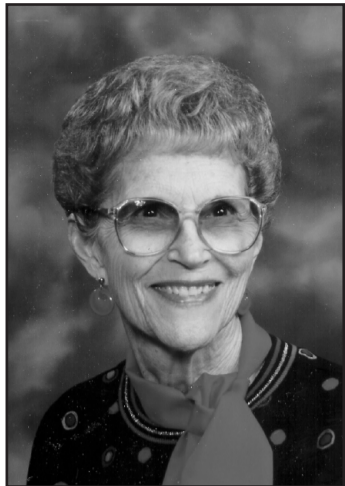

She talked to the camp about ways to keep verbal abuse from getting into your head and interfering with your dreams.

Although the speakers

were a very vital part of the camp, so were the team activities. It's not every day you get to go repelling, climb what was known as the Alpine Tower and Sarah's favorite, swing from the Swinger. "The Swinger," she said, "consisted of a harness and a cable. You had to get in the harness and let go ... leaving your only grip on the cable that was attached. Then you had to have faith while your teammates pulled you up." What an adventure!

"All in all the camp was great and so much fun,"

she said. "I learned so much about the qualities that make up a leader and how to meet people."

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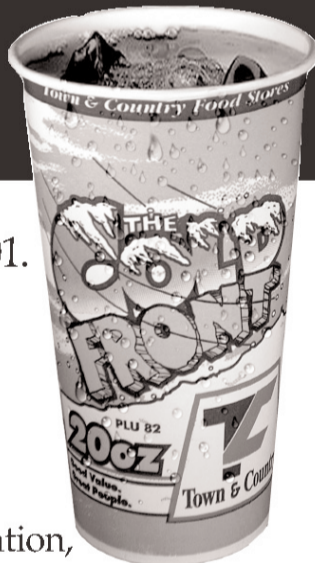

Area trap shooting team captures state title

Taylor Mesman and Trevor Owen are part of the 2006 Senior Novice trap shooting team that recently captured another Texas State Championship in the Scholastic Clay Target Program (SCTP).

The five-member team shot June 4 at the Waco Skeet and Trap Club during the state meet. The team total was 856, with Owen turning in an impressive score of 197 out of 200 targets.

The team is comprised of Mesman and Owen from Farwell; Andrew Van Zielst, of Seminole, and Shelby White and Kylon Blackwell, both of Littlefield. The team will

now advance to the Grand American Shoot, Aug. 7, 8 and 9, in Sparta, Ill. This will be the second time for Mesman and Owen to qualify for the Grand American. This national shoot will also be the inaugural Grand American at the newly constructed World Shooting & Recreational Complex in Sparta.

The local team is coached by Rick Seaton, of Lazbuddie, and Nelda Blackwell, of Littlefield. Both Seaton and Blackwell are state directors with the Scholastic Clay Target Program. The program is a division of the National Shooting Sports

Foundation. Both coaches are veteran shooters themselves and have coached championship teams at this and the Junior Olympic levels.

Trevor Coker and Jacob Schacher, both of Lazbuddie, were members of the 2nd place Senior Experienced trap shooting team at the SCTP state

meet. Coker shot 193 targets out of 200.

This team is also coached by Rick Seaton and Roy Don Coker, also of Lazbuddie.

Mesman competed in the Maverick (individual) division at the Rookie level of the SCTP. This was only his second competition, and he captured second-

place.

These shooters will be shooting next at the 4-H Shooting Sports District meet at the South Plains Gun Club in Lubbock on June 23. This meet will qualify them to shoot at

the 4-H State Meet in San Antonio on July 22. The shooters will be on different squads for the 4-H meets, but will team up for the Amateur Trap Shooting Association state meet in San Antonio on July 8.

It's a lean year for wheat harvest

The 2006 area wheat harvest – a low year on the continuo roller coaster that crop harvests go through.

Monty Vandiver, Parmer County Extension Agent-Integrated Pest Management, reported this in a recent email:

Wheat harvest is under way and will likely be short lived. The Southwest Farm Press reports that the 2006 wheat crop will be the smallest in 35 years due to fewer harvestable acres and lower projected yields. Production is estimated to be 63 percent below the 2005 crop.

Mike Nichols, of the AGP elevator in Lazbuddie said, "Harvest is way down this year due to the dry weather and drought that were in."

