It's time for 47th Border Town Days

The 47th annual Border Town Days celebration kicks off Saturday and it promises to be another superb family event for the Twin Cities of Texico and Farwell.

The day begins with the Decorated Bicycle Contest at 10 a.m. (all times in this article are CT -- Texas time). It will be held adjacent to the Texico branch of Citizens Bank on Anderson Street.

The deadline for entering the bicycle contest is 3 p.m. on Friday, July 26. You need to sign up at the State Line Tribune office, 404 3rd St., Farwell. The theme is "Western Hospitality."

Cash prizes will be awarded to the top bicycle contest placers, and the grand champions (a boy and a girl) will win brand-new bicycles courtesy of Master Tech Auto Service and Tedson Trailers, both of Texico.

Gerri Bowers is in charge of the bicycle contest. Contestants will be judged by three judges picked by the Clovis Chamber of Commerce.

A story elsewhere in today's Tribune has more details of the Decorated Bicycle Contest.

At 11 a.m., the Big Parade kicks off at Griffin Street in Texico. A map showing where participants need to line up is elsewhere in today's Tribune.

This year's parade will again feature antique vehicles and tractors, class reunions, fire trucks, motorcycles and lots of horse units.

Lining up the parade entries will be Valda Walls, Mike Read and Bill Dannheim. Participants are urged to be at the parade start at least 30 minutes early.

Because the highway will be closed during the parade, Hereford Street in Texico will be used as a

bypass for traffic moving through the area.

Hereford Street residents are asked not to park their vehicles on that street while the parade is held. The Border Town Days Committee appreciates your help.

Texico Police Chief Doug Bowman will give the signal to kick off the parade, after being contacted by the railroad officials who normally stop train traffic for it.

The parade proceeds down the highway (closed to traffic both ways), then turns at 5th Street in Farwell, going south past the Farwell Care and Rehabilitation Center and ending at the Farwell city park.

Helping out in this area will be Michelle Agee, who will be stationed at the railroad crossing, and Mike Woods, who will be at the end point of the parade to direct participants where to park.

After the parade, which normally takes about 35 minutes, folks will congregate at the Farwell City Park for a large variety of food and entertainment, highlighted by the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club's BBQ.

The BBQ opens immediately after the parade.

Also at noon, the Merchants Giveaway starts. Thirty participating merchants are giving away goodies to folks who have signed up at their businesses.

No dogs allowed at BTD

Just a reminder that last year we asked in the paper if dogs should be allowed at Border Town Days, and the answer was overwhelmingly 'no'.

A table manned by Farwell Care and Rehab Center personnel will be set up adjacent to the gazebo. Announcements will be made every few minutes by Benji Henderson of who the Merchants Giveaway winners are and folks must collect their winnings immediately, or new names will be called.

Local gymnasts excel at Nationals

"It was a great meet for us," agreed all the parents from Clovis Gymnastics Academy.

Five gymnasts recently traveled to the Junior Olympics National Tumbling and Trampoline Competition in Kansas City, Mo., and brought home four medals.

"It was an awesome experience for all of the kids and they represented their hometown exceedingly

well," comments mom and gym owner Darcy Rohrbach. "There were over 2,100 of the best gymnasts from all over the country and our kids brought home four medals. It was very exciting."

Farwell gymnasts Kylie Haseloff, Makenna Byrd and Landry Henderson, along with Texico's Riley Rohrbach and Clovis' Gemma Martin made the most out of their Junior Olympic experience.

Makenna placed 3rd overall in tumbling while Landry brought home a 2nd in tumbling along with a 3rd in trampoline. Riley Rohrbach added to the medal count by tying for 3rd overall in trampoline.

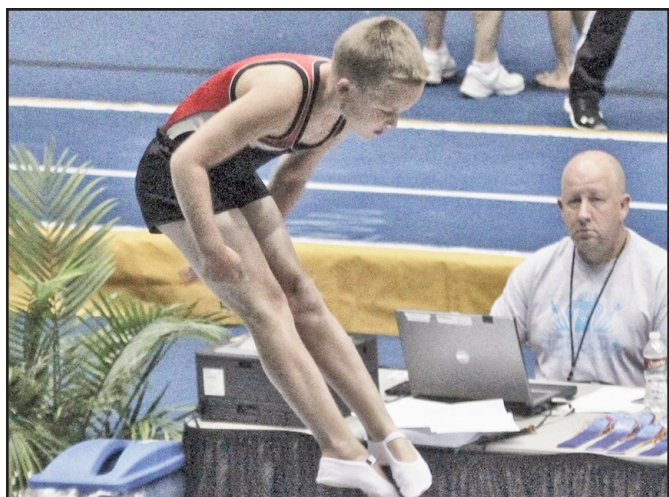
"All of the kids performed really well at Nationals," affirms Mrs. Rohrbach.

Before the competitions got underway, the kids got to participate in a Grand March that introduced them to thousands of spectators as they marched across the floor of the enormous auditorium.

After the Grand March, they watched the amazing performances from elite gymnasts -- including several U.S. Olympic hopefuls. These performances helped to inspire the younger gymnasts to compete at the top of their ability level and set high goals for themselves in gymnastics. The kids were spellbound as they watched these gymnasts attempt incredibly difficult routines filled with every flipping skill imaginable.

