# Season's First Snow Storm Blankets Area



The first snow storm of the season blew into the area early Tuesday morning, blanketing all of West Texas and Eastern New Mexico with from two to four inches of snow and pushing temperatures down to 20 degrees.

Accompanied by strong winds, the mildblizzard first hit about 6 a.m. Tuesday and continued until 11 a.m. In the Twin Cities the snow measured about two inches and it was followed Tuesday afternoon by a freezing drizzle.

Intermittent sleet and rain was still falling late Wednesday afternoon, with all of the streets and highways in the area covered with a heavy coat of ice.

Even though traffic has been hazardous, no serious accidents had been reported by Wednesday afternoon.

On the farm the moisture was expected to be more beneficial than harmful. The cotton harvest has been temporarily halted, but ginning in the area report that most of the crop is already out of the fields.

The moisture will be beneficial to the wheat fields and other land which is being prepared for next year's crops. The snow was a dry one, but with the sleet and rain, the area has received a considerable amount of moisture.

A concrete block plant is now in operation, construction will soon be completed on a motel, and a new wholesale gasoline business will be open in the near future. That's the latest story on business developments in the





# **Beet Meeting** Thursday Night

Each section is 12 inches in diameter and 36 inches long with an intake rate of 385 gallons of water per minute. Sand and gravel covers of different thickness will be used to cover the porous pipe to study the effects of silt in clogging the micro-

scopic holes in the porous pipe. The second filtration system will use perforated well casing 16 inches in diameter, eight feet long wrapped with fiber glass filter one inch thick.

A third method to be used for silt removal will be an eight foot circular cage of 3/4 inch expanded metal with a 7 foot cylindrical cage inside. Plastic screen will be placed inside the 8 foot cylinder and outside the 7 foot inner metal circle with 6 inches of gravel between the two cylinders.

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

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

Seedling trees for windbreak purposes on farm, ranch, and public lands are available again in 1961. The Red Cedar, Austrian Pine and Ponderosa Pine are the three evergreens that. are best adapted for windbreaks in this area and are available at \$1.50 per hundred. You can secure order blanks at the County Extension Office on the second floor of the Courthouse in Farwell.

If you are considering supplemental feeding of cattle on wheat pasture here are a few things you will want to consider. Young calves require less feed per 100 pounds of gain than do older cattle. The value of the extra pounds gained must be considered in light of the cost of putting these extra pounds on.

Part of the feed will replace pasture that will not be eaten because of the grain fed. Research conducted by the Texas A & M College, Experiment Stations, shows Creep fed calves required an average of 963 pounds of concentrate ration for each additional 100 pound gained. This research was conducted in 47 tests with calves running with their Mothers on native grass pasture. In case of calves on wheat pasture the results will likely be similar so you must consider feed cost against value of extra weight gained. With cheap feed and high priced cattle the profit factor could be favorable, but with feed cost high and cattle rather cheap the tables can turn. Better look it over pretty close and take into consideration costs and other advantages of supplemental feeding on wheat be-

# Watch For Bugs When Storing Cotton

planting seed? If you do, it would be a good idea to check the seed for stored grain pests. Fred Elliott, extension cotton specialist, and C. F. Garner, extension entomologist, says these pests occasionally infest stored cottonseed. This is especially true if a large percentage of the seed are is stored in infested bins.

Cottonseed should only be Council to help support their stored in bins that have been thoroughly cleaned of waste ma-

Do you store your own cotton say. Sometimes it is necessary to sweep the ceiling and walls and clean the floor to remove hidden waste. It is also a good practice to cover cracks with builder's molding to prevent seed from collecting in them. Dust can also give satisfactory protection against insect pests. Toxaphene (20%), DDT (5%) or malathion (4-5%) should be mixed with the seed

at the rate of 2oz. per bushel. Elliott and Garner warn that treated seed should never be crushed or used for feed. For further information on treating stored cottonseed contact the local county agent.

Make sure the cotton planting seed which you store on the farm doesn't become infested with insects which can severely damage the seed between now and planting time next spring. Extension Entomologist C. F. Garner and Fred Elliott, cotton specialist, suggest the local county agent be contacted for information on seed treatment.

This word from the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council -- "Have you noted how rural accidents increase with the fall harvesting and hunting season? It's better to lose a little time than a life trying to make up for time that has been lost. It's much cheaper to stay at home than to become a victim carelessness in the field or woods. Be careful and live

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
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
