



Railroad construction helps local business

Many area folks may be complaining about the railroad construction at the state line this week. However, one local business is actually benefitting from the construction zone and necessary traffic detour.

The Apple Shack is located on the detour route and is taking advantage of this opportunity to draw in new business. New owners Doug and Tanya Crawford say that many of their customers last week commented that they "never knew we (the Apple Shack) were here."

Mr. Crawford says that travelers from Minnesota, Seattle and even Las Vegas have stopped in last week due to the detour.

The Crawfords recently bought the Apple Shack from Tammie Mitchell and have been enjoying their first apple season. Doug says that the store fits in perfectly with their other business, a crop spraying business.

"Our crop spraying is winding down for the season before the Apple Shack gets going for apple season. It is a good fit for us."

Farwell residents for the past 19 years, the Crawfords were very familiar with the Apple Shack before buying it.

"Our youngest son, Tucker, actually got us involved, says Doug. "He knows some people in the apple business and thought it might be a good business for us.

Doug added that it also is a lot of work. "I now have a better understanding how difficult it is for retail businesses. Just to keep track of inventory

and stocking is a difficult process. I don't know how big stores like Walmart do it."

Doug has also been building muscles by moving around boxes and boxes of apples every day. Some customers come in to buy boxes of apples to take with them to relatives or just on their way back home, so he is always offering to carry the heavy boxes to their vehicles.

He also travels to Colorado to supervise the shipment of apples from his supplier. Now that local apples are no longer available due to poor weather conditions and lack of water, their apples come from Colorado every year.

"The late freeze took out all the apples in North Texas this year, so there just were not any available," said Doug.

The Crawfords are already looking forward to next year. "This year, we opened in September and will continue until the end of the year. Next year, we

want to open in August."

They also are looking to add more variety and looking into getting peaches and fresh corn next year."

Their website is under construction right now and should be finished soon. This way, they can give updates on new shipments and offer order placements online. Right now, the couple uses Facebook for updates and can be found by looking up the Apple Shack on the popular site.

They say that their apple butter is the best selling pantry item in the store. Another big seller is their apple pies. The added, "We can ship apples, pantry products, gift baskets - really anything customers want to buy."

Obviously, apples remain a big part of their business. "We estimate we will sell over 16,000 pounds of apples this year," they said.

The Crawfords plan an open house in November.



Texico looks at street upgrades

The Texico City Council on Oct. 22 discussed a possible upcoming State Highway Department project in town.

As reported in the last meeting, the state is looking to put handicap acceptable ramps along Wheeler Avenue.

Texico, however, might have a problem moving a couple fire hydrants due to asbestos pipes.

City Inspector Terry Martin said he spoke to the engineers involved and they should be able to design the ramps to be further from the hydrants.

He also spoke to them about replacing water lines as part of the project and putting in new curbs, gutters, and drainage.

Martin said he would love for them to put in sewers to move the water east of Texico to the area near the railroad track crossing. He also pointed out that some of the curbs on the highway are out of code.

Martin said he believed the state might be able to do all of this as part of the original project.

In other news, the council:

- Discussed the Ute Water Project. The most recent project manager said he wanted to start doing more studies on the project, but it looks like the member cities have shot down the idea.

The cities pointed out that studies have been done almost continuously for decades. More studies will not change anything.

- Heard that Texico has received a Jet Rodder from Clovis. The machine that was surplus in Clovis will be used to help keep Texico's sewer lines open.

In the past, the city has borrowed the machine from Clovis when needed, so it will be nice to have the machine available.

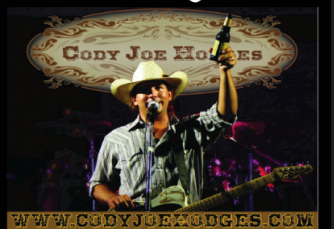





Like you, I make jokes about our congressmen, complaining that most are in it for greed, power, or sex.

It's hard to think differently when you see scandal after scandal emerge from Washington, D.C. It's happening more than ever due to the massive amount of money that flows through the town.

But the truth is that many of our congressmen are decent folks who want to make a difference. Regular folks who care about our nation and its future.