The parents were shocked at how many actually crashed during their performances. The old saying, "The bigger they are, the harder they fall" seemed to be right on track for some of the athletes. It was also

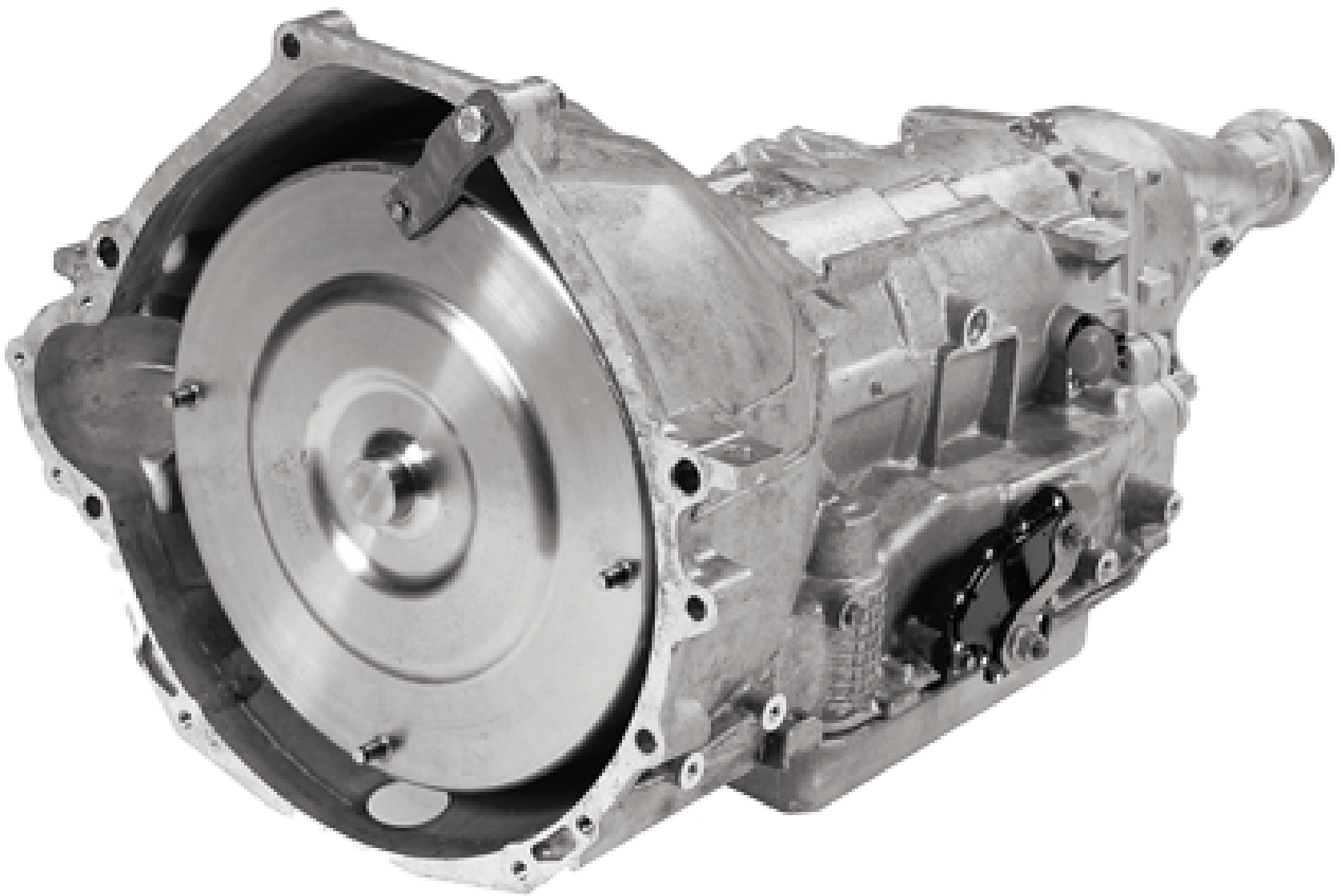

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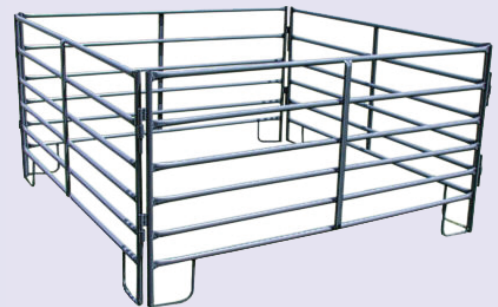

Great parade lineup set for Border Town Days

Here is the list of how groups should line up for the Border Town Days parade on Saturday.

The parade kicks off at 11 a.m. ct (10 a.m. New Mexico time) at Griffin Street in Texico, one block east of Hwy. 108.

Helping line up entries will be Valda Walls, Mike Read and Bill Dannheim.

The highway will be closed off during the parade. Hereford Street will be used as a bypass.

Residents are asked not to park their vehicles on Hereford Street during the parade.

The parade will go down the highway to 5th Street in Farwell, where it turns south, past the Farwell Care and Rehabilitation Center, and ends at Farwell City Park.

Mike Woods will be at the end of the parade route to direct groups to parking.

Also, Michelle Agee will be stationed at the railroad tracks for safety purposes. The Santa Fe Railroad is expected to not run its trains through town during the parade as has been the case the past several decades.

Any groups that wish to join the parade but are not included in this list may still do so, but have to line up near the end of the parade, in front of the Texico cheerleaders.

