## Farmers Will Vote In Referendum 25th

Parmer County farmers have a wheat allotment of 108,404 acres for 1956, it was announced this week by the Parmer County ASC office. This is a reduction of over 8,000 acres from the 1955 allotment of 116,885.

During the past few years, interest in growing wheat has slackened off considerably in Parmer though hardly comparable with the one of 1950, which was 204,000 acres, is expected to satisfy most producers.

Parmer County has not been planting all of its allotted acres.

Perhaps this trend has about run its course, however, and other factors-principally lower cotton allotments and lower grain priceswill revive interest in what in former years was the number one crop of the area.

In fact, as recently as this past fall, there was a certain amount of "scrambling" for wheat allotments, made possible through the release and reallocation provisions, under which unwanted acreage could be turned back to the county ASC committee for others who wanted it. Is it because of better pay elsewhere? We feel that this is partly the answer. Yet, on the other hand, there are many jobs in the small town that Rhea, and Lazbuddie. pay as well as comparable jobs in larger towns.

Is it lack of opportunity? Certainly not! We don't know of a better place in the world for a young man or woman to start out than in a growing small town. In many cases, they will be able to advance as the town advances, where this is not possible in larger places.

We feel that the biggest reason that our children don't stay in the communities which they call home is because we have failed to have a sales program to tell them of the advantages of staying where they are.

Perhaps we feel that it should be perfectly obvious that smaller towns are friendlier; there is less competition; there is more opportunity for

But maybe these things aren't obvious to the loung graduate who looks over a handsomely-printed brochure from an airplace factory, or a wholesale concern, or nicely-typed, personal letter from a big retailer.

Maybe they WOULD stay at home if we'd try to point out a few advantages of our own!





For the third time during the 1955 Legislative session, a new talkathon mark was established by a member of the usually sedate Se-

This time the speaker was Sen. Kilmer Corbin of Lubbock who took 28 hours, 25 minutes against a state water project financing plan.

Previous holder of the record was Sen. Wayne Wagonseller of Bowie. Before that it was Sen. Jimmie Phillips of Angleton.

Corbin was opposing a committee report on Sen. Dorsey Hardeman's proposed constitutional amendment to the \$100,000,000 water program. He was objecting to the threecent ad valorem levy.

Governor Shivers had advocated the plan as a key part of his water conservation legislation. The proposal would set up a six-man board, to be appointed by the Governor. Corbin also contended that the board should be elected, rather than appointed. In objecting to the method of taxation, Corbin said that it would cause dry land farmers to bear the burden of water projects in other districts. Like the other "billibusters," it

1/8 teaspoon pepper

6 frankfurters

1 tablespoon prepared mustard Margarine pats

Cook washed, peeled potatoes with salt in 1 cup boiling water until they can be pierced easily with a fork. Drain and mash. Add margarine, hot milk, and pepper. Beat until smooth and fluffy. Split frankfurters lengthwise, cutting almost but not quite through, so they can be flattened. Spread cut surfaces lightly with prepared mustard. Pile mashed potatoes into each frankfurter, leaving tops rough. Place filled frankfurters on baking sheet or shallow pan. Set under broiler or into moderately hot oven (425° F.) until potatoes are lightly browned and frankfurters heated through, about 12 to 15 minutes. When brown, press one or two margarine pats into top of

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

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

#### Health Commissioner Says Spoiled Foods Cause Summer Illness


AUSTIN-The summer season always brings an increase in the incidence of dysentery, diarrhea and enteritis, all of which are major menaces to the lives of small children, annually causing the death or illness of hundreds of Texas youngsters.

Dr. Henry Holle, Commissioner of Health, declares that the chief cause of these intestinal diseases are contaminated milk, water or food; allowing the child to get over heated or exhausted; excessive sugar in the infant's formula and foods that have been improperly refrigerated.

All foods should be clean and fresh and all leftovers should be refrigerated so as to avoid spoilused in preparing the infant's formula which should, of course, be prescribed by a physician and his recommendations as to sanitation precautions and correct refrigeration should be implicitly follow-

warned parents especially of the disease transmission by flies. Children in any home that is not free from flies are in danger of contracting dysentery or other intestinal diseases which may be

If dysentery or diarrhea symptoms appear in your child, call your doctor immediately, Dr. Holle advises. His treatment of the dis-






Lymphomatosis is the most destructive of all poultry diseases. It is infectious, contagious and malignant. The disease affects chickens much as cancer affects man. It is caused by a virus and attacks the internal organs of chickens, causing tumorous enlargement of the liver.

Experiments have shown that immunity to the "big liver disease" can be passed from vaccinated hens to their chicks. Researchers believe that vaccination causes a buildup in the mother hen's blood of protective antibodies which are transmitted through the eggs to the

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

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

Food Sense — Not Nonsense

Take A Close Look - What Makes The Man?

What makes the man-or the woman? How you view them will de-

termine your answer. Nutritionists know that there is a close relation-

What foods and how much should be eaten have been the target of numerous studies. As the basis of dietary allowances for adults, recently, the National Research Council selected a standard man and a

woman, 25 years of age. The standard man is 67 inches tall and weighs 143 pounds; the woman is 62 inches tall and weighs 121 pounds.

Why was this age selected? Because at this age, growth is completed and life insurance and other data indicate that best expectations for good health are associated with maintaining the normal weight at age

The nutritional needs of individuals, with the exception of calorie requirements, will vary little throughout the next 40 years of their lives, barring illness, or in the case of the woman, pregnancies. As active people, during the years 25 to 35, the standard man will require 3200 calories and the woman 2600 calories, daily. As they grow older, by each ten years, they will decrease calorie needs by about five per cent. Calorie needs of their associates, who may be bigger or smaller, will increase or decrease, respectively. Variations in basic calorie requirements will be influenced most by activity. Heavy work will increase the demand to as much as 20 to 25 per cent above the standard level.

These dietary allowances can be attained with a good variety of common foods which will provide necessary nutrients as protein, calories, minerals and vitamins. As an example, look at the contribution made by a popular, economical food—enriched bread. If the standard man eats six slices of enriched bread daily, he will receive the following percentages of his requirements: calories, 11; protein, 18; calcium, 14; iron, 20; and B vitamins—thiamine, 23; riboflavin, 15; and niacin, 19.

Therefore a close look at what makes the man, physically, is a well balanced diet and holding to his youthful figure—normal weight at 25 years of age.






