"I send out faxes or emails to media resources in Roswell, Hobbs, Amarillo, Lubbock, Clovis and all over our area," said Ms. Clement. "We send a description of the crime on Crime Stopper letterhead with a picture of the suspect, if possible."
The reward system is based on a point value, assigning a value to each crime based on the severity of the offense. between 1-3 points are eligible for rewards of $\$ 100$. Higher point values equal more reward money. Crime Stoppers got a grant to aid with operating expenses, such as their software program's annual fee. Ms. Clement plans to seek more grants to assist with