Groups that did not register for the parade by July

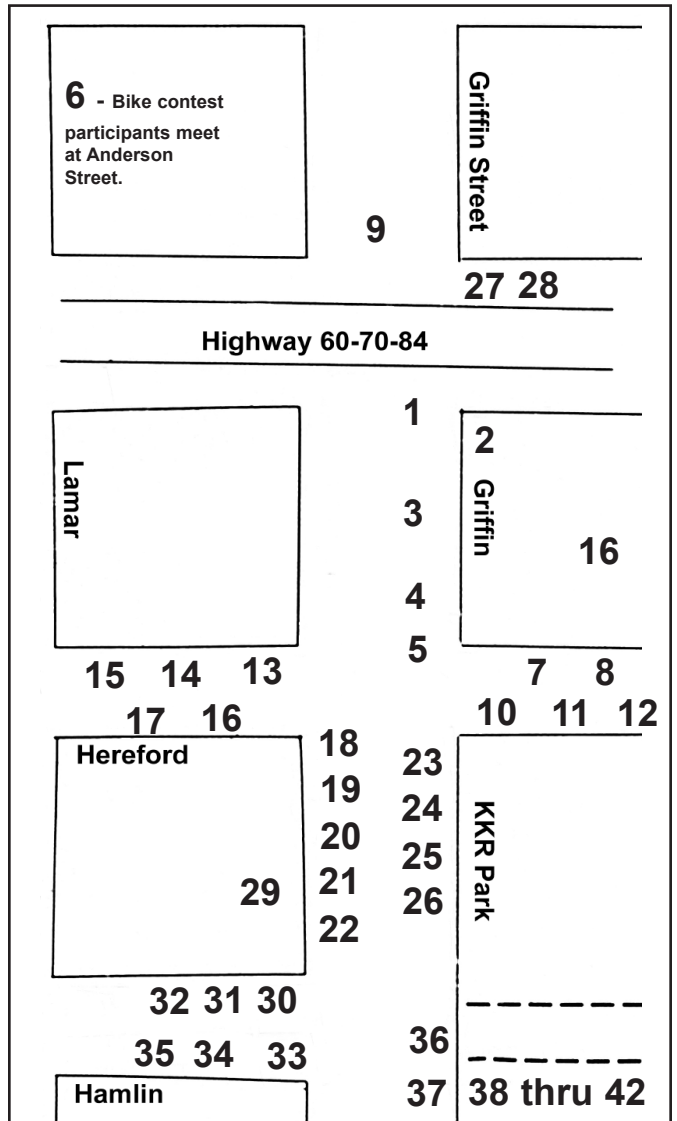
22 are not eligible for cash prizes.

Parade participants should know that Griffin Street will be closed at its highway entrance while units are forming. Thus, floats are asked to come down an adjacent street to Craig Street, then turn south on Griffin Street.

The contest will be held one hour before the BYD parade kicks off on Saturday. The contest takes place adjacent to the Citizens Bank branch in Texico. Entrants need to be here at 10 a.m. Texas time.

The contest is open to all area youths. Also, the BTD committee allows children and grandchildren of local folks to

enter also, even if they live elsewhere.

There are two categories 7 and under, and 8-12 years of age.

Other rules are:

-- A bicycle rack will be set up on the property of First Baptist Church of

Farwell at the end of the parade route.

-- Riding bikes in the park during BTD is not allowed, for safety reasons.

-- You must be present at the park to receive your cash prizes (or if you win the bicycles!) when the announcements are made during the 12:30 p.m. ceremonies.

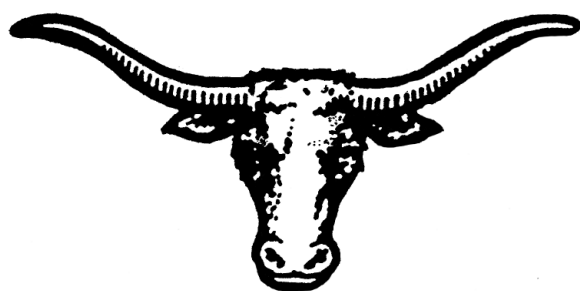

While it may be a small corner of the world, Lazbuddie is a community with a heart as vast as its horizons. From here, one can peer into the future with hope, while relishing a past and a present filled with success. At the heart of Lazbuddie is its school, Lazbuddie ISD, a family of students, parents, staff, and community members who seek, expect, and provide limitless opportunities for the youth of the area. The Mission of this unique family is to "cultivate strong minds, build communities, embrace values, and strengthen families."

Cultivating strong minds

Lazbuddie employs innovative thinking in order to provide big school academic advantages in the haven of a small school. Our high school students enjoy the opportunity to take Interactive Television (ITV) courses, dual-credit courses, and advanced courses in cooperation with South Plains College. Many Lazbuddie students have earned several semesters of college credits before high school graduation.

In addition to college-level courses, our high school students have the opportunity to enroll in many course offerings that were not previously available through the Texas Virtual School Network, which was developed by TEA. Students can choose from five foreign languages, psychology, sociology, music and art appreciation, as well as other core area courses that are offered through the TxVSN and counted for local, and in some cases, college-level credit.

For the first time ever, Lazbuddie High School will be utilizing the "flipped classroom" concept to deliver portions of its curriculum. Teachers in math, science, social studies, and language arts will use state of the art technology to video lessons, archive them online, and make them available to students. In the place of traditional homework, students will be asked to view the lesson for the following day at home; the application and practice of the concept will then take place in the classroom the following day, under the watchful eye of the classroom teacher. This "flipped" model enables students to view lesson videos whenever and wherever they choose, and are continually available for students who need extra practice with a lesson. Parents are also empowered to help their students with coursework, as they, too, can view lessons and see firsthand the instruction taking place.

Lazbuddie offers an array of junior high and high school Career and Technology Courses, including Food Science, Culinary Arts, Child Development, Horticulture, Agricultural Fabrication and Ag Mechanics, Animal Science, Interior Design, Professional Communication, and many others.

Instructional innovation is not limited to just junior high and high school academic programs. Our elementary school 1st through 5th grades are departmentalized. In lieu of a grade level teacher to teach all subjects in each self-contained classroom, our elementary has a Math Specialist, Reading Specialist, ELA Specialist, Science Specialist, and Social Studies Specialist. Students travel from classroom to classroom for a 45-minute instructional period in each core area.

The departmentalization of our elementary is advantageous to students for several reasons. First, our district utilizes a curriculum that is designed to facilitate vertical alignment of learning in each subject area from grade to grade. Departmentalizing enables our teachers to know their subject area in greater depth and at increasing levels of complexity. This eliminates the "jack of all trades, master of none" effect that plagues many elementary teachers as a result of the load of preparing lessons for multiple subject areas. Secondly, teachers know that students all learn differently, and at different rates of speed. As a student changes teachers from year to year, much instructional time is lost in the process of getting to know the student and his/her learning needs. By departmentalizing, teachers are able to get to know their students in their assigned instructional area, and then have the benefit of having that student for several years, with no instructional time lost!

