Leavells save a bit of Texico history

Howard and Marcia Leavell have pieces of Texico school history all over their house.

Their fireplace is made from recovered brick from the demolition of the original school building in 1968. And parts of their house on Craig Street in Texico have the original lumber from the old school, which was built in 1918.

But their favorite piece of history hangs on their living room wall. The Leavells recently restored an old clock that hung in the school building for as many years as Texico 1955 graduate Howard Leavell can remember.

"I can remember walking down the hall and seeing that clock hanging there," he said.

Some of his classmates from those times differ in their recollections of the location of the clock, but they all remember it. The 100-year-old clock was possibly used to tell what time classes concluded at Texico, but it no longer makes any sounds.

"It could have been used to just keep track of the class times, not chime on the hour," Leavell believes.

The Leavells thought about buying the clock

many years ago at a school auction but deferred to friend and classmate Mike Spearman.

"Mike saw the clock and wanted to bid on it, so I let him have it," said Leavell.

However, that clock was still on his mind many years later.

The Spearman's never repaired the clock but it did hang in one of their houses until they built a new one. When they moved into the new house, the clock went into storage. After awhile, Spearman contacted the Leavells and asked if they wanted the clock.

"It should be in Texico," was what Spearman told them.

Mr. and Mrs. Leavell

began researching the clock and took it to a repair shop in Clovis for refurbishing. The original wood was nicely restored and all it took to fix it was one little part.

Thus, the Leavells were thrilled with the results and now proudly display it in their home.

Mrs. Leavell feels a strong connection to Texico through that clock. She served as school district business manager for 24 years, retiring in 1991.

Both Leavells say that someday they wouldn't mind displaying the clock at the school where "everybody could see and enjoy it." Until then, the clock looks right at home in their living room.

Proposed Farwell School tax rate to stay the same

The Farwell School Board on June 11 announced three hirings:

- Annie Crawford, of Farwell, elementary school principal.
- Brittany Grant, of Muleshoe, junior high English teacher.
- Mary Southard, of Clovis, high school English teacher.

In other business, the board:

- Heart Supt. Mike Read say that 2013 enrollment ended at 568 students, and he gave a projected enrollment for the 2013-2014 year in the 560's.
- Heard that the track resurfacing is complete and read said it was "in tip top shape."
- Had a preliminary discussion on the 2013-2014 budget. It will have the tax rate staying the same as last year -- \$1.04 per \$100 assessed valuation.
- Discussed proposed 2013-2014 staff salaries, to be acted upon in July. It includes state-mandated step raises for certified personnel.
- Swore in new board member Jason Schilling, who replaced Mollie Stancell.
- Elected board officers: Darren Haseloff, president; Kendall Devault, vice president; and Keith Hadley, secretary.
- Tabled a recommendation by Hayley Christian and Sheryl Christian until next month that involves changing grade point parameters on the computer. No change is being made in how grade point averages work.

I first met Jesse in the middle 1980s. I remember talking him into running for Farwell City Council in the late '80s, and he just lost by just a few votes.

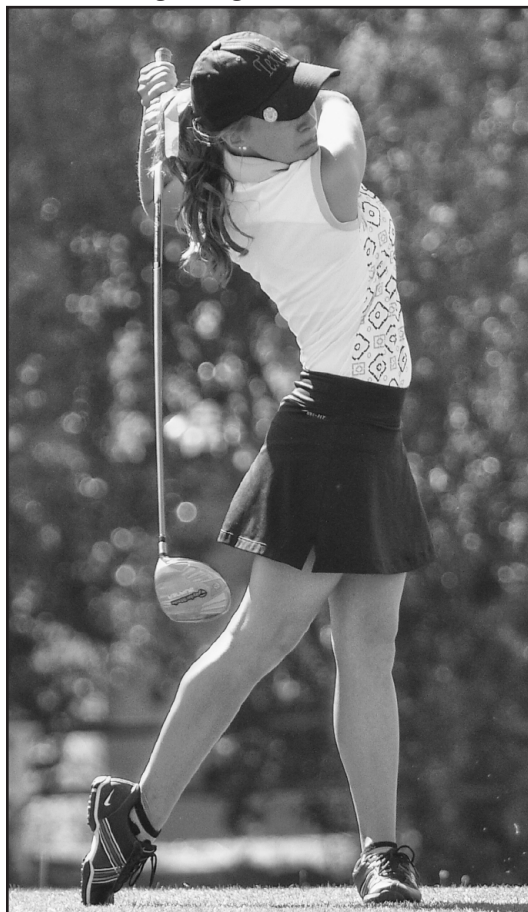
Later, he had a tough fight with cancer -- and beat it, living many more years.

Texico City Council clarifies mobile home ordinance

The Texico City Council on June 11 clarified their recent city ordinance on mobile home permits.

