The First World War was very much in evidence in the paper, even though community weeklies don't cater to national coverage. The Texas State Bank was urging people to buy Liberty Bonds. There was a story about local boys stationed at Camp Travis.

B. N. Graham was running for re-election as county and district clerk, and F. J. Doose was advertising his cleaning service at the Murphy Hotel in

The USDA was in the news in those days, too. They were urging farmers to "save the hens." Here's what it was all about: 'Every laying hen sold from the farms for meat before the first of May means a loss of about 30 eggs to the food supply of the nation.

"These eggs are valuable food, manufactured largely 10 PAGES from insects, weeds, and grass, garbage and waste. The eggs therefore are almost wholly a net gain in human food, Moreover, the hen is just as good meat after she has lain these eggs as before. Save the hens."

There was an ad offering for sale 960 acres of good land for less than \$20 an acre. R.C. Hopping was looking for some strayed cattle. J. M. Barnes and J. H. Aldridge were running



Methodist Open House Is Sunday Afternoon

Sunday afternoon at 3 p. m. dedication ceremonies will be held in Farwell at the new Hamlin Memorial Methodist Church building, located in the 300 block of South Fifth Street. Regular services will be held Sunday morning in the old church building in Texico.

Dr. W. R. Houston, District Superintendent from the Clovis District, will be guest speaker, and will give the opening message on "Completeness Found In Christ."

Other items on the program will be a prepared dedication service from the Methodist Book of Worship, the church history by Rev. Bill Hardwick, present church pastor; and special musical selections by the church choir.

From 4 to 6 p. m. open house will be held in the building, with members of the Wesleyan Service Guild serving tea during this

Eighty-five hundred square feet of floor space will be in use in the building which is the first phase of the Methodist building program.

The building houses eight classrooms, an audio visual room, two equipment rooms, four restrooms, parlor, kitchen and fellowship hall.

For the present time the fellowship hall, which is built to seat 200 persons, will be used for a sanctuary until that phase of the building is added later.

The building is centered around an open court which will allow a maximum amount of light for classrooms and hallways. Refrigerated air and central forced air heating will be used in controlling temperature in the building.








This is the brick two-story building which served the congregation from 1926 until now. It has been inadequate to serve the needs of the church for a number of years. It is located a block north of the highway in Texico.



This is the church as it looks today. This is the first of a two-phase program which will provide complete educational and worship facilities for Methodists in Texico-Farwell. The building is located on Fifth Street in Farwell. At the right is a view of one of the classrooms in the educational wing. Classrooms such as these will overcome the seriously crowded conditions that have existed for some time in the Sunday school.





Probably no part of the new building brings more comment than the modernly appointed parlor shown in the center picture of this column. It is in the northeastern part of the building. (Below) This is the fellowship hall, which will be used for a sanctuary until the addition containing the permanent auditorium can be built. Movable chairs will be used.

A HISTORY OF METHODISM IN TEXICO-FARWELL

Methodism was established in Texico-Farwell in 1904 with the appointment of Rev. Joe Hedgepeth as pastor. The New Mexico Mission Conference met in Albuquerque under the leadership of Bishop E. E. Hass and Texico's charge was

placed in the El Paso District.

The first church building was built in the S. A. Temple Addition of Texico where Highway 84 and the Pleasant Hill road intersect. This building was a frame building planked with rough lumber and stripped to keep out the wind and dust. It was 30' wide and 44' long, contained 29 pews and would seat 100 people.

The building was heated by a pot bellied stove. A tworoom rough lumber frame parsonage was bought next door to the church (north) for \$350. A year later a family claimed the property and for an additional \$450 gave the church a

quit claim deed.

During these first years the church was a constant recipient of mission money from the Section of Church Extension and the Woman's Home Mission Board.

By 1908 a rather unhealthy moral situation had developed in the nearby neighborhood and church officials decided to move the building to a new location.

In April of 1908 the church building was moved to the present location in eastern Texico. Two lots were purchased for \$650 and in 1922 two additional lots were given the church by A. L. King. By 1910 the church was known as Texico-Farwell Methodist Episcopal Church and was growing steadily. In 1909 K. K. Runnels contracted to remodel the church by

adding a T shaped room 14 x 28 and a 9 x 9 bell tower "not less than 50' high" for \$499.15 plus painting the roof. Rev. Abe Mulkey, founder of the Waco Methodist Home for

Children, preached a revival here in 1910. A picture taken at that time showed a strong and healthy church.

The drouths from 1912-1920 played havoc with this area and many of the people left for other locations. Records of the church are blank from 1910 to 1928 but a summary of the church showed that a strong and dedicated nucleus of Methodists were working hard at building the kingdom of God here.

On a cold Sunday morning in February 1926 a faulty flue resulted in the total loss of the church building and equipment. The official board and pastor, Rev. W. B. Gillian, met amid the smoking ruins that afternoon and began planning the building of a new church.

A contract was let for \$10,450 on July 8, 1926 for a new building. The contractor abandoned the project Nov. 1, 1926, and the building stood unused and uncompleted until March of 1927. The building was completed at a total cost of \$12,-326.25 and services held there in the summer of 1927. It has been in constant use since that time.

While the building was under construction the congregation met and worshiped in the district courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse.

