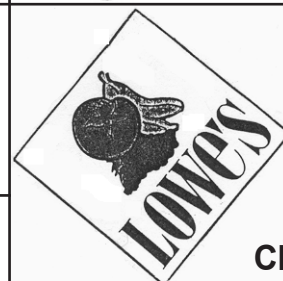