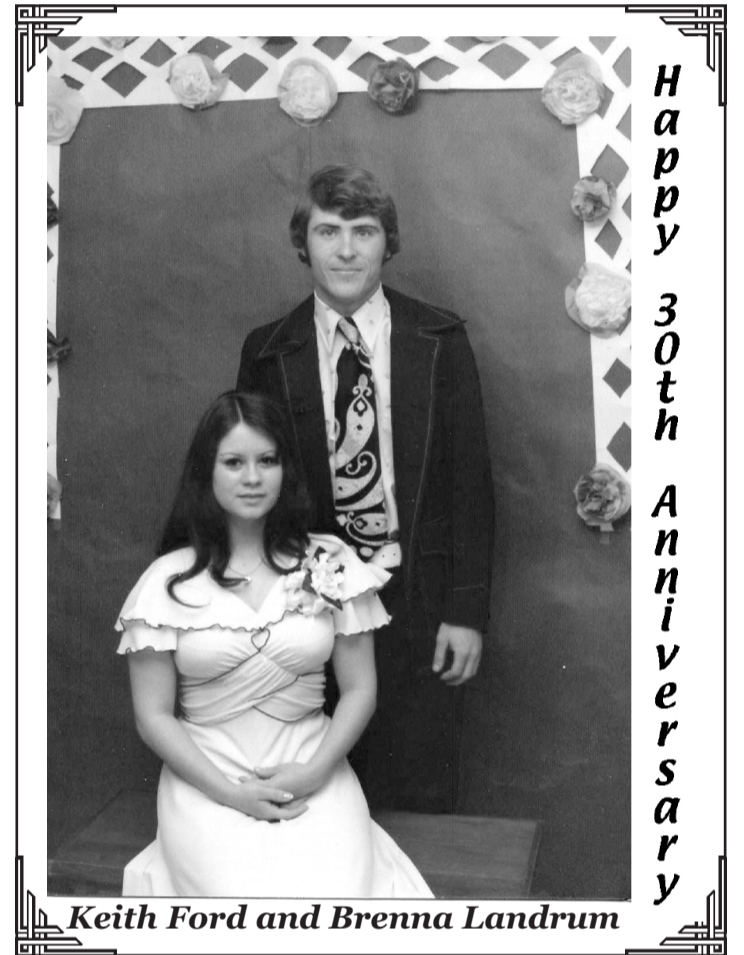
In fact, the farmers that have been coming in are getting an average of 11-bushels/acre dryland.

One Friona irrigated land farmer said he was getting about 30 bushels per acre.

Of course the irrigated crops are producing much more than that, but they are still down from last year's crop, where the harvest was very good. Last year, the dry land was producing about the same as irrigated land, but as every harvest shows, weather fluctuates as well as crops.

If you were reading the Tribune 50 years ago today, you would see that they were having an up year. Farmers were making about 54-58 bushels of wheat/acre.

Each year is truly a different story.

