# **Two Charged With Intent To Murder**

A Bovina man, John Hartwell, was seriously beaten by three men in the driveway of a Farwell service station Monday night following an argument.

Hartwell was in a Clovis hospital Tuesday recovering from injuries to the face and other parts of the body allegedly inflicted upon him by Bert Christenson, 29, Houston Bryan Martin, 41, and another unidentified party. Both Christenson and Martin have been charged with assault with intent to murder.

The two men, after being arrested by Sheriff Chas. Lovelace and Deputy Tom Atkins Monday night, were arraigned before J. R. Thornton's justice of peace court Tuesday, Bond for each of the individuals was set at \$5,000 and the case has been bound over to the grand jury.

Martin, an airman at Cannon Air Force Base in Clovis, has posted his bond, but Christenson was still in Parmer County jail Tuesday night.

According to Sheriff Lovelace, the beating occurred following an argument which apparently started at the Clover Club in Texico. Hartwell and his wife left the club and started toward Bovina shortly before 10 p.m.

Christenson and Martin, along with several companions, started following Hartwell and forced his car off the road at a roadside park a mile northeast of Farwell.

The car, which belongs to Elton Venable of Bovina, was damaged slightly by the impact. After bringing the car to a

stop, Hartwell's pursuers started beating on the car, causing damage to the body and breaking a window.

They also started hitting Hartwell with a double strand of heavy rubber-coated wiring, which was taped together. Hartwell managed to turn his vehicle around and head back to Farwell to summon the sheriff.

He drove into the driveway of Watts Service Station and there was overtaken by his pursuers, according to the report given to Sheriff Lovelace. Again, the men started beating him.

Lovelace was called to the scene by Donald Callouet, who was at the station. When the sheriff arrived, he found Hartwell in an alley near the station. "He was only half conscious and badly beaten up," Lovelace says.

Hartwell was taken to a Clovis hospital where he was treated for injuries. According to word from the hospital, he was recovering satisfactorily and was scheduled to be released Wednesday.

In addition to being charged with assault and intent to murder, Christenson and Martin have been charged with malicious destruction of property. Damage to the car was estimated at \$130.

A warrant has been issued for the third man, who allegedly had a part in the beating, but he had not yet been picked up Wednesday.

The Chiefs were held to 129 yards on the ground and they never completed a pass in eight attempts. The Steers, meanwhile, were tolling up 175 yards rushing and they completed all of five passing attempts for 106 yards.

Really, the Steers were never put to the test, either on defense or offense, but in both categories the blue and white did show signs of greatness.

Fullback Jerry Lovelace was the big offensive gun, as he romped for three of the Farwell touchdowns in the second period. However, the game was not a one-man offensive show as the Steers did display a well-balanced attack.
