But show us some poor man who is cutting down on the amount of money he makes so he won't have to pay so much income tax and we'll buy the drinks. Had a conversation with a fellow over Christmas who pointed out that a lot of that income tax money is being used to "shoot the moon." He wasn't really complaining about that, but he said he wished, if they were going to use his money to shoot the moon, that they would hit it once in a while astead of just shooting at it ill the time. ### Snow, Cold Covers Area


Some three inches of snow and sub-freezing temperatures greeted the area Monday.





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