The name of the church was changed in August 1929 to Hamlin Memorial Methodist Church in tribute to the leadership, service and influence of J. M. Hamlin. In 1930 Bishop H. A. Boaz

dedicated the church while the Rev. J. L. Chunn was pastqr. The beginning of the present building program is rather nebulous. Since 1945 there has been a sense of need for more adequate room and facilities for the church. Rev. R. C. Cantrell held a church conference in the spring of 1957 and the congregation voted to build a new plant on a new site.

In May 1957 Rev. William Hardwick was appointed to Texico-Farwell and immediately plans were made for carrying out the church conference recommendations. The final authority was given in November 1957 and plans crystallized rapidly after

A building committee composed of J. H. McDonald, Jack Williams, Woodrow Lovelace, W. D. Howard Jr., Sam Aldridge, Elmer Teel, W. H. Graham Jr., Joe Helton and Paul

Wurster was elected. A financial campaign for \$75,000 was carried out with success. One-half of the 300 block on 5th street in Farwell was donated by H. Y. Overstreet, and plans were drawn from which

field for \$67,744 and construction began immediately The present structure is one-half of the total planned plant. There are 8500 square feet of floor space in the present building.

L. L. Thurston came to the church 10-3-17 and left 10-5-21; H. W. Carter came 10-5-21 and left 10-4-22; C. O. Davis came 10-4-22 and left 10-3-23; W. B. Gilliam came 10-3-23 and left 10-6-26; D. D. Dennison came 10-6-26 and left 10-3-28; J. L. Evans came 10-3-28 and left 10-10-29; J. L. Chunn came 10-10-29 and left 9-3-31; R. L. Butler came 9-3-31 and left 11-25-37.

W. W. Pitman served the church from 11-25-37 to 1938, and E. J. Sloan served from 11-38 to 11-42. Paul H. Tripp came 11-42 and left 10-44; Charles Walker served from 10-44 to 1-46, and Harvey Carroll came in 1946 and left in 1949. Murphy Duncan served from 5-22-49 to 10-50 and Lance Hurst was with the church from 10-50 to 5-18-52. Miller H. Stroup came in May of 52 and left in May of 55. R. C. Cantrell served from May of 55 to 5-16-57. Present pastor

of the church is Rev. Hardwick. Two men from the local church have entered the full time ministry. Walter Hadley is now serving the First Methodist Church at Happy, and J. J. Spurlin served the church at Fabens. Another church worker, B. N. Graham, served as an ordained local deacon during the latter part of his lifetime.

> We won't spoil the newness of the report by saying here just exactly what it contains, but we will hint that the average farmer is going to be surprised at the amount of water he pumped in 1959 -- in spite of the increased natural moisture available.

One thing we would like to pass along in advance is our appreciation to Paul Rettman of the U. S. Geological Survey office out of Plainview, who has been very helpful in supplying us pertinent hydrological information whenever we have requested it.

We watched while Paul took a measurement on a well last week, and had one of those occasional experiences where we feel like thumping ourselves on the head and uttering, "Why, of course. Why didn't we think

The thing that prompted us to this soliloquy was the act of taking the measurement. We have watched before as farmers lowered an electric gadget into their well to establish the water table. Whenever it touched the surface it would short out, close a circuit, and indicate the depth from the surface.

Paul used just a plain steel tape. We stood nearby as he began to reel it off into the casing. 'How deep you think the water is here?" he asked us.

"Two hundred and nine feet,"

we guessed. "Okay," he said, letting the tape whistle down into the dark-

"How are you going to tell whenever you hit the water table?" we queried, thinking maybe he could sense the surface by the feel of the tape. He grinned, "You don't

"Just a minute. There, Shows 215 feet." He noted the marking of the tape to the top of the casing. Then he began to reel the tape in, that big grin

We said nothing. When the end of the tape approached the top of the hole, the solution sunk in on us. There was about 12 feet of the bottom of the tape that was wet. All he had to do was subtract that from 215 and he had the level measured. This he did. Depth to table:

203 feet. Oh well, 209 was a pretty good guess.



In addition to being the best source of calcium, milk is a good source of high-quality protein, needed for growth and replacement of body tissues. Milk also contains vitamins, A, D, and riboflavin.

Whatever age groups you have in your family--babies, teenagers, or adults -- they all need milk daily. Children need 4 cups or 1 quart daily to meet minimum calcium requirements. Adults need a pint of milk to supply the needed cal-

Recent studies show older people need a pint of milk-it's just as important for them as for children. They need the calcium and phosphorus found in milk to keep their bones from becoming fragile. Broken bones are much more serious for older people since recovery is slower. Older people should eat fewer calories and more protein food. Milk is an excellent source of protein.



FREEZING PORK

Storage time for fresh pork in your home freezer should be limited. Frances Reasonover. extension foods and nutrition specialist of Texas A&M, says pork does not keep its quality in frozen storage as long as other meats.

Fresh sausage may be stored in the freezer from one to three months. Other cuts of fresh pork can be stored from three to six months, provided they are packaged properly and held at zero degrees F, or lower.

Fat portions of cured or smoked pork may become rancid if stored longer than a two-month period.

To package pork for the freezer use freezer paper, that is, a moisture vapor resistant material. Fold closely to drive out the air.

Directions for preparation, packaging and storage of foods for the freezer are given in a special bulletin, "Frozen We would like to urge your Foods." You can get a copy from your county home demonstration agent's office.