Here's my perspective on the recent government shutdown. The GOP took a beating in the world of public opinion on this.

of the struggle. What we saw was that some congressmen actually voted for what they thought was best for the future of our nation, politics be damned.

Politically, they could not win, and they knew that. But this was a rarity in Washington. Some of our politicians actually voted from their heart and for their constituents in an attempt to save our nation's future.

They are to be applauded for that. We may never see that occur in our lifetime again.

Some of those folks likely will lose their reelection campaigns because of this. But they can walk away with their heads high.

I know that it was unwise for our nation to default, and I was happy that the shutdown ended. But a part of me said something has to occur to stop our mad rush off the financial cliff and if it takes a default, so be it.

You see, folks, the GOP congressmen who most everybody is angry with actually were in the

right -- philosophically, but not politically.

Here's the ballgame in a nutshell:

Republicans believe that our headlong dash to drive up our debt while not cutting back on expenditures will destroy our nation's future.

Democrats believe that higher taxes will keep the debt problem in check. And more federal expenditures will lead to more jobs which, in turn, will lead to more taxes paid, thus eliminating the climbing debt problem.

I favor the Republican view of economics.

I expect the Democrats to maintain control of the presidency for years to come. In fact, after Mr. Obama finishes his eight years in 2016, I look for him to run again for president in 2020 or 2024. And he will win.

This means that the Democrat view of economics will prevail for some time.

From what I have read, we have about 10 years more before the national debt suffocates us.

The bottom line is that folks vote their pocket books. And the Democrats want to hand out the largesse, while Republicans don't.

'Horns come from behind to win District opener

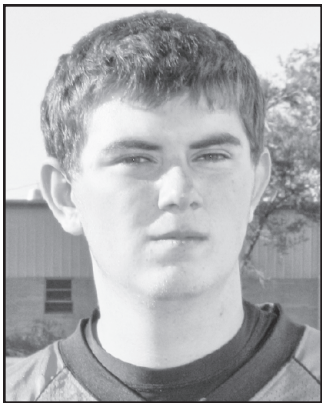
It was a wild and wooly game as the Lazbuddie Longhorns came from behind late to win their District opener over Cotton Center at home on Friday, 40-34.

This left me in a state of bewilderment and I decided that dating was not what some friends had led me to look forward to.

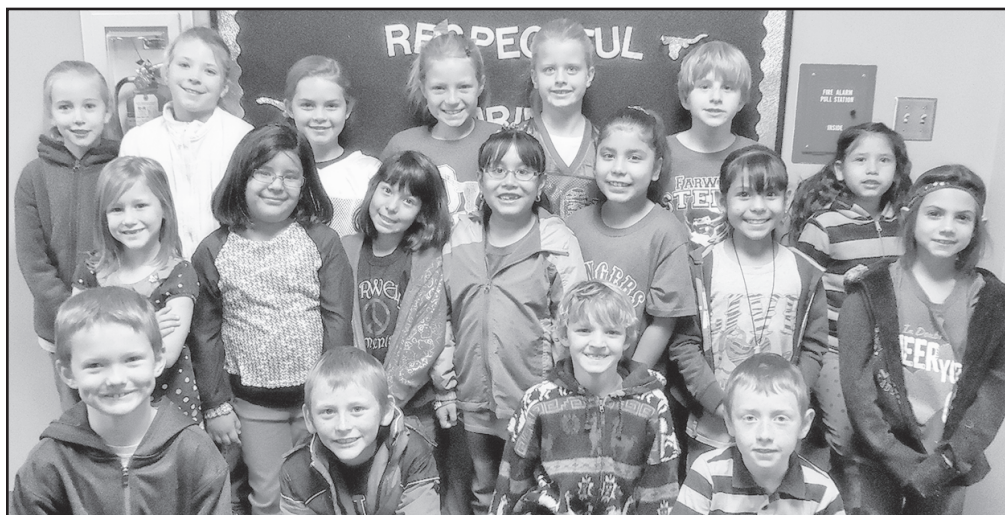
Because of this, I further withdrew and decided to remain single all of my life, swearing to move to the farthest region of Alaska in order to never again see a female person.

