

## Future of Muleshoe city landfill remains uncertain

After another lengthy discussion on the future of the city landfill during a city council meeting Tuesday, the City of Muleshoe is still no step closer to making any decisions.

Muleshoe City Manager Dave Marr was scheduled to attend meetings in Lubbock on Thursday and Friday and hopes to get answers to many questions which are needed in order for the city to be able to

make any kind of reasonable decision.

Joe Shehan of PSC/McMorries, the city's consulting firm, was also present to answer questions from councilors Tuesday. But with many rules and regulations still being written and still yet-to-be written by the Environmental Protection Agency, Shehan, was unable to give any specific answers.

"We are currently looking

at all of our options we have, with the information that we have right now," Shehan said. He said that the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) needs to know by Oct. 1 what the city plans to do, whether to close the landfill or fix it up to comply with new regulations. Shehan said the city will need to be ready to close the landfill by this date if that is what they decide to do.

A discussion was held on the impact closing the landfill would have.

In this event, a private contracting company would be hired by the city to transfer the city's waste.

City Councilman Rex Harris expressed concern over how concrete and other inert materials would be transferred.

Shehan said that the city would probably be able to get a registration for a site to dump

non-disposable things, such as concrete.

Marr explained to the council that the city still has a lot of land at the landfill site, but said that if the cost of getting a new permit could be higher than having a private company haul the trash it would be hard to justify.

"What we need to look at here is the bottom line," Marr said. "Because we will have to justify it, if we do keep the

landfill open and it is cheaper to have our trash hauled."

Marr said the reason the city has delayed making a decision on the landfill so long is because there is basic confusion over all kinds of things regarding what they can and can't do.

"I haven't been able to get anybody to give me a straight answer on this," Marr said.

## Candidates file to run for two city council seats up for election

One of two races in the upcoming Muleshoe City Council Election on Saturday, May 6 will be contested.

In District #2, Cliff Black and Tony Scolley have both filed applications to be placed on the ballot. This seat on the city council was held by former mayor pro-tem A.V. Wood who resigned a few months ago. This seat on the city council has been vacant since Wood resigned.

It looks like incumbent Juan Chavez of District 1 will run unopposed in the election. Chavez is the only person who signed up to seek election to this position.

The deadline for people to file an application for a place on the ballot in this election was Wednesday. However, write-in candidates may still

file an intention to run until April 6, which is the deadline for write-in candidates. Applications can be filed at City Hall.

The two city council seats up for election are for two-year terms.

Candidates do not have to live in the district they are running in, but only people who live in the respective districts may vote for the city council person running in that district.

April 6 is also the last day a person may register to vote in the May election and is the last day a voter who has moved to a different city election precinct may submit a transfer of registration to be eligible to vote in the precinct of their new residence. Early voting will begin on April 17.

## Predictions for 1995

### Chief Crim looks to wind for annual spring forecast

Weldon "Indian" Crim is at it again, and once again he has come up with his weather prediction for the 1995 spring season.

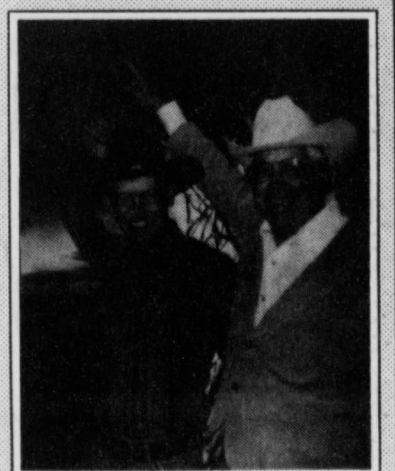
Following a 85-year old family tradition, Crim predicts the spring weather each year on March 22 and has been correct on four of his last five forecasts. Eighty percent accuracy in the area of weather is rare.

Based on his March 22 prediction this year, Crim said local farmers are not going to like what they hear this year.

"A west wind at sunrise means another dry season. Heap bad medicine," Crim said. "The west wind indicates a dry spring."

"But don't kill the messenger," Crim reminds folks. "The 'Indian' doesn't control the weather, he just reads the signals, and he has a certain knack for getting that right."