Unlike many districts, Lazbuddie offers a full-day Pre-kindergarten program to all 3- and 4-year-old students. These students are taught by highly qualified, experienced classroom teachers that provide not only instruction, but the nurturing, love, and attention that every parent desires for their child who may be starting school for the first time. Until noon each day, 3-year-olds receive instruction in their own classroom, while 4-year-olds learn in a separate classroom. This allows our teachers to tailor instruction in a manner most appropriate for their age group. After lunch, 3- and 4-year-old students are grouped together for centers, PE, and naptime, so that they have ample time to learn social skills and interact with their peers.

Lazbuddie offers an array of services for students with varying instructional needs, including RTI, Dyslexia, Gifted and Talented, ESL, Special Education, and reading intervention. Our District utilizes a variety of research-based instructional software that provides remedial opportunities for students who struggle.

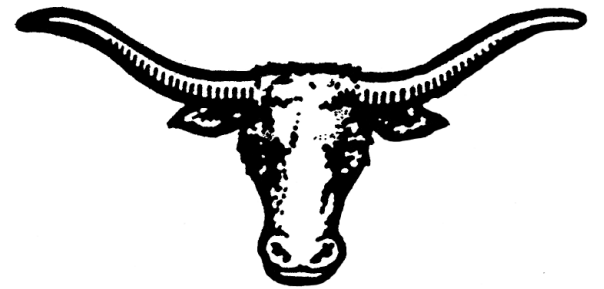

Embracing Values

Small school values are what attract many students and their parents to Lazbuddie. Our policies, whether regarding discipline, grading, dress code, attendance, or student recognition, reflect our belief that all students, regardless of background, abilities, or challenges, have value and are valued equally just because they are. It is our calling to show every child that he or she is loved, accepted, and respected, and it is our commitment to inspire our students to achieve nothing less than their personal best. We embrace these values and principles in an ongoing effort to guide the decision-making process and to ensure that we, above all else, strive to do what is right for kids.

At Lazbuddie, we believe hard work should be recognized and rewarded. In elementary, students are rewarded for everyday kindnesses and responsibility with "Longhorn Loot," which can be used to purchase prizes, school supplies, or privileges like lunch with their favorite teacher. Students who have shown exceptional growth in their reading abilities are given the opportunity to eat at a restaurant with their peers, as well as paint a ceiling tile that will be displayed in the elementary hallway. Student accomplishments are also honored in an awards assembly at the end of the school year.

Junior high and high school students are recognized for exemplary attendance, behavior, academic performance, and community service through the Longhorn Pride program. Students who qualify for Longhorn Pride are given special privileges throughout the year and are rewarded with a year-end trip. High school students who meet certain criteria are honored in May at the High School Academic Banquet, which is an elegant and classy soiree for the students and their parents.

We believe that one of our primary objectives in educating our students should be preparation for life outside of Lazbuddie. As a result, last year, the first annual "Life After Lazbuddie Amazing Chase" took place. The senior class traveled with their sponsors to Lubbock in late spring, where they were divided into teams and dropped off with their sponsors at the Lubbock airport. The teams and sponsors raced across town, using public transportation, to be the first team to complete a list of tasks that included everything from washing and drying a load of towels in a laundromat, to obtaining a library card, to budgeting and purchasing items for a first aid kit and a dorm room. Thanks to the generosity and enthusiasm of the many businesses and individuals who donated to the project, at the end of the "Chase," every student had amassed a large, rolling duffel bag full of roadside emergency kits, travel irons, box fans, bath towels, memo boards, desk lamps, and many other items needed for their lives after graduation.

Strengthening Families

For many years, Lazbuddie School has relied on the support of the community, as well as the parents whose children attended the school. In an age of ever-increasing challenges for parents with young children, we believe that it is part of our mission as a school family to give back to the community and to the parents who have given so much to us. As we seek to adapt and evolve our approaches in meeting the needs of kids, we are striving to impart what we have learned to parents in order to help them make the best decisions for their children.

In the coming school year, we plan to continue communication and involvement with our parents by using our AlertNow phone system, SMS messages, letters and newsletters home, parent meetings, a parent/teacher organization, and family nights at school. Live Cattle prices eased back down a little last week which had been expected. The market has given up very little of their gains made over the prior two weeks which could be a good sign going forward. This week will need to see the market take out last weeks highs and continue higher if some of the higher targets are going to be reached. If the market can keep their uptrend going, it should last a few more weeks. Cash trade has done little to support a higher market. Last weeks cash traded below \$120 which doesn't help.

Feeder prices have had no problem working up towards their targets. The \$152.00 level was hit this week basis August contract which was the first target once prices turned higher. The second target around the \$154.00 level will be tough one with cash trading far behind the board at this time. Whatever gains are seen between now and August may be all this market can do. Once August approaches, cash will determine where prices go from there.

Soybean prices have remained strong on old crop, but moving down in new crop. The November contract broke down again on Friday and trends are all pointing lower at this time. New crops across the board are all under pressure. Expect to see the April low around the \$11.85 level tested at some point.

Corn prices have remained strong on old crop, but new crop prices continue to move down into new low territory. The first level of strong support lies around the \$4.70 level basis the December contract. There is basically nothing below this level. If prices push down below the \$4.70 level, the next support comes in around the \$3.00 level which can only be found on the weekly charts.

Wheat prices have continued to work down into new low territory with all the nearby contracts making new contract lows. About the only long term support comes in around the \$6.00 level basis the weekly charts. There really is no support below these levels and harvest pressure usually pushes wheat prices down into the late July/August time frame. Once a bottom is complete, higher prices into December.

Cotton prices were up slightly higher on the week, but remain inside a tight trading range. Prices have now formed a range between the \$89.20 level and \$82.20 on the bottom. Until one side or the other is penetrated, the market could remain inside this range for quite some time. With many commodity prices under pressure, we would have to lean towards the downside or a deflationary environment.

Bovina council okays funds for repair work, litigation expenses

The Bovina City Council on July 18 met in executive session with its attorney to discuss pending litigation matters.

In public session, the council transferred \$100,000 from its Edward Jones account to pay expenses for legal purposes, water well repairs, wastewater treatment plant repairs and other expenses.

