

Swift Justice Meted Out by Court Friday

Some of the quickest justice that has been administered in this part of Texas in a long time took place at the courthouse in Farwell Friday afternoon. That was the scene where the grand jury returned two criminal indictments against James Robinson, charged with burglary and theft; and Clyde Crabtree, charged with rape.

Robinson, Clovis negro who was taken into custody shortly after robbing the Paul Jones Service Station in Bovina last week, pled guilty as charged, waived the three-day waiting period, and permitted District Judge E. A. Bills to hear his case in a non-jury district session the same day. He was given four years in the state penitentiary.

Crabtree, who also pled guilty to the charge of raping a 9-year-old girl last month south of Farwell, got his case over with

Estimated 550 Wells Now On Natural Gas

Editor's note: During the past year, one of the most noticeable changes in the agricultural industry of Parmer County and near-by areas has been the extension of natural gas lines away from the communities and the "mains" between towns of the communities, into the rural areas.

There, small-size mains, called "feeder lines," have been used

to extend service to hundreds of irrigation well owners in the county, who have tied onto the natural gas facilities.

This article is the result of research between this newspaper and Pioneer Natural Gas Company of Lubbock, and The Tribune gratefully acknowledges the cooperation received from the Company.

Beginning with a mere trickle, the number of irrigation wells in Parmer County operated on natural gas for fuel has soared to a figure somewhere around 550 in the past 12 months.

That is over one-third of the total number of wells within the county.

Pioneer Natural has installed 45.9 miles of "feeder" lines into

quickly, too. He waived the waiting period as Robinson had done and permitted a jury to be selected at random during the same day. The jury returned a verdict of guilty and he was assessed 10 years in the pen.

Purple Heart Given For Lonnie Parker

Mr. and Mrs. C. A. White of Oklahoma Lane and Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Wojinski and children of Clovis were in Roswell recently to attend the Armed Forces Day Retreat review held at Walker Air Force Base.

Mrs. Lonnie Parker, daughter of the Whites and a sister of Mrs. Wojinski, received the Purple Heart from Brig. Gen. Thomas C. Musgrave, Jr. Mrs. Parker's seven-year old daughter, Janet, was presented the Air Medal from Gen. Musgrave. The awards were made posthumously to the late Lt. Lonnie Parker, and received in his behalf by his widow and daughter.

Lt. Parker was reported missing from an air flight during the war and has been officially declared as dead.

Mrs. Ivy Parker of Mercedes, California, mother of Lt. Parker, came for the ceremony and remained for a visit with her daughter-in-law. Mrs. Parker was well known in Farwell before her marriage.

Wheat Harvest Rolls into Action

The first loads of Parmer County's golden wheat rolled into the elevators last weekend and the first of this week, a trifle earlier than had been expected by most grain men.

Cool weather up until about 10 days ago was thought to have slowed up the maturing of the wheat considerably, but the hot, windy days during the past week changed the picture entirely. The fields did their green-to-yellow transformation in an amazingly short period of time.

The first loads for the county rolled into Bovina and Friona last Saturday. Leland Ivy of the Lazbuddie Community unloaded at Sherley Grain in Bovina part of his cuttings from 120 acres of Early Wichita.

His dryland wheat was running from 7½ to 10 bushels an

acre. G. D. Anderson Jr. of the Company estimated that the wheat in the Bovina area would exceed last year's crop.

The first load delivered to Bovina Wheat Growers also arrived on Saturday. It was brought in by E. V. Isham and sons, who farm 1½ miles east of Bovina.

They have harvested about 40 acres of dryland wheat that is yielding around four bushels per acre. The Ishams brought in the first load at Wheat Growers last year, also, the time having been June 17.

A. C. Teeter, manager, says the report is out that Parmer County is expected to produce about a million bushels of wheat this year, but he feels that the harvest will be somewhat under that figure. It should beat last year's 500,000-bushel total, however, he thinks.

On Tuesday, the first wheat went into Black Grain Company. O. B. Roberson, four miles east of that community, brought in two loads that were from cuts yielding about 35 bushels per acre, irrigated.

The moisture was 12.29, and the variety of the wheat Early Wichita. First wheat at Black Grain last year was June 12.

D. C. McWhorton, operator, went along with most other grain men in the area when he said he imagined that the yield on the 1954 wheat harvest will exceed that of last year.

There are about 90,000 acres of wheat in the county, and of this amount about 15,000 acres are under irrigation. Irrigated wheat is expected to yield about 25-30 bushels per acre on a county-wide basis.

Dryland wheat will probably run somewhere around 4-7 bushels per acre. At these figures, it is not likely that the county will manage to produce its hoped-for million bushels of wheat, but optimists point out that the harvest in 1953 far exceeded most pre-harvest predictions, and the same thing may happen again this year.

In any event, interested persons won't have long to wait as the harvest promises to be a short one if the weather holds hot and dry.

Scattered Hail Damages Wheat, Cotton, Row Crop

Hail, scattered but deadly in some spots, rattled along in the wake of a severe, short windstorm that blew up from the southwest Tuesday afternoon.

Most of the damage was confined to an area south and east of Farwell and around the Rhea community in northern Parmer County. Earl Booth reported heavy damage to young crops six miles south of Farwell; on south and to the east, damage also was reported in the West Camp area.

The report was out that Harold Lillard, northwest of Friona, suffered 100 percent damage; and hail was heavy around the Anthony and Phipps places in that area.

North of Bovina about 15 miles, Jack Woltman and Glenn Hromas were reported to have been damaged by hail also.