The annual prediction in the Crim family comes from an ancient Indian custom which was brought into the Crim family in 1910. The fireburning is done at sunrise

on March 22 by setting fire to a teepee-shaped wood pile. Whichever direction the wind blows the fire's smoke at sunrise predicts the spring weather for the area.

Weldon's grandfather, Taylor Crim, learned the ritual by observing Indian customs as he was growing up. Taylor passed the tradition down to his son J.W., who conducted his version of the burnings for 60 years. The family tradition was briefly discontinued after J.W.'s death in 1980. Weldon began his forecasting in 1993 at the urging of his family and neighbors.

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## Legal Matters

### Need A Lawyer?

Many people call the Office of the Attorney General seeking legal advice. But according to the Texas Constitution and state law, we are prohibited from giving legal advice or written opinions to anyone who is not a state official or entity.

At one time or another, nearly everyone needs legal advice. In this column, we've put together some guidelines for choosing a lawyer.

### Define Your Problem

No one knows your situation better than you do, and that includes even the smartest lawyer. So before you start your search, sit down and define your problem. Does it involve a criminal matter, real estate situation, or a will? The answer to that question may determine what kind of lawyer you need.

Once you decide on the appropriate type of lawyer, ask your friends and family for references or contact your county or local bar association. Many associations maintain lawyer referral services that are listed in the Yellow Pages. While a listing is no guarantee of quality, it is a good place to start.

### Great Expectations or Clear Requirements?

When you hire a lawyer, you should be very clear on what services are expected of him or her. Don't be reluctant to talk business. You don't buy tomatoes in a grocery store without knowing the price per pound, and you shouldn't hire an attorney without knowing the price per pound, and you shouldn't hire an attorney without knowing what the fee is going to be.

If you are involved in a lawsuit, will you be charged on a contingency fee basis, a flat rate, by the hour, or by some other arrangement? Will

you pay now, pay later, or only if you win your case? Settle it all up front - in writing - and there will be less chance for misunderstandings later. Your attorney will then be able to go about the business of representing you, the client.

### Specialized or General Practitioner?

For relatively simple matters, such as some wills and certain family law matters, there may be no need for a specialist. But more complicated matters may require expert knowledge in certain areas. If attorneys hold themselves out to be board certified, that means they have demonstrated the attainment of a certain level of knowledge in certain areas.

What Matters  
Just as only you know your situation best, you sense which attorney you trust and feel comfortable working with. Rely on your common sense and instincts.

When discussing business with your lawyer, settle the how, when and how much at the beginning of your relationship.

Abraham Lincoln once said that a lawyer's stock in trade is time. To save both time and money, some lawyers commonly refer you questions to their assistants or clerks. Find out up front who you will talk to and how much it will cost. If you are comfortable with the arrangement, fine. If not, you can consider someone else.

### What Does Not Matter

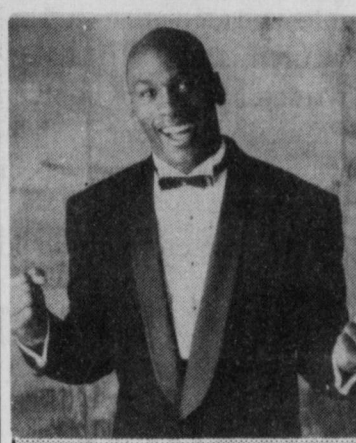
There is more to choosing a lawyer than just considering his or her age, law school, and the size of the counselor's firm. Age doesn't necessarily mean wisdom, nor youth folly. And even the best schools have their share of graduates who are less than brilliant. As for the size of the firm, some clients like the stability of a large practice while others may feel more comfortable with a smaller

firm. What matters most, however, is the relationship and trust you have with your individual attorney.

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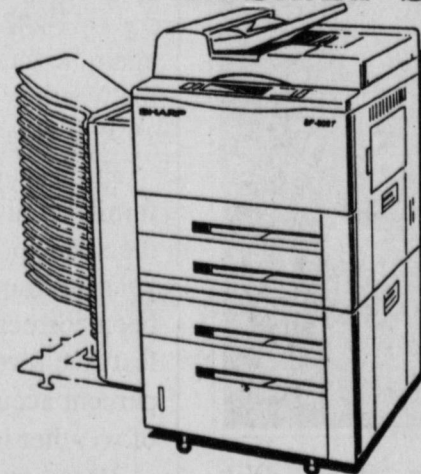

## Building of McDonald's officially begins

A foundation has been laid and an official groundbreaking ceremony was held Thursday for a new McDonald's Restaurant being built.