The Edward Jones account is the city's reserve account, so to speak. It had more than \$400,000 in it before the \$100,000 removal, thus leaving it at over \$300,000.

- In other business, the council:
- Approved an ordinance renewing the Atmos franchise for five years. Atmos is paid 5 percent.
 - Received six bids for the old ambulance. The high bidder, DNS Farms, was awarded the ambulance for \$1,500.
 - Received a request from C.J. Tamez to use the baseball field. Due to calendar concerns, no action was taken.
 - Discussed whether to put up a plaque thanking city employees who contributed time and labor toward the XIT Recreation Center construction. This was referred to the Rec Center oversight committee.
 - Gave plaques to Richard Villarreal and Gaylon Rhodes, who did not seek re-election to the city council this year.
 - Moved its meetings from the 3rd Thursday of each month to the 3rd Tuesday. The next meeting will be Aug. 20.
 - Approved some auditing changes.

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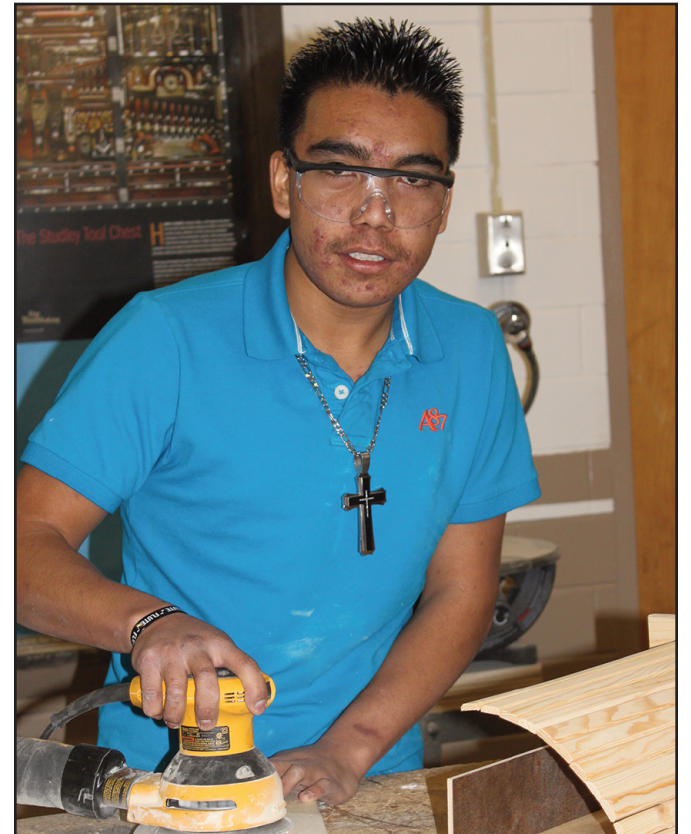

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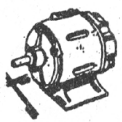
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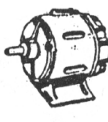
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Border Banter

We all know of church mission trips to exotic locales.

But I personally favor missions that help people here. There is a great need for that.

A friend of mine, a retired educator, works with a group mission team in Amarillo, home to a growing community of refugees from places in Southeast Asia like Burma, Vietnam and Thailand, and from places in Africa where there have been tribal warfare.

She helps teach them English. No, she doesn't know the languages from Asia, but helps greatly anyway. It's almost a full-time volunteer job for her.

Once our government accepts refugees for reasons such as escaping from racial or religious persecutions, they are brought to cities in the U.S. where they have a good likelihood to find work.

Amarillo has a couple of large businesses that fit that category.

Here's a story my

friend tells:

Robert's family has had a serious problem -- the apartment manager has not fixed a leak in their apartment. It's been leaking a full stream of hot water into the bath tub for more than a month. There is mold growing and the bathroom stays very steamy.

The family has had to go across the street to another apartment rather than use their own bathroom.

The mission team started making some calls. The city of Amarillo intervened and repairs were made. But since the hot water ran for so long, the family got hit with a very high electricity bill.

The mission team has helped Robert's family, not just with advice, but by helping the father find work, and donating the family money toward backpacks and school supplies.

Robert worries that troubles in the Congo have followed him to America. He is fearful and paranoid, believing someone is trying to harm his family. He doesn't know who to trust.

Someone turned Robert and his wife into Children's Protective Services (CPS) and CPS threatened to take his children. But after researching, CPS was

unable to find anything wrong.

Robert's troubles stem from the fact his father was Congolese and his mother was Rwandan. Ethnic wars have caused severe strife in central Africa, with millions killed. United Nations teams are in many places trying to help keep the peace.

Robert's parents owned a compound (small farm with two or three small houses). Soldiers and rebels kept harassing the family.

One time, Robert had to be away for a couple of days. When he returned, he found that soldiers had killed his mother and hung her head in a tree outside the house. Inside, he found his father and two brothers dead.

Robert was understandably angry and wanted to kill those responsible. But he said to himself that he could not go after them because he was "under God."

Soon after, soldiers came looking for Robert. His wife had him hide under the bed while she told the soldiers he was volunteering at the youth center.

The soldiers left. Robert went into hiding. After a few days, he sneaked back home and

found his pregnant wife had been stabbed and left for dead while she was washing clothes in the nearby river.

A neighbor found the woman and got her to a doctor. Two days later a son was born healthy.

Another time, soldiers came and killed Robert's first-born son; they cut out his organs and threw them about.

Robert and his wife appealed to a United

Nations contingent and were placed in a refugee camp until they gained passage to the U.S.

Robert found a job in Amarillo and his wife works, too. In Africa, he had finished his university studies but in America he must start over and get a GED. He plans to do that this fall.

While he told this story, Robert remarked numerous times of how God is with him and how

glad he is to be a Christian. His faith is strong regardless of his losses. He was wearing a t-shirt that said, "Christ died for me, so I could live for Him."

Folks, helping people like Robert and his family, is a true Godly mission. I applaud my friend for her work in that area.

