"Let's Keep 'Em Home" Is Another Good Theme

"Trade at home" is a universally-popular theme at any chamber of commerce meeting. Other civic-minded organizations take up the banner and wave it around until residents feel like they have committed a felony if they spend a nickel in Amarillo.

We think that less time ought to be spent on this philosophy, and more invested in another theme: Let's keep our youngsters in the community in which they grew up.

Why does a young man or woman, after college training, so often seek employment in distant cities? Why do so many high school graduates, unable to pursue college training, leave their home towns for other areas?

Is it because of better pay elsewhere? We feel that this is partly the answer. Yet, on the other hand, there are many jobs in the small town that pay as well as comparable jobs in larger towns.

Is it lack of opportunity? Certainly not! We don't know of a better place in the world for a young man or woman to start out than in a growing small town. In many cases, they will be able to advance as the town advances, where this is not possible in larger places.

We feel that the biggest reason that our children don't stay in the communities which they call home is because we have failed to have a sales program to tell them of the advantages of staying where they are.

Perhaps we feel that it should be perfectly obvious that smaller towns are friendlier; there is less competition; there is more opportunity for growth.

But maybe these things aren't obvious to the young graduate who looks over a handsomely-printed brochure from an airplane factory, or a wholesaler's concern, or nicely-typed, personal letter from a big retailer.

Maybe they WOULD stay at home if we'd try to point out a few advantages of our own!

Bill Crume Receives Commission

LUBBOCK— "One U. S. Strategic Air Command plane today can deliver three times the firepower of the entire combined efforts of the U. S. and British Air Forces during World War II."

That was the word given 47 new Air Force second lieutenants by Brig. Gen. Charles W. Schott, commander of the 47th Air Division, during commissioning exercises Monday afternoon in Texas Tech's Aggie Memorial Auditorium. William D. Crume, son of Charlie Crume of this city, received his commission.

General Schott told the Tech AFROTC graduates, "no nation will start an all-out war unless they're sure of winning, and so long

as the deterrent power of SAC exists as its present level, no enemy can be sure of victory if they attack us."

Speaking before an overflow audience of approximately 300, the Walker AFB commander emphasized the rewards awaiting today's officer in the U. S. Air Force.

He pointed out that because of the importance of their work and the effective manner in which their mission is being carried out, Air Force officers enjoy both prestige and respect.

Not every newly-commissioned officer will want to make a career of the military service, General Schott stated, but the Air Force can guarantee "an interesting career, a chance to get around and see people and places, enough of the things that money can buy to keep you and your family happy, security, self-respect and the respect of your

fellow-men." Col. William A. Schulgen, Tech AFROTC commanding officer, administered the oath of office and presented the commissions to the new Air Force second lieutenants, most of whom have already received temporary duty assignments.

Charges Explained In Summer Program

Why is it necessary for children to have to pay for certain activities in the summer recreation program, when the community is underwriting it with funds?

That's a question mothers and fathers of Texico-Farwell may have turned over in their minds the past week—and the explanation is a simple one:

The four, five, or six hundred dollars that will be contributed to the program through community-wide breakfasts, just isn't enough to cover the cost of having the program.

Besides, only two activities—swimming and matinee picture shows—are charged for. The vast bulk of the program is 100 percent free to any child who wants to participate.

Contrary to some reports being circulated, there is no fee for the privilege of riding a school bus furnished by the Farwell ISD. Money from the benefit breakfasts will pay for gas to operate the vehicle.

The salary of Curtis Miller, Texico instructor, is taken care of through special school funds. In Farwell, no such funds are available, and the money coming from such things as the breakfasts goes to help pay Calvin Murray, Farwell instructor.

A charge of 25 cents per young-

ster is made for those who go swimming. It would have been possible for the local program to have made use of a Clovis pool at no charge, but program leaders thought it would be more advantageous from several standpoints to use the Muleshoe pool and pay for it.

