Special education: an area which is misunderstood

Special Education is an area of education misunderstood and misrepresented by many, many people. There has been a tendancy, by those special education participants into the category of "retarded", even though that is just one small portion of special education.
tion deals with all problems which interfere with the learning process; intellectual, emotional and physical. It covers a myriad of limita-
tions, most of which are very comtions, most of which are very com-
mon and can be remedied relatively easily if caught in the early, more developmental years.
A major concern of many parents, is that their child may be "labeled"
if placed in special education. We do our best to restrict access to special education services, attempting to place only those students whose needs require speciaiized training
not available in the regular classroom. No student is placed in special education unless it is obvious that it is in the best interest of the child. Also, we go to great.
lengths to restrict this information and to protect the privacy of the stu

The process of placement is very
complicated and involved After complicated and involved. After a learning problem is recognized,
permission from the parents is requested to test the student, with the goal of identifying and diagnosing the specific problem. After the testing is completed, a committee classroom teacher, the special education teacher, administrators and diagnostician (the person trained to give and interpret the tests) makes a student in special education. It is a true committee decision.
In Farwell, most of our special education students are learning dis-
abled, the least severe of the handcapping conditions. These students are "mainstreamed" into the regular classroom for most of thei subjects, and given special educa-
tion services only for their specific tion services only for their specific
area of deficiency. For example students with problems in math would not be in special education all day. Rather, they would be in the
regular classes for all subjects and reguiar classes for all subjects and math only. In this way, we can place students in "the least restrictive environment." This is a high pri-
ority for our District. ority for our District.
Patrons should people have some form of learnin disability. (I have a learning disa
bility. But, like most people, it was not discovered in my early years, as
I never knew that there was problem. I merely found ways to overcome the problem. I am fortunate because my problem does not negatively affect me. But, othe
adults are not as fortunate.) Beadults are not as fortunate.) Be-
cause we do a better job of identifying, diagnosing and treating these problems early, most can be rem edied before they become adult conditions.
