

What a Newspaper Will And Will Not, Print

what a newspaper will and will not put into its columns. While it would take much too long to thrash that matter out on this editorial page because of so many different situations which can qualify or modify a newspaper's policy, we do occasionally like to clarify our position in some respects.

This newspaper has been rebuffed for publishing the names several weeks ago of a number of Hereford young men for rioting on the streets of

Now, we'll admit that it would have taken a Tot more guts for us to have published names of the boys if they had been from Friona, Bovina, or Farwell, because we would have been personally acquainted with many of them and their parents.

Nonetheless, we see it as our duty to take from the public record of the courts the names of these boys, not for the purpose of ridiculing or "exposing" them, but in the hope that they become more aware of the serious consequences which such ac-

In our opinion, if a boy has any family background at all, he will be utterly ashamed of what he has done to the family name if that name appears in connection with a group of young hoodlums in the community newspaper.

If these young men had only been brought to Farwell and given a sound talking to by peace officers, then released in the hope that they would refrain from such behavior, the names would have never appeared in this publications - even if we could have secured them.

But when a sarcastic, chip-on-the-shoulder gang lands in the county calaboose, is formally charged and fined, then the matter becomes pub-

When discussing what is proper, and what is not proper for our news columns, we always like to gr back and study the comments of a wise old Texas newspaper reteran, Ike Ashburn, who is now publisher of Texas Parade magazine.

Some of his comments are not directly applicable to weekly newspapering, but most of them are and he at least gives an idea of what a publisher is often up against. Read this and see if you don't catch a little of how difficult it is to establish a pol-

BY IKE ASHBURN

I always have had an affectionate regard for working newspapermen and have been conscious of their problems because since December of 1909, I have been actively associated with the profession. Universally the members of the newspaper profession have been very indulgent with me and generous in their cooperation with whatever work I may have been engaged in for, lo, these many years.

I started to work for the old Fort Worth Record as a newspaper reporter in December, 1909. My weekly stipend was \$10, and all my waking and sleeping time belonged to the newspaper. I worked seven a week, subject to duty for whatever time my bond of kinship with all newspapermen from publishers to cub reporters. In the old days there was pasted on the editorial department wall a policy statement: what we would use and what we wouldn't use, what we would say, and what we woudn't say in the columns of the paper.

Why can't we talk more about the ennobling things of life and the heroic behavior of decent people without glorifying in words, terms, and pictures, that illicit behavior nished by a patent medicine adwhich was not even discussed, much less blatantly publicizezd a few years ago?

A bizarre story of filth and corruption in New York involving one of the scions of a wealthy Chicago family and a nineteen year old girl has been emblazened in great detail in the newspapers over the country. Certainly freedom of the press needs to be defended and perpetuated. But the press has a responsibility to use the blue pencil, and edit out the publications of stories that are not consistent with continued elevation of ideals and morals. The use of such salacious stories and pictures subject the newspaper fraternity to the charge that is interisted only in the stimulations of the readers' inter- Outside this Area ests and sales for the monetary gain of the publishers and circulators.

All of us are exposed to enough filth and lewdness in everyday life. But after all, standards employer required my services. I, therefore, feel a of decency should be exploited and glamorized, and not the gains and practices of wrong doers and violators of every code of decency. It is our responsibility, of course, to safeguard those whose mentality and morals are still in the formative period of life.

The use of all such articles ought straightway to be discontinued. Evils and immorality have exis-I believe that some members of the press td since the beginning of man. But certanly lewdness and lascivious for monetary gain have no place in the reading or discourse of decent men and women. Farmers Still Lag With Wheat Reports FARM BUREAU

Parmer County farmers are still lagging in turning in reports on wheat acreage for the PMA, Joe Camp says, with only 50 percent of the county farmers having given the urgently needed information to the PMA office this week.

The wheat acreage information is required to make equitable allotments in event that national allotments are required. Wheat growers should give a legal description of their farm, number of acres of wheat in 19-51, 1952, and 1953.

"This information is needed right away in order that each farm growing wheat in Parmer County might receive an allotment representing its fair share of a county allotment," Camp explained.





Now, see what happens when TWO men dig away at opposite ends of the grain bin. Grain pours both directions from the supply zone between the two holes. In effect, the two diggers are fighting a silent battle with each other for the lion's share of the grain. The same is true of water wells "A" and "B", which are spaced several hundred feet apart.

Interference is a typical subsurface condition where water wells are jammed together. This causes increased drawdown, the point where pumping costs go up. Regulated well spacing, as practiced by the Water Conservation District, can help reduce this in-