Texico teacher and coach Kristen Scanlan recently partnered with Curry County to offer a health fair for all 2nd-5th graders.

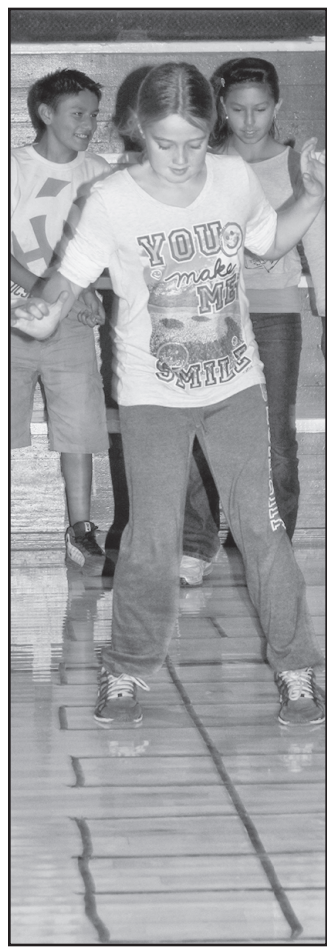
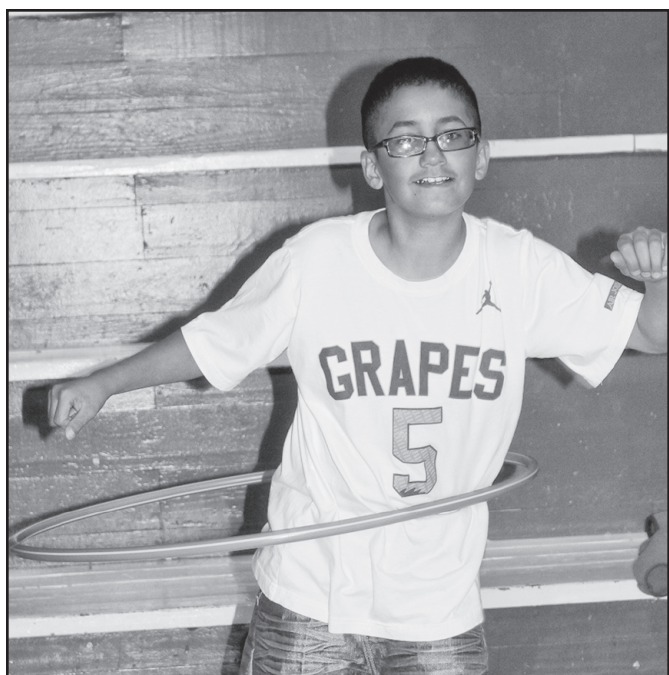
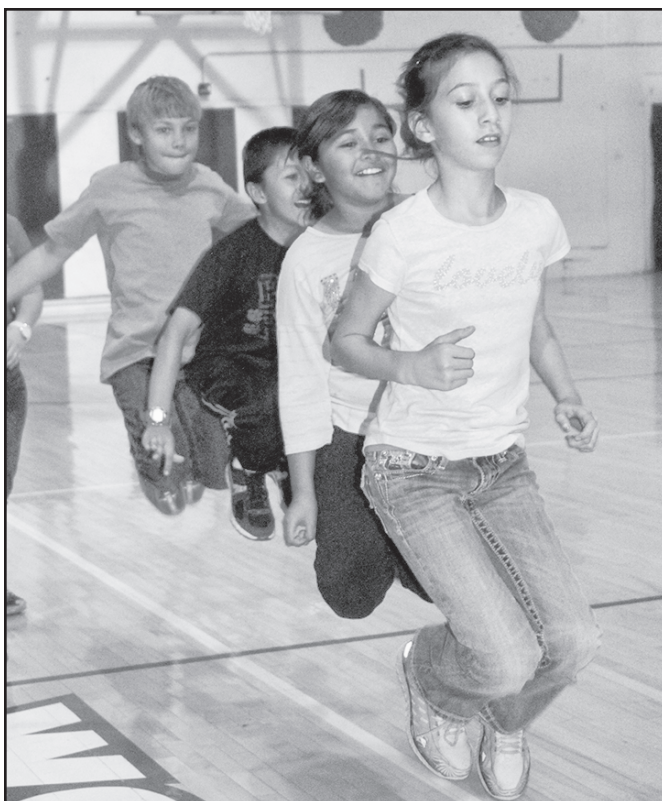

Bovina Schools win big settlement

Two weeks ago, it was announced that Bovina School and its insurance company had settled over the lawsuit involving the amount of money the insurance company was willing to pay concerning roof repairs.

