

Suit had been filed several weeks ago by several Texico individuals against members of the council following a protest against the intended creation of a paving district by the city.

Originally, a petition had been circulated, and in excess of the called-for two thirds of the property holders in the area affected affixed their signatures to the instrument.

Later, a group of citizens brought suit against the council to stop the paving movement. Otto Smith, attorney for the plaintiffs, introduced evidence designed to show that the cost of the paving would result in confiscation of some of the citizens' property.

### Water Will Come High For Most Texas Points

Texans have never been short on big ideas. For years the talk has been of dredging the Trinity River which flows between Dallas and Fort Worth, to make it possible for navigation from northcentral Texas clear to the Gulf. That sounded like a pretty big order.

But last week W. A. Dexheimer, U. S. Reclamation Commissioner, stood up and laid out a plan that beat anything Texans ever heard of, His idea: Since there is an overabundance of surface water in East Texas and a deticiency in Central and West Texas, why not construct a huge canal to transport water across state?

The cost of such a gigantic project? A modest (estimated) \$11/2 billion. "Texas needs bold, new -concepts," this fellow told his stunned audience. Well, his idea is certainly bold enough.

We profess to be no authority on this matter, but we venture to suggest that if \$10 million were invested in the development of an economical means for converting ocean water to a solution fit for domestic supply, it could be done.

Any way you look at it, though, it is becoming increasingly evident that water is a mighty precious resource, and those who do not have it are going to have to pay mightly to get it.

### What Will Littlefield Strike Mean for Parmer County?

Lamb County, already liberally endowed with a supply of shallow irrigation water, has received another economic shot in the arm following the recent development of a producing wildcat within the city limits of Littlefield.

What this will mean to Parmer County is

entirely speculative. The wildcat is in the geologic boundary defined as the "Palo Duro Basin." Parm-

er County is not. To the southeast, this is the nearest indication of oil in paying amounts. To the southwest, Parmer and Adjoining we have the discovery last year in southern Roosevelt County on the New Mexico side of the line. Outside this Area Year after year, wildcatting increases in this part of the Plains.

Parmer County has one test now, in the northeast tip of the county, where drilling is below 6000 feet. We are awaiting further developments, but not overanxiously so.