The new McDonald's will be located on American Blvd., by Alco Discount Store.

Owners Rick and Maria Robillard of Clovis, N.M., along with members of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture were present for the ceremony. Also present was Southwest General Contractors of Amarillo, who are doing the construc-

tion.

Rick said the new McDonald's is expected to be completed and open by May 31. He said they expect to hire about 55 employees, with 35 fulltime positions and 20 part-time positions.

A highlight of the new McDonald's Restaurant will be a completely enclosed playground area for the children.

Rick said the playground will be located inside, between a lobby and the eating area. They chose to make the playground area indoor because of

the windy weather this area is known for. This will enable it to be used year-round and at about any time.

Felix Cortez will be the manager of the Muleshoe McDonald's. Rick said Felix will move to Muleshoe. Cortez has worked in the McDonald's Corporation for 16 years.

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## Minding Your Own Business

I couldn't believe my eyes. I looked again. It was real, and standing right in front of me. A dinosaur, right in the heart of Chicago's Gold Coast North side.

It was as tall as a two-story building and nearly as wide. It was dark red and green in color with black markings.

I watched closely to see if there were any signs of life. Yes, there was movement! I never expected to see one in 1995. Certainly not in a swank neighborhood of one of America's largest cities.

The scientific name is - I believe - MomandPopus Grocery Storeus. A nearly extinct mom and pop store standing just as it had been for more than 100 years. The faded white letting on the ancient green awning said "State Parkway Market."

I ventured inside for a closer look. A frail white face looked up from behind a small check out counter near the door. "Hello," it's owner said softly. Her smile was warm, but weak. I judged that this little lady had seen at least 85 Chicago winners.

I returned her greeting and stepped past the counter, and back into time. Suddenly, it was 1950, or perhaps as early as 1930 or 1940. Vintage is hard to tell in old grocery stores. I walked the aisles searching for clues. There were two - aisles that is. I found no clues.

Three other shoppers were in the little store. Two were seasoned citizens. The other was a mid-forties working woman on her way home. The younger woman watched as I gazed intently around the store. With a knowing, You-aren't-

from-around-here look, she said softly, "It's a dinosaur isn't it?" "Yes," I replied. "I didn't know any still existed."

"This is the only one left in this area," she volunteered. She glanced sadly at the wizened lady behind the counter. "It probably won't last much longer," she said with a hint of sadness.

In the next few moments I was to learn much of the history of this little store. I learned that three generations of this shopper's family had been faithful customers. And, that little had changed over the years.

The business had been built on old-time personal service. "I-can-call-you-by-name" service. "Your-credit-is-good-here" service. "I'll-carry-that-bag-home-for-you" service.

But how can this small, neighborhood grocery, survive the influx of supermarkets and chain stores? How does this mom and pop compete?

The quality is the highest.

Pop carefully selects the vegetables early every morning at a nearby wholesale produce market. Meat, also carefully chosen, is cut to every customer's liking. Only premium fruit is displayed. Every order is filled with a personal touch.

Overhead is low. The owners live above the store. There is no debt. The owners are from a generation of hardworking immigrants whose whole lives have been filled with hard work, long hours and frugal living.

There are good lessons here for newer retail and service businesses. First, focus on giving customers exactly what they want when they want it.

Second, never lose the personal touch. People prefer to do business with people. Statistics and numbers may tell you a lot about your business, but statistics don't buy your products and numbers won't pay your bills.

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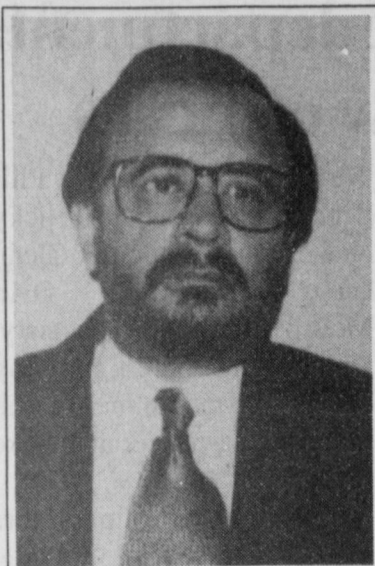

the ENMU College of Business, Room 103. All events are open to the public. For more information, call ENMU College of Business at (505) 562-2342.