Using the Muleshoe pool will mean that it will be reserved exclusively for local participants; whereas very crowded conditions would result at the Clovis pool.

A charge of \$1 is made for 12 matinee movies, but all of this money goes to the owner of the showhouse, and this part of the program is independent from regular recreation.

Money also must be spent on equipment of various types which is used in games.

Ulich, Agricultural Engineer and Mrs. Eloise T. Johnson, Family Life Specialist from Agricultural Extension Service at College Station.

A representative from the Texas Highway Department will assist with the driving safety phase.

Other activities will include swimming, rifle shooting, rope making, special interest demonstrations, ceremonies and parties.

This is the seventh year the joint camp for both boys and girls has been held in the district. The attendance is limited to three boys and three girls from each county who are thirteen years old or older. During the camp the two state council representatives from District I will be elected.

Young Democrats To Meet In Santa Fe

Governor Frank G. Clement of Tennessee and John C. White, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, will be the featured speakers at the Young Democratic Clubs of America National Committee Meeting and Conference in Santa Fe, New Mexico, June 3, 4, and 5.

Governor John F. Simms, Jr., of New Mexico, will deliver the welcoming address on the evening of June 3.

The National Committee meeting on June 5, called by National President Neal E. Smith, will set the time and place for the 1955 National Convention of the Young Democratic Clubs of America. Agenda for the three-day conference will include panel discussions on the issues.

Headquarters for the conference is at the Bishop's Lodge, near Santa Fe, New Mexico. Arrangements and reservations are being handled by Miss Eveline Robinson, of Los Alamos, President of the Young Democratic Clubs.

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Texico Court Record Released By Lewis

Twenty cases were tried in Sam N. Lewis' Justice of the Peace Court, Texico, during the months of April and May.

During May five fines, ranging from \$10 through, and including \$50, were assessed in the court. There were two cases of overloading, one violation of SCC laws, one without brake and light stickers and one accident caused by failure of driver to have vehicle under control.

Cases tried in April, which included fines from \$5 through, and including \$100, totaled 15 with four cases of overloading, four exceeding the speed limit, three violations of SCC laws, two illegal use of license plates, one illegal turn from left hand lane on four lane highway, and one accident caused by failure to yield right of way.

Southern Union Gas Has Safety Program

With the coming of summer, vacationers take to the highways and byways, attracted by the lure of new things to do and see. And during these summer months, highway deaths across the nation reach an increasingly alarming peak.

Here in Texico-Farwell, Southern Union Gas Company is cooperating with the National Conference of State Safety Coordinators in sponsoring a nationwide "Slow Down and Live" campaign, as part of the gas company's year-round accident prevention program. According to Tom Wagner, town plant mgr., each of the company's local trucks and cars will carry a bright, easy-to-read bumper strip that carries the slogan, "Slow Down and Live."

The Slow down and Live campaign will be in operation in all of the 48 states from Memorial Day through Labor Day in an effort to reduce the number of accidents which normally occur during the vacation season. July or August now replaces December as the month with the greatest number of highway traffic deaths.