Reports were that Verney Towns, southeast of Lariat, suffered extensive damage to the roof of his home, and also had his pickup and a car "all beat up" by large hailstones. Clark Billingsley had a car damaged, too.

Charles Felts at Lariat said that hail in that community was light locally, but in the outlying areas it had been pretty severe. He said that he heard that Alvin Mace was in town shortly after the storm with a disphen full of hailstones as large as baseballs.

Eastward toward Oklahoma Lane the hail was bad in spots. Some spotted crop damage was reported, and Murrell Rundell was said to have been another car owner who came out on the short end of the stick with the storm.

Little moisture was received with the storm, although a dashing rain fell for a few minutes. Rainfall at Farwell was reported at .06 an inch. A quarter-inch estimate was made for the Bovina area.

Absentee Patrons Can Cast Ballots

Announcement was made this week that persons who plan to be gone when the special election for Farwell Schools is held June 19 can vote at any time between now and that date.

To vote absentee, they must obtain ballots from the office of the county clerk at the courthouse.

The election will be on a proposal to permit the school to sell \$115,000 in bonds to finance building a new gymnasium and band hall.

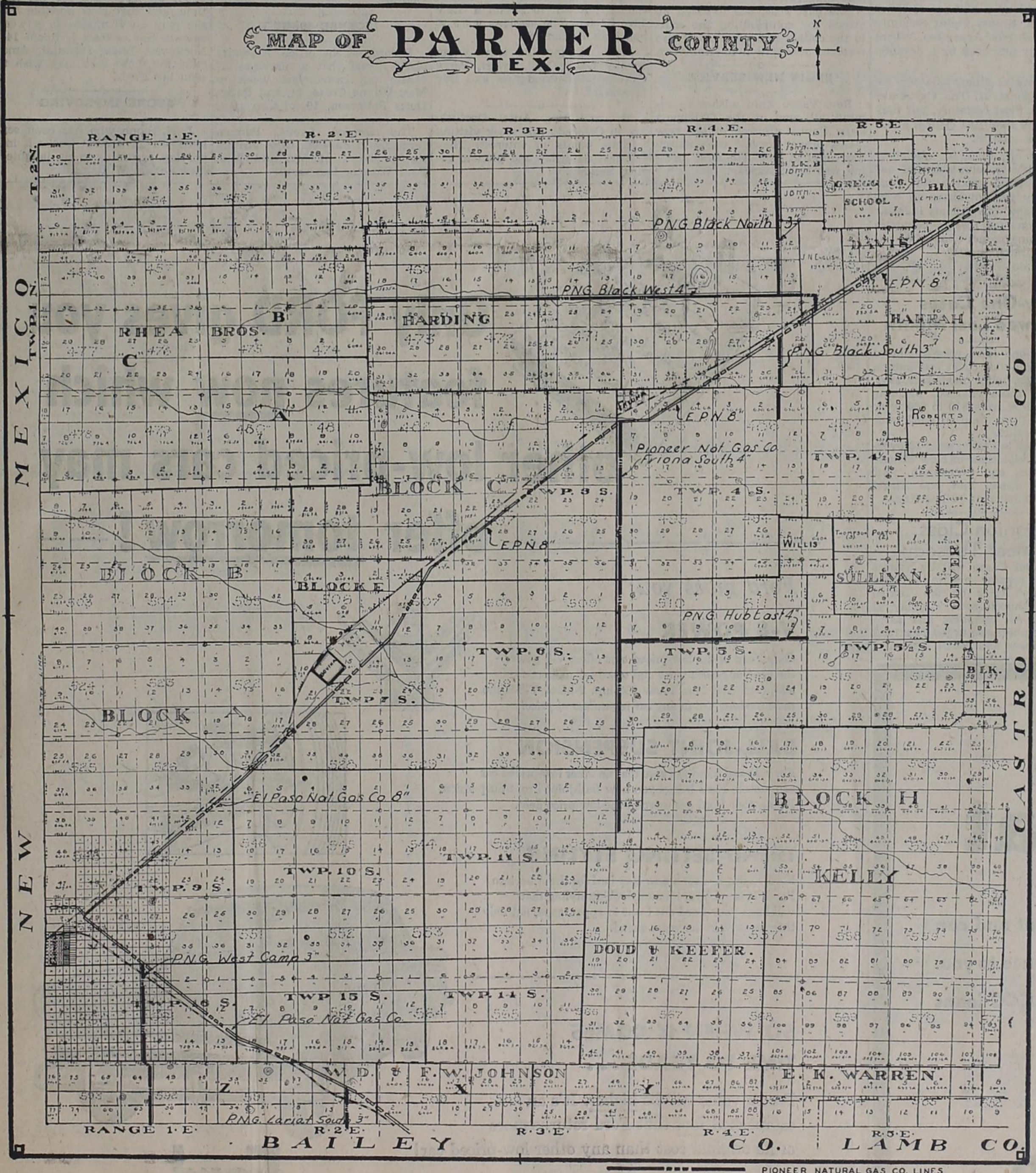
TWO DRUNKS FINED

By looking closely, you should be able to see the seven natural gas "feeder" lines that are in Parmer County (including two that originate in the county but extend into Bailey). In the upper right hand corner can be seen the three lines going north, west and south of Black. From Friona is a line going south to the Hub, and one from the Hub eastward toward Castro County. Southeast of Farwell can be

seen the start of the West Camp line; also part of a line going south from Lariat. The legend at the lower right of the map indicates ownership of the lines. THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

More Than Just Candidates To Be Voted On This Year

We notice in a neighboring weekly newspaper, the Ralls Banner, that the voters of Texas will be faced with a number of things just as important to them as electing local and state officials when they go to polls this November 2.

