Olivia, Gabbie Schilling to perform Chamber approves banquet changes

The Farwell Chamber of Commerce on Jan. 29 approved some big changes for the annual Chamber banquet for this year.

Historically, the banquet to honor local folks for their support of the city has been held on a Saturday night and has featured steaks cooked before the event. This April, the event will be held on a Thursday night, with the exact date still

to be set.

The move was prompted by parents who said they couldn't make the event because of weekend activities. Several also said weekends were harder to find sitters for.

On the other hand, supporters who wanted the event held on Saturday pointed out that it would be more difficult for family from out of town to make a Thursday event.

Chamber President Rob Pomper supported the change to Thursdays, pointing out that recent turnout for the event has been dwindling and the Chamber needs to change to ensure as many local folks can make it as possible.

He said that it was disrespectful to give out the awards if the only ones who could show up were the award winners.

The second big change was in the food provided.

Over the years, many folks had asked for a different selection of food offered. The Chamber will look into possibly having the event catered by Desperado's, Leal's, or a similar caterer.

The Chamber is looking into possibly providing chicken fried steak, Mexican food, or a chicken and fish dinner.

Pomper said if folks in the community would like to offer suggestions, please call him and leave a message at (806) 481-3681.

This year's entertainment will be Olivia and Gabbie Schilling, Farwell High students who recently released an album.

The Chamber is also looking into the idea of door prizes to help boost attendance.

In other news, new city brochures have been made for Farwell. They are available at City Hall.












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Texico students present Science Spectrum exhibits


graders recently presented their Science Spectrum exhibits.

Emily DeLaRosa said she learned a lot about her topic, Neptune, and liked getting to read





Chilie Relleno Casserole

Ingredients:

- 1 lb. Jack Cheese
- 1 lb. Cheddar Cheese
- 2 8 ounce cans of whole Ortega Chilies
- 4 eggs, separated
- **1** Tablespoon flour
- 2/3 cups evaporated milk
- Salt & pepper

Grate cheeses and layer in a 9 X 13 casserole dish. Place Ortega chilies on top of cheeses. In another bowl, beat egg yolks and gradually add flour and evaporated milk to yolks. In a separate bowl, beat egg whites until fairly fluffy and then mix into the yolk mixture. Salt and pepper to taste. Layer egg mixtures over the chilies and cheese. Bake uncovered at 325 degrees for 50 minutes.



New standards proposed for school lunch menus

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has proposed new standards for school lunch menus.

The idea is to give students healthier food choices. It would ban the sale of almost all candy, highcalorie sports drinks and greasy foods on campus.

The USDA proposes to set fat, calorie, sugar and sodium limits on almost all foods sold in schools.

Food sold outside the lunchroom is not regulated. Here is the gist of the proposal, which still must be approved:

What's out -- candy, snack cakes, most cookies, are not 100 percent juice.

What's okay -- baked potato chips, granola and cereal bars, dried fruits, yogurt, diet soda, flavored water, unsweetened or diet ice tea.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

In last week's Tribune, Mike Pomper stated in his column that prisoners were receiving free health care.

I am currently teaching at the T.L. Roach prison unit in Childress and have been for the past 2 1/2 vears. I can assure you that the prison system in Texas is not coddling the offenders (inmates). I have been very pleased with the frugality of this unit while spending taxpayer money.

Just one example is the use of deer meat for meals. Many hunters enjoy killin deer, but not eating them. The prison system encourages donations of deer meat.

Farmers often donate truckloads of vegetables that they can't or don't want to sell, for meals at our prison unit.

Additionally, we are a "farm" unit complete with "hoe squads" that work the vegetable fields, raising food for the offenders' tables.

The other units have various specialties that they produce. Some manufacture chairs, tables, desks, soap, uniforms, and raise chickens, hogs, beef and many more items that they supply to units within the prison system.

With regard to health care, Jan. 1 offenders must pay \$100 on the first visit to the infirmary. Subsequent visits are free.

Since many offenders' families are not there for them for various reasons (won't send them any money), many can't afford the initial fee. Thereford, they can't or won't go to the infirmary.

I recently had a student in may class who had no knee. His leg bones ground on each other when he walked. Consequently, he limped terribly. Ths prison system will not treat him because the injury did not occur while incarcerated. He is going to be in prison for a very long time, painfully getting from point A to point B.

We all applaus the Arizona sheriff who runs a nofrills prison system. I think that we should also appreciate the Texas Department of Criminal Justice for running a tight ship.

If one way or another, Washington D.C., confiscated 100 percent of legally-held weapons, we have to consider the result: firearms will be possessed only by the government and the criminals.

> In the 1990s, Britain and Australia completely disarmed their citizens because they had required every weapon to be registered for decades before and they knew just which homes to visit (or, in many instances, to raid) in order to seize those instruments of selfdefense.


> Immediately, the crime TRIPLED, including crimes committed with firearms. It is ridiculous to think that criminals would have ever registered their illegally held weapons, and suddenly, thanks to the national government, criminals knew that none of the victims of their crimes had any chance of defending themselves.

Those higher rates of crime have remained, with one of the fastestgrowing crimes being home-invasion – entering a residence when they know the family will be home in order to steal, rape, kidnap, murder, and other outrages.

In contrast, home-invasion has been rare in America and the criminals who do break into residences take every caution to do so when they think no member of the family is home.

The criminal knows there is a good chance that the man, woman, or child they encounter in that home may possess a and know how to use it.




The Farwell Obelisk was remade through donations from the Farwell Chamber and private citizens. Once the signpost of the west, it now is a feature of the city park.

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



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
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