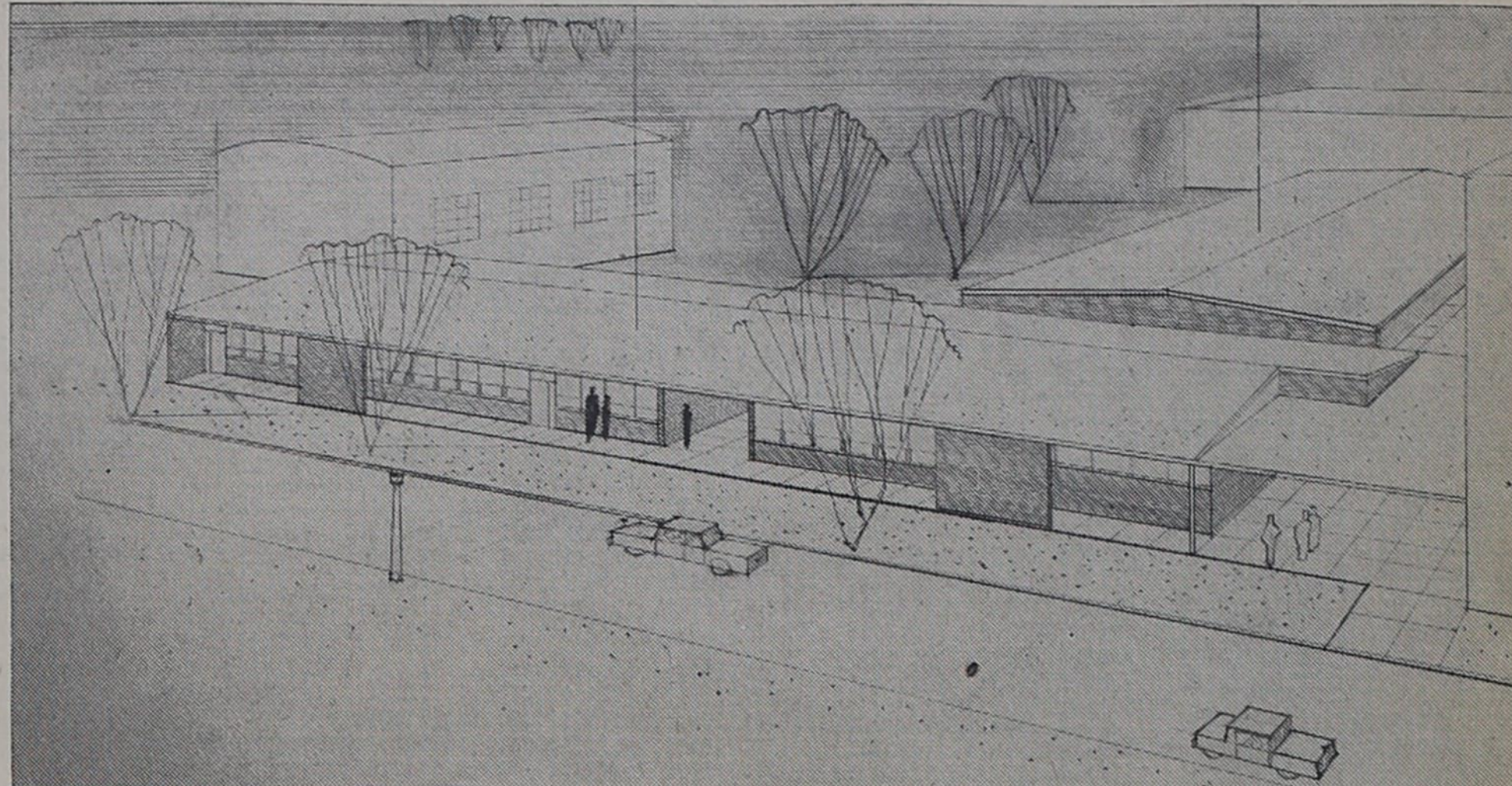
Doctors are hopeful that she will be able to return to school in the fall.

AUSTIN—It's amazing how quickly pennies can grow into millions of dollars.

But, it is with pennies that Texas is solving its financial problem.

Big discussion of the week has been the proposed two cent increase in gasoline taxes. Right behind that big topic has been the 1c increase in cigarette taxes and the hike to 1c per bottle (\$1.30 per barrel) in beer taxes.

With these topics before them, the Legislators came back almost to where they started—namely Gov. Allan Shivers' original tax recommendations. Tossed out by the Senators, after many hearings on numerous phases of taxation, were virtually all other tax proposals.

When the tax bill bogged down in the Senate, Governor Shivers threw in a surprise strategy move.

By message, he told the House and Senate—now working without pay—that if they wanted to end this session, he would call them back in a special session when they could be paid \$25 a day.

Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey and Speaker Jim Lindsey at once responded that the session could complete the tax chore, unblock the billion and a half dollar appropriation bill, and finish its job.

Filibuster Record Busted
For the third time during the 1955 legislative session, a new talkathon mark was established by a member of the usually sedate Senate.

This time the speaker was Sen. Kilmer Corbin of Lubbock who took 28 hours, 25 minutes against a state water project financing plan.

Previous holder of the record was Sen. Wayne Wagonseller of Bowie. Before that it was Sen. Jimmie Phillips of Angleton.

Corbin was opposing a committee report on Sen. Dorsey Hardeman's proposed constitutional amendment to the \$100,000,000 water program. He was objecting to the three-cent ad valorem levy.

Governor Shivers had advocated the plan as a key part of his water conservation legislation. The proposal would set up a six-man board, to be appointed by the Governor. Corbin also contended that the board should be elected, rather than appointed. In objecting to the method of taxation, Corbin said that it would cause dry land farmers to bear the burden of water projects in other districts.

Like the other "billibusters," it was fruitless.

Rain Steals The Show
General rains throughout the state stole the spotlight from the Legislators the past week. It was NEWS—BIG news. Even where there were floods, there were smiles of gratitude for the moisture.

As for the capital city, weathermen here report that Austin already has received more rain this year than it did throughout 1954.

Recent almost statewide rains have changed Texas' crop outlook from "dismal failure" to "fairly good" according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White. Rain came too late to help the wheat and oats, says White, but benefits to pasturelands were rated "excellent." He pointed out the need for a normal amount of moisture the rest of the year.

Governor Shivers and Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd recently have made affidavits to the effect that they were absent from board meetings on certain dates when the minutes cited that they were present.

From San Antonio, the district attorney's office announced it was demanding the maximum 10-year prison term for Giles, in his schedule trial on charges of accepting a \$30,000 bribe. Also that C. V. Wynn and Arthur McKenzie of San Antonio, charged with offering the bribe, would "turn state's evidence against Giles."

Probe In Senate
Lack of information prompted them to approve veterans land deals as a matter of routine. So said two state officials testifying in the Senate phase of the Land Office investigations.

State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert and State Auditor C. H. Cavness were the witnesses.

Cavness showed a form used by Giles to request funds for loans. Bearing the seal of the land board, the form carried no signature other than Giles'.

"Nothing came to us to cause us to have any suspicions," Cavness said, adding that he had assumed the deals had been approved by a majority of the three-member board.

Cuts in allowable oil production, made by the Railroad Commission, whittled the State's prospective revenue from oil. June allowable was cut 64,820 barrels daily, and July 67,219.

The Senate joined the House in passing Rep. Dolph Briscoe's stringent bill regulating veterans' land sales and outlawing block deals. Briscoe's constitutional amendment replaces the Governor and Attorney General as Veterans Land Board members. Two appointive members would serve with the land commissioner.

Mrs. Jack Patterson sends us her favorite recipe this week, another different cake idea for your family. Mrs. Patterson resides in the Rhea community. Thanks so much Mrs. Patterson for telling us your recipe for lemon layer cake.

LEMON LAYER CAKE
Cream together:
½ cup shortening
4 egg yolks
1 cup sugar

Add 2 tsp. lemon flavoring
Sift together:
2 cups flour
2 tsp. baking powder
½ teaspoon salt

Then add mixture and one cup milk to creamed mixture, and beat three minutes at No. 3 speed on mixer. Bake at 350 for 25 minutes.

Father's Day should be doubly significant for the editor this year, as his family of children, is doubled in the very near future (we hope)!

We received a pamphlet on tornado precautions through the mail last week, from the Texas civil defense and disaster relief. After the scare of such a short time ago in the area, we feel it might be pretty timely to give you some of the pointers in our column this week.