I understand that mission work is needed throughout this crazy

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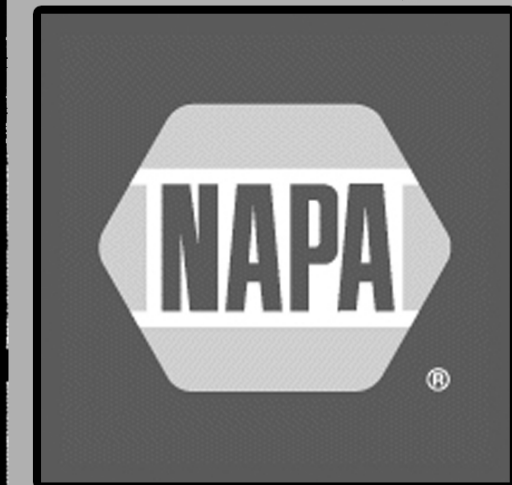

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

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City employee insurance rates decrease in Farwell

The Farwell City Council on July 16 learned that the insurance rates for city employees are going down a significant amount for this year.

City officials believe that since there were no major claims over the past few years, the rates decreased from \$492 per employee last year to \$369 this year.

The council voted to reinstate vision and dental coverage for each employee. This extra coverage was cut at one point because the cost of the insurance rates were too high.

Now, with the vision and dental included, the cost of insurance coverage will be \$409 total.

In other business, the Council:

-- Approved building permits for Pedro Ruiz of 200 Ave. C, and Ignacio Olivas of 601 Ave. D for roofing work at their homes.. A new awning on the west end of the warehouse facility for Kelly Green Seeds was approved.

-- Heard that the new drug dog has been used in traffic stops and to track individuals in town. On one vehicle search, the dog found crack pipes.

A mock drug find was also conducted at the school with the dog alerting to

drugs stashed in a locker. Police Chief Larry Kelsay said the dog will help keep drugs out of Farwell.

-- Learned that the fire department had 2 calls last month in Farwell. Three firefighters will attend fire school soon in College Station. The department used grant money to pay for the school tuition.

-- Heard that the EMS department has answered 62 calls this year. Craig Giesbrecht reported that another Farwell EMS volunteer has moved to Muleshoe.

This leaves Farwell with four EMS volunteers. He noted that Texico is helping with calls.

-- Discussed the need to publish ads in the Tribune concerning the benefits of volunteering for the EMS and fire departments.

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Postal rates decrease by a penny --- in 1919

Here's another in the series of articles from the Texico-Farwell News, which was published in 1917 to 1919.

National news dominated the top of Page 1 of the June 25, 1919, issue of the Texico-Farwell News.

A change in postal rates was announced. One cent would be applied to postal cards and the two-cent letter postage again would come into its own. Both rates are down a penny from previously.

President Wilson was in France working on the peace treaty following the end of World War I. The article said no president, with the possible exception of President Lincoln, "has been subjected to such vitriolic abuse and such bitter personal attacks as he had," involving being attacked as a pacifist by some and as "war mad" by others.

Complete returns of the May 24 election were given including for prohibition, 158,982; and against, 138,907.

The only "major" local article on Page 1 was headlined "Miss Thelma Allen entertains at dinner." Enjoying her hospitality were Misses Lee Methvin, Nama Nabors, Hinda Nabors, Maebelle Schlenker, and Messrs. Eustace Allen, Ernest Lopey, Vernon Hunter and Hamlin Overstreet.

Three ads were on Page 1:

-- R.H. Kemp Lumber Co., "posts, wire, cement and all kinds of building materials."

-- Western Tire Mfg. Co. -- "we will be prepared

to make deliveries about July 10th."

-- Eagle Pencil Co., New York -- "conceded to be the finest pencil made for general use."

Page 2 also had mostly national news. There was a column on "Hurley items," which noted that William Coventry marketed a car load of grain last week, and that Rev. G.F.C. Fons had made a trip to Farwell.

An item noted that the election for annexing four additions to Texico would be held July 22. Another said the train which Miss Estelle Nobles and Mss Eunice Wulfman had planned to take to Fort Worth was wrecked near Sweetwater and a number killed.

An ad on Page 3 noted the opening of Plains Buying and Selling Association of Texico-Farwell. "Highest market price paid for butter and eggs," it noted, while offering staple groceries, feed, coal, gas and oil.

J.J. Plaster who had a room east of the O.K. Wagon Yard, said he had a "real Goodyear welt stitching machine in Texico. No more sending shoes away to have them repaired."

Page 3 was mostly full of "Town Topics." They included:

C.F. Leftwich is back from Phoenix where he visited his brother. He said that area is on the boom.

Rev. Thurston was busy. On Wednesday, he united in holy wedlock Irma Mulhair and Thomas Teasers, then later that day he tied the knot for Frank Martin and a Mary Kays, a Texico school teacher.

Some friends treated Melvin Brown to a burro ride around town. He said he is not going to get married again, not for awhile at least.

B.H. Ingram and son Walter left for the wheat fields near Hutchinson.

For sale -- 160 acres within 4 miles of Farwell for \$2,500.

W.N. Porter lost the end of one of his fingers when the crank on his car got loose.

Mack Nobles, son of Farwell School Supt. B.E. Nobles, was back from Europe.