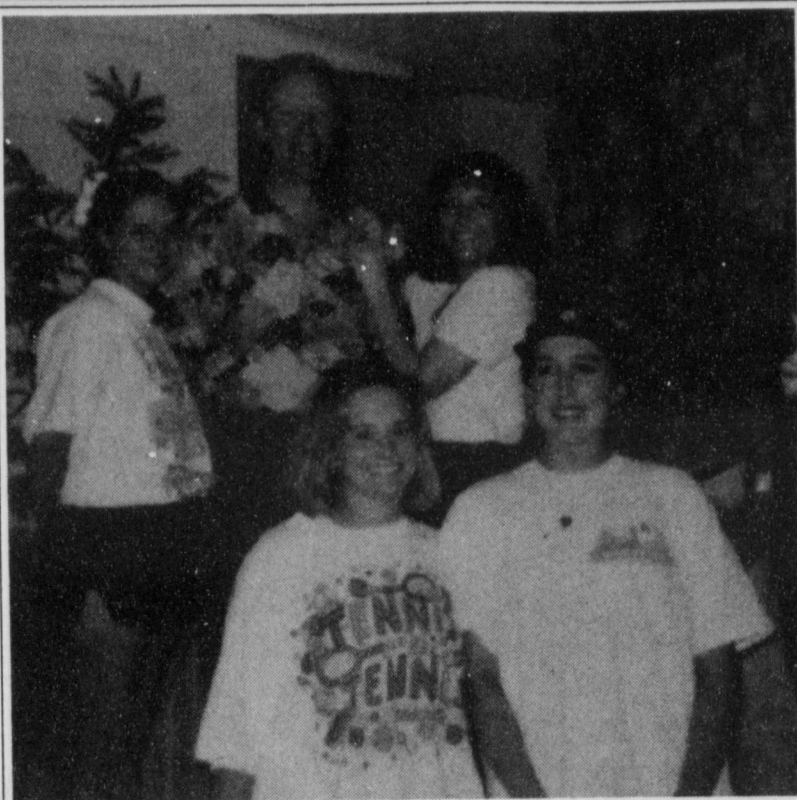
## Morton is named Citizen of Month

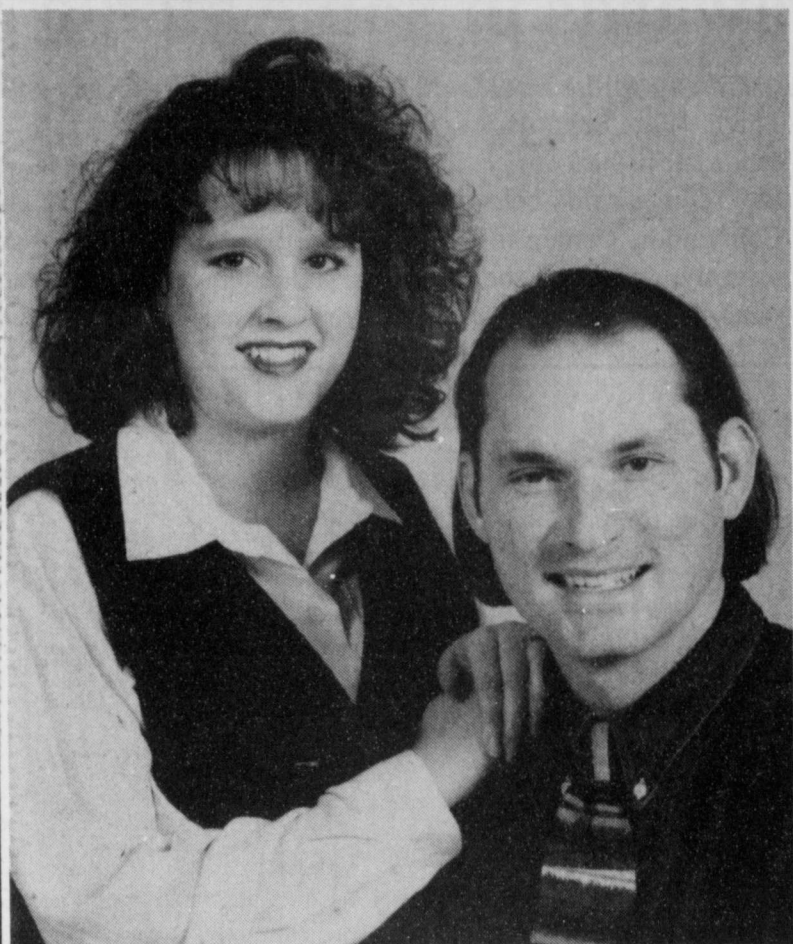



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

## 1995 Farm Bill hearing to be held

WASHINGTON, D.C.—U.S. Representative Larry Combest (R-Texas) today announced that the House Agriculture Committee will convene a special field hearing on the 1995 Farm Bill in Lubbock at 9:00 a.m. at Texas Tech University's Ex-Students Center on Tuesday, April 25. Lubbock is only one of three sites nationally where the full committee has selected producers from the region to testify in the months prior to the drafting of the 1995 Farm Bill.

House Agriculture committee Chairman Pat Roberts (R-Kansas) will conduct the field hearing hosted by Combest, the committee's fourth-ranking member. Combest approaches the hearing with the familiarity of being one of nine of the current 49-member House Agriculture Committee to have had a hand in writing the 5-year legislative plans for U.S. agriculture.

"We are bringing this hearing to our part of the country to hear from the people who work to make American agriculture a success and to see that government's role is as a resource, not a burden," said Combest.

"We are bringing Washington back home to the people so that producers will be able to get off their tractors to tes-

tify and then return to their fields and pastures satisfied that they have made good, constructive comments about what works and what can work better in the next Farm Bill. We will see that everyone's ideas are considered in writing a workable farm bill under extreme pressures of the federal budget."