According to the pamphlet, there is no universal protection against tornadoes except caves or underground excavations. Storm cellars should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure, and preferably equipped with pick and shovel.

If you are in open country, move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead from 25 to 40 miles an hour.

FLUFFED FRANKS

Don't let a food budget get you down. Some of the tastiest dishes can be the most economical, too. Instead of serving "hot dogs" the next time your food allowance is running low, use the same frankfurters as a basis for this nourishing dish.

(Six Servings)

5 medium-size potatoes
1½ teaspoons salt
¼ cup margarine
½ cup hot milk
¾ teaspoon pepper
6 frankfurters
1 tablespoon prepared mustard
Margarine pats

Cook washed, peeled potatoes with salt in 1 cup boiling water until they can be pierced easily with a fork. Drain and mash. Add margarine, hot milk, and pepper. Beat until smooth and fluffy. Split frankfurters lengthwise, cutting almost but not quite through, so they can be flattened. Spread cut surfaces lightly with prepared mustard. Pile mashed potatoes into each frankfurter, leaving tops rough. Place filled frankfurters on baking sheet or shallow pan. Set under broiler or into moderately hot oven (425° F.) until potatoes are lightly browned and frankfurters heated through, about 12 to 15 minutes. When brown, press one or two margarine pats into top of potato on each serving.

or organization if all the workers should suddenly up and move some place else.

The shameful fact about all of this is that those who do the work so often go thankless. Not only do they go thankless—more often than not they are the most resented, the most often cussed-out people that can be found.

"Old so-and-so wants to run the whole town, that's what's wrong with him." Or, "This is a one-horse club. If you'd just get that sore-head out of the presidency, maybe we could get something done."

How often have you heard back-biting comments like the ones above? Plenty! The people who have enough interest and ambition to get out and get something done are the ones who take the booting from the public for trying to be helpful!

And never have we seen a man or woman who worked hard for anything in his community or organization who wouldn't gladly turn the reins over to ANYBODY who would get in there and do a good job—or at least try.

It's so easy to criticize. Next time you start to, think for a few moments. Put yourself in his or her shoes. Would YOU be willing to invest the time and effort THEY have in public service?

Ches Fowler says the drought is over.

Coming from such a confirmed pessimist, this is something to think on.

Something has gotten into us. We used to take a lot of stock in optimistic views such as this. But in recent months, we've gotten to be the "I'll believe it when I see it" kind.

This isn't quite like us. Thumbing back through the files, we find that as recently as the end of 1954, we predicted 1955 would be the "it" year when the drought would pass away.

And now, when signs are showing up, we refuse to believe it. Something has happened.

J. W. Crim did a lot to shake our faith for 1955. In fact, his prediction may have been the turning point. Somehow or other, we hope that Ches is right and Crim is wrong. But we are a wait-and-see'er for the moment.

Ches is another farmer who's ready for a return to boom-and-bust, dog-eat-dog agriculture. No farm programs for him, he says. Things are getting so balled up nobody'll ever get 'em untangled.

A little dab of wheat here, and a little dab of cotton there isn't getting the job done, says Ches, and it's the dryland boys who haven't been able to put down wells who are getting their throats cut. That's somebody

we've almost forgotten out here: the dryland farmer. He's been suffering in silence for all these years.

First of all, they will vote on whether to continue with marketing quotas. As things now stand, a producer who overplants his allotment is penalized 45 percent of the parity price on the wheat which he desires to sell as "surplus."

This is a stiff assessment, and usually is sufficient to keep producers in line with allotments.

If the farmers turn down marketing quotas, they will no longer be penalized for wheat produced on acres outside of the allotments.

The important thing to remember is that in any case, allotments will continue to be in effect, and it will be necessary for producers to comply with them in order to receive supports.

The price support for 1956 in Parmer County has not been announced, but a national minimum of \$2.06 per bushel has already been established. This is 82 1/2 percent of parity.