Some eleven amendments to the state constitution will face every Texas voter on that day, and they are things that should not be taken too lightly, because they could have far-reaching effects if enacted.

Editor Joiner of the Banner points out that there will be a proposed amendment to raise the ceiling on state spending for old age pensions and other public aid from \$35 million to \$42 million a year.

Other proposed amendments include a proposal to make all services to the state of teachers and state employees count in computing retirement benefits;

To extend social security to state the local government employees; to create a state building fund; to increase salaries of state officials; to raise the pay of legislators from \$10 to \$25 per day;

To prohibit credit of the state from being pledged for toll road bonds; to make women eligible for jury service; to provide for four year terms, instead of two, for elective district, county, and precinct offices;

To create hospital districts in large counties; to permit Texans in military service to vote; to permit counties with less than 10,000 population to create a separate office of assessor-collector of taxes.

Brother, there's dynamite in more than just one of those! The tragedy of it is that since this is not a national election year, poll tax payments are really not "up to snuff" and comparatively few Texans will have a choice in deciding whether they want these changes.

We predict that some people who were lazy and didn't get around to obtaining a poll tax receipt are in for some very sad news when they suddenly realize these great changes that are upon them, and they discover that they won't be able to vote.

Is Isolationism Really An Outdated Theory?

On many occasions we have heard and read conclusive arguments designed to show that it is no longer possible for any one country of the world to think that it can live the cloistered life of the oyster. Great distances have been bridged by revolutionary concepts of transportation.

An ocean, a mountain range, or other natural barrier is no longer a reason for any particular part of the world to be inaccessible. In addition, the argument has been advanced that as economic progress marched on, nations were more interdependent one upon the other for economic support (world trade).

The United States is one country that has whole-heartedly thrown away the book of isolationism, if the modern foreign policy is to be considered as evidence. The lawmakers who have sug-

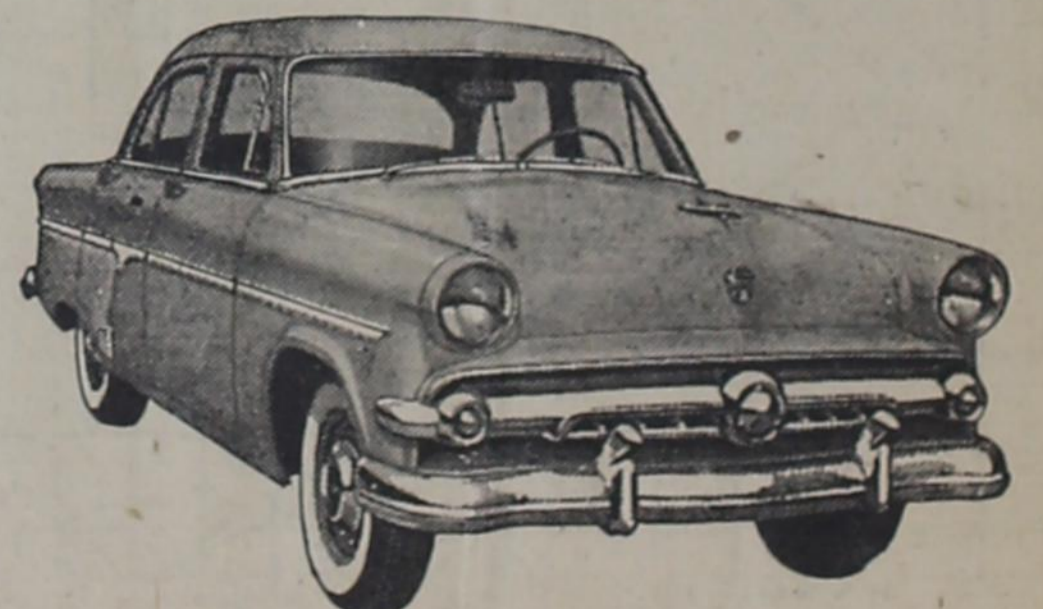
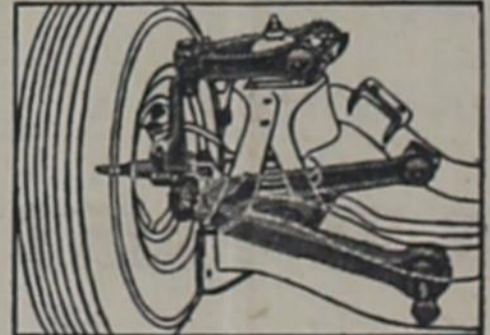

Perry McMinn had a nice patch of vetch that is about ready to plow under. He is planning to follow A. L. Reznick's method of turning it under. A. L. had his vetch seeded on beds. To turn it under he used rolling colters on his lister. Two weeks after A. L. listed his vetch, it was almost completely decomposed. After Perry saw A. L.'s job of listing, he decided that he would try it.

Henry Ivy has a good patch of dryland wheat. I believe it is about as good as any dryland wheat I've seen.

M. A. Black, who lives just north of Friona, is going to plant 15 sacks of Chinese Red and Blackeye cowpeas. He is growing the peas on land that he intends to plant to wheat this fall. He has the idea that we can't just keep taking crops from the soil without replacing something.

Anyone interested in planting vetch or Madrid clover between the rows of your grain sorghum should start looking for the seed and the equipment needed to plant it.

The Parmer County Soil Conservation District still has some vetch seed. Also your local seed dealer will probably handle the

vetch. If you intend to plant Madrid clover, you should start looking for the seed pretty soon.

There seems to be more and more interest in proper water application. We are still laying out bench levelling and row irrigation systems that can give proper water distribution if used according to design.

