

Construction to begin on railraod crossing




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
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Texico to seek bond for new JH, HS roofs

-- Was updated on the "21st Century After School Program," which was begun three weeks ago through a federal grant.


A state official checked on how this grant was being used and was so impressed that Texico may be used as a pilot program for other schools.



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

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Texico discusses handicap ramps

The Texico City Council on Oct. 8 discussed an upcoming project to put handicap ramps on the sidewalks along Wheeler Avenue.

The sidewalk ramps are part of the Americans with Disabilities Act and would allow people in wheel-chairs to be able to move down the sidewalks more easily, but there is a problem with two fire hydrants.

The two hydrants are in what would be the ramp path, and moving them would be the best course of action, except that the pipes leading to them were made in the 1940's with asbestos.

Councilman Doug Scioli said that moving them or cutting them could lead to the pipes breaking and could easily become an expensive problem.

City Inspector Terry Martin suggested that he might be able to design the ramps to be further away from where they currently sit, and it might allow the work to be done without moving the hydrants.

In other news, the council:

- Set their meetings for the next calendar year.



- 2) The car lot on Wheeler Avenue that has an unfinished fence will need to re-apply for a permit if they want to finish their fence.
- 3) The motel next to Amy D's Restaurant will need to be boarded up.

Martin will be working on all of these situations.

- Heard Police Chief Doug Bowman say he has been working on getting folks to clean up tall weeds, alleys and dead trees.

He has also been watching for speeders, especially around the school.


I like to update my **Christmas** predictions each year. Over the years, I think I have been pretty much dead-on.



How Do I Know if I'm Addicted?

The first time you take a drug, you choose to take it. The second time might not be a choice any more.

There are many different signs that point to drug addiction. The most obvious is a need to have a particular drug or substance. Changes in mood, weight, or interests are other signs of drug addiction.

If you think you - or a friend - may be addicted to prescription drugs, talk to your doctor, school counselor, or nurse. They can help you get the help you need. It's especially important for someone who is going through withdrawal from a depressant to speak with a doctor or seek medical treatment. Withdrawal



can be dangerous when it's not monitored. If a person has become addicted to prescription

drugs, there are several kinds of treatment.

Behavioral treatments teach people how to function without drugs - handling cravings, avoiding drugs and situations that could lead to drug use, and preventing and handling relapses. Pharmacological treatments involve giving a patient a special type of medication to help him or her overcome withdrawal symptoms and drug cravings.

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday verified there were enough signatures on a petition presented by Bovina city councilman Radford Venable to legalize selling liquor in that city.

Venable has proposed the idea as a way for Bovina to get revenue from taxes on liquor sales.

Now the question is: when will the proposal be put on a ballot?

The commissioners voted to not call a special election for this proposal; if they did, the county would have to pay for it. Thus, it appears the earliest it could be on an election ballot would be November 2014.

That brings up a question of whether the petition approved this week would still be valid more than a year from now.

Venable will look into the questions raised during the meeting.

In other business, the commissioners:

-- Okayed early voting on Oct. 31 at Friona Interbank.

-- Approved the annual contract (around \$5,000) with Lubbock County for a public defender if needed in a major case, such as for a murder.

Reasonable Notice of Open Meeting Law

The Texico City Council met in a regular session on October 8, 2013, and decided that reasonable notice to the public as required in Open Meetings Act (NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1 to 4) would be as follows:

Unless the business before the City Council dictates otherwise, the City Council conducts open meetings to take formal action on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at 6:30 p.m. However, when that Tuesday is a City holiday, that meeting will be held on the next business day.

The City Clerk and staff were authorized and directed to publish an annual schedule of regular meetings as legal advertisement in the State Line Tribune.

Emergency meetings will be called only under circumstances, which demand immediate action to protect the health, safety and property of citizens or to protect the public body from substantial financial loss. The City of Texico Council will avoid emergency meetings whenever possible. Emergency meetings may be called by the Mayor or a majority of the members upon four (4) hours notice, unless threat of personal injury or property damage requires less notice. The notice for all emergency meetings shall include an agenda for the meeting or information on how the public may obtain a copy of the

The Mayor or majority of the council members upon three (3) days notice may call special meetings. The notices shall include an agenda for the meeting or information on how members of the public may obtain a copy of the agenda. The agenda shall be available to the public at least twenty-four hours before any special meeting.

All other meetings which may be called for informational purposes at which no action is taken shall be held only after written notice is issued to the State Line Tribune no later than 9:00 a.m. of the Friday before such meeting, or seventy two (72) hours before such meeting, whichever is greater.


