THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

These Amendments Are Vital; Don't Forget November 2

There are 11 proposed amendments to the constitution of the State of Texas which will stare voters in the face on Tuesday, November 2, when they go to the polls in another general election. It is certainly too bad that there are so few races to draw the general public's interest, because it is quite probable that the election will have very light participation from voters.

The "sleeper" in this general election for Texans is the long list of proposed constitutional amendments. As promised eight weeks ago, The Tribune intends to publish its appraisals of the proposals in the hope that voters will become interested in what's about to happen to them. It matters little to us whether you agree with our viewpoint or not. The point is, we want you to think things through for yourselves.

Because it would take entirely too much space to discuss the amendments in one paper, we are starting our analysis ahead of time, and will consider a few in each of the three issues preceding the election. We sincerely hope you will follow along with us, as there are some issues which may possibly affect us more than we suspect at the present time, in this ballot. Here are our views on four of the 11 amendments:

NUMBER 7-Permitting women to serve on juries. Here, indeed, is a warm subject, and one worthy of thought. There are now only five states, all of them in the South (besides Texas) which do not permit women to sit in the jury box. Texas voters turned thumbs down on this same proposal five years ago. How come?

According to those who oppose this amendment that would grant this privilege to women, we find these reasons: No courthouse in the state is equipped with separate facilities for keeping a mixed jury overnight, as is oftentimes necessary in criminal cases. Special exemptions for women will be necessary because of household duties. Women tend to be "soft-hearted" and shy away from prosecuting criminals in a manner befitting the magnitude of their crimes.

As for the last claim, our only comment would be that its author doesn't know his oats. Any man who has ever run up against a woman's notion of what is right (and most of us have), know that they can be exceedingly firm. On that count at least, we think there's little cause to worry.

If the ladies want to serve on juries, it's okay with us. We'll encourage it. After a couple of rounds in the box, they will discover that it's no pleasure cruise, and that the spicy detail cases that sometimes fall upon their ears will not be adequate recompense for the agonies of listening to gusty orations from highly paid lawyers who will attempt to make saints out of crusty sinners. No sir, after a few cases, they'll be as full of excuses for getting out of jury service as are the men!

Evenso, women now enjoy the privilege of helping make the laws in the legislature, helping to enforce them in our policing organizations, and helping to interpret them in any court in the state. Why, then, should they be denied jury duty? Let 'em have it if they want it!

NUMBER 8-Providing for four-year terms of offices for district, county, and precinct officials. This is a tricky one. We have just received a bulletin from the Texas Federation of District, County and Precinct Officials that says they are for the amendment. This is hardly a big surprise, as any person working for others would be expected to favor four-year contracts over two-year contracts.

The Federation argues, however, and not without some merit, that the county and district offical lives a very uneasy life, having to go out and whip up a campaign every other year. It's a big financial burden, they claim, in addition to interrupting his

Well, let us hark back to the constitution of the state. The fathers of Texas thought that the voters ought to vote on the candidates at least every two years. That was a fundamental protection which the constitution afforded to the people. Corruption has much less chance to grow where there is "turned inside out." Just ask Ralph Yarborough.

Texas has traditionally maintained this practice on the grounds that those away in the service could not be expected to be properly informed on matters pertaining to state and local issues. In addition, past legislators have been fearful of the danger of allowing military votes to dominate civilian af-

There is no fear of either in the modern day. In the first place, the solder is oftentimes far better informed in pertinent issues than are his friends back at home. As to the matter of military block voting, there need be no fear, because it is proposed that the soldier be required to vote absentee in the county from which he came. This would split up the vote and take from it the danger of military

We're strongly pushing this amendment, especially since nearly all of our young men are sooner or later compelled to serve in the military.

NUMBER 11-To allow counties of fewer than 10,000 population to elect an assessor-collector of taxes if they want to. This is another amendment that we the strong for.

One thing that has caused farmers to shy away from soybeans has been their tendency to "shatter" before the entire field was ready for harvesting. In other words, as the bottom of the plant matured earlier than the top part, the pods were likely to become dried out, brittle, and would pop open, spilling the beans to the ground where they could not be

recovered. Lee says that new varieties of beans have avoided this tendency in a large measure. However, he added that when the beans were ready to harvest, he would be ready too, and not waste any time in getting them

Special equipment is not needed for the harvesting operation. Outside of a few adjustments of the straw racks, little needs to be done on combines already being used for milo, says Lee.

Lee, who like many other farmers received big acreage reductions in cotton, says he isn't ready to go into the soybean business on a big scale, but he may see the day when he will have to, and