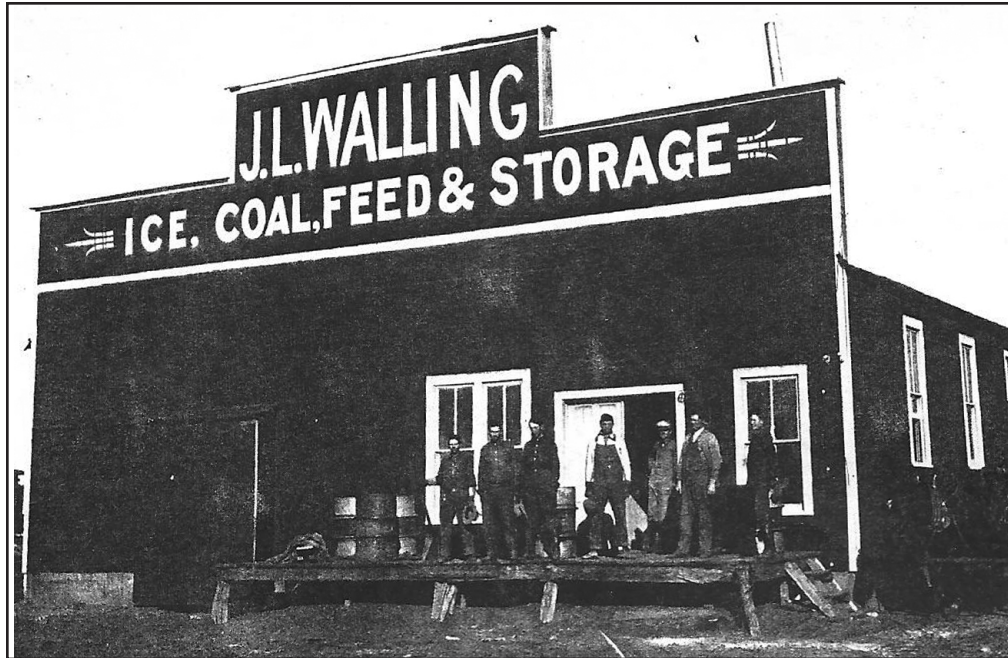
And there was this note:

"One of the neatest papers reaching our desk is the State Line Tribune. It is brim full of local news besides many helpful articles on different lines. Its makeup is a credit to any city many times larger than this community. Editor Fears is to be congratulated for the sort of paper he is giving his patrons."

Page 4 featured four proclamations from the Village of Texico board of trustees:

One was about a petition from residents of the G. Clark Smith Addition asking they be annexed into the Village. An election was called for July 22 by Mayor J.F. McGrew.

The other three proclamations repeated the first. Was this a case where a petition had to be printed four times, so all four were run in the same issue?

J.D. Hamlin - the most famous person to ever live in the Twin Cities

It was on Jan. 10, 1950, that James D. Hamlin died.

Here's a bit of important history that involved the most famous person to ever live in the Twin Cities.

The Tribune reported at his passing:

Funeral services for Texico's founder and West Texas' No. 1 citizen, Judge James D. Hamlin, will be conducted at Hamlin memorial Methodist Church in Texico.

Burial will take place in the Farwell Cemetery in the Hamlin plot under the direction of the Steed Funeral Home.

Pallbearers will be Earl Wyatt, William Boyce, J. Evetts Haley, Dr. Curry Holden, John Aldridge and Jack Dunn.

The end came to the 73-year-old illustrious West Texas character at

Clovis Memorial Hospital where he had spent four months as a patient sufferer.

He had been in failing health the past year and underwent surgery in Denver last August.

A Kentuckian by birth, Judge Hamlin was a Texan by choice. In the late 1890s, he left his native home of Louisville, Ky., bound for the Klondike gold rush and stopped off in Amarillo to visit his father's old friend, Capt. J.M. Kindred, Amarillo's first postmaster.

Judge Hamlin settled in Amarillo and from then on was a fixture in the Plains country, his active life forming one of the Panhandle's most vivid pages.

Believing that Texico was to become a division point on the Santa Fe

Railroad, then under construction, Judge Hamlin formed a partnership with John Hutson, a descendant of English royalty, to establish the town of Texico in 1905.

A year later, the town of Farwell was laid out by the Capital Freehold Land Trust of Chicago, and Judge Hamlin was named resident representative of the Chicago syndicate.

The Chicago firm had come into possession of the far-flung XIT Ranch, embracing three million acres of West Texas land, which the state of Texas had given in exchange for building the State Capitol at Austin.

Shortly after he landed in Amarillo in 1898, Hamlin began the study of law, and later was admitted to the bar in Texas. His first public

office was as county attorney of Potter County, serving one term and not seeking re-election.

Just after Parmer County was organized, he became this county's first county judge and continued in office for four terms.

It was during his administration as county judge that the present courthouse was erected in 1916. Since his tenure as county judge, he was always affectionately referred to as "Judge Hamlin."

Large in stature, he was 6'3 and weighed about 200 lbs., he was a gentleman of the old school. But the biggest

thing about him was his heart and soul. He was indeed the "poor man's friend."

Scores of present-day successful farmers in Parmer County owe their success to Judge Hamlin, who stood by them in years of adversity.

For five years, he served as president of the Panhandle Plains Historical Society, and was a past president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

His abiding hobby was collecting rare objects of art. He knew Oriental art as possibly no other man in Texas, and his rare collections, gathered from the far corners of the

earth, cannot be duplicated in any museum in the land.

In recent years, most of his collections have been presented to the panhandle Plains Museum of Canyon.

A natural orator of unusual ability, Judge Hamlin's speaking engagements called him to many places throughout the Southwest.

Thus, the books are closed on one of the greatest characters that ever set foot on West Texas soil.

His wife, Katherine, died 12 years ago while visiting her brother in Lima, Peru, and is buried there. They had no children.

Just Passing Through

Albert Einstein is generally credited with the observation that insanity can be defined as doing the same thing over and over again and always expecting a different result.

That definition seems to be more than appropriate for the current push by the Obama administration to disarm the American people.

Following the school-house massacre in Connecticut and the Florida jury's verdict of self-defense in George Zimmerman's killing of Trayvon Martin, President Obama has put all his effort into what he calls "common sense" infringements on Americans' right to keep and bear arms.

There are three groups that possess weapons in any society - the law-abiding people, the criminals, and the government coercive forces.

Historically in other nations, the process always begins with measures defined as "common sense" that affect the law-abiding people only; the government's coercive forces are exempt from the laws and the criminals are going to ignore these new laws as readily as they ignore all others.

Then the measures grow increasingly repressive until they arrive at the complete disarming of the law-abiding citizens. That is

the ultimate result because dictators make it a priority to disarm the law-abiding citizens for two reasons.

First, a government that has sole possession of weapons can then inflict whatever it wants onto a population now unable to resist.