They said that moving a mobile home or 5th wheel from one location to another in the city would require a permit.

Also, moving a mobile home or 5th wheel into the city would require a permit. Moving one through the city would not require a permit.

In other news, the council:

- Approved closing Anderson Street for the bicycle contest at Border Town Days. The annual event will be July 27.

- Heard that Fire Chief Lewis Cooper has found a defibrillator for one of the Texico ambulances. This was paid for by a grant. The new defibrillator will cost \$28,800.

Purple sorghum problems can result from cloudy days

From Benji Henderson, Parmer County extension agent:

With the recent hail storms and problems we are seeing across the county, I am getting a few calls on issues with some of the grain sorghum as it is emerging.

In the recent issue of FOCUS, I found information which may help our local producers.

Occasionally, grain sorghum seedlings growing in early cool conditions, especially if prolonged and coupled with cloudy weather, will have purpling of the leaf sheaths and leaf margins/leaf blades. This may be coupled with interveinal yellow striping (chlorosis) related to iron deficiency.

The purple color results from insufficient phosphorus uptake or from the plant's inability to move sugars from the leaf blade. Symptoms usually disappear when favorable temperatures return.

If you find a field with the purpling and you have had cool conditions, re-check the field ever few days as warm weather resumes to track the return to normal colored tissue. Look for the newly emerging leaf to be green in color. As long as the plants are otherwise healthy yield potential is generally not compromised though it is possible individual plants might appear stunted.

Could this be herbicide injury? The return of warm conditions and good growing conditions will diminish the symptoms and injury potential.

The Twin Cities got about three quarters of an inch of moisture on Monday night. It was reported that Lazbuddie got between 1 and 1 1/2 inches.

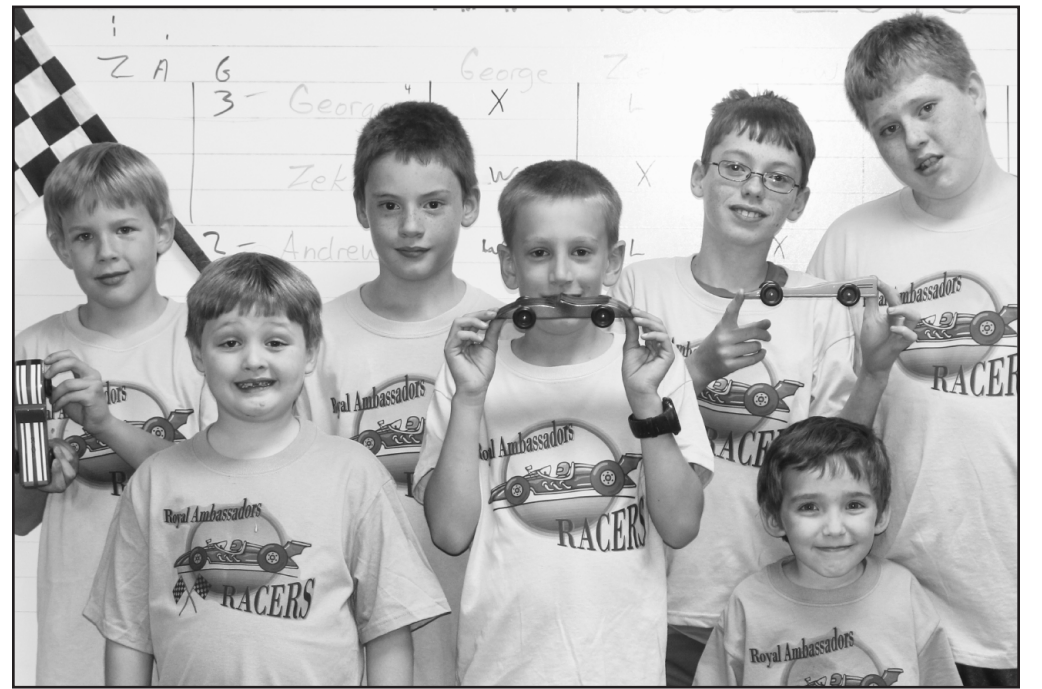

-- Claims of conspiracy state a claim on which relief can be granted.

Both sides have backed up their views by listing a multitude of past federal and state court cases.

The lawsuit alleges that an "illegal scheme" was hatched to harass some residents and extort money from them to fill city coffers.

Previously, federal court Judge Mary Lou Robinson has set a deadline for a joint report from both sides' attorneys setting forth the status of settlement negotiations by Aug. 23; a deadline for complete discovery for Nov. 15; and that the case be put on the trial docket for January.

And last month, the plaintiff's attorney requested that a jury trial be given in the case.

judge for the city; also, the federal court lacks jurisdiction over any state claims; the plaintiffs have failed to plead additional facts sufficient to their state claims; and the plaintiffs have added allegations regarding her involvement in the Eliseo Castaneda incident and alleged conspiracy to violate the plaintiff's civil rights.