Settlement was reached just days before it went on trial in Amarillo.

The school has received its check from the insurance company, and it's a big victory for Bovina School.

The check was for \$700,000, in addition to \$202,000 already received from the insurance company -- for a total of \$902,000.

Originally, the insurance company only wanted to pay \$300,000, while the school wanted the entire cost for the repair work -- \$970,000.

The roof repairs included some upgrades. The formerly flat roof is now tapered.

The cost for the upgrades, litigation fees and money paid to experts who would testify at the trial was around \$250,000 for the school, said Bovina Supt. Denise Anderson.

Thus, if the school board simply had accepted the insurance company's offer, it would have gotten \$300,000.

But by filing the suit, the school received a net of about \$652,000, which included the roof upgrades.

What Does the Debt Ceiling Resolution Mean to Investors?

After plenty of haggling, and a fair amount of political theater, Congress reached a last-minute agreement to raise the debt ceiling and end the partial government shutdown. Most people would agree that a fully functioning government that can pay its bills on time is a positive thing — and it's certainly good news for investors, because a default on the part of the U.S. government could have had serious repercussions in the financial markets. But what's next?

We may find out fairly soon, because the legislation that passed only funded the government through Jan. 15 and raised the debt limit through Feb. 7.

But as an investor, you don't have to wait until next year to respond to these ongoing political issues.

Consider taking the following steps:

- Look for opportunities. The stock market didn't overreact to the drama in Washington. Also, despite the likely short-term drag on the economy caused by the partial government shutdown, U.S. companies have shown that they are able to increase earnings, even with slow sales growth — and corporate earnings are a key driver of stock prices. These are all good signs for investors. And stock valuations (as measured by price-to-earnings ratios) are reasonably attractive. So, now may be a good time to pursue new investment opportunities, assuming they're appropriate for your individual needs, goals and risk tolerance.
- Be prepared for volatility. The financial markets have their "likes" and "dislikes" — and one thing they don't like is uncertainty. So, despite the fact that the markets stood up pretty well during the shutdown/debt ceiling episode, it's still quite possible that we'll see some volatility in the weeks ahead. To prepare yourself for these potential fluctuations, you'll want to own an appropriate mix of investments — which means you may need to rebalance your portfolio. A diversified portfolio can't guarantee profit or protect against loss, but it can reduce the impact of volatility — and it can help keep you calm, too.
- Be aware of interest rate movements. If the debt ceiling had not been raised, it's highly possible that we would have seen a spike in interest rates, which could have hurt the value of your bonds. (When interest rates rise, investors won't pay full price for existing bonds because they can get newly issued ones at the higher rates.) But even though we avoided this scenario, you'll still need to be on the alert for interest-rate movements over the next several months — especially if the Federal Reserve discontinues its bond-buying program, which is designed to help keep long-term rates low. Still, it's probably not a good idea to totally avoid bonds in anticipation of rising rates, because bonds can help balance your portfolio if stocks were to decline. Nonetheless, keep a close eye on the Fed's actions, and be prepared to make changes if it appears that rates may indeed jump.

Apart from registering your opinion with your elected representatives, you can't control what happens in Washington. But, no matter what political conflicts are taking place, you can control your investment decisions — and you can continue with a strategy that can help you make progress toward your long-term financial goals.

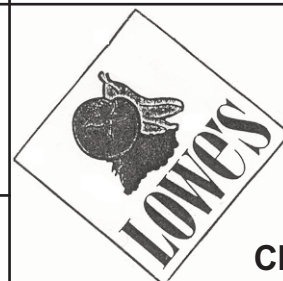