The site of the Lubbock hearing is on the southeast corner of the campus of Texas

Tech University, one street north of 19th Street, off of University Avenue. Parking is available adjacent to the Ex-Students Center.

## The effects of global warming being studied

This summer Dr. Anthony I. Mezeroll, a West Texas A&M University assistant professor of biology, will participate in a marine biological study that may hint at the cause of coral reef deaths throughout the world. Mazeroll will participate in the study with Dr. Denis Goulet, a research associate at the State University of New York at Buffalo.

Sponsored by the Center for Field Research's Earthwatch program, the oceanic project will occur off the coast of Fiji, an island in the South Pacific, northeast of Australia. The Center for Field Research is an international center for scientific research.

To determine the cause of reef deaths in this area, Earthwatch volunteers, under the direction of Mazeroll and Goulet, will study the butterfly fish populations that feed on the coral polyps, invertebrate animals that live within the coral skeletons. Because polyps are nocturnal creatures, it is difficult and sometimes hazardous to directly measure the disappearance of corals, Mazeroll said.

By studying the roving fish populations, the volunteers can estimate the health of the reef and its inhabitants. Large fish populations indicate a thriving reef, whereas small numbers will show less coral production or dead reefs, Mazeroll said.

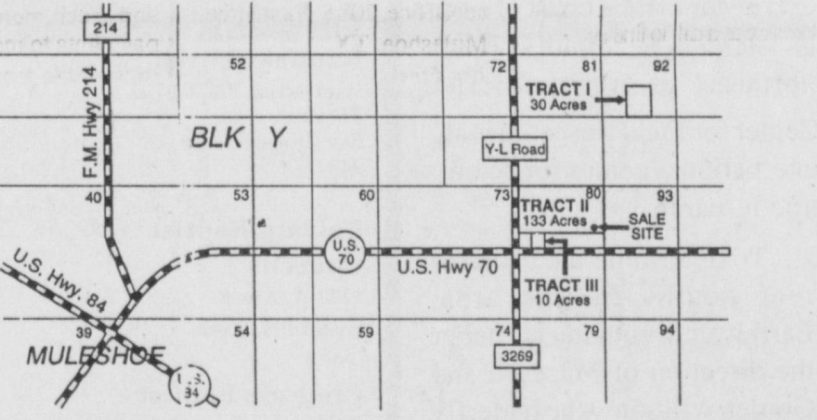

Leadership TASB provides applicable and specialized trustee leadership training to school board members who are emerging as leaders in public education.