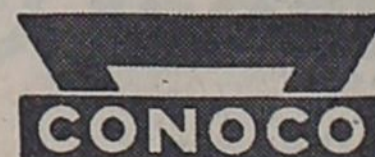

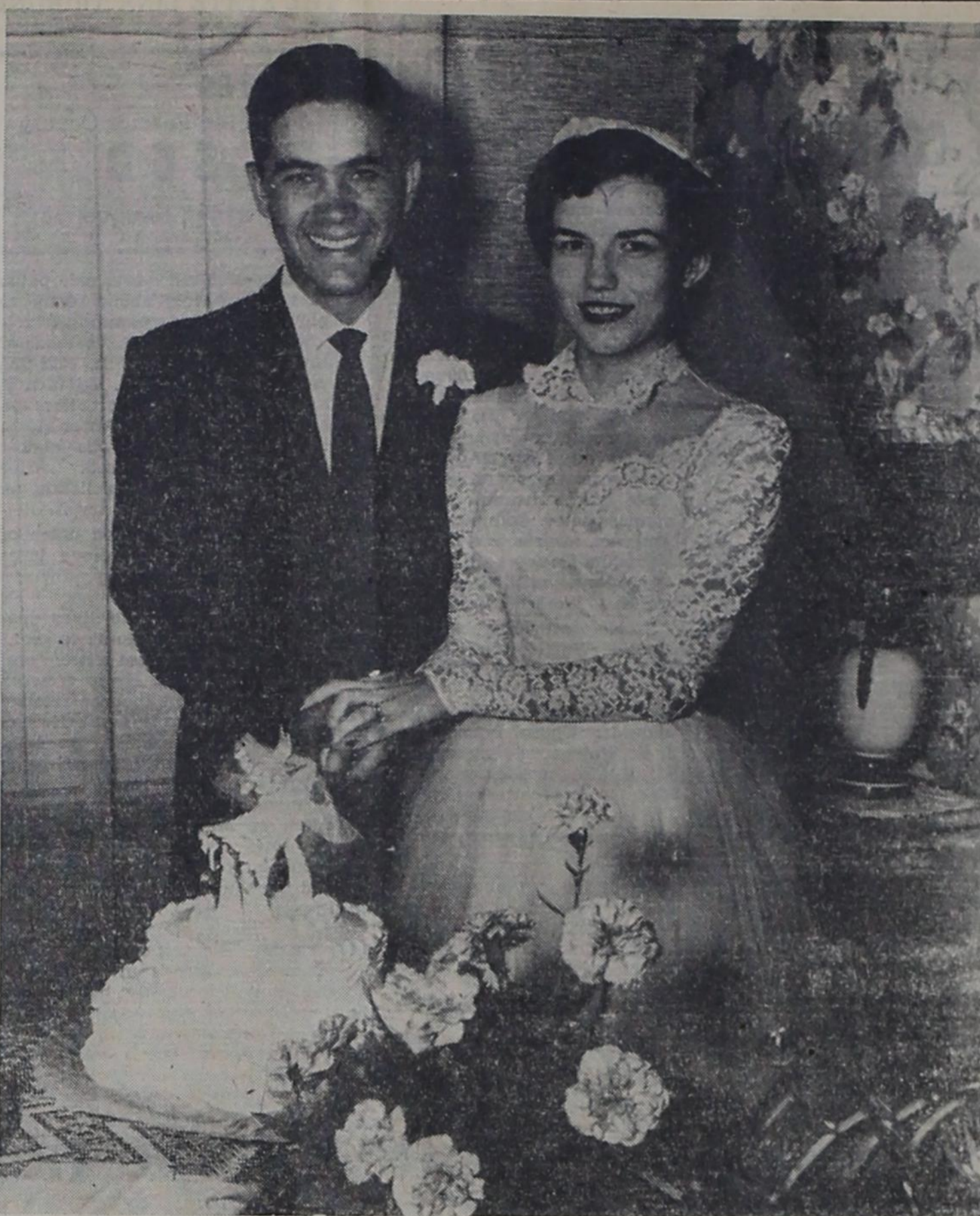

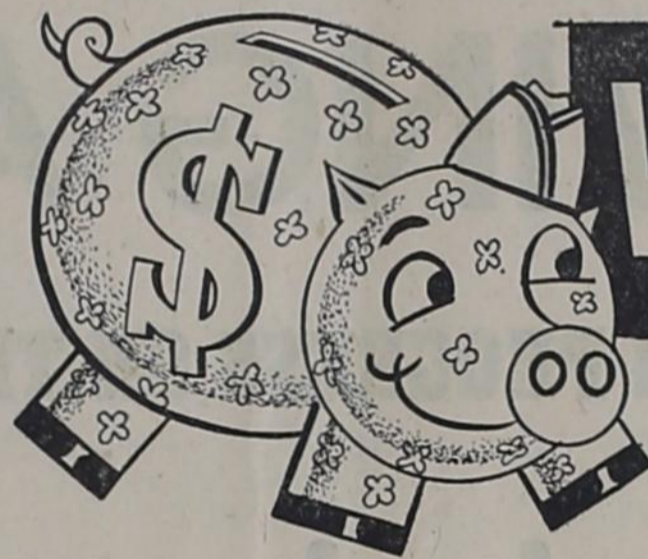

Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

AUSTIN—Texas is moving to clean up its "insurance mess."

A study of reform proposals has been scheduled by the Texas Legislative Council, with a special committee of legislators in charge of the project. Other state agencies will participate.

A. W. Worthy, executive director of the council, said that Lieutenant Governor Ben Ramsey has written to all insurance companies operating in Texas, asking for their cooperation in the study.

