Steers Vs. Chiefs Season Opener

Football, with a 1960 look, gets the jump on Appreciation Day when the Farwell Steers entertain their cross-county rivals, the Friona Chiefs, Friday night at 8 p.m.

The game will be the season opener for both teams and all pre-season data points toward a bang-up game between the long-time arch foes. A capacity crowd is expected for the

According to the records of last year's performances, returning lettermen and starters, the Steers would have to be listed as favorites.

But, the Chiefs do have seven returning lettermen from last year's team which finished the season strong and according to Coach Earl Smith, "The team will have a lot of fight." Both teams will be "up" for this game, and as past history shows, the favorite's role doesn't mean a thing when these two teams meet. In 1958, when the powerful Steers were drifting toward an unbeaten season, the Chiefs came from behind to deal them their lone defeat in regular season play.

Then last year when the Steers had lost much of its starstudded team from the previous year, they opened the season by shellacking the Chiefs, 24-6.

Coach Dempsey Alexander says the Steers are in good shape for the contest and spirit is running high as the season opener nears. The team has come through the first three weeks of practice without a serious insury.

Jimmy Clements, starting center, was laid up with a groin injury early this week, but he will be ready for the game Friday. Probable offensive starters for the Steers will be as follows:

But, the coach is well aware of the fact that it will take a good team to face the rugged schedule ahead, which doesn't have a weak link in it. Only two Class B teams are on the schedule, Bovina and Lazbuddie, and they are both considered strong contenders for the Class 2-B crown.

The Steers will not be a heavy team, but the average weight for both linemen and backs is 165 pounds, about average for Class A schools. "That's just about right," Alexander says. If the team is outweighted in any of its encounters, they will make up for it in hustle and speed.

Can Plant On Right-Of-Way Parmer County farmers, who plan to plant wheat along the

proposed right-of-way for the widening of Highway 70-84, were assured this week that construction would not start before July 1, 1961.

Much of the right-of-way for widening the highway from Bailey County to Farwell, has been purchased by the county and state, but since the construction date of the road is still sometime in the future, farmers have been planting the rightof-way into crops, Parmer County Judge Loyde Brewer says. A letter this week from O. L. Crain, district engineer for

the Texas Highway Department, revealed that the farmers, who have crops planted in this stretch of right-of-way, will be able to harvest them without highway department construction interfering.

"We should like to point out, however, that a crop may be damaged by the moving of utility lines or the adjustment of gas lines," Crain said. All of the right of way for the road should be secured by January 1 and "it is hoped that shortly thereafter the Southwestern Public Service Company will be in a position to remove their line from the new right-of-way," Crain said. This may result in slight damage to any planted

At the present time there is no definite date for construction to begin on the highway. "However, as soon as all right-of-way is secured, we will make every effort to obtain funds for the



As if there weren't enough things to do on the farm at this time of year, one farmer of the Hub community has taken on another sizeable chore--that of playing mother to 82 baby Albert Canhon, who farms

two miles south of the Hub corner in eastern Parmer County, last week received 82 Holstein heifer calves from a breeding farm in Dorchester, Wisconsin. When they arrived, the calves were from 7 to 11 weeks old and Cannon started each of them off on the bottle.

Yep, that's right, twice each day Cannon and a hired hand have been feeding the 82 head of livestock by hand--and with a bottle. They feed four at a time and it takes about an hour morning and night.

What's the reason for att this? Cannon is getting ready to go into the dairy business at his 480-acre farm and this is just the first stage of a long-range plan. Two years from now these heifers should be calving and coming fresh for the first time. That's when Cannon plans to start producing milk for sale.

All of the calves are of artificial breeding and come from some of the best stock in the Midwest, Cannon says. Their mothers all give on the average of 10 gallons of milk per day.

The bottle-feeding process will last for only a few weeks. After the calves become 12 weeks of age, they will be weaned from the bottle and placed on a mixed feed ration. Sixteen of the calves have al- times a day. ready been taken off the bottle.



Phosphate can be placed in the drill furrow with wheat seed but nitrogen or potassium cannot, so be sure you don't try puttoo near the seed.

To date phosphate has not been profitable when applied to wheat on clays or clay loam





Water, in the form of irrigation, played a big role in last year's bumper crops on the Texas High Plains, topping all past records in grain sorghum production. And we produced a cotton crop of 1.8 million bales, second only to the 2 million bales ginned in 1958. Irrigation was applied to 1-1/2 million acres of cotton, 2 million acres of grain sorghum, 686,000 acres of wheat, and 89,000 acres of
