After a Hornet punt, Morris and Christian had big runs as the Steers crossed midfield. They were held there and a punt was returned 86 yards for a TD. Farwell again drove downfield as Christian hit a 10 -yard pass to Langford on 3rd down, and Morris moved the chains with his running as well.
Farwell got to the Sudan 20 but was held there. minute left before halftime for a 13-6 lead.
In the 3rd quarter, Christian threw to Morris for 10 ards, but Farwell had to punt again, which Sudan quickly turned into a TD.
Langford sparked the Steers with a 20 -yard kick eturn, and Morris added 25 yards of rushing. ing environment nurtured Herman's lifelong loves of working the
fruits of hard work, hunting, and fishing.
Herman was active in FFA at Farwell High School, and after graduation, at age 18, he made the best decision of his life and married high school sweetheart Alta Norton, on May 28, 1950. The couple have been pillars of comfort joy, love, and support for 62 years.
The couple started their life together with Herman then in 1951, they moved north of Farwell where Herman rented property from his father-in-law, Lester Norton. The U.S. went to war and Herman volunteered for the Air Force in 1952, where he used the skills he'd learned on
the farm to serve as a sheet the farm to serve as a sheet metal worker on airplanes
during the Korean War. He was stationed in Germany for a year, an experience of service in which he always took great pride and added to his already immense sense o patriotism. Herman ended his enlistment in the Air Force with stints at Cannon AFB and Altus AFB in Oklahoma. After leaving the Air Force, Herman continued his farming career north of Farwell and served as presiden
of the Parmer County Farm Bureau. Alta and Herman decided to start a family, and in February of 1961 they adopted their first child, a baby girl they named Tina Three years later, having to pull their car from the drive way with a tractor, they braved a snowstorm driving to
Fort Worth to adopt their second child, a baby boy they Fort Worth to adopt their second child, a baby boy they
named Todd. The couple's lives would revolve around their children for the rest of their lives, and Herman and Alta were always exemplary parents.
Herman continued his farming career and expanded his operation in 1970, buying land in New Mexico and building his own house on the property. He continued to be active in the Curry County Farm Bureau, and then in 1977, to add to his duties, he became a member of the Texico School
selfless years.
Despite all of his familial, civic, and ecclesiastica duties, Herman still found time through the years to enjoy his passion for hunting and fishing, making numerous forays into Colorado, and New Mexico to hunt for
deer and elk on horseback. His penultimate hunting deer and elk on horseback. His penultimate hunting
expedition however was a 2 -week stay in the wilds o Canada in 1968, where Native American guides led him and his friends on a hunt which yielded a black bear and an elk for the avid huntsman.
While Herman focused intently on his family and career, he always held God and his church as central to
being the person God wanted him to be. He was a charter member of the First Baptist Church Farwell; served as the Sunday School Superintendent; worked in the Men's Brotherhood; served as a deacon for years; taugh Sunday School; volunteered for any committee that needed him; and traveled to locales as far asunder as Arizona, Mexico, Guatemala, and Brazil on mission trips