Sixty insurance companies have failed in Texas since 1939, Worthy said. The council will look at the records of these companies to see why they went bankrupt.

Another aspect of the council's work will be to examine Texas' insurance laws and recommend "changes to assure a sound and stable insurance industry."

Yarborough's Charges

Ralph W. Yarborough, candidate for governor, charged that there had been "influence peddling" in connection with the insurance situation. Yarborough recommended: "A complete investigation looking into retainers, bank accounts, expense accounts, income tax returns, and excessive personal expenditures of state government officials connected with insurance law administration in Texas."

Insurance News

Nearly everybody got into the insurance show. These included:

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd, who recommended 29 changes in the state insurance laws, including state control over insurance company stock sales.

Chairman Garland A. Smith of the insurance commission, who denounced "blatant untruths and half-truths" in a Time Magazine article. Smith said the magazine was "joining with jealous big Eastern insurance companies in trying to smear the Texas insurance industry."

Good Business

Dr. John R. Stockton of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research says that a trade decline is over and recovery has started.

Business activity rose two percent from March to April in Texas, Dr. Stockton found, representing "a recovery of approximately half of the decline from January, 1953, and January, 1954."

This finding indicates, Dr. Stockton said, "that the decline in business, which has been underway since the spring of 1953, is approaching an end."

Lots of Roads

A construction program for 1955-56, costing about \$211 million, was announced by the state highway commission.

It was the largest program ever approved in Texas.

Involved is the construction of 2,663 miles of roads, but, said commission chairman E. H. Thornton Jr., "it can only eliminate a minor percent of the critical deficiencies of the system."

About \$43 million of the money will go for highways within cities. Thirty of the worst bridges will be repaired or replaced.

Political Scene

State political campaigns opened up, with principal interest in the governor's race.

There, the contenders are incumbent Allan Shivers; Ralph Yarborough, Austin attorney; and J. J. Holmes, Austin contractor.

Yarborough opened up with a speech in which he talked about "the need for integrity in state government and a sound program for the advancement of Texas."

Meanwhile, Austin political observers heard reports from the Rio Grande Valley that national CIO leaders are going all-out in an attempt to defeat Shivers. These reports said that the CIO has put up \$250,000 to finance Yarborough and already had 300 paid workers in the field campaigning against Shivers.

Holmes, who is beginning to step up his pace in the race, says "I'm not mad at anybody. I just want to be governor of Texas."

Shivers' Race

Shivers returning from Korea, said that the thing for Texans to do is to keep our government at home, and not to turn it over to outsiders.

At a press conference, the governor said he expected some opposition from Democrats who supported Adlai Stevenson last time.

Shivers pointed out that he led the fight for Eisenhower because the Republican nominee saw eye-to-eye with him on the tidelands issue, whereas Stevenson thought the tidelands ought to belong to the federal government.

Since the return of the tidelands to Texas a year ago, Shivers said, this state has collected from them about \$32 million in mineral rights, and this money goes to the state school fund.

Lieutenant Governor

Opposing Ben Ramsey for lieutenant governor were State Representative George T. Hinson of Mineola and C. T. Johnson, Austin business man.

Hinson announced in favor of legislation which would require lobbyists to register with the state and force lawmakers to file a list of all the sources and amount of their income.

Johnson plugged what he termed the need for "new men" to strengthen insurance laws for the protection of policy holders. Said Johnson: "It's interesting to see those who have been in a position for years and years to clean up the insurance mess suddenly getting stirred up about it."

jattin's from jeanne

Mrs. Ralph Humble of Farwell permitted us to use her favorite recipe for pound cake this week. We used to have the pound cakes along with fruit cakes at our house at Christmas, so we highly recommend them.

But Mrs. Humble has a new idea for decorating this cake, which is not usually iced. She takes a paper lace doily, places it on top of the cake, and generously sprinkles powdered sugar over it. She then removes the doily, leaving the design in sugar.

The cake can also be placed in the deep freeze.

POUND CAKE

3 cups sifted flour
2 cups sugar
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup shortening
4 whole eggs, plus enough milk to make 1 cup

Mix for three minutes at medium speed on the mixer, or 150 hand strokes. Scrape bowl frequently.

Then add
1/4 cup milk
1 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.
Beat 3 more minutes. Add nuts if desired.

Pour into 9-in. tube pan, 4 in. deep. Bake 325° F. for 1 1/4 hours.

Loyde Brewer has handed us "Polio Pointers for Parents for 1954" issued by the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis, which might be of note for all of us.

With gamma globulin being tested in polio epidemic areas, as polio protection, caution is just as important as in the past.

Until an effective vaccine is available for general use, we must continue to expect epidemics of polio, according to this pamphlet. If polio should strike here, precautions to avoid the fearsome disease are:

1. Keep children with their usual companions; don't take them in crowds.

2. Avoid fatigue and chilling. This means adults too.

3. Following the doctor's advice about mouth and throat operations.

4. Teach children to wash hands carefully before eating and after going to the toilet. Don't use another's soiled towels, dishes or tableware.

5. Tell the doctor if those symptoms appear: headache, fever, sore throat, upset stomach, stiff neck or back. Put sick person to bed promptly.

6. Remember—at least half of all polio patients get well without any crippling.

7. Get in touch with your local Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis if you need help for a polio patient.

Wheat Received Here Saturday

The first load of 1954 wheat was received at the Continental Grain Company in Friona the past Saturday morning at 11:45. Manager G. (Preach) Cranfill reported this week.

The cutting came from the farm of R. F. Talley, and tested 58.8, Cranfill said. He added that some 60 bushels was in the load which was cut from irrigated wheat.

