Farwell School tax rate lowered

The Farwell School Board on Monday approved a proposed tax rate of \$1.04 per \$100 assessed valuation.

The proposed rate is six cents lower than the current rate of \$1.10. This is because the bond issue in the mid-1990s for the gymnasium has now been paid off.

A public hearing will be held on Aug. 29 at 7 p.m. in the school administration building on the proposed tax rate.

Former New Mexico State Rep. Earlene Roberts, 77, of Lovington, N.M., died Aug. 6.

I will always remember when Mrs. Roberts first ran for that state post. She came by the State Line Tribune to put some ads in, and find out more about Texico.

I told her that although Texico wasn't as big as some of the towns in her district, like Portales and Lovington, it was still important. And I urged her to go door-to-door in Texico.

So that day she knocked on a bunch of Texico doors. Meanwhile, her opponent neglected to do the same.

The election was very close. Mrs. Roberts won by a small margin -- that turned out to be virtually the same margin that she won Texico by.


By taking the time to knock on those doors and ask Texico folks for their votes, she earned the election victory.

The Parmer County will hold two public hearings on a proposal to increase total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll in the preceding tax year by 8.039648 percent (percentage by which proposed tax rate exceeds lower of rollback tax rate or effective tax calculated under Chapter 26, Tax Code). Your individual taxes may increase at a greater or lesser rate, or even decrease, depending on the change in the taxable value of your property in relation to the change in taxable value of all other property and the tax rate that is adopted.

The average taxable value of a residence homestead in Parmer County this year is \$64,397. If the governing body adopts the effective tax rate for this year of \$0.454000 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed this year on the average home would be \$292.36.

If the governing body adopts the proposed tax rate of \$0.490500 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed this year on the average home would be \$315.87

rest & Sinking Fund tax revenue is used to pay for bonded indebtedness on construction, equipment, or both. The bonds, and the tax rate necessary to pay those bonds, were approved by the voters of this district.

Under state law, the dollar amount of school taxes imposed on the residence homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or of the surviving spouse of such a person, if the surviving spouse was 55 years of age or older when the person died, may not be increased above the amount paid in the first year after the person turned 65, regardless of changes in tax rate or property value.

Notice of Rollback Rate: The highest tax rate the district can adopt before requiring voter approval at an election is 1.170000. This election will be automatically held if the district adopts a rate in excess of the rollback rate of 1.170000.





Live Cattle prices are beginning to show some trength with cash trade taking place around \$121.00 last week. Futures prices surged up into new high territory last week, but couldn't seem to close up above major resistance levels. This week prices are back up against last weeks highs, but have yet to take those highs out as of today. We remain optimistic that Live Cattle prices will eventually make new highs over the near term. If this turns out to be the case, odds also favor a short term top within the next week or so.

Feeder prices may have done about all they can unless ive Cattle prices can give them a boost. Feeders have been reluctant to move back up into last weeks highs so far this week. Most long term target prices have been met up to this point and there are strong seasonal tenlencies which indicate lower prices over the near term.

Soybean prices were sharply higher today when JSDA reduced their yield estimates by almost 2 bushels. Last months estimates were to see about a 44.5 yield and his report moved those estimates to 42.4 bushels which ushed the market up almost 43 higher on the day basis he November contract. There technically was no change in the long term, but if a bottom forms, it will take weeks to indicate a major turn.

Corn prices also got a boost of today's USDA report which also dropped yield expectations from last months stimates. The USDA pegged the yield at 154.4 bushels down from last months estimates of 156.5 bushels. This of course dropped production estimates and boosted the December contract about 10 cents of the day. Technically, long term trends still remain down at this ime.

Wheat prices rallied after the USDA report was eleased today, but not much good news as world stocks actually rose a little from last month, but are slightly ower than last years. Most of the negative news should be factored into this market and demand should begin to increase as we move into the end of the year. The seaonal tendency is to see higher prices into the December time frame.

Cotton prices broke out and closed above a major esistance level above the \$89.20 level basis the December contract today. There needs to be some follow through buying to confirm this breakout and continuation charts also show some resistance up around the \$92.50 area. Technically, this breakout closed above a wo-thirds retracement level basis the December contract which would project a move to \$106.00?


She added, "Mr. Hill's enthusiasm for the program is obvious. The students have already responded well to his woodworking program and now the new welding program will provide even more real-world skills."

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits, households receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits (formerly Food Stamps)/Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) only have to list their child's name and SNAP or TANF case number. An adult household member must sign the application.

Households that do not list a SNAP/TANF case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the last four digits of the Social Security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If the adult who signs the application does not have a Social Security number, the household member must indicate that a Social Security number is not available by writing the word "None," "No Number," or some indication that the person does not have a Social Security number. The application must be signed by an adult household member.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced-price meal policy the secretary will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal for a hearing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to Superintendent of Schools PO Box 70, Bovina, Tx 79009.

If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the housenoid snould contact the school. Such changes may make the students of the household elig ble for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.


