## Carlson inducted into Hall of Heroes

Lt. Col. (ret.) John Carlson, of Farwell, received a great honor on Sept. 30 at the Cannon Air Force Base "Heritage to Horizons Dining Out."
Carlson, a former Farwell city councilman, was inducted in and joins 20 only person inducted at the
Hisis 20 other Hall of Fame members. Carlography in the Cannon AFB program cited: Carlson spent a distinguished 27 years in the U.S. military. He started his career in the Navy in 1945. In 1947, he joined the Air Force and attended pilot training. After completing pilot training in 1949, he was Development Center (ARDC)
During his time with ARDC, he served as a test pilot Throughout his career, he was involved with the testing of the B52, B66, B57, B47H and B45 and was an integral Ast of the team that training the Apollo flight Carlson s.
Carison spent $21 / 2$ years as an A-1E "Sandy" Pilot in Operations Squadron, 56th Special Operations Wing at Nakhon Phanom in northeastern Thailand.
He epitomized the core value of Service Before Self by voluntarily risking his life in multiple search and rescue efforts. Hundreds of airmen's lives were saved.
For his heroic actions in combat, he received two Silver Stars, six Distinguished Flying Crosses, a Bronze Star and 31 Air Medals.
Carlson is currently owner and flight instructor of United Aero, Inc., at Clovis Municipal Airport. In 2006 and 2007, he was awarded the Southwest Regiona Aviation Instructor of the Year award.
He spends his days teaching others to fly aircraft with his wife, Lt. Col. (ret.) Mary Carlson. They have