Asked as to the approximate yield, as estimated with this initial cutting, Cranfill said that he did not have that information on Monday. A premium for the first load will be paid, he added.

The first wheat delivered to Friona Wheat Growers was brought in Monday by Russell O'Brian, 12 miles southeast of Friona near the Lakeview community.

His irrigated wheat was yielding 15 bushels to the acre. He reported that his wheat had been damaged by the late freeze, which could have accounted for the early maturity. O'Brian received a \$25 premium for his load, said Arthur Drake, manager.

Plenty of Storage
The storage question was raised, and Drake replied that he was sure there would be plenty of storage in town for the current crop, pointing out that a good deal of grain stored in local elevators last fall had been cleared out to make room for the new harvest.

Actually, there is not a great deal of wheat in the immediate Friona territory, observers report. And, it looks like harvest should get underway in good style within the next ten days or so, judging

by reports from various farmers.

Just how the yield will run is questionable. Some wheat which shows an apparent beautiful, full stand was damaged by heat and the heads actually have no wheat in them, observers report. Other good spots have been neatly harvested by scattered hail flurries.

Farmers are not idle while they wait for their wheat to ripen, however, with the majority being engaged in getting feed grain plantings into the ground. Drake said that one day recently his elevator put out some 300 sacks of maize, which will cover a lot of acreage.

Fire Does Damage to Rule Home Sunday

Fire which apparently originated around a floor furnace did considerable damage to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Rule, Sunday night, and would have done more damage but for pure happenstance.

The Rules were away from home at the time. Mrs. A. E. Taylor, mother of Mrs. Rule, "just happened" to drop in at the home to pick up something she had left and discovered the fire, with the alarm being turned in at 9:15.

Firemen quickly responded to the call and the blaze, which was just threatening to go up the inside walls, was quickly brought under control. Glenn Sparkman, of the department, said Monday that indications were that the fire had been caused by all or part of a birdnest dropping down into the vent from the furnace. The furnace vent, incidentally, is capped but not screened against birds.

Most damage was sustained to the floor around the furnace, and Dan Ethridge, insurance adjustor, reported that a quick estimate on Monday would set the loss at around \$1,000. The carpet, sustained water and fire damage, he added.