If farmers defeat controls in the referendum, the support level will decline to 50 percent of parity. Those who produce within allotments will receive this support price; those who overplant will sell on the open market (but without marketing penalties such as would be the case now).

Plenty Of Wheat

The United States is anything but short on wheat. "Current estimates are that 1.86 billion bushel of wheat will be available for the marketing year beginning July 1. More than a billion bushels will be carried over from previous crops."

"The total supply, including the 1955 crop, will be enough to meet our current needs for domestic use and exports for the next two years and is 66 percent above the 'normal supply' prescribed in the controlling legislation."

Those quotes are from the USDA, Commodity Stabilization Service. It illustrates why the Secretary of Agriculture has been compelled by law to declare marketing quotas and set allotments.

The national allotment is 55 million acres. Oddly enough, that's the same allotment as last year, and the reason for its being the same is that it is the minimum prescribed by law.

The Texas allotment is 4,227,000—up about 20,000 from 1955. It is apparent that since the state allotment has increased but the county allotment decreased, under the same conditions prevailing nationwide, the wheat is being allowed to follow a "trend" to other parts of the country, in much the same fashion that cotton is coming to Parmer County.

County allotments are determined on the same basis as the state allotments but individual farm allotments will be determined on the basis of wheat production during recent years, and in addition, tillable acres, crop rotation plans, type of soil, and general typog-

raphy of the farm. The county allotments will be broken down into individual farm allotments by the county ASC committee, and are expected to be in the mail sometime next week.

Chairman Joe Camp points out that all wheat growers in Parmer County who will have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain in 1956 are entitled to vote in the referendum.

Local voting places will be announced in The Tribune in one or two weeks.

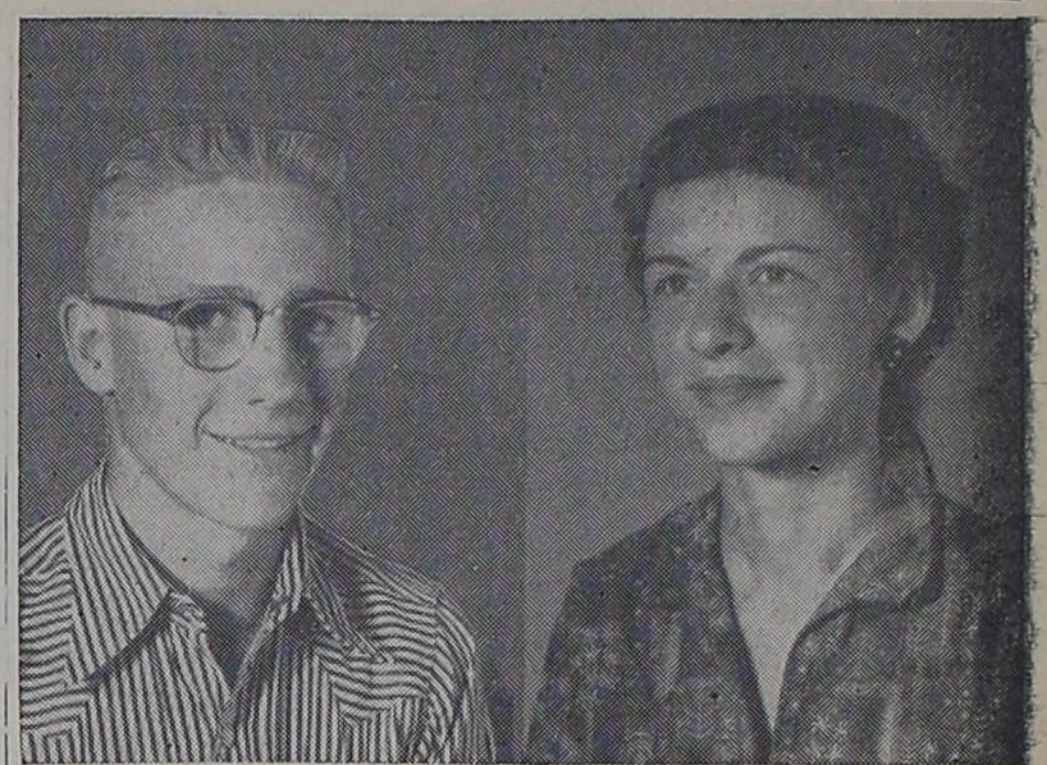
Next meeting will be tonight (Thursday) at the fire station at which time the members will do some work on the pumps.

