Manufacturers are largely protected by "administered prices", or shutting down production by when the demand for its products is low. The farmer, on the other hand has not as yet been able to come up with an organization or system for maintaining farm prices. Nor is there such a few farmers yet that their leaders may fit production to market needs and hold up profits.

If the farmer cannot use unions, government regulations, or administered prices, what must he do? When improved machinery and modern know how make unlimited production a price beyond anything ever known before, something should be done.

Some people look at our big crops and surpluses and say that production controls have failed, but who knows what our surplus would have been without the controls. Except for cotton, tobacco, and possibly one or two other crops, there has never been a real effort to control production. Wheat controls have been haphazard and the corn program has been a farce. Farmers Union stands for a strong program for all farmers which will assure a parity of income .-- Bill Wooley

"The age limit was recently reduced from 65 to 60. A person to be exempt because of the riper ages must have been 60 before the first of January of 1958.

That's where some of the confusion enters in. Poll taxes are always a year behind and it will actually be the 1958 tax that'll be paid to vote this year. Poll taxes can be paid at the courthouse in Farwell, or Ethridge-Spring Agency in Friona. Applications are taken at the Bovina city offices.



To give garments their wrin-kle-proof quality, manufacturers impregnate them with resins. All is well until the garment is washed in water containing a bleach and then exposed to heat. Heat releases the chlorine and often causes a sparkling white shirt or blouse to turn any number of colors and the fabric loses strength. The culprit is not the bleach, but the type of resin used. To retain the original color of

your wash-and-wear garments, or cool water for washing and

rinsing. 2-For heavily soiled children's and sports clothing, use hot or warm water, but keep the washing time short-not more than 5 minutes.

-If you wash these garments in your washer, do not pack it too full.

-Be selective in choosing the things you wash together. -Do not allow cleaned or dried

wash-and-wear clothing to re-main in the washer or dryer too long. If you have a dryer, a wel-

come appliance for wash-andwear fabrics, don't overdry. If your dryer has a washand-wear setting, use it. If not, use a medium heat or a short-dry setting. Recently a reader inquired as

to how she can remove or con-trol the scale which forms on the side of her washer.

The use of synthetic detergent will help to a certain extent. A very effective solution is treating the wash water with 1 teaspoon of household lye to every 5 gal-lons of water. By softening the water you will use less soap, prevent build-up of scale, and prolong the life of your washing se on aluminum parts.