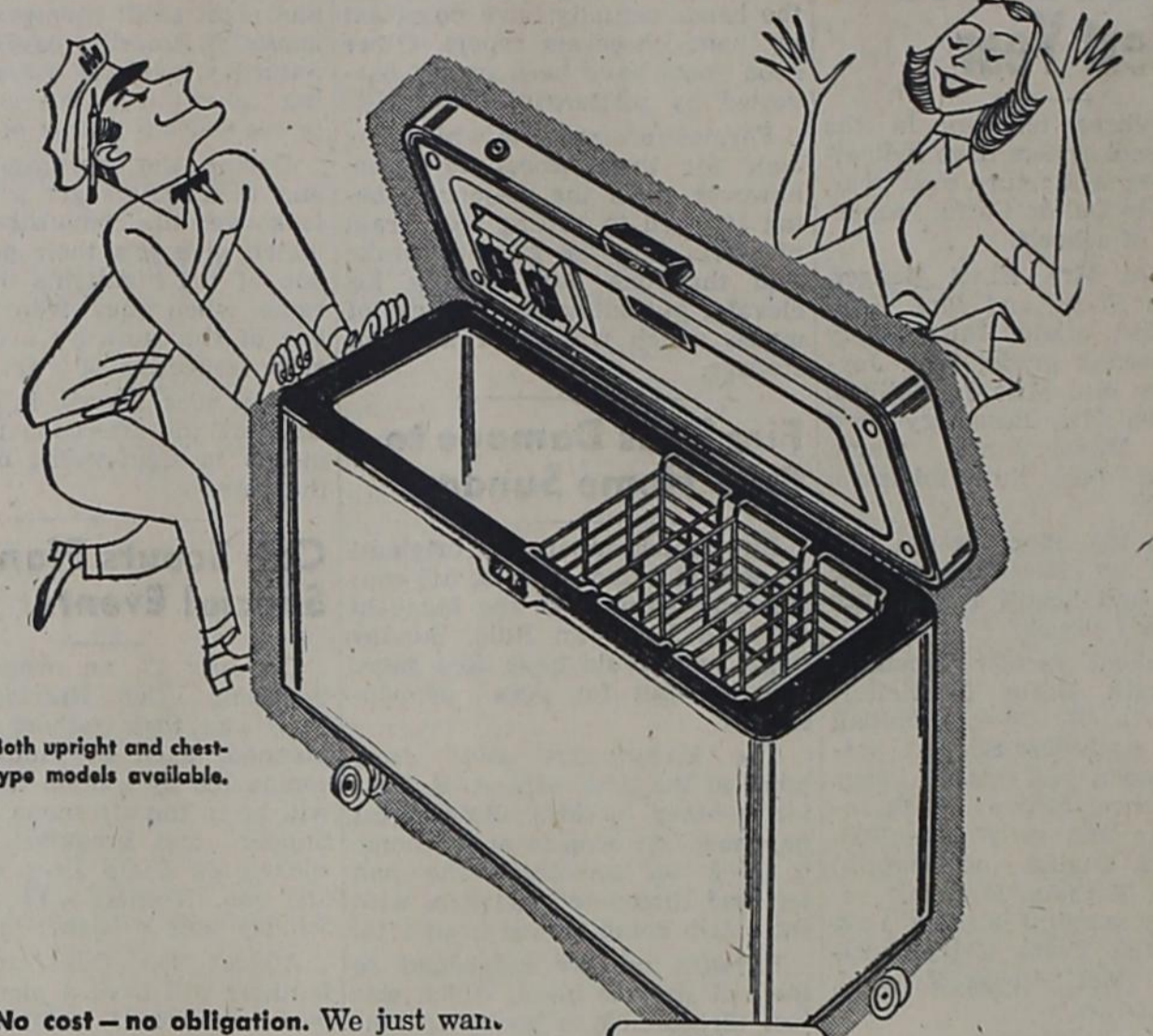

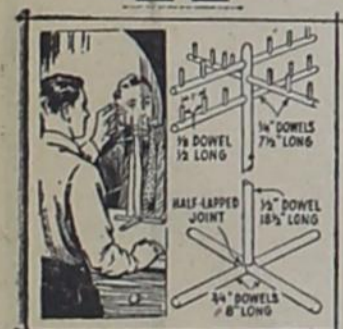

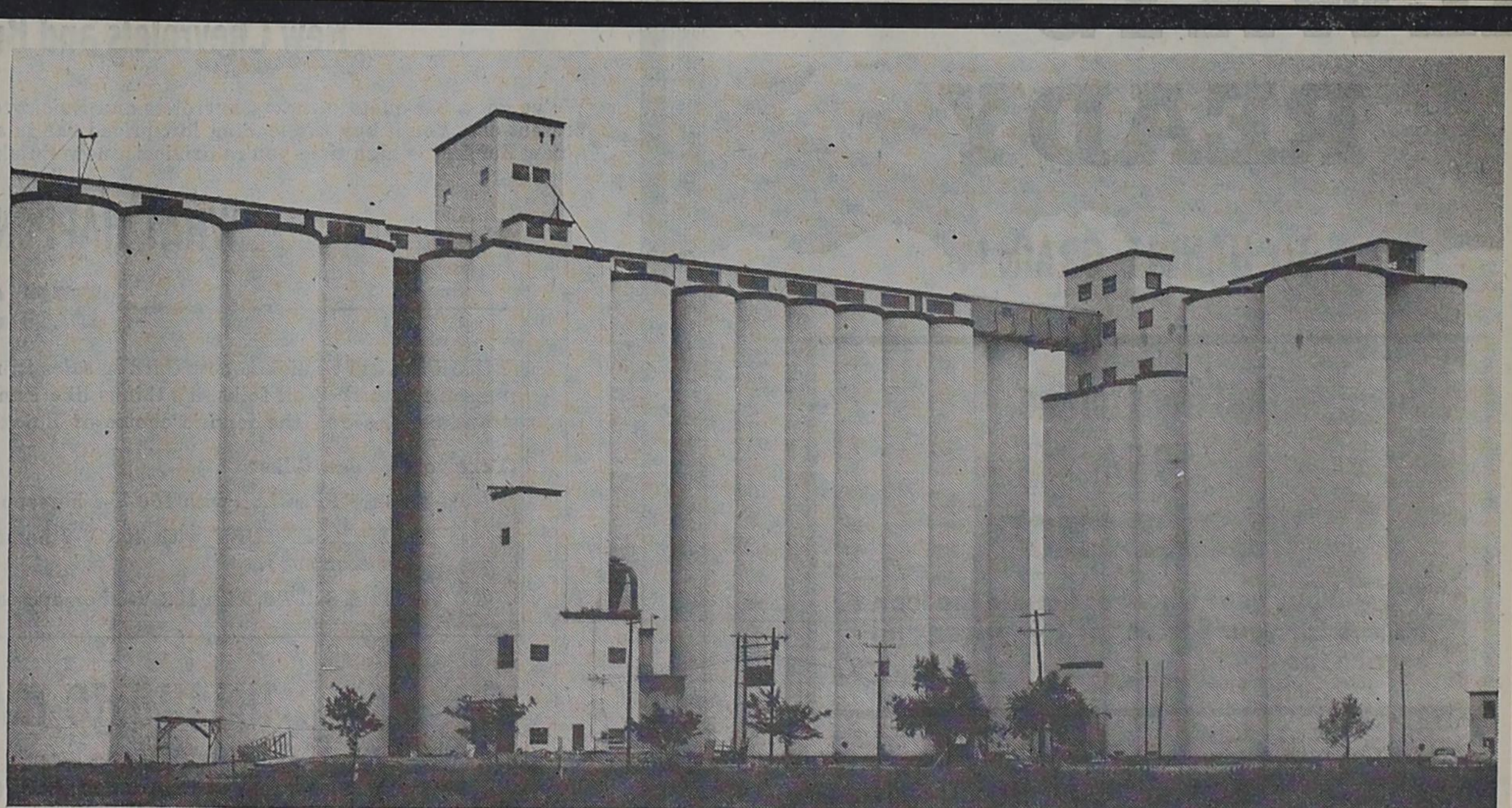

Farm Bureau was instrumental in gaining reinstatement of this provision last week. If you like this provision, we believe you will keep your dues current for several years to come without it costing you anything.

