Border Town Days swings into action

The Border Town Days Committee met Monday to finalize plans for this year's big event.

The final committee meeting before BTD will be July 10.

"Real Heroes" will be the theme of the 40th annual Border Town Days to be held on Saturday, July 29.

As always, the parade will begin at 11 a.m. cdt, followed by the Day in the Park activities, highlighted by the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club's BBQ dinner.

The arts and crafts show will again feature homemade and commercial vendors. Here's a rundown on how the day looks:

The parade theme is "Real Heroes," such as ordinary folks like teachers, nurses, policemen, etc.. Cash prizes are given the top four floats -- \$75, \$50, \$35 and \$25. The deadline for signups is Friday, July 21. After that date, you can sign up by calling BTD chairman Mike Pomper at the Tribune, 481-3681, but you will be placed at the end of the parade and not be eligible for cash prizes.

Early signups include the Texico Class of 1956, the Texico Class of 1981, the Clovis Fire Department honor guard, the Farwell Marching Band, and a vehicle driven by Orie Jones carrying this year's Honorary Parade Marshals.

Ugly Pickup Contest: Several years, the parade included an ugly pickup contest, and this will be tried again this year. Prizes will be awarded. If you would like to enter, go by Helton Oil Co. in Farwell.

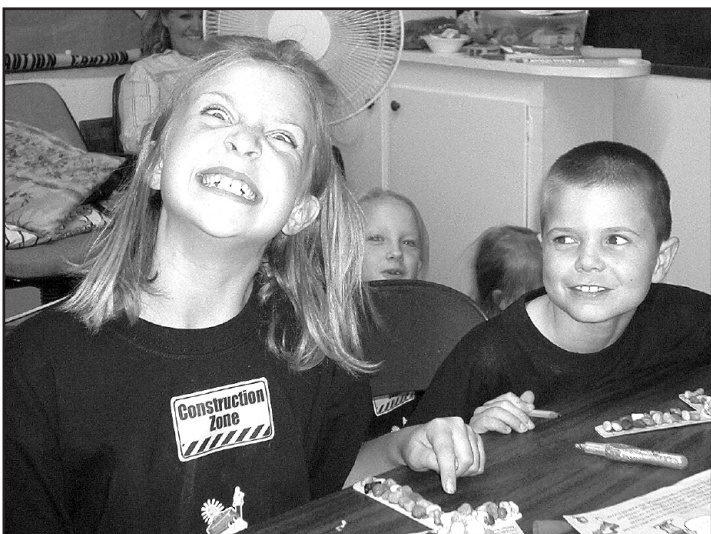

LIVE CATTLE: The market may have found a temporary stopping point this week? Much will depend on the cash trade. If cash trades at \$82, then we could see a little more up next week, but anything less would probably discourage some buying interest? Either way, long term trends are still pointing higher into the August/October time frame.

FEEDER CATTLE: Prices will follow the Live Cattle whether that's up or down. Long term trends remain higher into the July/August time frame. The cattle in general have all reached some important resistance levels and may find themselves pulling back down for a few days? A break out to new highs later in the month should resume the upward spiral into the mid to late Summer time frame?

CORN: The market was able to hold short term support levels this weeks at \$2.48 basis the July contract and has moved back up into resistance levels at \$2.58. The trade remains sideways and choppy with dry conditions in the extreme Western Corn Belt and almost ideal conditions in the Eastern Corn Belt. Seasonal tendencies are normally down into the last day of June.

SOYBEANS: The market blasted higher this week as more analysts become convinced that planted acres will be lost to corn. The fact that just a few weeks ago, soybeans were at 12 month lows and corn at 12 month highs may create a change in direction over the near term. Long term trends are beginning to shift to the upside even though seasonal tendencies are down during June.

WHEAT: The market broke short term support levels this week when the July KC Wheat closed below the \$4.91 area. Prices have been able to rebound, but will need to move back above the \$5.17 level in order to keep long term trends pointing up? The jury is still out on production with varied yields coming in from everywhere. Overall, prices may have already factored in a worst case scenario, but shortages may help to support strong prices into harvest?

COTTON: A major turn up this week has turned long term trends back to the upside. There are several reasons to think this is very important with the main one being the normal seasonal tendency is for lower prices into the August time frame. A trend change this early in the Summer could possibly signal a significant rally just ahead? Weather has been a major concern affecting production.



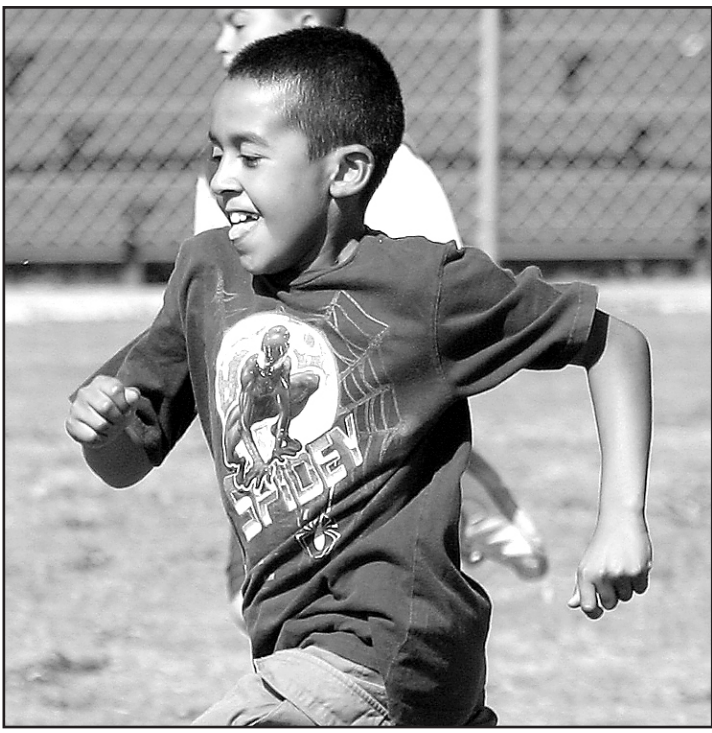

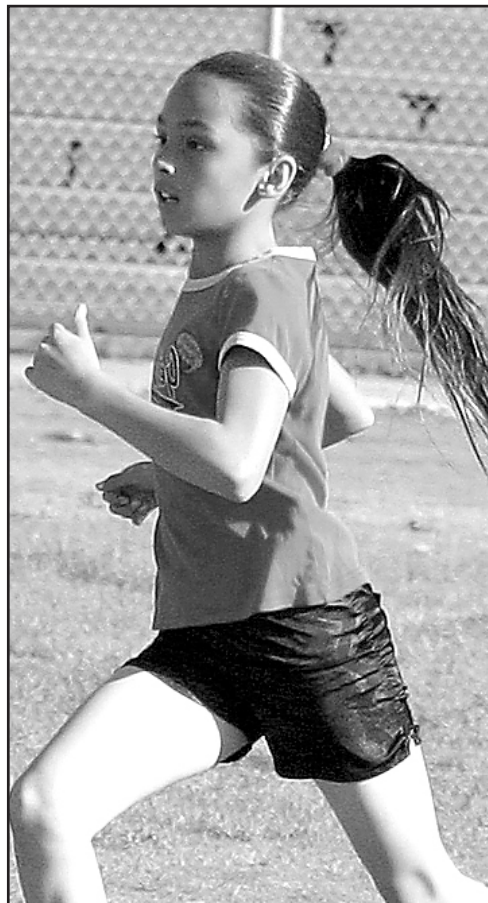