Mrs. Pitcock: The defense alleges a lack of factual allegations for alleged conspiracies; and noted the statute of limitations.

City of Bovina: The defense alleges that the amended complaint by the plaintiffs which includes additional allegations is still insufficient.

Sinclair: The defense alleged that information added to the complaints of Martha Jaramillo, Federico Velo, Jose Garcia and Eliseo Castaneda are not sufficient and charges should be dismissed; and noted the statute of limitations.

The plaintiffs, besides those mentioned above, are Sandra Moreno, Carlos Moreno, Jose Gonzales, Briselda Rodriguez and Rogelio Martinez. They are represented by a Hereford law firm.

Motions to dismiss also were made by the attorneys for the three former police officers. The defense said the complaints by the Bovina residents include six federal claims and two state claims.

The basis for the defense's motions to dismiss was pretty much the same for all the three former police officers. They allege:

- Immunity for all state law claims.
- Dismissal of charges after an arrest does not indicate a violation of constitutional rights.
- In Foster's case, negligent hiring and supervisor claims are not applicable under federal law.
- Claims of conspiracy are not specific enough.
- Statute of limitations.
- The plaintiffs have not shown an excessive use of force. The only plaintiff that comes close to stating a claim against Foster for excessive use of force is Martha Jaramillo; others said they were "arrested" or "issued a citation."
- In Manny Jimenez' case, the defense alleged Carlos Moreno's "failure to state a claim."

Then on June 10, responses were filed for the plaintiffs by attorney J.B. Johnston concerning the city and its officials. The plaintiffs asked the judge to deny the defense's motions to dismiss.

The plaintiffs' responses alleged:

- Plaintiffs' claims meet the pleading requirement set forth by the U.S. Supreme Court in *Ashcroft vs. Iqbal*.
- Plaintiffs' claims are not barred by the statute of limitations.
- Plaintiffs' claims of negligent hiring and negligent supervision are supported by factual allegations in plaintiffs' amended petition.
- Plaintiffs have sufficient factual allegations concerning excessive force; and infringement of the plaintiffs' equal protection and due process rights.
- Claim of conspiracy states a claim on which relief can be granted.
- Involving Municipal Judge Mitchell, the defense alleges she is not entitled

to judicial immunity for all claims asserted arising out of judicial acts taken as municipal judge.

And on June 11, Johnston filed a response to the motions to dismiss made by the three former police officers:

- Claims of excessive force should not be dismissed.
- Claims of conspiracy are not barred by intra-corporate conspiracy doctrine.
- Equal protection and due process rights are infringed upon.

-- Scheduled the next regular meeting for July 18.

There is a possibility of litigation dealing with how the plant is working.

-- Although the council received some bids for purchasing the used ambulance, it was decided to extend the bidding deadline, with bids to be opened at the July meeting.

The bid envelopes received so far have not been opened, said City Manager Buster Poling.

-- Met with the XIT Recreation Center Committee about improving communications between the committee, City Hall and the City Council on rec center matters.

-- Decided to let the Rec Center committee decide whether to allow volunteer fire department and other emergency community volunteers access to the rec center's exercise room without charge.

-- Discussed the length of time for retiring city council members and city personnel to receive reduced water rates after leaving city employment.

Currently, when a councilman leaves the council or a city employee leaves city employ, they receive a small rate reduction in their water rates.

Some clarification of the policy recently was asked for.

No change was made.

-- Decided to schedule its regular meetings on the 3rd Thursday of each month.

Here is an update on the Bovina lawsuit

There has been more movement recently concerning the federal civil rights lawsuit filed Dec. 29 by nine Bovina residents against current and former city officials.

On May 20, the two law firms representing the defendants filed motions to dismiss again. This apparently was done because the plaintiffs filed more information in their briefs after the defense filed its original motions to dismiss.

The defendants are former City Manager Jana Pitcock, Municipal Judge Donna Mitchell, former Police Chief Gary Sinclair, the City of Bovina, and former police officers Owen Foster, Jonathan Jimenez and Manny Jimenez.

A Lubbock law firm represents the city and its officials, while the three former police officers are represented by an Amarillo law firm.

On the defense said, the motions to dismiss noted:

Mrs. Mitchell: The defense said she is entitled to judicial immunity for all claims brought against her individually for judicial acts performed as municipal

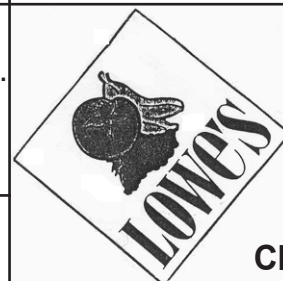
