## TEXICO HIGH SCHOOL OPENS

The Texico high school opened Monday, September 8th, 1919. Over 140 pupils were enrolled the first day. Others are expected to enter later.

If they have had the smallpox or have been vaccinated before, it will only be necessary to obtain a certificate from some physician. Vaccination should be attended to this week.

## \$75,000,000 TO BE RAISED IN SOUTH

BAPTISTS ANNOUNCE PURPOSES TO WHICH VAST SUM THEY SEEK WILL BE GIVEN.

### STRENGTHEN CHURCH WORK

Special Effort of Denomination Along General Lines Will Be Enlarged And Made Stronger As Result Of This Campaign.

Every general interest fostered by Southern Baptists will be strengthened and enlarged through the success of the Baptist 75 Million Campaign which is now well under way, and which will reach its climax in the final drive to secure this sum in cash and subscriptions during the eight days of November 30 to December 7. A period of five years will be provided for the final payment of these subscriptions but for the campaign to succeed, the sum of \$75,000,000 must be subscribed within the eight days. Many have expressed the belief that the subscriptions will run to \$100,000,000.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention the \$75,000,000 to be raised was apportioned among the general inter-

ests fostered by the Convention, as follows: Foreign missions, \$20,000,000; home missions, \$12,000,000; christian education, \$20,000,000; state missions, \$11,000,000; ministerial relief, \$2,500,000; orphanages, \$4,700,000; and hospitals, \$4,125,000.

The apportionment of this sum among the several states within the territory of the Convention has been announced as follows: Alabama, \$4,000,000; Arkansas, \$3,200,000; District of Columbia, \$200,000; Florida, \$1,000,000; Georgia, \$7,500,000; Southern Illinois, \$1,200,000; Kentucky, \$6,500,000; Louisiana, \$3,325,000; Maryland, \$750,000; Mississippi, \$3,350,000; Missouri, \$2,925,000; New Mexico, \$250,000; North Carolina, \$6,000,000; Oklahoma, \$2,250,000; South Carolina, \$5,500,000; Tennessee, \$4,600,000; Texas, \$16,000,000; and Virginia, \$7,000,000.

Here is what this big sum of money will help Southern Baptists do for the Master, as set forth by the Campaign Commission:

"It will equip more adequately and multiply manifold the 1,099 missionary workers of the Foreign Mission Board, and the more than 2,000 Home and State Board Missionaries.

"It will enlarge and raise to a better efficiency the 132 Baptist schools in the South.

"It will go far towards meeting the expanding needs of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and the Women's Missionary Training School in Louisville, Ky., the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and Women's Training School in Fort Worth, the Baptist Bible School in New Orleans, La., a Theological Seminary for the Negroes, and will provide a first-class college for boys and girls of the mountain region.

"It will increase greatly our hospital service to the sick, open wider our arms to the orphans and provide a strong support for our aged ministers of the gospel.

"It will put Southern Baptists in position to assume a considerable share in the reconstruction of war-torn Europe, and embrace many of the marvelous opportunities for service which thrust themselves upon us from all parts of the world, at home and abroad."

While \$20,000,000 of this sum will go to foreign missions and thus be expended in carrying the gospel and its blessings to other lands, the remaining \$55,000,000 will be expended at home in building up home missionary, educational and benevolent institutions and projects, of which there are a number in every state within the boundaries of the convention.

**PROCLAMATION**

Whereas, At the regular meeting of the board of trustees of the Village of Texico, duly held on the 8th day of March, 1919, there was presented to said board of trustees a petition signed by a majority of the taxpayers and residents of the S. A. Temple Addition to the Village of Texico, which petition was accompanied by a survey and plat of said addition; and,

Whereas, Said petition requested and prayed that said territory described in said petition be annexed to the Village of Texico in the manner and form prescribed by law; and, whereas, said petition constitutes and was contiguous territory to the Village of Texico; and,

Whereas, Said board of trustees did, on said date, duly pass a resolution consenting to the annexation of said contiguous territory; and, granting the request of said petition; and, whereas, said petition and the survey and plat accompanying said petition, together with said resolution, were duly filed in the office of the Clerk of the County of Curry, State of New Mexico, on the 29th day of May, 1919, and,

Whereas, I, the undersigned Mayor of the Village of Texico, did, under and by virtue of the statutes of the State of New Mexico, and the power in me vested, call an election to be held in said S. A. **ANOTHER DEMONSTRATION**

(From Farm Bureau News.)

Mr. E. L. Kempf of the Moye district says: "I have the stuff growing on my place and it is just at the right stage to show what effect good seed and the formaldehyde treatment has on crop production." Mr. Kempf says he would rather take his farmer friends through his fields and show them than to talk about it.

Some time when you are driving by stop a moment and let Mr. Kempf show you his results. He has several things of interest to any farmer trying to grow a row crop in this country. He can show you very plainly where he used good seed and where he used poor seed, where he used treated seed and where he used untreated seed, where he used manure and where he used no manure. He has these various demonstrations side by side so you will have no trouble deciding as to whether or not it pays to use the best and treat it properly.

Mr. Kempf's smut demonstration is especially interesting. He has fifty-five acres planted to kafir corn, all but ten acres of which was given the formaldehyde treatment. In this part Mr. Kempf found two heads of smut, while in the ten acres which were not treated there is fully 20 per cent smut.

While it is not time to make a statement about the use of good seed, yet Mr. Kempf is just as enthusiastic about this phase of his farming business, as he is about treating for smut or any other farming operation.

**CO-OPERATION**

A business letter contains this sentence: "We stand ready to co-operate with you at any time." Literally, this is true of much of the co-operation that is afforded freely in these earlier days of reconstruction and readjustment. It is a co-operation that stands, not a co-operation that moves, that advances and meets one at least half way.

Genuine co-operation does not "stand ready." It is too busy co-operating to stand still at all. It is constantly on the move, continuously aggressive. It moves cordially and effectively to meet you, and then it moves heartily with you. It does not wait for you to go to it; it comes to you.

There is nothing easier in the world than to offer co-operation. The real task is in co-operating, in working earnestly together, in intelligent, well balanced team work. The word co-operation seems to be used commonly in the sense of exchange. It is an attitude which says in effect: "If you will come to me with a request for co-operation I shall be glad to work with you, to get your co-operation in exchange for mine, but the initiative is left to you, unless it is clearly to my advantage to take the first step."

Where the cause is common there should be no thought of exchange. The impulse should be that of giving and the object a blending of activities and energies and ideas that will bring the results most to be desired. There should be no "standing ready" to co-operate, no waiting for an invitation to co-operate, no thought of one sided advantage through co-operation.

The secret of co-operation lies in co-operating. It defines itself only in action. It has no meaning when it stands or waits. It has its coat off and its sleeves rolled up before it announces its purpose, and then it begins pulling or pushing or lifting or whatever is most urgently required without waiting for anyone else to take hold.

Its example is infectious. Its enthusiasm is contagious. The only way you may escape it is to lie down and play 'possum; and there won't be much room for that sort of thing till this world is brought back to something like normal.

The "stands-ready" co-operator is going to be a mighty lonesome fellow when all the rebuilding agencies and activities get into their full stride.—Criterion.