Second, people with no means of defense against criminals are totally dependent on government coercive forces for whatever protection they might provide against armed criminals.

In the security of families and businesses, as in every other major function (employment, medical care, economic and monetary factors, etc.) people who are made dependent have at the same time been made obedient.

The wealthy and the political elites with their armed bodyguards are unaffected by the "common sense" laws that have removed the means of effective self-defense from their subservient classes who have no bodyguards.

Rights once removed are never restored, regardless of the costs of their loss.

When Great Britain confiscated the handguns of its subjects in 1997 following a school massacre, the crime rate exploded because criminals could now be certain that no law-abiding citizen had a firearm for defense.

A major London newspaper documented that after Britons were forced to surrender their handguns, the rate of gun violence increased 89 per-

cent increase.

The Australian confiscation of its subjects' firearms two years later yielded the same results. While crime rates had been declining for years when law-abiding Australians had guns, after the confiscation it increased in every category, particularly in armed robberies, assaults, and home invasions.

It is well over a decade since both confiscations took place, and the rates of violence and gun crime continue to climb

in both countries.

The 310 million Americans today possess something over 270 million firearms, about 88 for every 100 of us. That number of armed law-abiding Americans has continued to skyrocket since the 2008 elections.

And the number of gun crimes has continued to fall, year by year. More guns, less crime, because criminals are not the only ones with weapons.

Despite the U.S. being far and away the most

heavily armed nation, the American murder rate is 2.97 firearm homicides per 100,000 citizens -- 27th in the world.

The most important statistic, however, is the number of crimes prevented by law-abiding American possessing a firearm. Each year, something like 2.5 million crimes are prevented by armed citizens, overwhelmingly without a single shot needing to be fired.

Using the British

example as a template, that means that if Americans allow this government to restrict, count, and ultimately take their weapons, the number of firearm murders would explode from under 12,000 a year to over 22,000 a year.

To start down that "common sense" pathway would be far worse than foolish. It would be far worse than catastrophic.

By definition, it would be insane.

Moisture boosts crops

From Monti Vandiver, Parmer County extension agent - IPM:

The area has been blessed with a widespread slow soaking rain!

The moisture will provide a much needed boost to crop production and has already provided a significant boost in producer optimism. Weather stations recorded from near 1 inch to over 2.5 inches last week; individual reports in excess of 3 inches were also received.

Recent rain and cooler weather could not have come at a better time for corn which is pollinating. Moisture demand has decreased from over .40 inch/day to .13 inch/day during the recent cool humid conditions. Moisture demand will rapidly rebound to previous levels as temperature increases and humidity decreases.

Hopefully, current soil moisture along with irrigation will get the early corn past peak moisture demand. A good soil moisture profile will also be a good base for later planted corn as moisture demands increase.

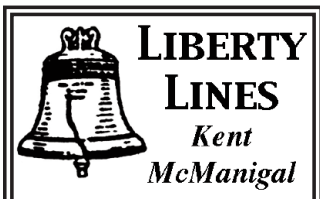

# Conservation measures urged

Here are some water conservation tips from High Plains Underground Water Conservation District:

- In the bathroom:**
- Take shorter showers. New shower heads can use 2.0 gallons of water per minute as old opposed to older shower heads that use 2.5 gallons per minute.
  - Consider installing high efficiency toilets that use 1.6 gallons of water per flush or less. Older toilets use 3.5 to 5.5 gallons per flush.
  - Test toilets for leaking flappers.
  - Never use the toilet as a trash can.
- In the kitchen:**
- Wash only full loads when using automatic dishwashers.
  - Keep a pitcher of drinking water in the fridge instead of running water from the tap until it is cool.

- In the laundry:**
- Wash only full loads when using the washing machine.
  - If a new washer is needed, consider a more water-efficient model. Some, for example, use 35 percent less water than regular washers.
- Outdoors:**
- Abide by city ordinances governing water conservation methods.
  - Water landscapes in either early morning or late evening during the summer.
  - Don't water landscapes right after it rains or on windy days.
  - Consider use of drip irrigation for bedded plants, trees or shrubs.
  - Don't water the street, sidewalk or driveway. If watering starts to run off





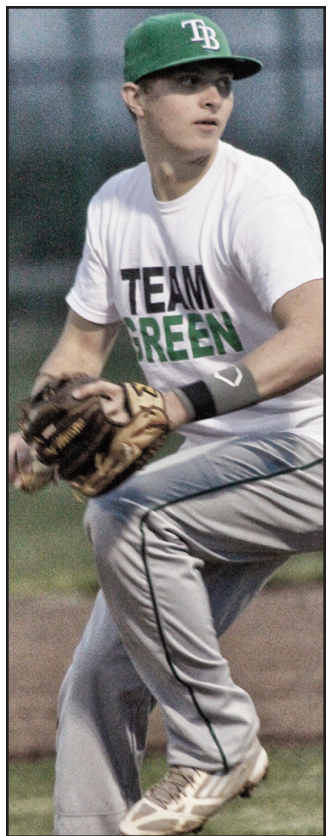


# 'Open Field' held

your property into the street, stop it.

-- Consider rainwater harvesting to capture rainfall for use on landscapes.

-- Use drought-tolerant plants.

-- Consider modifying your landscape to make it more water-efficient.

**Agriculture:**

-- Keep a close watch on center pivot end guns. No need to spray into bar ditches or county roads.

-- Avoid irrigation water waste by installing earthen borders to keep water on the field or by upgrading to a more efficient irrigation system, such as a LEPA center pivot or subsurface drip irrigation.

-- Install furrow dikes to keep irrigation water or rain water on the field so it may soak into the soil.

-- Don't purge water from subsurface drip irrigation systems into nearby road ditches.

-- Consider irrigation scheduling to determine when and how much water to apply to crops.

**Businesses:**

-- Conduct a water use survey to evaluate water usage.

-- Consider modifications to water-using equipment and processes.

-- Replace older conveyor-type dishwashers with more efficient models.
