All in all, most farmers seem to Thursday, think it will take a much more severe freeze to put a stop to growth so that combining and cotton stripping can get underway. The grain, of course, is far ahead of the cotton at the present time so far as the portion of it which has been harvested is concerned.

We would appreciate some advice on whether to consider Oct. 14 as our first freeze for the fall of 1954. We can't quite decide, ourselves.

# THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

## Continuing Our Review Of Constitutional Amendments

NUMBER 1-Permitting the legislature to increase spending for old age assistance, aid to the blind, and aid to dependent children from \$35,000,000 to \$42,000,000 per year; and requiring that names of recipients be made available to the public.

Most of us agree that those needy persons on assistance programs of one sort or another have found their monthly checks lagging far behind the acceleration of higher costs of living, and most of us would gladly increase money available to these people.

Yet, we seriously question whether the first part of the proposed amendment under discussion would do the job. The maximum available to individuals will not be increased by the amendment. That is to say, the \$7,000,000 increase proposed would likely help very few needy persons on the rolls-it would merely make it possible to admit more to them.

It is healthy for the country to have several agencies trying to do the same job at once, and that is the case in which our State Department of Public Welfare finds itself, as its purposes parallel those of the federal social security program in many

The trend has been to transfer more and more people from state rolls to the federal rolls. It strikes us that the reverse would be the better, but the fact is that there is no advantage to be gained by enlarging two systems for one purpose. One system should retire from the field.

The amendment is not likely to increase benefits to those who now receive aid, and at the same time will add to the duplication already existing in the assistance field. Even though we favor the part of the amendment which would make names of recipients available to the public, we shall vote against the amendment.

NUMBER 3-Would authorize the legislature to make agreements between the state and federal governments to obtain federal social security coverage for "proprietary" employees of its political subdivisions.

This is a minor point, but it would remove an inequity that exists in some counties. Our county officials tell us that there are no "proprietary" employees in Parmer County, and that all employees are already participating in the Social Security program through a special agreement with the state and federal government.