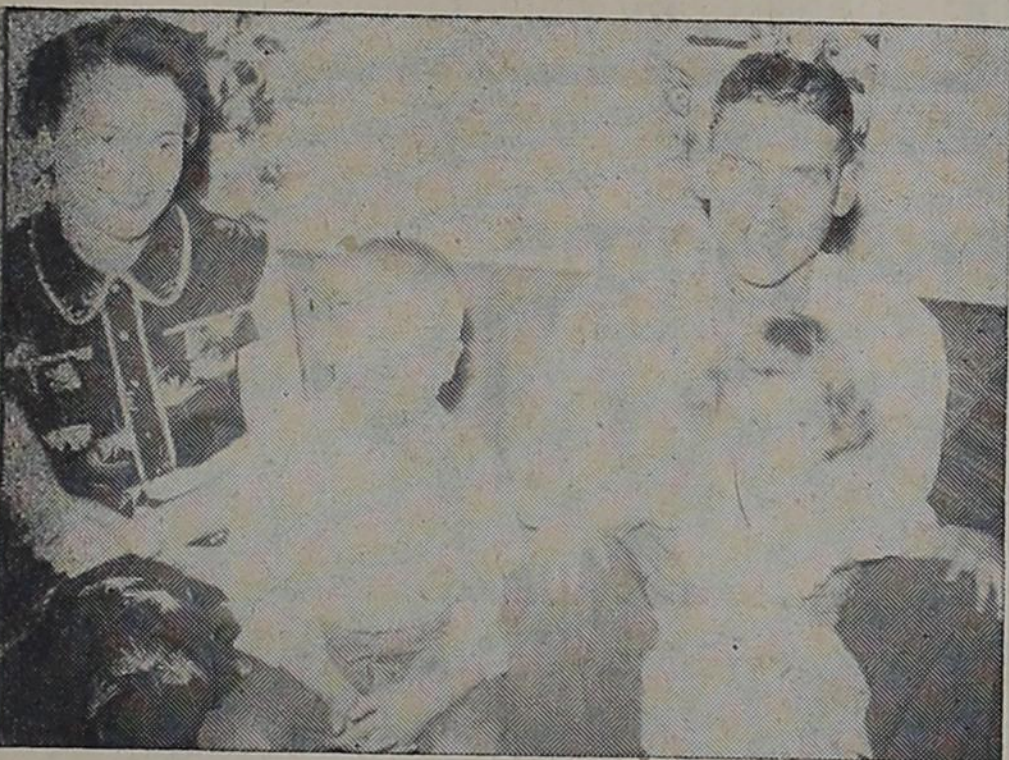

Solar Battery Efficiency Increased, Says Forester

The efficiency of the Bell solar battery—man's first successful device for converting sunlight directly into substantial amounts of electricity—has been practically doubled in the one year since its announcement, according to C. H. Forester, manager of Mountain States Telephone.

Bell Telephone scientists have increased the battery's efficiency to 11 per cent—comparable to the efficiency of the best gasoline engines. When first shown, the battery had a 6 per cent efficiency.

Forester said the announcement of this new stride toward utilizing the sun's energy came shortly after Bell scientists had also succeeded in developing a miniature electronic "brain," capable of computing complex mathematical problems in 15 thousandths of a second.

Forester said both the Bell solar battery and TRADIC are expected to have wide uses in many kinds of industry in the future. In the telephone system, both may soon play an important part.