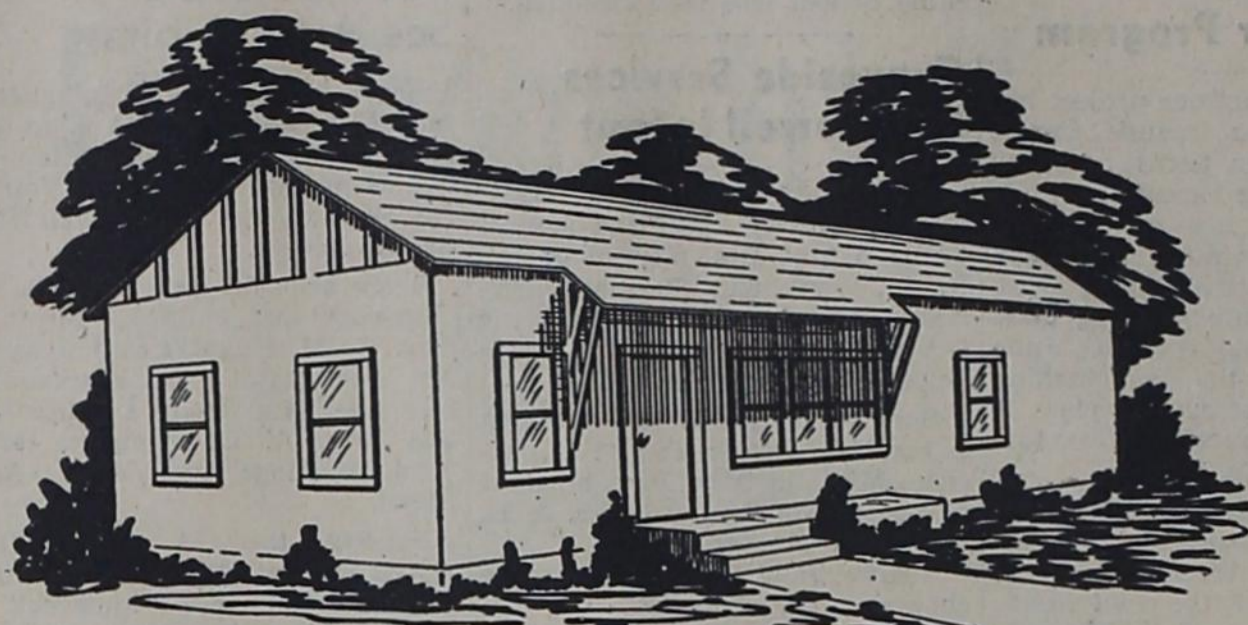

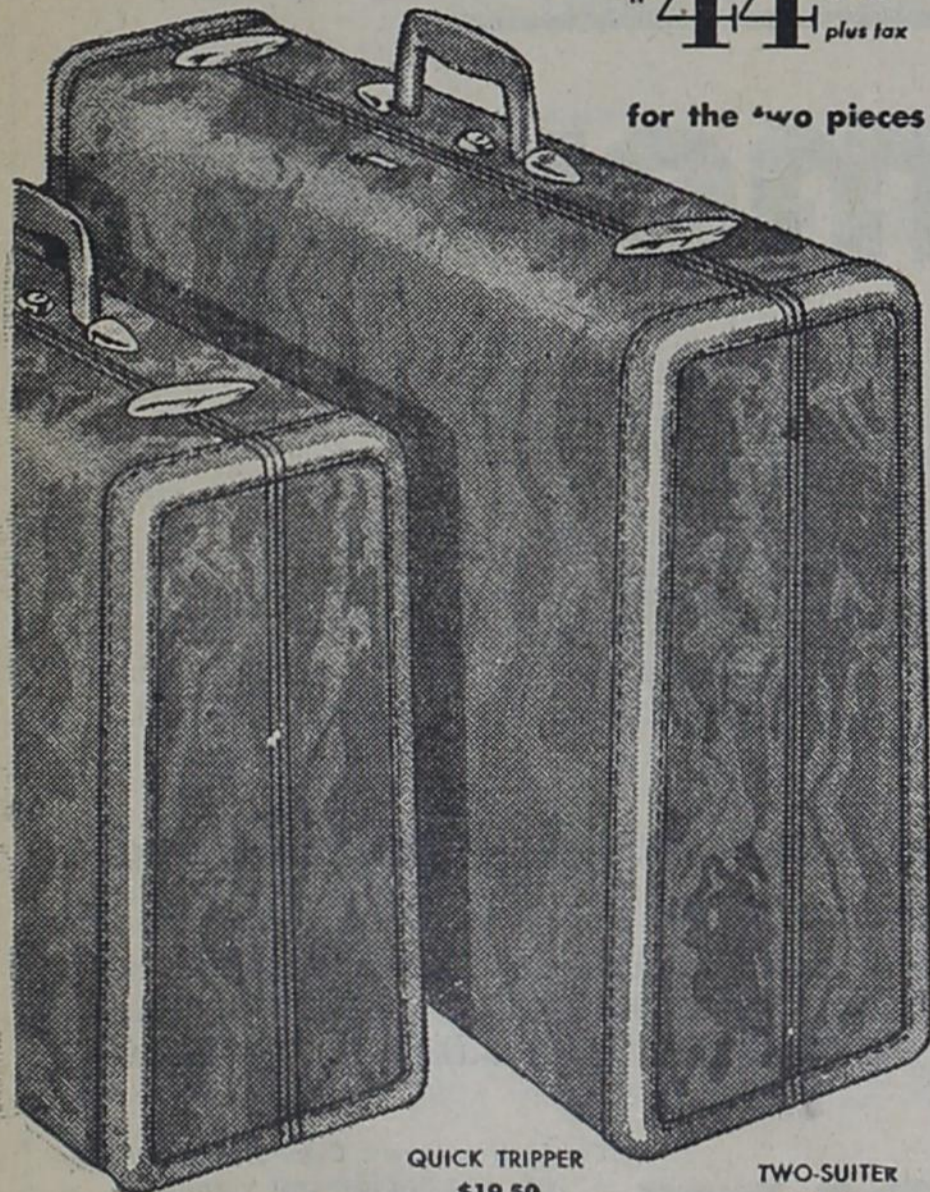