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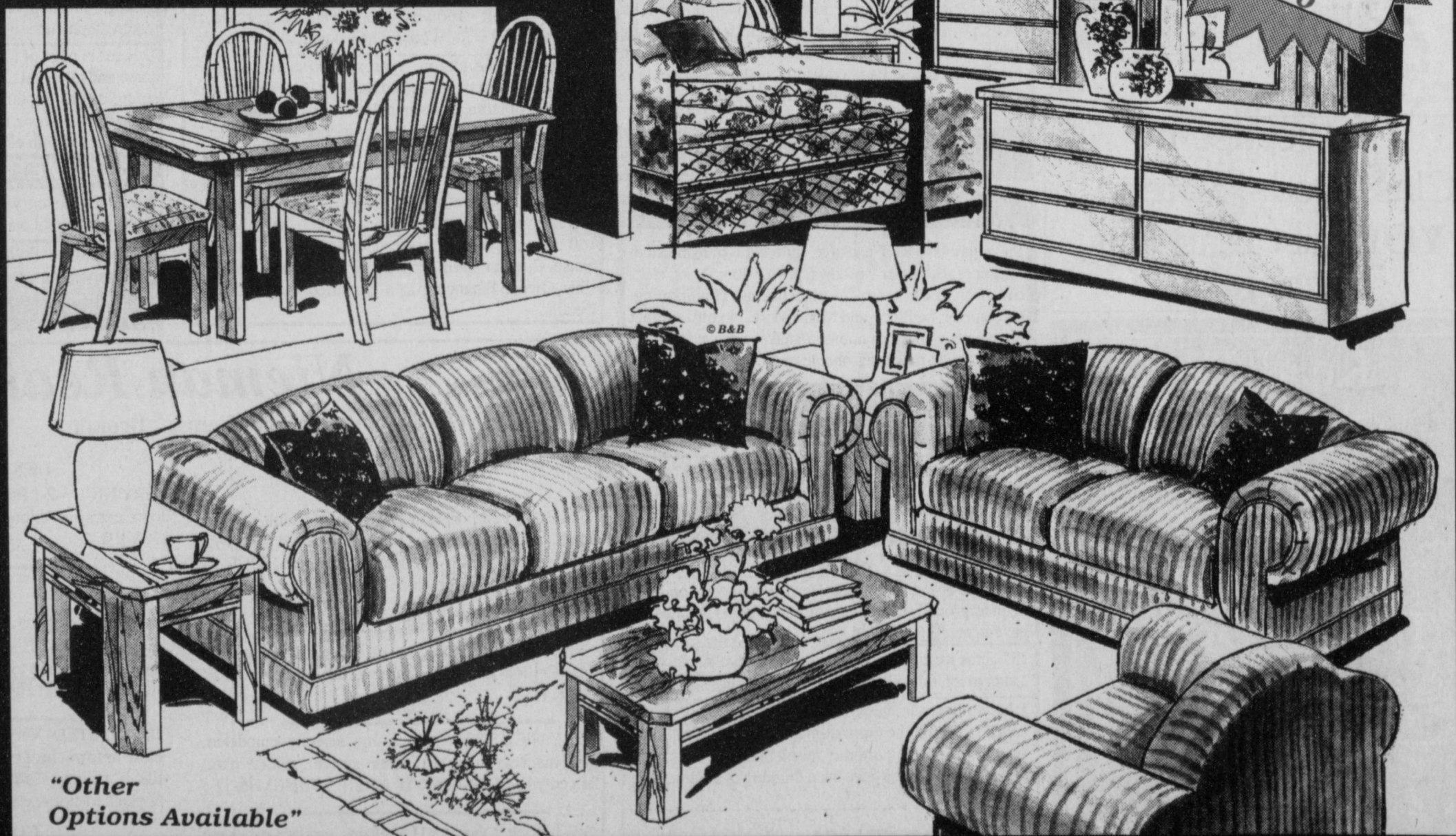