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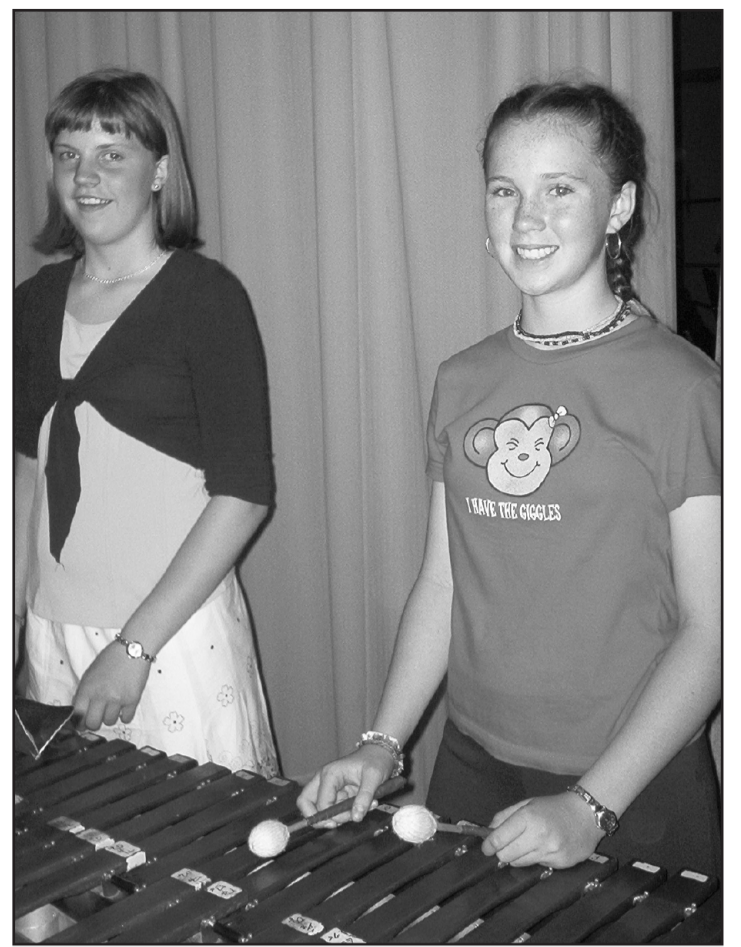
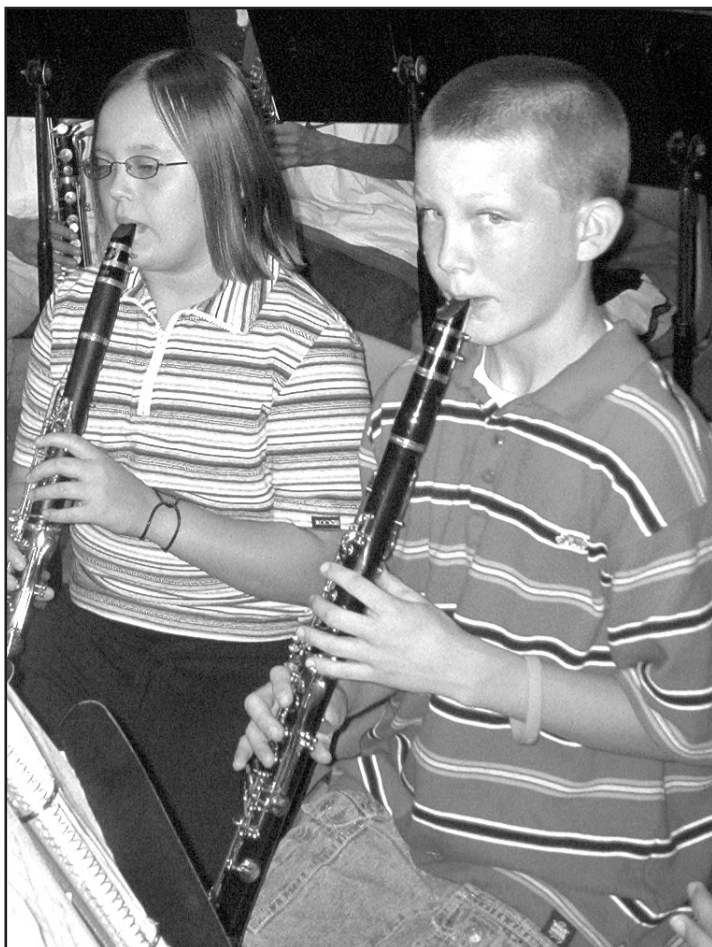
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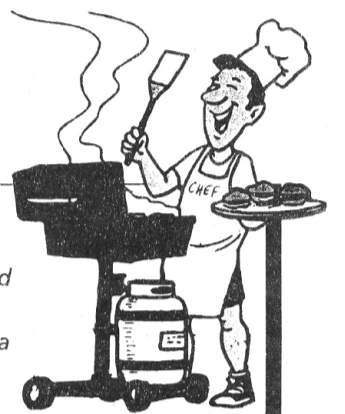
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- Always use your grill outside in a well-ventilated area. Don't bring cylinders inside or into an enclosed space such as a garage.
- Before lighting your propane gas grill burner, use a leak-detection solution to make sure all connections are secure. Contact your local propane gas supplier to obtain the leak-detection solution and instructions on how to use it. Never use matches or lighters to check for leaks.
- Always use or store cylinders in an upright, vertical position. Store them outside and away from sources of ignition.
- When you have your cylinder refilled, ask your supplier to check for dents, damage, rust or leaks.
- After filling, take your cylinder home immediately. Keep your vehicle ventilated with the cylinder valve closed and plugged or capped (unless your cylinder type does not require plugs or caps). Never leave the cylinder in your car.
- Make sure the grill burner controls are turned off and keep the cylinder valve closed when not in use.
- Make sure the grill is shut off and cooled before covering.
- When your grill is not in use, cover disconnected hose-end fittings and burner air intakes with small plastic bags, or obtain protective fitting caps from your propane supplier to keep out dirt, insects and moisture.
- If there is a significant and uncontrollable release of gas or a fire, call the fire department immediately and move all people and pets away from the unit.

LIVE CATTLE: The week started with overwhelming negative news calling for cattle prices to retest contract lows, beef prices to collapse over \$10 over the near term, walls of cattle waiting to come to market and no demand? With all of this information, cattle prices broke out to the upside closing up the 300 point limit one day and closing strong again on Friday. Long term trends are higher and will remain that way into the July/August time frame at the earliest. Until trends change, the market should remain strong. Why the news remained so negative may remain unknown?

FEEDER CATTLE: This market reacted in basically the same manner as the Live Cattle. There was a limit up move followed by a strong close on Friday in the face of negative news. This makes the market look even stronger than before. Expect higher prices into the July/August time frame.

CORN: Short term trends have remained under pressure over the last couple of weeks as the good to excellent ratings are around 70% compared to the 16 year average of 65%. The bulls still believe that ethanol production will support prices this year. This may have more impact next year, but this year will be hard pressed to keep excess corn off the ground again?

SOYBEANS: Although short term trends have turned higher, the market seem to be stuck in a rut? US bean acres are expected to decline substantially from previous USDA estimates. This has helped to support prices, but South American production will determine long term price trends. This market may be able to trade inside a tight range until there later into the Summer?

WHEAT: As the market continues to drift lower, there seems to be more and more confirmation that long term tops are done for the time being? There is no doubt a shortfall of hard red winter wheat, but most of this information has already been factored into the market. There will be support at lower levels and the possibility of a rally once harvest is complete.

COTTON: Long term trends have turned up supported by drought conditions across many areas in Texas. The US crop is reportedly rating for good to excellent is only 42% compared to the 16 year average of 53%. China is also having weather problems of their own. World demand continues to maintain it's strong posture. Any significant crop loss could drop US ending stocks back down into the 4 million bale range occurring to some analysts? Trends are up.

Futures and Options Trading involves risk of loss and may not be suitable for everyone.
