Lt. Col. (ret.) John Carlson, of Farwell, received a great honor on Sept. 30 at the Cannon Air Force Base "Heritage to Horizons Dining Out."

Carlson, a former Farwell city councilman, was inducted into the Cannon AFB Leadership School Hall

He was the only person inducted at the ceremony,

and joins 20 other Hall of Fame members. His biography in the Cannon AFB program cited:

Carlson spent a distinguished 27 years in the U.S. military. He started his career in the Navy in 1945. In 1947, he joined the Air Force and attended pilot training. After completing pilot training in 1949, he was assigned to the Aeronautical Research and **Development Center (ARDC).**

During his time with ARDC, he served as a test pilot. Throughout his career, he was involved with the testing of the B52, B66, B57, B47H and B45 and was an integral part of the team that training the Apollo flight Astronauts.

Carlson spent 2 1/2 years as an A-1E "Sandy" Pilot in Southeast Asia. He was assigned to the 602nd Special **Operations Squadron, 56th Special Operations Wing at** Nakhon Phanom in northeastern Thailand.

He epitomized the core value of Service Before Self by voluntarily risking his life in multiple search and rescue efforts. Hundreds of airmen's lives were saved.

For his heroic actions in combat, he received two Silver Stars, six Distinguished Flying Crosses, a Bronze Star and 31 Air Medals. Carlson is currently owner and flight instructor of

United Aero, Inc., at Clovis Municipal Airport. In 2006 and 2007, he was awarded the Southwest Regional Aviation Instructor of the Year award. He spends his days teaching others to fly aircraft

with his wife, Lt. Col. (ret.) Mary Carlson. They have been married for 52 years.

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Lost in space?

...critics of human space flight believe that robotic probes can gather the needed scientific data at much less cost, and that humans contribute little to space-based scientific research. In the days before there were satellite or cable connections, families in Texico-Farwell could gather each night in front of the single TV in the house and their choices were restricted to NBC or CBS (and sometimes ABC, if the atmospherics were right.)

One popular TV series that was on from 1965-1968: "Lost in Space" told the adventures of the Robinson family, launched from Cape Canaveral to establish a colony in Alpha Centauri, a galaxy about 44 trillion miles away (4.35 light years.)

The story line was supposed to be happening in the distant, technologically dazzling times to come when human space travels at the speed of light were to become as routine as a flight between Lubbock and Dallas. And what was that distant, technologically dazzling year the writers envisioned for "Lost in Space" to be occurring? It was 1997.

After the show went off the air. American scientific excellence managed to land a total of 12 men on human metabolism. From enough into the space sions that carried no midst of their space mishuman baggage with sions.

The Farwell Legends in Blue Band will compete in a marching contest at Lowery Field in Lubbock on Saturday, Oct. 20, at 3:30 p.m.


The cost is \$3 for adults and \$1 for children. Band Director Bill Shelly asks that everyone comes out and support the youths.

LIVE CATTLE: Cattle prices were able to rebound this veek after a week on negative news coming mostly from the TOPPS meat company which drove prices down hard last week. Cash began trading at \$89 in Nebraska early this week, but once futures prices climbed back out of their hole, futures continued higher and turned trends back up. Cash trade may be the determining factor which helps to push the market back to higher levels next week or stop the advance?

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeders also turned up with the ive Cattle prices late this week, but Friday's USDA Crop roduction report generated a higher open in the cor and pressure on feeder prices. Overall, feeder trends turned back up this week and should be in a position to retest the \$115.00 over the near term. Seasonal trends are normally down until after Thanksgiving.

CORN: The USDA Crop Production report had some small revisions in the overall corn production, but was enough to move the price up 10 cents on Friday's opening. Fundamentally, the market seems to be struggling vith basically a ìFlatî trend at this time. Harvest pressure, record production and declining demand may pressure prices into harvest.

SOYBEANS: Soybeans were able to hit their projected mark this week at \$9.82. The USDA report helped to support a higher opening, but prices opened far short of the opening call. A close back below \$9.82 on Friday would probably lead to lower prices over the near term. Again, there were few surprises in the report to expect significantly higher prices over the near term.

WHEAT: Wheat had been called to open about 10 cents higher after the USDA report, but instead came in about 5 cents lower. Daily trends turned down last week and although there was a limit up close going into the report, it was not enough to turn daily charts up. A lower close on Friday would probably lead to lower prices over the near term. World stocks still remain tight.

COTTON: Not much change here. Prices have stopped on major resistance levels around \$64.80 basis the December contract and have yet to turn short term rends back higher. A break below \$62.30 would project a move towards the \$58.50-59.00. Harvest pressure, large ending stocks and dismal exports have all contributed to a soft market. Prices are expected to be sharply higher next year?

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

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

There isn't a whole lot to report about the Lazbuddie Longhorns' loss to an excellent Motley County team last Friday there.


The score was 50-0, with the Matadors scoring all their points in the first quarter. After a scoreless second quarter, the game was called due to the 45-point rule.




6. You concluded by writing "All this even though Parmer County has not been determined to be a viable candidate for wind farm development." Wrong! I quote
