Farwell opposes **Xcel rate hike**

The Farwell City Council on Nov. 20 voted to oppose a proposed rate increase by Excel Energy.

David Essex, of Excel, informed the Council that the suggested rate increase was larger than a normal increase because many equipment upgrades are needed. Due to the wind energy issues and just normal upgrades, new transition lines, transformers and substations are slated for installation.

According to Essex, Excel is just staying ahead of the curve for upgrades. However, he did recommend that the Farwell City Council deny the rate increase request and join with other cities in Texas as a group. The consolidation of city interests provides a uniform presentation to government entities that determine utility rates.

Essex said the time line for rate decisions has not been determined yet, but he will keep the Council informed.

Xcel has asked the 79 Texas towns and cities it serves to boost revenue by \$90.2 million a year. The impact would mean an increase averaging \$6.61 per month to residential customers.

In other news, the Council:

-- Approved building permits for Thomas Taylor at 404 Ave. G for a carport addition; Ralph Serna at 302 7th St. for a patio addition; Isidro Galvan at 303 2nd St. for improvements such as new windows, a new roof, new flooring and inside walls; Robert Lucio at 403 8th St. for a new roof; and Mario Lara at 102 Ave. E for a carport addition.

-- Heard that the water department has been cleaning the city storage yard and recently turned in scrap metal worth \$375 for recycling.

The fence around the water tower is being completed and has turned out well. The water department discussed a new sign for the Farwell Distribution Center due to state regulations that it be marked. Supt. Gerald Porter will be researching the proper wording to have the sign printed.

The Council also discussed the operational aspects of the distribution center - deciding that anyone using the facility must be identified as a citizen of Continued on Page 5

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
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

Texico to sponsor food bank drive


The City of Texico is sponsoring a holiday food drive benefiting High Plains Food Bank and the Farwell Baptist Church food pantry.

Students learn about the effects of alcohol

Kristen Scanlan's 6th grade Current Events class walk a line with the goggles. I couldn't even do it. I at Texico School recently got a little hands-on alcohol prevention education.

Drunk Busters of America set up a demonstration that really opened kids' eyes to problems associated with drinking alcohol. This traveling educational program is a joint venture with the New Mexico State Police, Texico, Melrose, Clovis Police and the Curry County Sheriff's office.

Curry County Sheriff David Ford explains, "These "Our kids did a much activities demonstrate different levels of blood alcohol content, so the kids can experience the impairment first hand. This makes learning about drug awareness a fun learning experience, but also focuses on the issue of impairment."

During this demonstration, Ford and two Clovis Jesus Police officers guided students through three different stations. Wearing goggles that represented different levels of impairment, the kids were asked to drive a pedal cart, shoot basketballs into a hoop and try to walk a straight line.

> The students learned these simple tasks were made much more difficult with the impairment goggles. Many of the tasks could not be completed at all while wearing the goggles that represented the highest level of intoxication.



















Hospice is about living

Farwell by providing verification such as a water bill. Operating hours for the facility were discussed and will be decided at a later time.

When the facility opens to the public, a citizen can call ahead to City Hall and an employee will meet them at the facility to provide access. The Council discussed the possibility of opening the facility for a half-day on Saturday at least one time per month during the warmer months.

The Council also heard that the concrete work is almost complete with only the outside ramps remaining. Those should be complete soon.

The water department is also looking into a tree chipper to be used at the old facility to provide mulch to local residents. No tree debris will be allowed at the new Distribution Center. -- Learned that the police department was

involved in a pursuit of an individual that later warranted an evading arrest charge. There were also two arrests for narcotics and weapons last month. Chief Kelsay said he was now handling the FEMA regulations for the city. Now, all city workers,

Farwell EMS, Fire Department and police officers have been issued FEMA badge numbers for identification. A contact list with phone numbers has been assembled. He also said the mandated FEMA training classes are now offered online for the first time.

-- Heard that the Fire Department responded to a call concerning a maize field on fire between Farwell and Muleshoe.

The Fire Department will soon be receiving new uniform shirts that identify each firefighter by name on the shirt. They feel that these shirts will help them be more recognizable to citizens.

The Fire Department is also looking into grants for new equipment such as air tanks, trucks and more.



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

Elevated Fluoride Levels Detected in Texico Water System

This is an alert about your drinking water and a cosmetic dental problem that might affect children under nine years of age. At low levels, fluoride can help prevent cavities, but children drinking water containing more than 2 milligrams per liter (mg/L) of fluoride may develop cosmetic discoloration of their permanent teeth (dental fluorosis). The drinking water provided by the Texico Water System has a fluoride concentration that ranges from 2.54 mg/L to 2.81 mg/L.

Dental fluorisis in its moderate or severe forms may result in a brown staining and or pitting of the permanent teeth. This problem occurs only in developing teeth before they erupt from the gums. Children under nine should be provided with alternative sources of drinking water or water that has been treated to remove the fluoride to avoid the possibility of staining and pitting of their permanent teeth. You may also want to contact your dentist about proper use by young children of fluoride-containing products. Older children and adults may safely drink the water.

Drinking water containing more than 4 mg/L of fluoide (the US Environmental Protection Agency's drinking water standard) can increase your risk of developing bone disease. Your drinking water does not contain more than 4 mg/L of fluoride, but we're requied to notify you when we discover that the fluoride levels in your drinking water exceeded 2 ,g/L because of the cosmetic dental problem.

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

Harris quickly ran in the ball for the TD, and


to Texico's 10.


